CITY OF FALCON HEIGHTS REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MINUTES MINUTES OF APRIL 28, 1999

Mayor Gehrz called the meeting to order at 7:00 P.M.

PRESENT: Gehrz, Gibson Talbot, Hustad, Jacobs, Kuettel, Administrator Hoyt,

Phillips, Engineer Maurer, Attorney Knutson

COMMUNITY FORUM:

There was no one wishing to take advantage of the community forum.

MINUTES OF APRIL 14, 1999

Minutes were approved by unanimous consent.

CONSENT AGENDA

Councilmember Kuettel moved approval of the following consent agenda. The motion passed unanimously.

- 1. Disbursements and Payroll
- 2. Licenses
- 3. Request for authorization of purchase and installation of automatic dialer in the sewage lift station
- 4. Accept a gift of ceiling fans in Community Park from the Falcon Heights/Lauderdale Lions Club
- 5. Authorization to purchase trees for boulevard and park planting
- 6. Approve the purchase of planters for the westside of the community business district on Larpenteur Avenue

PUBLIC HEARING ON PROPOSED ASSESSMENT FOR THE 1999 STREET PROJECT

Mayor Gehrz asked Engineer Maurer to provide information on the improvement project and the assessments. Maurer said the full project cost is approximately \$1,500,000 with assessments at approximately \$600,000. Maurer stated the bids from contractors will be opened on May 4th and anticipates the start of the project to begin in late May. A newsletter will be sent to affected residents advising them of the name of the contractor selected with specific names and phone numbers to call if there are questions or concerns during the project.

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Mayor Gehrz opened the public hearing at 7:06 p.m.

Katherine Elhardt, 1841 Asbury appeared before the council and indicated she had a certificate of title showing the sale of the southerly 10 feet of their property to their neighbor on the north. Elhardt said the front footage of this property appeared as 102 feet on the assessment roll when it should be 92 feet thereby reducing the amount of their assessment. Engineer Maurer will check with county records to verify this change and Attorney Knutson said legally the council can proceed with the adoption of the assessment roll with corrections, subject to confirmation.

Richard Kranz, 1484 Crawford asked why it was necessary for the water hydrants to be replaced and how much extra charge would that be to the residents. Engineer Maurer stated there are no added charges to the residents for new water hydrants. Kranz then asked about the rate of interest on the unpaid balance of the assessments. Mayor Gehrz indicated the city won't know for sure until the bonds are sold. Kranz asked why the city doesn't sell some of the university farm campus land and build some houses to get more tax money. Mayor Gehrz informed him that the city does not own this land. Kranz asked when the assessment had to be paid and Engineer Maurer informed him that it can be paid by October 1, 1999 with no interest.

A member of the audience asked if there was a discount for prepaying to which Maurer said there would not be any interest charged but no discount.

The public hearing closed at 7:15 p.m.

POLICY AGENDA

Consideration of Resolution 99-12 adopting the assessment roll for the 1999 street project

Engineer Maurer explained that adoption of this resolution is necessary to complete the special assessment process for this project. The proposed assessment rate is \$26.50 for residential properties and \$52.50 for non tax-paying properties. The total anticipated assessment amount is \$602,000 or 38% of the total cost to be bonded at \$1,580,000. Councilmember Jacobs moved to approve resolution 99-12, revised to reflect the Elhardt correction. Motion passed unanimously.

Consideration of Resolution 99-11 restricting parking on the northside of Garden Avenue approximately 270 feet east of Holton Street

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Administrator Hoyt said this request is made to eliminate parking along the area that school children walk on the northside of Holton directly to the school. Also, Garden Avenue narrows as it meets Holton Street and state highway aid standards require the area to be posted "no parking" to qualify for state aid on the reconstruction project. Motion was made by Councilmember Gibson Talbot to approve Resolution 99-11. Motion passed unanimously.

Consideration of Resolution 99-13 calling for the sale of 1999A General Obligation Bonds for the 1999 Street Project

Sharon Klumpp, financial advisor with Springsted Inc., reported on the anticipated sale of \$1,580,000 general obligation bonds for the reconstruction of the streets in the northeast quadrant. Klumpp said the anticipated interest rate is 4.3% but will fluctuate and may vary on the date of the sale which is May 26, 1999. The results of the sale will be brought to the May 26th council meeting. The bonds will cover the entire project costs including engineering, financial preparation and legal counsel. Councilmember Hustad made the motion to approve Resolution 99-13. Motion passed unanimously.

Consideration of an amendment to the agreement with Springsted for financial services for arbitrage and disclosure reporting

Administrator Hoyt said the amendment to the agreement entered into in December, 1996 with Springsted would agree to have Springsted cover arbitrage and disclosure reporting that is required by the federal government to include this bond issue. The city staff does not have the expertise to manage these annual financial requirements and recommends Springsted's services be used for this purpose. Councilmember Kuettel made the motion to approve the amendment to the agreement effective only after the sale and award of the 1999A G.O. improvement bonds. Motion passed unanimously.

Becoming a Community of Promise

Mayor Gehrz talked about the concept of Falcon Heights becoming a "Community of Promise". Gehrz said this is a nationwide youth development organization that is encouraging communities to provide mentoring, safe places, service opportunities, nurturing and teaching and learning opportunities to its youth. Gehrz also said that a youth summit gathering will be held at the state fairgrounds in Falcon Heights possibly in the year 2000. Mayor Gehrz asked the council to consider formally adopting a motion to indicate that Falcon Heights be officially named a Community of Promise. Councilmember Hustad made the motion to officially include Falcon Heights as a Community of Promise. Motion passed unanimously.

