City of Falcon Heights Council Minutes June 26, 2002

Mayor Gehrz called the meeting to order at 7 p.m.

PRESENT: Gehrz, Kuettel, Lamb, Lindstrom, Talbot. Also present was Heather Worthington, City Administrator and Pat Phillips, Deputy Clerk.

COMMUNITY FORUM: There was no one present to speak before the council.

MINUTES: The minutes of June 12, 2002 were approved as written.

PRESENTATION:

Mayor Gehrz presented Certificates of Achievement to Kimberly and KatieJo Kuhens in honor of their receiving the Girl Scout Silver and Gold Awards. Both KatieJo and Kimberly stepped forward to acknowledge receipt and to say a few words about what they had to accomplish in order to be nominated for these highest awards.

POLICY

2001 Street Repairs and Alley Improvements Project – Final Retainage Payment to Hardrives, Inc.

Administrator Worthington said the city's engineers recommended release of \$2,500 retainage payment to the contractor hired to do the 2001 Street and Alley Improvements. One final punch list item, a sidewalk replacement in the Northome area, had been completed so release of the retainage amount was recommended. Councilmember Lindstrom made a motion to approve the release of \$2,500 to Hardrives, Inc. The motion passed unanimously.

REPORTS FROM COUNCILMEMBERS

Councilmember Lindstrom said he had attended a meeting on Monday, June 24, with regard to the Curtiss Field improvement proposals. Another meeting will be held on July 22nd.

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Lindstrom also said the Planning Commission met to discuss possible changes in the city's code on lot coverage. It currently is at 75% and the commission is considering proposing a 35 to 45% lot coverage to maximize green space.

Councilmember Talbot reported briefly on the League of Minnesota Cities conference he attended in Rochester. Talbot also talked about the Curtiss Field meeting and the drainage problem and said residents who attended the meeting were concerned about the possibility of a change in traffic patterns and how it would affect their neighborhood.

Councilmember Kuettel said that at the League of Minnesota Cities conference the city received the 2002 Homeland Security Initiatives Award.

Mayor Gehrz also mentioned several committees and workshops she attended at the LMC conference.

INFORMATION AND ANNOUNCEMENTS

Administrator Worthington reminded everyone of three upcoming meetings/events. One is on July 18 at City Hall dealing with the SE Corner Re-development plans. A traffic engineer will also be present at this meeting to answer questions about traffic. The second reminder is the Park Commission's second meeting regarding the Curtiss Field improvements which will be held on July 22 at City Hall. The third event is the Ice Cream Social which will be on July 25, 2002 from 6 to 8 p.m. Worthington said "Booker the Dog", a Ramsey County Library mascot will also be in attendance this year.

2002 SIDEWALK IMPROVEMENTS

Dear Ms. Worthington:

The City received quotes to complete the 2002 Sidewalk Improvement project on July 2, 2002. Requests were sent to seven contractors. One quote was returned by Midwest Concrete Driveway. We have marked the sidewalk to be replaced as part of this project. We measured the exact dimensions of the areas to be replaced, which totals 1,480 square feet and identified two pedestrian ramps to be replaced. The total construction cost in this quote is \$9,850.00

The completion date for this project is scheduled for September 27, 2002. Further scheduling issues will be worked out at the pre-construction conference. No work will be permitted prior to a pre-construction conference being held to coordinate the work. We will provide periodic inspection of the work as it progresses.

The project requires City staff to complete restoration along the completed sidewalk as has been done in previous years. We will coordinate this work with the contractor and City staff.

We recommend award of this contract to Midwest Concrete Driveway in the amount of \$9,850.00

EXPLANATION:

<u>Summary:</u> The city's auditors, Kern DeWenter Viere, Ltd, presented a three-year contract which included audit expenses for 2001 totaling \$9,800.00, plus unknown expenses related to the GASB-34 conversion. The final billing for the 2001 audit was \$14,300, \$4,500 of which was related to the GASB-34 conversion. Since the Council approved the preliminary audit amount of \$9,800 earlier this year, staff is requesting that the Council formally approve the final audit amount which reflects the \$4,500 needed to satisfy the GASB-34 audit conversion requirements.

