#### City of Lake Elmo City Council Minutes

December 1, 2009

Mayor Johnson called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

PRESENT: Mayor Johnston and Council Members DeLapp, Emmons, Park and Smith.

Also Present: City Administrator Messelt, Planning Director Klatt, Planner Matzek, City Engineer Griffin, Attorney Snyder, Finance Director Bouthilet, Joe Rigdon, KDV Consultant, and City Clerk Lumby.

#### APPROVAL OF AGENDA:

MOTION: Council Member Park moved to approve the December 1, 2009 City Council Agenda as presented. Council Member Smith seconded the motion The motion passed 5-0.

#### GROUND RULES:

#### APPROVED MINUTES:

The November 15, 2009, City Council minutes were approved by consensus.

PUBLIC COMMENTS/INQUIRIES: None

#### CONSENT AGENDA:

MOTION: Council Member Smith moved to approve the Consent Agenda as presented. Council Member Emmons seconded the motion. The motion passed 5-0.

- Approve payment of disbursements and payroll in the amount of \$310,149.37
- Approve 2010 Liquor license renewals and On-sale intoxicating liquor license for the Lake Elmo Inn Event Center
- Consider approval of Resolution No. 2009-046 approving the renewal of an Interim Use Permit application from Common Ground Church to permit the keeping of horses.

## **REGULAR AGENDA:**

Update on Friends of Washington County - Marc Hugunin

Bruce Messelt, City Administrator, reported the City Council was asked to receive an update from Marc Hugunin, Executive Director of the Friends of Washington County regarding efforts to address state-wide rulemaking on landfills that will have an impact on the proposed Xcel fly ash landfill in West Lakeland Township.

Mr. Hugunin explained because their work will expand to encompass Legislative activity, the costs for this project will be somewhat greater in 2010 than in 2009. He requested that the City renew its support of this project at the same level (\$2,500) as in 2009.

MOTION: Council Member DeLapp moved to authorize \$2,500 to come out of the CIP Bond Fund to renew the City's support for the Friends of Washington County in an effort to strengthen the statewide rules for landfill siting and to better protect our groundwater resources from contamination from landfill operations. Council Member Emmons seconded the motion. The motion passed 5-0.

#### Final 2009 Tax Levy Certification, Payable 2010, Resolution No. 2009-048

Bruce Messelt, City Administrator, reported the City Council is being asked to affirmatively consider and adopt the Final 2009 Tax Levy Certification, Payable 2010.

Joe Rigdon, KDV Financial consultant, presented the proposed 2010 City property tax levy and proposed 2010 city budget.

MOTION: Council Member Park moved to approve Resolution No. 2009-048 authorizing certification to the Washington County Auditor of the 2009 Tax Levy (\$2,743,346 collectible in 2010). Council Member Emmons seconded the motion. The motion passed 5-0.

# Proposed 2010 Operating Budget and 2010-14 Capital Improvement Program; Resolution No. 2009-049

The Public Hearing notice on the budget and on the proposed amount of 2010 property taxes the City proposed to collect to pay for the cost of services the City will provide in 2010 was published in the November 25, 2009 Oakdale/Lake Elmo Review.

Tom Bouthilet, Finance Director, reported the City Council is being asked to convene a public hearing on the proposed 2010 Budget and then take action on the 2010 Budget and 2010-2014 CIP.

Mayor Johnston invited residents in attendance to express their opinions on the budget and on the proposed amount of 2010 property taxes.

Dan Novak, 8520 Ironwood Trail N, asked what percentage of the budget was increased or decreased. The City Administrator responded for the 2010 total budget there was a 1.3% increase over the 2009 budget.

MOTION: Council member Smith moved to approve Resolution No. 2009-049 as amended by redirecting \$2,500 to the Friends of Washington County, adopting the 2010 Budget and 2010-2014 Capital Improvement Plan. Council Member Emmons seconded the motion. The motion passed 5-0.

Public Hearing: Delinquent water and wastewater utility bills; Resolution No. 2009-050 The public hearing notice was published in the November 18, 2009 Oakdale/Lake Elmo Review

Tom Bouthilet, Finance Director, reported the City Council is being asked to convene a public hearing, as required under State law, to consider recommended action to assess property owners for delinquent 2009 Water and Wastewater utility bills.

Mayor Johnston opened up the public hearing at 8:08 p.m.

