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## Roll Call

Mayor Gaasch called the Regular City Council meeting to order at 7:31 p.m.

Councilors present: Andi Moffatt, Roxanne Grove, Kelly Dolphin, Jeff Dains, and Mayor Mary Gaasch.

Councilors absent: None.

Staff present: Heather Butkowski, City Administrator; Jim Bownik, Assistant to the City Administrator; and Miles Cline, Deputy City Clerk.

## **Approvals**

Mayor Gaasch asked if there were any additions to the meeting agenda. There being none, Councilor Grove moved and seconded by Councilor Moffatt to approve the agenda. Motion carried unanimously.

Mayor Gaasch asked if there were any corrections to the meeting minutes. There being none, Councilor Dains moved and seconded by Councilor Grove to approve the minutes of the August 28, 2018, city council meeting. Motion carried unanimously.

Mayor Gaasch asked if there were any questions on the claims. There being none, Councilor Dolphin moved and seconded by Councilor Dains to approve the claims totaling \$92,645.41. Motion carried unanimously.

### Consent

Councilor Moffatt moved and seconded by Councilor Grove to approve the Consent Agenda thereby acknowledging the July Financial Report.

## **Informational Presentations/Reports**

A. City Council Updates

Councilor Dains stated that he attended a Mississippi Watershed Management Organization meeting. Councilor Dolphin shared that she attended a North Suburban Cable Commission meeting where budgetary issues were the primary topic. Mayor Gaasch stated that she will be attending a League of Minnesota Cities Board of Directors retreat on September 12. Finally, Councilor Dains commemorated those who lost their lives during the September 11, 2001 attacks and paid tribute to the police and fire departments of New York City for their brave work.

## **Discussion/Action Items**

A. Rental Housing Fine Waiver Request for 1866 Eustis Street

The owner of 1866 Eustis Street submitted a petition to waive the late fees associated with his

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rental housing license. Rod Borg, dba Perma Companies, is appealing the late fees on the basis that the tenant changed the locks which prohibited access during the first inspection.

After discussion, Councilor Dolphin moved to reduce by the late fee by \$200. The motion was seconded by Councilor Moffatt. After further discussion, Administrator Butkowski polled the Council. Councilors Dolphin and Gaasch voted in favor of the motion and Councilors Dains and Moffatt vote against the motion. Councilor Grove abstained. Motion to reduce the late fee was denied.

## B. 2019 Preliminary Budget and Levy

Staff reviewed the 2018 actuals and revisited the anticipated costs for 2019 since the previous meeting and nothing has really changed. To recap the last meeting, compared to other Ramsey County cities, Lauderdale is seeing a large increase in home values for 2019 per the county assessor. A median valued home is \$206,300 for 2019 (up 9.1% over 2018). As the City's overall market value went up considerably over 2018, the proposed levy increase would actually result in a decrease in the tax rate.

The proposed budget would balance at \$1,437,074 or an increase of 3.5%. To support a balanced budget, the levy would need to increase by 5.7% which results in roughly a \$39.00 city property tax impact on a median valued home.

Butkowski informed the Council that the levy must be set at the next meeting. Staff will be preparing the appropriate documents and continuing to revisit the budget in the interim.

## C. Update on Staff Projects

Butkowski went through the various projects staff have been working and noted which will be on council agendas in the near future.

## Set Agenda for Next Meeting

Administrator Butkowski stated that the September 25 council meeting may include the 2019 preliminary budget and levy, proposed tobacco ordinance revision discussion, and 1795 Eustis Street discussion with the City's financial advisor.

## **Work Session**

A. Opportunity for the Public to Address the City Council Mayor Gaasch opened the floor to anyone in attendance that wanted to address the Council.

Fakhri Alaghbash, Falcon Heights resident, approached the Council. He stated that he and his business partners were interested in purchasing the Lauderdale Service Station. Their intention is to either open a food establishment or violin store. They are open to renovating the existing structure or building a new one on a different part of the parcel. The Council mentioned that the

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building is not technically for sale and in order to consider an offer they would have to see a detailed proposal. Namely, they would need to see how the business fit into the zoning requirements, accommodated parking, and would be financially viable.

B. Community Development Update

Butkowski informed the Council that all updates were covered throughout the course of the meeting.

Adjournment

Councilor Grove moved and seconded by Councilor Dains to adjourn the meeting at 8:23 p.m. Motion carried unanimously.