EXPLANATION:

Summary: The 2002 Budget allows \$32,000 for seal coating in the NE Quadrant neighborhood this summer. That area of the city was reconstructed in 1999, and the pavement is now in need of crack sealing and seal coating in order to maintain the roadway and prevent future damage. Bids for this project were higher than anticipated based on last year's seal coat project in Northome. The two bids for the Seal Coat and Crack Seal with Alternate 1.0 (see bid tabulation) received were as follows:

Pearson Brother's Inc. \$44,762.60 Allied Blacktop \$48,171.30

Last year's sealcoat used a buckshot aggregate for the final coat, and much of that material does not adhere completely to the tar sometimes. As a result, staff has researched some new material for seal coating, and found that a granite chip will have more durability, better adherence to the tar, and a better appearance overall than the traditional pea gravel used in years past. The granite chip has a slightly higher cost than pea gravel, but typically lasts about two years longer. Several cities in the north metro have gone to the granite chip and are pleased with the results. Since the durability of this material is higher, our engineers anticipate a cost savings over time despite the higher material cost. The difference in cost between the buckshot and the granite chip is roughly \$1,000 for this project.

Another issue identified by staff is the classification of seal coating as a general fund project rather than a capital fund project. The city adopted the Pavement Management Plan last year in preparation for the GASB-34 auditing requirements. This creates a structure in which seal coating and other planned maintenance of our streets may fall under the capital fund designation. If the auditors advise us to make this change, we would then request that the Council approve a budget amendment sometime towards the end of this year. There are adequate funds in the Infrastructure Fund to cover the \$12,762.60 difference between the bid amounts and the budgeted amount.

Dear Ms. Worthington:

As you know, today the City opened bids for the above-named project. Two bids were received for the project. The low base bid and low alternate bid were from Pearson Brothers.

We have worked with Bill Maertz to develop an alternate bid for this project which will provide a higher quality and more durable seal coating aggregate. The cost differential between the two options is minimal and the benefits should prove to provide a long-term cost savings for the City. The granite aggregate in the alternate bid will prove to be more durable and should last longer than the buckshot aggregate that has been used in previous years. This change is another step we are recommending in the City's shifting focus from reconstruction to maintenance.

Pearson Brother's Inc., has provided quality service to the City on previous projects. We recommend the City award the project to include the rout and seal cracks and the alternate seal coat aggregate in the amount of \$44,762.60 to Pearson Brothers, Inc., as shown on the attached bid tabulation. The other bid received for this project with the recommended scope was in the amount of \$48,171.30.

Summary: During the 2002 Session, the State Legislature legalized certain fireworks for the first time since the 1940's. They made no provision for the use, or time of use of fireworks, other than a general provision that they not be used on public property.

It has been recommended that city clarify its role in enforcing the local regulation of fireworks by adopting an ordinance covering the use of fireworks within their boundaries on public and private property. This ordinance does not cover the purchase of legal fireworks, as that is addressed in the state statute.

ORDINANCE NO. 02-04

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 8 OF THE FALCON HEIGHTS CITY CODE CONCERNING FIREWORKS

THE CITY COUNCIL OF FALCON HEIGHTS, MINNESOTA ORDAINS:

SECTION 1. Chapter 8, Section 3 of the Falcon Heights City Code is amended by adding Section 8-3.05 to provide as follows:

8-3.05: LEGAL FIREWORKS.

The following items which are defined as "legal fireworks" may not be used on public property or on private property without the consent of the private property owner:

Wire or wood sparklers of not more than 100 grams of mixture per item, other sparkling items which are nonexplosive and nonaerial and contain 75 grams or less of chemical mixture per tube or a total of 200- grams or less for multiple tubes, snakes and glow worms, smoke devices, or trick noisemakers which include paper streamers, party poppers, string poppers, snappers, and drop pops, each consisting of not more than twenty-five hundredths grains of explosive mixture.