Jeff Riegle, 2773 Inwood Avenue N., referred to his letter submitted to the City stating his objections:

- Rationale for the "Estimated" billing of water to the resident
- Repair of defacement of home
- Connection of water service to water softener system,
- Water service with proper water pressure
- Water meter of good working order

Phillip Liniewicz, 8226 26<sup>th</sup> Street, stated they just installed a new well two years ago at a cost of \$12,000 and had to cap this well. Since they have been connected to the city water service, they have had problems with proper water pressure even though a booster pump has been installed.

Mayor Johnston closed the public hearing at 8:15 p.m.

Administrator Messelt will follow-up on residents' concerns by contacting public works and the city engineer.

MOTION: Council Member Park moved to approve Resolution No. 2009-050, A Resolution authorizing certification to Washington County Auditor for unpaid utility bills. Council Member DeLapp seconded the motion. The motion passed 5-0.

Consider an application from James Burns for a variance from the front yard setback requirement in an R1 zoning district to allow the construction of a building addition; Resolution No. 2009-045

Kyle Klatt, Planning Director, reported the City Council is being asked to consider a request from James Burns for a variance allowing the construction of an addition to an existing residence at 11140 20<sup>th</sup> Street Court North. The addition would be set back 22.8 feet from a front property line, or 3.2 feet closer to this line than allowed under the R-1 Single Family Residential Zoning District requirements and related provisions for established neighborhood setbacks.

MOTION: Council Member Park moved to approve Resolution No. 2009-045, A Resolution approving a variance request to a setback variance for James Burns, 11140 20<sup>th</sup> Street Court North, to allow the construction of an addition to an existing residence

at this address that would be set back 22.8 feet from a front property line, or 3.2 feet closer to this line than allowed under R-1 single Family Residential Zoning District requirements and related provisions for established neighborhood setbacks. Council Member Smith seconded the motion. The motion passed 5-0.

Consider application for a CUP to allow an Agricultural Entertainment Business, a rezoning request, and an amendment to a CUP for Country Sum Farm and Greenhouse, Resolution No. 2009-047, Ordinance No. 08-021

Kelli Matzek, City Planner, reported the City received an application for land use changes, including renewal, update and expansion of an existing Conditional Use Permit, as well as a related rezoning request and new Conditional Use Permit received from Sun Country Farm and Greenhouse. The City Council is being asked to consider the following requests from Country Sun Farm & Greenhouse:

CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT: To issue a CUP for the entire 67 acres of property under consideration, or specified portion thereof, thereby allowing an "Agricultural Entertainment Business" on the property. At this time it would be appropriate through the issuance of such CUP to clearly delineate the specific uses existing on the site and to clarify which uses are legally permitted, either outright or under the current and/or proposed updated and expanded CUP. This issuance could include the construction of an overflow parking area of 39,900 square feet which is accessory to the other uses on the site.

## Action on the proposed new CUP establishing an Ag Entertainment District

MOTION: Mayor Johnston moved to approve Resolution No.2009-047 (Option B) whereby issuing a Conditional Use Permit for an Agricultural Entertainment Business for Country Sun Farm & Greenhouse on the identified 65 acre portion of the requested 67 acres, with the conditions identified in the Planning staff report, and to include the construction of an overflow parking area of 39,900 square feet accessory to the other uses on the site, as recommended by the City Administrator, City Attorney and Planning Advisor. Council Member Park seconded the motion. The motion passed 5-0.

REZONING: To rezone a 33.44 acre parcel from Rural Residential (RR) to Agricultural (Ag). This rezoning could allow the future movement of an existing greenhouse from the original CUP area to the new proposed area, as greenhouses is not permitted in the RR zoning district.

## Action on the rezoning of 33.44 acres from Rural Residential to Agricultural:

MOTION: Council Member Park moved to adopt Resolution No. 2009-052 denying the rezoning of the identified 33.44 acres of property from Rural Residential to Agricultural, with the specific findings of fact:

