18	Chair Dahl convened the meeting of the Lino Lakes Charter Commission at 6:30 pm on October

25	Chair Dahl requested to add discussion of the Five-Year Plan under New Business.

29	OPEN MIC/PUBLIC COMMENT		
30	No one present opted to speak for the open mic.

32	OLD BUSINESS		
33			
34	A. <u>Approval of May 9, 2019 Minutes</u>		
35	MOTION by Commissioner Juni, seconded by Commissioner Poehling, approving the meeting		
36	minutes of May 9, 2019.		
37			
38	Motion passed unanimously.		
39			
40	B. <u>Petitions with City Clerk and City Attorney</u>		
41	City Clerk Bartell referenced the discussion the Commission had at the May 9 <sup>th</sup> meeting which		
42	left some open-ended questions. She explained that due to the number and types of varying		
43	petitions, it would be difficult to provide a template petition. She reviewed some of the different		
44	petitions that she has received in the past. She explained that each petition is very different in its		
45	regulations and therefore a template could make it more difficult as it would not be accurate. She		

- stated that the most successful method would be for residents to check with City staff or legal
- 47 counsel related to the necessary information for a petition.
- 48
- 49 Commissioner Lyden commented that it appears it would be difficult to formulate a template and
- 50 perhaps it would be better to include language on the City website that residents can contact City
- 51 staff for more information on what would be required for a particular petition. He explained that
- 52 his concern is making the information accessible and user friendly.
- 53
- 54 City Clerk Bartell stated that perhaps blurbs could be placed under the City Charter and
- 55 Administration portions of the website which would make it easily searchable.
- 56
- 57 Chair Dahl provided an example of a petition that circulated her neighborhood and was
- 58 successful to gain additional streetlights.
- 59
- 60 Commissioner Trehus stated that the discussion at the last meeting was related to the petitions
- available under the two sections of the Charter. He stated that he has heard in the past that
- residents have reached out about potential petitions and were assisted by City staff. He asked for
- additional details on the assistance that City staff is able to provide, as he would want to ensure
- 64 that the petition process is an easy and open process.
- 65
- 66 City Clerk Bartell agreed that she also likes to ensure that the process is as easy and open as
   67 possible. She provided an example where she recently spoke with a resident about a petition that
- 68 was not clear. She stated that in that case it was clear to her that the resident should speak to
- 69 legal counsel on how best to proceed. She stated that the petition was ultimately rejected by the
- 70 City Council.
- 71

Commissioner Trehus stated that he has submitted a petition in the past and used the statute for
 guidance. He asked if a form was created for the petition against the extension of water in a
 neighborhood.

76 City Clerk Bartell confirmed that the City Attorney assisted in creating that form, based on

- direction from City staff. She explained that there was a need for the Council to know how many
- 78 people supported water/sewer in that neighborhood. She noted that the decision from City staff
- 79 to request assistance from the City Attorney would be based on the circumstances. She stated
- that she would hope that residents would not see a petition form as the only method of
- communicating or requesting something they would like to discuss. She noted that she will help
- to the extent of her knowledge and power when asked.
- 83
- 84 Commissioner Lyden stated that in getting it right, sometimes a legal opinion is needed.
  85
- 86 City Clerk Bartell stated that in some instances the City Attorney could review that. She noted
- that she does not refer anything directly as the City Attorney conducts work under a legal
- contract and therefore any potential referrals would need to go through the City Administrator.
- 89
- 90 C. <u>Legal Representation</u>