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INFORMATION AND ANNOUNCEMENTS

Councilmember Kuettel encouraged everyone to participate in the city's May 22nd anniversary parade and to attend the gathering afterward at the school for hot dogs, coke and chips. Kuettel also reminded everyone about Arbor Day celebration at Falcon Heights School on Friday, April 30. A tree will be planted and dedicated to two teachers who are retiring at the end of the school year.

Mayor Gehrz said that the playground area at Community Park will soon be upgraded. Gehrz also received a request from two Ramsey County commissioners asking the city to endorse the concept of light rail transit for the East Metro Area. After a briefing by Councilmember Jacobs on light rail issues, council decided not to endorse this concept until they have all the facts.

Administrator Hoyt said the summer recreation program enrollment is well underway.

EXPLANATION/DESCRIPTION:

Summary and action requested. The council is being asked to promote the secretary 3, Pat Phillips, to executive secretary with a pay increase from \$14.78 per hour to \$16.60 per hour, which represents Step 4 of the pay range for this position effective March 1, 1999. The pay is based upon comparable positions in comparably sized and organized cities. The request is being made since Pat has demonstrated her willingness and ability to organize and carry out a variety of administrative tasks and activities in addition to her duties as clerical support to the organization. Pat has been responsible for initiating and directing several activities since the departure of the administrative assistant on February 19, 1999. This promotion will cost the city \$3,578 over a 12 month period in additional pay. However, the administrative assistant position, with a budgeted 1999 salary of about \$39,000 is not being filled. Pat has been employed by the city for ten and a half years. The city did not fill the second Secretary 3 position upon the retirement of Dee Swenson in 1997.

Meets goal 4. To provide a responsive and effective city government.

Background.

The definition of executive secretary position in government offices is: The top level secretarial position in government unit. Examples of duties – performs broad and varied secretarial duties, which may be of confidential nature. Responsibilities include handling telephone calls, scheduling appointments and relieving the supervisor of administrative detail. May utilize word processing equipment or a personal computer and may be required to become proficient in the use of more than one software package. Composes correspondence, prepares periodic reports and conducts special projects. May give work direction to others. Position requires considerable judgment and is typically performed under minimum supervision.

Minimum qualifications: 6 plus years of secretarial work and broad knowledge of overall operations and policies.

EXPLANATION / DESCRIPTION:

Summary and action requested.

The council is being asked to authorize the contracting of Kunde Co. Inc. for forestry consulting services at a cost not to exceed \$4,800 for 1999. The contracted services will include a city-wide biannual inspection for dutch elm disease and annual inspection for oak wilt; on-site inspections of resident and staff reported problems and forestry concerns as needed. This also includes providing of information related to tree selection, diseases, planting, and maintenance to residents and staff. \$4,800 is budgeted for staffing of the tree program in 1999. The firm's owner worked with David French, Falcon Heights forester and U professor. The firm provides full-service forestry services to several cities including Oakdale, North Oaks, Burnsville, Montomedi, Birchwood and Edina. The firm will also work on the 99 street project determining how to protect trees during the street reconstruction. (These charges will be assigned to the street reconstruction project.)

Background

The Kunde Co. is a local firm (I-694 & Rice St.) that provides similar full service forestry services to the cities of North Oaks, Mahtomedi, Oakdale, Burnsville, Edina, and Birchwood. Additionally, they conduct research with the University of Minnesota and are highly recommended by the Plant Health Specialist of the Minnesota State Dept. of Agriculture. Steve Kunde, the company's owner and lead forester, is very familiar with the city of Falcon Heights due to his working relationship with Dr. David French, a renowned forester, under whose supervision he worked in Falcon Heights as a student at the University of Minnesota.

In the past, the city's tree program has been managed by a part-time seasonal employee. This person provided technical assistance in the care, planting, maintenance and removal of city owned and privately owned trees within the city. They also coordinated the

contracting of tree trimming and removal services. For the last two years, the city forester worked a scheduled 4 hour shift most weeks from mid-March through October.

With the resignation of city forester Anita Twaroski last fall, staff has researched options for the efficient delivery of forestry related services to make sure that residents' concerns are met in a timely way with the necessary level of expertise. After reviewing the city's options, it is recommended that a forestry consultant be utilized for services requiring technical expertise while city staff be utilized for services related to policy issues and the contracting of tree trimming and removal services.

With this model, city staff members would field resident's questions and concerns and forward those requiring technical expertise to the forestry consultant. Thereby, expediting residents' questions that have nothing to do with the health or well being of a tree, but have to do with other issues – like when will I get a boulevard tree. The parks and public works staff would follow up on policy related questions and concerns, the coordinating and implementation of trimming and removal contracts, Arbor Day events and Tree City applications. This is a model that is utilized very successfully in a number of area cities. The benefits of this model include the following:

- Easy access for staff and residents to consultants with the highest levels of forestry expertise. (by phone, through regularly scheduled visits to the city, etc.)
- Ability to utilize consultants at a rate consistent with actual needs (won't be in the city doing tree work if there is none to be done).
- Prompt service to residents with materials that can be faxed or delivered on specific tree questions.
- Ability to review the RFP for tree trimming and tree removal
- Ability to oversee and review the work done by the tree trimming/tree removal service
- Experienced people who have dealt with tree problems as well as with many residents concerns about trees in a variety of settings
- Recommendations will be made from an independent forester's perspective rather than from the firm that is in the business of planting, trimming or removing trees
- The firm provides written comment sheets on all interactions with Falcon Heights residents as well as a prepared annual report for the city.