- 1. That the procedures for obtaining said Map Amendment is found in the Lake Elmo Zoning Ordinance, Section 154.020.
- 2. That all the submission requirements of said Section 154.020 have been met by the applicant.
- 3. That the proposed rezoning of the property is from Rural Residential to Agricultural for the entire 33.44 acres.
- 4. The Rural Residential zoning district has a 10 acre minimum lo size requirement while the agricultural zoning district has a 40 acre minimum lot size. The rezoning of the parcel to Agricultural would result in non-conformance to the minimum lot size as the parcel is 33.44 acres.
- 5. Relocating the greenhouses would still allow for reasonable use of the current property, thereby resulting in a de facto expansion of business activity and, with it, traffic concerns and other public health, life and safety considerations.
- 6. The proposed rezoning would be preemptive in nature as the applicant's intent is to move a greenhouse to the property which may or may not be in conflict with currently unknown, unplanned or unscheduled future reconfigurations of the intersection of County Road 17 and State Highway 36.
- 7. As public infrastructure would be significantly impacted by any rezoning an subsequent access road and greenhouse relocation, the public stands to have such disruption of public services our on multiple times and at significantly increase cost due to this premature rezoning.
- 8. The applicant retains reasonable use of the affected property toady and, with approval of the Agricultural Entertainment Business CUP, is allowed for reasonable expansion of said business within the acceptable parameters established by the City.

Mayor Johnston seconded the motion. The motion passed 5-0.

<u>CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT AMENDMENT</u>: To amend the existing conditional use permit currently allowing operation of Country Sun Farm & Greenhouse at 11211 60<sup>th</sup> Street North to add approximately 24 acres of land (as the rest is in a roadway easement) for the "greenhouse" and "food concession" uses currently permitted. This land would be added to allow the eventual future movement of existing uses for the business. This amend would include the construction of an overflow parking area of 39,900 square feet which is accessory to the other uses on the site.

# Action on the requested CUP Amendment to extend CUP uses to newly rezoned property

MOTION: Mayor Johnston moved to approve Resolution No. 2009-051 (Option B) denying the requested CUP amendment, with the specific findings of fact:

- 1. That the procedures for obtaining said Conditional Use Permit Amendment and are found in the Lake Elmo Zoning Ordinance, Section 154.018.
- 2. That all the submission requirements of said Section 154.018 have been met by the applicant.
- 3. That the proposed Conditional Use Permit amendment is to include an additional 24 acres to the existing 43 acres and to allow construction of a 39,900 square foot

overflow parking lot. The applicants are intending to move existing structures (greenhouses) and uses (hay ride and corn maze) to this area at a time in the future if and when the reconfiguration of County Road 17 and State Highway 26 and a subsequent frontage road displaces those uses and structures. The Conditional use Permit amendment would allow the movement of the following use and structure:

- a. Greenhouse growing range
- b. Sale of concessions
- 4. That the uses identified in the existing Conditional Use Permit are not allowed without the rezoning of the property to the Agricultural zoning district.
- 5. The proposed amendment, as stated by the applicant, is intended to allow the movement of an existing greenhouse to the property due to a future reconfiguration of County Road 17 and State Highway 36. This is preemptive in nature as a plan for the reconfiguration has not been approved, nor is a timeline identified for when the project will take place.
  - a. The area identified for movement of the greenhouse may be n conflict with a future frontage road, public utilities, or other improvements in conjunction with a future reconfiguration of the interchange.
- 6. That the Conditional Use Permit Amendment does not meet the review criteria for Conditional Use Permits (Section 154.018).
  - a. Without road reconfiguration, and/or until such road reconfiguration occurs, the applicant would still have reasonable use of existing property, in addition to the property identified within this CUP.
- 7. The expansion of the CUP property will likely lead to an expansion of the existing uses which would negatively impact traffic conditions on the site,
  - a. Applicants own application material includes MNDOT concern over increased traffic problems, leading the City to conclude serious community life, health and safety considerations would be detrimentally harmed by approval of this CUP.

Council Member Park seconded the motion. The motion was passed 5-0.

The City Planner explained due to recent ordinance changes and the evolving nature of these types of requests, City Staff and the Planning Commission recommended the City Council direct greater scrutiny of this issue as part of the department's 2010 Workplan.

MOTION: Council Member Smith moved to direct the inclusion of the recommendations' promulgated by the City staff and Planning Commission and delineated in this communication in the Planning Department's 2010 Workplan. Council Member DeLapp seconded the motion. The motion passed 5-0.

MOTION: Mayor Johnston moved to delay enforcement of seasonal sales of Christmas trees until the end of the year. Council Member Smith seconded the motion. The motion passed 5-0.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:40 p.m.

<u>SUMMARY AND ACTION REQUESTED</u>: Pursuant to approval of the 2010 Annual Budget and City Council direction, authorization is requested to offer employment to the most qualified candidate for the position of Ice Rink Operator, as well as authorization for the City Administrator to execute minor employment and/or service contracts for a variety of positions of less than 50% FTE or intermittent in nature. Suggested motions:

"Move to approve an offer of Employment to the most qualified candidate for the position of Ice Rink Operator, consistent with the already-budgeted compensatory parameters for the position and contingent upon completion of reference checks and an appropriate background investigation."