- 91 Chair Dahl stated that she reached out to Kennedy and Graven, following the last discussion.
- 92 She stated that the firm currently represents the City on bond and development matters and
- 93 therefore cannot represent the Charter Commission. She noted that two additional referrals were
- 94 provided that have knowledge on municipal law but noted that neither option had any experience
- 95 with charters. She stated that she is at a loss of what else she could do to research potential legal
- 96 representation.
- 97
- Commissioner Bretoi asked if Kennedy and Graven provided a reason for not wanting to assist
   the Charter Commission.
- 100
- 101 Chair Dahl explained that the reason provided was a potential conflict as the firm currently 102 represents the City on bonding and development issues.
- 102
- 104 Commissioner Trehus agreed that there could be a potential conflict if that firm represents the 105 City on bonding and development issues.
- 106
- 107 Commissioner Poehling asked if a specific issue was mentioned in the email to the firm, as there 108 could be a difference in a potential conflict dependent upon the issue needing assistance.
- 109
- 110 Chair Dahl read aloud the communication she sent to the firm, which was vague in the possible
- representation. She stated that at this time there is not a specific issue the Commission needs
- assistance with. She explained that is why she kept the request general as there is not a specific
- 113 request needing assistance.
- 114
- 115 Commissioner Poehling stated that if there is a specific issue that arises, perhaps the Commission
- 116 could reach out to the firm and there could be clearance provided for that firm to assist the 117 Commission if there is not a conflict.
- 118
- 119 Commissioner Bretoi stated that this issue has been ongoing for some time with no resolution 120 and perhaps it would be time to move on.
- 121
- 122 Commissioner Trehus referenced the outdated list that Chair Dahl mentioned and asked for more123 information.
- 124
- 125 Chair Dahl stated that she has a list from the League of Minnesota Cities of other charter cities
- and the related contacts. She noted that the contacts listed have most likely become outdated,
- 127 which would equate to the lack of responses. She stated that she did request an updated list but
- 128 was told there would be a very high hourly charge to provide that information. She stated that
- she would be willing to reach out to additional cities.
- 130
- City Clerk Bartell stated that perhaps the contact be limited to the metro area to narrow down thelist.
- 133

- 134 Commissioner Damiani stated that she completed a Google search of charter cities within the
- state of Minnesota which provided immediate results. She noted that may be a source to provideupdated contact information.
- 137
- 138 Chair Dahl noted that some charter cities replied that they do not have their own representation 139 and simply utilize their City Attorney with questions.
- 140

## 141 D. Open Positions on Charter Commission

City Clerk Bartell stated that the Chair typically invites the members with expiring terms to reapply if desired and reviewed the different methods to reapply. She explained the process that is followed once applications are received. She stated that the City has been advertising for the open positions on the Commission through multiple formats. She stated that the City has not yet received any applications for the three open positions.

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## 148 **<u>NEW BUSINESS</u>**

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## 150 A. Odd Year Elections

151 City Clerk Bartell hoped that the Commissioners were able to review the report which includes 152 the background information going back to 2010. She explained that in 2010 the Council brought 153 forward the idea of switching to even year elections, as Lino Lakes is one of only two cities in 154 Anoka County that complete local elections in odd years. She stated that a driving force to

change to even years is the cost savings to the city budget as well as staff time. She explained

- that both the City Clerk and Deputy City Clerk devote much of their time in a year to election administration, along with the time of the election judges. She stated that the requirement of an
- odd year election is included in the Charter and therefore, inte 2010, the question of change of an
- even year was sent to the Charter Commission.

161 Chair Dahl recalled that the Mayor was opposed to a change. She found it helpful to have that 162 opinion expressed.

163

164 City Clerk Bartell noted that the topic was added to the Charter Commission now at the request

- 165 of the Chair. She noted that the cost budgeted for election administration this year is \$18,000.
- 166 She confirmed that \$4,000 to \$5,000 of that cost is capital improvements for equipment that 167 wouldn't be saved.
- 167 v 168
- 169 Commissioner Poehling asked if the Council is currently discussing this topic.
- 170

171 City Clerk Bartell said no.

- 172
- 173 Chair Dahl stated that she placed the item on the agenda at the request of a Commission member.
- Commissioner Poehling stated that he would favor even year elections. He recognized the cost
   savings but noted that there would also be higher voter turnout.