SECTION 2. This ordinance shall be effective immediately upon is passage.

ORDINANCE NO. 02-03

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 8 OF THE FALCON HEIGHTS CITY CODE CONCERNING NOISE

THE CITY COUNCIL OF FALCON HEIGHTS, MINNESOTA ORDAINS:

SECTION 1. Section 8-2.02, subparts D and E of the Falcon Heights City Code are repealed.

SECTION 2. Chapter 8 of the Falcon Heights City Code is amended by adding Section 5 to read as follows:

SECTION 5. NOISE.

8-5.01 Definitions.

Words and phrases defined in this Section have, when used in this ordinance, the meanings given below. Any other word or phrase used in this ordinance, and defined in regulations of the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency Noise Pollution Control Rules Chapter 7030, has the meaning given in those regulations.

- A. Air Circulation Device means a mechanism designed and used for the controlled flow of air used in ventilation, cooling, or conditioning, but not limited to, central and window air conditioning units.
- D. Person means an individual, firm, partnership, corporation, trustee, association, the state and its agencies and subdivisions, or any body of persons whether incorporated or not. With respect to acts prohibited or required herein, "person" shall include employees and licensees.

8-5.02 Noises Prohibited.

A. <u>General Prohibition</u>. No person shall make or cause to be made any distinctly and loudly audible noise that unreasonably annoys, disturbs, injures, or endangers the comfort, repose, health, peace, safety, or welfare of any persons or precludes their enjoyment of

- property or affects their property's value. This general prohibition is not limited by the specific restrictions of the following sections.
- B. <u>Horns, Audible Signaling Devices, etc.</u> No person shall sound any signaling device on any vehicle except as a warning of danger, as required by Minnesota Statutes 169.68.
- C. <u>Exhaust</u>. No person shall discharge the exhaust, or permit the discharge of the exhaust, of any steam engine, stationary internal combustion engine, motor boat, motor vehicle, recreational vehicle or snowmobiles except through a muffler or other device that effectively prevents loud or explosive noises therefrom and complies with all applicable state laws and regulations.
- D. <u>Defective Vehicles or Loads</u>. No person shall use any vehicle so out of repair or so loaded as to create loud and unnecessary grating, grinding, rattling, or other noise.
- E. <u>Loading, Unloading, Unpacking</u>. No person shall create loud and excessive noise in loading, unloading, or unpacking any vehicle.
- F, Radios, Tape Player, Compact Disc Player, Paging System; etc.
 - 1. General Prohibition. No person shall use or operate or permit the use or operation of any radio receiving set, musical instrument, tape player, compact disc player, paging system, machine, or other device for the production or reproduction of sound in a distinctly and loudly audible manner as to unreasonably disturb the peace, quiet, comfort, safety, or welfare of any persons or precludes their enjoyment of property or affects their property value.
 - 2. Nighttime Prohibition. Operation of any such set, instrument, tape player, compact disc player, machine, or other device between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. in such a manner as to be plainly audible at the property line of the structure or building in which it is located, in the hallway or apartment adjacent, or at a distance of fifty feet (50') if the source is located outside a structure or building shall be prima facie evidence of a violation of this section.
- G. Participation in Noisy Parties or Gatherings. No person shall participate in any party or other gathering of people giving rise to noise, unreasonably disturbing the peace, quiet, or repose of another person. When a police officer determines that a gathering is creating such a noise disturbance, the officer may order all persons present, other than the owner or tenant of the premises where the disturbance is occurring, to disperse immediately. No person shall refuse to leave after being ordered by a police officer to do so. Every owner or tenant of such premises who has knowledge of the disturbance shall make every reasonable effort to see that the disturbance is stopped.
- H. <u>Loudspeakers, Amplifiers for Advertising, etc.</u> No person shall operate or permit the use or operation of any loudspeaker, sound amplifier, or other device for the production or reproduction of sound on a street or other public place for the purpose of commercial

advertising or attracting the attention of the public to any commercial establishment or vehicle.