"Move to authorize the City Administrator to renew and/or execute minor employment and service contracts for various minor City positions, consistent with City policies and the approved 2010 Annual Budget."

**BACKGROUND INFORMATION:** The positions identified herein are fully funded in the City's FY 2010 Annual budget. Larger and more significant employment agreements and professional services contracts will continue to be brought to the City Council for consideration on an individual basis.

The City is currently finalizing the recommended selection of an Ice Rink Operator, following advertizing and selection of candidates to interview. Other positions are anticipated to be renewed "as is" to the greatest extent practicable, with the exception of augmenting the number of additional Back-up Cable Operators, due to limited availability of current Cable Operators.

**STAFF REPORT**: City staff has followed the normal advertizing, review, interview and recommendation for the position of Ice Rink Operator. However, a final recommendation is not available

prior to the December 15th, 2009 Council Meeting. As a result, City Staff is recommending approval of a Contingent Offer of Employment to the most qualified candidate.

In addition, the following minor City positions and/or service contracts, as determined by their limited FTE %, the intermittent nature of their employment, or the size and scope of their contracts, are identified for either annual renewal or re-appointment:

- Custodial Services for City Facilities
- Planning Advisor
- CDBG Administrator
- Accounting Clerk
- Animal Control Services

- Forestry Services
- Ski Trail Grooming Services
- Snow Plow, Sanding and Salting Services
- Assessing Services

Many current contracts have automatic annual renewal provisions and may follow a non-calendar year schedule. Affirmative authorization of tonight's recommendation will allow the City Administrator and staff to review and standardize such employment agreements and contracts and pursue, where reasonable, additional efficiencies and programmatic improvements.

**RECOMMENDATION**: It is recommended that the City Council undertake the following two actions:

"Move to approve an offer of Employment to the most qualified candidate for the position of Ice Rink Operator, consistent with the already-budgeted compensatory parameters for the position and contingent upon completion of reference checks and an appropriate background investigation."

"Move to authorize the City Administrator to renew and/or execute minor employment and service contracts for various minor City positions, consistent with City policies and the approved 2010 Annual Budget."

<u>SUMMARY AND ACTION REQUESTED</u>: The City Council is being asked to consider whether or not to waive the statutory tort limits for the City's liability insurance coverage. Based upon the identified needs and liabilities of the City, it is recommended that the City Council approve the liability coverage-waiver form stating that the City-does not waive the monetary limits on municipal tort liability as established under Minnesota Statues 466.04. The suggested motion (as part of the Consent Agenda) is:

"Move to approve the liability coverage-waiver form stating that the City-does not waive the monetary limits on municipal tort liability as established under Minnesota Statues 466.04."

**BACKGROUND INFORMATION:** The City Council is being asked to consider whether or not to waive the statutory tort limits for the City's liability insurance coverage. The City of Lake Elmo obtains liability coverage through the League of Minnesota Cities Insurance trust for buildings and vehicles. The coverage also covers tort liability. Because of this coverage, the City must decide whether or not to waive the monetary limits on municipal tort liability as established by Minnesota Statutes §466.04.

STAFF REPORT: If the City does not waive the statutory tort limits, an individual claimant would be able to recover no more than \$500,000 on any claim to which the statutory tort limits apply. The total which all claimants would be able to recover for a single occurrence to which the statutory tort limits apply would be limited to \$1,200,000. These statutory tort limits would apply regardless of whether or not the city purchases the optional excess liability coverage.

If the City waives the statutory tort limits, and does not purchase excess liability coverage, a single claimant could potentially recover up to \$1,200,000 on a single occurrence. The total

which all claimants would be able to recover for a single occurrence to which the statutory limits apply would also be limited to \$1,200,000, regardless of the number of claimants.

If the City waives the statutory tort limits and purchases excess liability coverage, a single claimant could potentially recover an amount up to the limit of the coverage purchased. The total which all claimants would be able to recover for a single occurrence to which the statutory tort limits apply would also be limited to the amount of coverage purchased, regardless of the number of claimants.