177

178 Commissioner Lyden asked if there is information on the turnout for even and odd year elections.

179 City Clerk Bartell commented that in Presidential years the voter turnout rate is in the 90 percent 180 rate, whereas typical odd year turnouts range from about 15 to 30 percent. 181 182 183 Commissioner Trehus asked if special referendum elections could still fall on odd years. 184 City Clerk Bartell confirmed that those elections could occur on odd years if necessary. She 185 provided additional information on the administration of elections and the related costs. 186 187 Commissioner Bretoi asked if it would be appropriate to bring the topic back to the City Council 188 following the election this year. 189 190 Chair Dahl agreed that would be a good idea. 191 192 Commissioner Juni stated that he remembered when this discussion occurred in 2010. He stated 193 that it seemed that the Charter Commission at that time followed the opinion of the Mayor to not 194 change that element of the Charter. 195 196 City Clerk Bartell noted that Charter amendments that don't go to ballot require a unanimous 197 vote of the Council. 198 199 200 Commissioner Trehus stated that the reason the change was not supported in the past is because the visibility of the local candidates often becomes lost during even year elections because of the 201 elections at the state and federal levels occurring at that time. He stated that even though there is 202 a lesser voter turnout on odd years, the people voting are often more informed. 203 204 Commissioner Bretoi noted that there is nothing that requires a voter to vote for every position. 205 He noted that people can simply skip items that they are not informed on. He stated that there is 206 a much smaller voter turnout for odd election years. 207 208 209 Commissioner Trehus commented that those are more informed voters. 210 211 Commissioner Bretoi commented that is just a personal opinion. 212 Commissioner Juni stated that he would like to wait to continue the discussion after the elections 213 this year. He stated that even if half of the even year election turnout votes on local elections, 214 that is still more than the turnout on odd years. 215 216 Commissioner Trehus stated that it his opinion that the ability to focus on local election matters 217 218 is compromised by the larger elections occurring on even number years. 219 Commissioner Poehling stated that he pays attention to all those offices up for election when he 220 votes on even number years. 221 222

- MOTION by Commissioner Bretoi, seconded by Commissioner Lyden, requesting to bring this topic forward to the City Council after the election.
- 225
- Further discussion: Commissioner Juni commented that this would be a good topic for joint discussion between the Commission and City Council.
- 228
- 229 Commissioner Davis stated that it is a fairly common issue across the country with lower vote 230 participation in odd years. He stated that he believes in odd year elections as it provides local
- candidates much more visibility but noted that education of the public would really be a driving
- force in increasing voter participation. He stated that during even year elections the local
- election candidates would most likely be placed on the back side of the form which is typicallyconsidered "less important".
- 234 235
- Chair Dahl noted that the Commission could discuss this at its January meeting and then
   something could be potentially sent to the City Council.
- 238
- Commissioner Bretoi (maker of the motion on the floor) stated that he would agree to delaying
   until after the Commission can discuss the topic again.
- 241
- Commissioner Juni stated that he would also suggest that the Commission discuss the topic and perhaps then in a joint format with the City Council to open that line of communication as this would be a good topic to discuss jointly between the two groups.
- 245
- 246 Commissioner Bretoi agreed that this should be discussed under Old Business at the January
- 247 Charter Commission meeting and a specific time to discuss the topic with the Council could be 248 discussed at that time.
- 248 249
- 250 Motion passed unanimously.
- 251252 B. <u>Discussion of the Five-Year Plan</u>
- Chair Dahl stated that this element is required by the Charter but did not believe that the City
  Council is doing a good job to ensuring this is completed.
- 255
- MOTION by Commissioner Bretoi, seconded by Commissioner Trehus, ask the City Council when it plans to update and publish the next Five-Year Plan as required by the City Charter.

- 259 Motion passed unanimously.

TOPIC:	City Charter Document On-Line

## **INTRODUCTION**

Since Lino Lakes is a home rule charter city, it is organized and operates under the guidance of its City Charter, its Code of Ordinances and state statutes.

## BACKGROUND

It's important for citizens to have access to the City Charter to fully understand the operations and regulations of the City. Currently the Charter document is available to view on the City's website as a PDF document that can be accessed by clicking on the Charter Commission link.

The City's Code of Ordinances is available through the City website also however it is provided by a link to a professional legal publishing company called American Legal. By hosting our Code online through this service, we offer residents and staff certain benefits such optimum search capability and the ability to insert amendments efficiently.

#### **RECOMMENDATION**

As someone who utilizes the City Code and Charter often, I think it would be beneficial to add the City Charter to the Code of Ordinances site for the following reasons:

- Better search capability;
- More visibility to the general public and staff;
- One stop viewing for City regulations;
- Cleaner format.

There is an upfront cost of approximately \$1,200 to get the Charter added to the site. This upfront cost would be covered through the current City annual budget line item for updating the City Code with no impact on the Charter Commission budget.