- I. <u>Animals</u>. No person shall keep any animal that unreasonably disturbs the comfort or repose of any person by its frequent or continued noise. For purposes of this section, "disturbs the comfort or repose of any person by its frequent or continued noise" means any one of the following:
 - 1. The animal noise occurs at a time between 10:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. and can be heard from a location outside the building and premises where the animal is being kept, and the animal has made such noises intermittently for more than three (3) minutes; or
 - 2. The animal noise can be heard five hundred feet (500') from the location of the building and premises where the animal is being kept, and the animal has made such noises intermittently for more than three (3) minutes; or
 - 3. The animal noise can be heard from a location outside the building and premises where the animal is being kept, and the animal has made such noises intermittently for a period of at least five (5) minutes.
- J. <u>Schools, Churches, Hospitals, etc.</u> No person shall create any excessive noise on a street, alley, or public grounds adjacent to any school, institution of learning, church, hospital, or home for the elderly when the noise unreasonably interferes with the working of the institution or disturbs or unduly annoys its occupants or residents and when conspicuous signs indicate the presence of such institution.

8-5.03 Hourly Restriction on Certain Operations.

- A. <u>Recreational Vehicles and Snowmobiles</u>. No person shall, between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m., drive or operate any snowmobile or other recreational vehicle not licensed for travel on public highways.
- B. <u>Domestic Power Equipment</u>. No person shall operate a power lawn mower, power hedge clipper, chain saw, mulcher, garden tiller, edger, leaf blower/vacuum, drill or other similar domestic power maintenance equipment except between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m.
- C. Refuse Hauling and Recycling Collection. No person shall collect or remove garbage or refuse or collect designated recyclables in any residential district except between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m.
- D. <u>Construction, Maintenance, and Repair Activities</u>. No person shall engage in or permit construction, maintenance, and repair activities involving the use of any kind of electric, diesel, or gas-powered motor vehicles or machine or other power equipment except between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m.

- E. <u>Exceptions</u>. The following uses and activities are exempt from this section as specified below:
 - 1. Snow removal motor vehicles, equipment, and operations are exempt from subsections B and D above.
 - 2. Excavation/grading operations are exempt from subsection D above.
 - 3. Equipment and vehicles used for maintenance or public or private golf courses, public and private driving ranges, ice skating rinks on public property, and ski trail grooming on public property are exempt from the hourly restrictions of subsections A, B, and D above.
 - Golf carts for use on public or private golf courses are exempt from subsections A and D above.

8-5.04 Receiving Land Use Standards.

A. <u>Maximum Noise Levels By Receiving Land Use Districts</u>. No person shall operate or cause or permit to be operated any source of noise in such a manner as to create a noise level exceeding the limit set in Table I for the receiving land use category specified when measured at a point of normal human activity of the receiving land use.

B. <u>Exemptions</u>. The levels prescribed in subsection A above do not apply to noise originating on public streets and alleys but such noise shall be subject to other applicable sections of this ordinance.

8-5.05 <u>Exemption for Emergency Work.</u>

Noise created exclusively in the performance of emergency work to preserve the public health, safety, or welfare necessary to restore a public service or eliminate a public hazard shall be exempt from the provisions of this ordinance for a period not to exceed twenty-four (24) hours after the work is commenced. The City Administrator may grant an extension of the 24-hour exemption as deemed appropriate. Persons responsible for such work shall inform the City Administrator of the need to initiate such work or, if the work is commenced during non-business

hours of the City, at the beginning of the first business day thereafter. Any person responsible for such emergency work shall take all reasonable actions to minimize the amount of noise.

8-5.06 Powers and Duties of the City Administrator.

The administering office of the noise control program established by this ordinance shall be administered by the City Administrator or his or her designee.