**RECOMMENDATION**: It is recommended that the City Council undertake the following action approve the liability coverage-waiver form stating that the City does not waive the monetary limits on municipal tort liability. The suggested motion to do so is as follows:

"Move to approve the liability coverage-waiver form stating that the City does not waive the monetary limits on municipal tort liability as established under Minnesota Statues 466.04."

Alternatively, the City Council may elect to reject the proposed motion discuss this issue further and pass an alternative resolution.

SUMMARY AND ACTION REQUESTED: The City Council is asked to release the Letter of Credit securing public infrastructure installed as part of the Farms of Lake Elmo Development. Instead of extending the Letter of Credit, the developer has provided cash security in the amount of \$12,000 to ensure completion of the two remaining items by June 30, 2010. To accomplish this, the following motion is proposed to be included as part of approval of the Consent agenda:

"Move to authorize the release of Letter of Credit No. 453 for the Farms of Lake Elmo Development and to accept the cash escrow in the amount of \$12,000 for the remaining work to be completed by June 30, 2010."

BACKGROUND INFORMATION: The public infrastructure within the development has been substantially completed (see attachment No. 1). The developer of the Farms of Lake Elmo has addressed all punch list items except for additional treatment and seeding of the drain field area and the removal of a plug in the sanitary sewer pipe located within the public Right-of-Way. These items cannot currently be completed due to weather conditions.

**STAFF REPORT**: City staff has reviewed the status of this development and finds the request reasonable. Letter of Credit No. 453, secured by Lake Elmo Bank, in the amount of \$21,250 is set to expire on December 21, 2009.

Instead of extending the Letter of Credit, the developer has agreed to provide cash security in the amount of \$12,000 to ensure completion of the two remaining items by June 30, 2010.

**RECOMMENDATION**: It is recommended that the City Council authorize the release of Letter of Credit No. 453, in the amount of \$21,250, based on the substantial completion of the public infrastructure and the provision of a cash security in the amount of \$12,000 for the remaining items to complete the development. The suggested motion to accomplish this is as follows:

"Move to authorize the release of Letter of Credit No. 453 for the Farms of Lake Elmo Development and to accept the cash escrow in the amount of \$12,000 for the remaining work to be completed by June 30, 2010."



Joe Rigdon's financial expertise complements and supports the day to day work of the City's Finance Director. The hourly rate for Joe Rigdon remains at \$135.00 per hour with no minimum fee for his services.

**RECOMMENDATION**: It is recommended that the City Council approve the attached Letter of agreement with KDV for 2010 Financial Consultative Services by undertaking the following action:

When, and if, our hours or billings approach the estimated amounts, we will discuss the progress of the above consulting services with you. We will also provide the City with progress reports on objectives accomplished on an "as requested" basis.

Should our relationship terminate before our engagement is completed, you will be billed for services to the date of termination. All bills are payable upon receipt. A service charge of 1% per month, which is an annual rate of 12%, will be added to all accounts unpaid 30 days after billing date. If collection action is necessary, expenses and reasonable attorney's fees will be added to the amount due.

Any disputes between us that arise under this agreement, or for a breach of this agreement, or that arise out of any other services performed by us for you, must be submitted to non-binding mediation before either of us can start a lawsuit against the other. To conduct mediation, each of us shall designate a representative with authority to fully resolve any and all disputes, and those representatives shall meet and attempt to negotiate a resolution of the dispute. If that effort fails, then a competent and impartial third party acceptable to each side shall be appointed to hold and conduct a non-binding mediation proceeding. You and we will equally share in the expenses of the mediator and each of us will pay for our own attorneys' fees, if any. No lawsuit or legal process shall be commenced until at least sixty (60) days after the mediator's first meeting with the parties.

The nature of our engagement makes it inherently difficult, with the passage of time, to present evidence in a lawsuit that fully and fairly establishes the facts underlying any dispute that may arise between us. We both agree that notwithstanding any statute of limitation that might otherwise apply to a claim or dispute, including one arising out of this agreement or the services performed under this agreement, or for breach of contract, fraud or misrepresentation, a lawsuit must be commenced within twenty-four (24) months after the date of our report. This twenty-four (24) month period applies and starts to run on the date of each report, even if we continue to perform services in later periods and even if you or we have not become aware of the existence of a claim or the basis for a possible claim. In the event that a claim or dispute is not asserted at least sixty (60) days before the expiration of this twenty-four (24) month period, then the period of limitation shall be extended by sixty (60) days, to allow the parties to conduct non-binding mediation.

We appreciate the opportunity to be of service to the City of Lake Elmo, Minnesota and believe this letter accurately summarizes the significant terms of our engagement. <u>SUMMARY AND ACTION REQUESTED</u>: The City Council is asked to appoint an official City Engineer and City Attorney. These officials are contracted for professional engineering and legal advice. These appointments are not specifically required by statute or ordinance, but are consistent with past practice. The suggested motions are to:

"Move to appoint Mr. Jack Griffin of TKDA as the official City Engineer and principal provider of professional engineering services for 2010."

"Move to appoint Mr. Dave Snyder of Eckberg & Lammers as the official City Attorney and principal provider of both civil and criminal services for 2010."

**BACKGROUND INFORMATION:** Mr. Jack Griffin of TKDA currently serves as the Official City Engineer and primary provider of professional engineering services. He is supported by Mr. Ryan Stempski. TKDA has submitted a proposal for 2010 services which does not include an increase for the cost for their 2010 engineering services.

Mr. Dave Snyder of Eckberg & Lammers currently serves as the Official City Attorney for regular City business and civil litigation. Criminal prosecution services are provided by Mr., Jerry Filla of Peterson, Fram and Bergman.

**STAFF REPORT**: The City did not solicit additional bids or conduct an RFP for Engineering Services. City staff is satisfied with the Engineering services provided by TKDA and the City Council has not directed formal action to consider an alternative engineering service provider.

In 2009, the City Council appointed Mr. Dave Snyder City Attorney for official City business and civil litigation. Criminal prosecution services remained with Mr. Jerry Filla. City staff is

satisfied with the legal services currently provided and has no opinion on the efficacy of either changing or combining legal services at this time.

In November, 2009, the City Council directed the City Administrator to combine the two services (civil and criminal) and overall City legal needs under Eckberg & Lammers, provided it proved cost effective for 2010. The City has solicited bids from the law firms of Eckberg & Lammers, Peterson, Fram and Bergman and Lawson. These were as follows:

# Firm: Eckberg & Lammers S 3,750 per month Lawson S 3,900 per month Peterson, Fram and Bergman S 4,000 per month (telephone bid)

While the amount of projected annual savings by combining legal services under a single firm is less than that discussed at the Council meeting, Eckberg & Lammers provided the lowest responsible monthly bid for comparable combined legal services.

Should the Council direct a change in legal services, it is recommended that January be denoted as the suggested month for transition of files and calendars (already established well into 2010) from the current firm to the newly-selected firm. This will affect only minimally the overall financial benefits derived from any transition and would minimize as much as possible any disruption in service.

**RECOMMENDATION**: Based upon Council direction & Staff assessment, it is recommended that the City Council approve the proposed actions as they related via following motion:

"Move to appoint Mr. Jack Griffin of TKDA as the official City Engineer and principal provider of professional engineering services for 2010."

"Move to appoint Mr. Dave Snyder of Eckberg & Lammers as the official City Attorney and principal provider of both civil and criminal services for 2010."

Alternatively, the City Council may elect to discuss and modify these recommendations, as desired, and provide staff specific direction with respect to how to proceed accordingly.

We would be willing to undertake the Lake Elmo prosecutions for a flat fee of \$3,900 per month. I believe that this is a significantly lower rate than your current monthly average for criminal legal fees.

If Lake Elmo accepts our bid, I will be the lead attorney handling the prosecutions. I am a Lake Elmo resident. I have been with the Lawson law firm for four years. I received my undergraduate degree from the University of Minnesota and my law degree from the William Mitchell College of Law, where I graduated magna cum laude and served as an editor of the William Mitchell Law Review.

I believe I am uniquely qualified to serve as the Lake Elmo misdemeanor prosecutor. As the prosecutor for Willemie and Pine Springs, I have the same court schedule as the current Lake Elmo prosecutor. I am familiar with the court staff and procedures in Washington County and am also familiar with many members of local law enforcement.

<u>SUMMARY AND ACTION REQUESTED:</u> The City Council is asked to receive the Feasibility Report for the 2010 Street and Water Quality Improvements and pass a Resolution Accepting the Report and Calling for a Public Improvement Hearing to be held on January 19, 2010. The suggestion action to accomplish this is as follows:

"Move to adopt Resolution No. 2009-057 Accepting the Feasibility Report for the 2010 Street and Water Quality Improvements and Calling for a Public Improvement Hearing to be held on January 19, 2010."