8-5.07 <u>Variances</u>.

- A. <u>Authority</u>. The Zoning Administrator shall have authority, consistent with this section, to grant exemptions from the requirements of Section 5.
- B. <u>Application</u>. It is recognized that under certain circumstances it would be impossible for a noise source to comply with the provisions of this Section 5 due to economic or technological reasons. In cases such as this, application for an exception may be made in writing to the Zoning Administrator. The application shall contain the following pertinent information:
 - 1. Legal description of property;
 - 2. Dates of exception requested;
 - 3. Location of particular noise source and times of operation;
 - Equipment involved;
 - Necessity for request of exception;
 - 6. Steps taken to minimize noise level from source;
 - 7. Names of responsible persons; and
 - List of property owners within two hundred feet (200') of the subject property in a format prescribed by the Zoning Administrator (only if exception is for more than 3 days).

If the exception is for more than three (3) days, the Zoning Administrator shall give notice of the request as provided herein. Notice of the request for an exception shall consist of a legal property description, description of request for exception and map detailing property location, and be published in the official newspaper at least twenty (20) days prior to a decision on the request, and written notice shall be mailed at least twenty (20) days prior to a decision on the request to all owners of land within two hundred feet (200') of the boundary of the property in question. Applications will be reviewed by the Zoning Administrator and a decision to approve or deny the exception will be made in writing to the responsible persons within thirty (30) days of publication of the notice. Any person

choosing to comment on the exception may do so in writing within twenty (20) days of mailing of the notice.

- C. <u>Action on Application</u>. The exception may be approved only if the Zoning Administrator finds that full compliance with the requirements of the ordinance would constitute an unreasonable hardship on the applicant, on other persons, or on the community. In determining whether to grant or deny the application, the Zoning Administrator shall balance the hardship to the applicant against the adverse impact on the health, safety, and welfare of the persons affected, the adverse impact on property affected, and any other adverse effects of granting the exception. The exception may be granted subject to conditions, including a time limit, which shall be clearly stated. Mailed notice of the decision shall be made within five (5) days to all persons who commented in writing on the application.
- D. <u>Appeals</u>. The decision made by the Zoning Administrator concerning the exception request may be appealed to the City Council within ten (10) days after the Zoning Administrator's written decision. The appeal shall be filed in writing with the City Clerk who shall schedule a date before the City Council as soon as possible. The person appealing the decision shall file with the City Clerk a Notice of Appeal specifying the grounds upon which the appeal is based. Mailed notice of the City Council date shall be made to the applicant, and to any person who filed a Notice of Appeal.

8-5.08. <u>Enforcement</u>.

- A. Primary enforcement of this ordinance shall be by the police department.
- B. Notice of Certain Violations. When the City Administrator determines that a noise exceeds the maximum sound level permitted under this Section 5, written notice of the violation shall be given to the owner or occupant of the premises where the noise originates and such person shall be ordered to correct or remove each specified violation within such reasonable time as is prescribed in the notice. The failure to remove or correct any such violation within the time so prescribed constitutes a violation of this ordinance.
- C. <u>Civil Remedies</u>. This ordinance may be enforced by injunction, action for abatement, or other appropriate civil remedy.
- D. <u>Criminal Penalties</u>. Any violation of this ordinance involving the operation of a motor vehicle, which occurs in a motor vehicle, is a petty misdemeanor and, upon conviction, the violator shall be punished by a fine established by state statute. Every person who violates any other provision of this ordinance is guilty of a misdemeanor and shall, upon conviction, be subject to penalties imposed by Minnesota Statutes for misdemeanor offenses. In all cases the City shall be entitled to collect the costs of prosecution to the full extent permitted by law. Each act of violation and each day a violation occurs or continues constitutes a separate offense.

8-5.9 <u>Severability</u>.

If any provision of this ordinance or the application of any provision to a particular situation is held to be invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining portions of the ordinance and the application of the ordinance to any other situation shall not be invalidated.