**BACKGROUND INFORMATION:** TKDA has completed the Feasibility Report for the 2010 Street and Water Quality Improvements including the residential streets of Jane Road, Isle Avenue, 53<sup>rd</sup> Street, and 57<sup>th</sup> Street. TKDA will present the findings of the Feasibility Report to the City Council.

The preparation of the Feasibility Report was authorized on October 20, 2009. At that time, the City Council directed that City staff apply the City's revised street assessment policy for 2010 to these projects, which has been done and is included in this report. The City Council also directed that the Budget Committee undertake a more thorough review of all City assessments during 2010.

**STAFF REPORT:** As part of the feasibility study, a geotechnical investigation was completed to identify the existing roadway sections and subsurface soil characteristics for each street segment. The findings of this investigation resulted in a modification of the proposed improvements. Inadequate soils identified underneath Isle Avenue, 53<sup>rd</sup> Street, and 57<sup>th</sup> Streets

have resulted in the need to remove these soils and stabilize them with suitable material, resulting in an increase in project costs more commensurate with a partial street reconstruction (versus simple reclaim).

In addition, the geotechnical investigation determined that Jane Road North had insufficient existing pavement and base section to support a reclaim process. Therefore the report recommends a full street reconstruction for Jane Road North using recycled aggregate base from the excess reclaim material from the other street segments.

The inability to salvage existing curb and the need to match into numerous flat driveways and front yards have also increased the anticipated restoration costs for the streets to be completed in the 2010 improvement project.

Estimated project costs, including application of the approved 2010 Street Assessment Policy, are included in the Feasibility Report and will be presented at the Council meeting. It should be noted, however, that the City Engineer, Attorney and Administrator believe the short- and long-term benefits to adjoining properties to be assessed far outweigh the projected assessment costs.

**RECOMMENDATION**: It is recommended that the City Council receive the Engineer's report and, following discussion, formally accept the Feasibility Report and call for the required Public Improvement Hearing by undertaking the following action:

"Move to adopt Resolution No. 2009-057 Accepting the Feasibility Report for the 2010 Street and Water Quality Improvements and Calling for a Public Improvement Hearing to be held on January 19, 2010,"

If approved, the Budget Subcommittee will also have to incorporate these changes into the Street's portion of the approved Capital Improvement Plan for 2010. This will then be scheduled for future Council action. Alternatively, the City Council may elect to consider other action, as determined by the City Council, and/or provide City staff with specific direction with respect to these needed street projects.

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that it is in the best interests of the City and its residents within OP – Open Space Preservation Zoning Districts to clarify the required buffer setback within each OP – Open Space development and to create a reference table with all buffer setbacks identified for specific developments; and

WHEREAS, the Planning Commission reviewed the proposed buffer setbacks, held a public hearing at their regular meeting held November 23, 2009, and recommended approval of the OP – Open Space Preservation Buffer Setbacks as identified in the chart below; and

SUMMARY AND ACTION REQUESTED: The City Council is asked to consider adopting Ordinance 08-021 to establish buffer setbacks for nineteen Open Space Preservation (OP) developments. This action is requested to provide clarity for future review and approval of building permits and, in most cases, eliminate existing non-conformities that were permitted in the past. It should be noted that Council direction to review rear yard set-back requirements and establish acceptable accessory structure parameters for Open Space Preservation developments is already scheduled for Planning Commission action. Their recommendations and specific incorporation of these into existing City ordinances will be presented to Council for subsequent action at a later date. The recommended motion to adopt Ordinance 08-021 is as follows:

"Move to approve Ordinance 08-021 approving the OP Buffer Setbacks for the 19 existing developments, as recommended by the Planning Commission and modified by the City Council, and direct inclusion of the study and recommendation in the Planning Department's 2010 Workplan of setbacks for OP developments for rear yards, primary structures, and accessory buildings."

**BACKGROUND INFORMATION:** The Open Space Preservation development ordinance was first written for Lake Elmo in the 1990's. The purpose of the ordinance is to provide a developer the ability to cluster more homes than otherwise permitted on smaller lots and to set aside land as preserved open space in perpetuity. Originally, an Open Space Preservation development required an additional step to rezone the property as OP before a development was reviewed and approved.

Since then, this approach has been revised so that an OP development could be permitted by a conditional use permit in specific zoning districts, thereby eliminating the additional step of rezoning the property. Although the zoning district code language was repealed, the zoning of the existing developments was never retroactively returned to Agricultural or Rural Residential, and, therefore, the Open Space district remains on the zoning maps.

As a part of this ordinance, from the beginning, a buffer setback (originally called a buffer zone) was identified as an effort to physically buffer the existing adjoining neighbors from the more densely built clustered homes. The buffer setback section of the ordinance has been revised a few times throughout the years to its current form, which was last approved in 2001. A buffer setback has always been required, but has varied in depth from 100 to 200 feet and has been revised from once just requiring "main structures" to be outside the setback to all structures and road surfaces not at a 90 degree angle.

The OP ordinance permits the City Council to modify any of the minimum standards outlined in the ordinance by a 4/5 vote. Staff has found this clause has been used in altering the buffer setback requirement in some of the OP developments. [Of note: by not taking action, variance requests will continue to be received and acted upon for some lots in most, if not all, OP developments. As mentioned, some existing platted vacant lots in the City are also essentially unbuildable when this setback applies, which appear to be due to errors, oversight, or, in some cases, an alternate interpretation made at the time of the development review.]

In an effort to address denied building permits due solely to the buffer setback, on July 7, 2009, the City Council approved resolution 2009-033 reducing buffer setbacks in the Tana Ridge and Parkview Estates development. Because both developments are zoned OP and not approved as a Conditional Use Permit, a public hearing was not required. Since then, the City Attorney has advised staff to proceed with revising buffer setbacks by ordinance, thus the Tana Ridge and Parkview Estates developments are included in the proposed action.

**ADDITIONAL INFORMATION:** City Planning Staff is recommending approval of the OP Buffer Setbacks identified in the chart below and as depicted in the attached maps.

- o The Hidden Meadows development, while an OP development, was not evaluated at this time, as the final plat for the residential lots has not been approved. The buffer setbacks can be addressed for that development at the time of final plat approval.
- O Though not required, the city mailed notices to contact points for the Homeowner Associations of the various OP developments in addition to publishing the public hearing notice in the legal newspaper and on the city's website.

PLANNING COMMISSION/STAFF REPORT: The Planning Commission reviewed each of the OP developments individually with regards to the implications on the property owners. A majority of the commission (though not all) expressed the importance of maintaining a buffer setback whenever feasible, even if the buffer setback was entirely within an outlot of the development and preserved for open space through a conservation easement. At least one commissioner felt strongly that the presence of a buffer setback, when overlapping with private property, was inappropriate, as property owners are still responsible for the land and continue to pay taxes on the entire property.

The commission held a public hearing at the November 23, 2009 meeting at which one person asked for clarification on the setback for the St. Croix's Sanctuary development. The commission recommended by a 6:1 vote to recommend approval of the buffer setbacks identified in this staff report.

**SUGGESTED MOTIONS:** The City Council is asked to consider the following motion as part of tonight's action:

"Move to approve Ordinance 08-021 approving the OP Buffer Setbacks for the 19 existing developments, as recommended by the Planning Commission and modified by the City Council, and direct inclusion of the study and recommendation in the Planning Department's 2010 Workplan of setbacks for OP developments for rear yards, primary structures, and accessory buildings."

Should the City Council wish to not take action at tonight's meeting, it may table the item indefinitely, until the Planning Commission completes its additional work (though it should be noted that the Planning Commission's efforts may take some time and the City feels it will continue to receive variance requests in the interim), or deny the recommendations outright via the following action:

"Move to deny Ordinance 08-021 establishing OP Buffer Setbacks for 19 existing developments [and . . .]."

# AN ORDINANCE APPROVING THE BUFFER SETBACKS IN 19 EXISTING OPEN SPACE PRESERVATION (OP) DEVELOPMENTS

WHEREAS, Section 150.180, Subd. (B,2,d) of the City Code prescribes specific buffer setbacks requirements within OP – Open Space Preservation developments; and

WHEREAS, the buffer setbacks required by the City Code have not been observed in many of the City's OP – Open Space developments due to either the lot arrangement approved by the City at the time of subdivision approval or the setbacks approved as part of the building permits review in OP Zoning Districts; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that it is in the best interests of the City and its residents within OP – Open Space Preservation Zoning Districts to clarify the required buffer setback within each OP – Open Space development and to create a reference table with all buffer setbacks identified for specific developments; and

WHEREAS, the Planning Commission reviewed the proposed buffer setbacks, held a public hearing at their regular meeting held November 23, 2009, and recommended approval of the OP – Open Space Preservation Buffer Setbacks as identified in the chart below; and