## TRANSITE SIDING REMOVAL AGREEMENT

This Transite Siding Removal Agreement (the "Agreement") is entered into as of the Effective Date by and between Bauer Bros., Inc., a Minnesota corporation, having its primary place of business at 2432 N 2<sup>nd</sup> Street Minneapolis, Minnesota (the "Contractor"), and the city of Lauderdale, Minnesota, a Minnesota municipal corporation having it offices at 1891 Walnut Street, Lauderdale, MN 55113 (the "City"). Both the Contractor and the City may be referred to, from time to time, individually as "Party" or collectively as "Parties".

## **RECITALS**

WHEREAS, the City desires the Contractor to perform certain work and services, hereinafter referred to only as the "Services", set forth in Section 1, Scope of Work; and

WHEREAS, the Contractor has expressed a willingness to perform said Services, specified in said Scope of Work; and

WHEREAS, the Contractor represents it has the skill, knowledge, experience, and ability to perform the Services.

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the covenants and promises made one to the other herein, the City and the Contractor agree as follows:

- Section 1. <u>Scope of Work</u>. Upon issuance of a written notice to proceed by the City, the Contractor agrees to perform the Services to remove and dispose of all Transite siding product (the "Product") currently existing on the property of 1825 Eustis Street Lauderdale, MN 55113 (the "Property").
- Section 2. <u>Term of Agreement</u>. The term of this Agreement shall begin on the last date of execution by the second Party hereto (the "Effective Date") and shall continue until the Contractor completes the Services required herein to the satisfaction of the City, unless sooner terminated as provided in Section 9.

## Section 3. Obligations & Responsibilities.

The Contractor shall:

- A. devote such time as reasonably necessary for the satisfactory performance of the Services to be provided under this Agreement;
- B. furnish and pay for all labor, tools, materials, equipment, supplies, transportation and management necessary to perform the Services;
- C. abide by all federal, state, and local laws and regulations in providing the Services. This includes conformance with all applicable environmental, health and safety-related regulations and guidelines proffered by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency and pertaining to the Product;

- D. exercise professional judgment, made on the basis of all information available to the Contractor, and to use the same standard of care and skill ordinarily exercised in similar circumstances by other contractors performing comparable services in the Twin Cities metropolitan area. This standard of care shall be judged as of the time and place the Services are rendered; and
- E. adhere to any applicable site safety procedures and regulations as well as any special safety concerns or dangerous conditions at the site, which the Contractor shall communicate to its employees. The Contractor, its employees, and agents will be obligated to adhere to such procedures and regulations once notice has been given.

## The City shall:

- A. designate in writing the person or persons with authority to act in the City's behalf on all matters concerning the Services to be performed by the Contractor.
- B. if requested by the Contractor, furnish to the Contractor any existing information thenavailable to the City which may be necessary for performance of the Services. The Contractor will be entitled to use and rely upon all such information.
- C. provide the Contractor access to the Property to perform the Services.

## Section 4. Time For Performance.

- A. The Contractor shall perform all Services as provided for under this Agreement in a proper, efficient and professional manner in accordance with the City requirements. Such services shall be completed within 30 days after the Contractor's receipt of written notification to proceed from the City
- B. The Contractor's Services will be considered complete at the earlier of (i) the date when the Contractor's Services are approved by the City or (ii) 15 days after the date when the Contractor notifies the City of its completion of Services if the Contractor is not notified in writing within such 15-day period of a material defect in such Services.
- Section 5. <u>Payment</u>. In consideration for providing the Services, the Contractor shall be entitled to retain any Product removed from the Property. The Contractor expressly agrees that, other than the aforementioned consideration, all Services referenced in Section 1 of this Agreement shall be provided free of charge. Any claims for extra Services, additional Services, or changes in the Services, irrespective of whether such Services are free of charge, must be made by written agreement with the City prior to the performance of such Services.
- Section 6. <u>Independent Contractor</u>. It is understood and agreed by and between the Parties that the Contractor, in satisfying the conditions of this Agreement, is acting as an independent contractor, and that the City assumes no responsibility or liabilities to any third party in connection with the Contractor's actions. The Contractor shall supervise the performance of the Services and shall be entitled to control the manner and means by which the Services are to be performed, subject to the terms of this Agreement. There is no intended third party beneficiary to this Agreement.

## Section 7. <u>Insurance</u>.

- A. The Contractor shall during the term hereof maintain in full force and effect the following insurance:
  - (i) a comprehensive general liability policy of insurance for bodily injury, death and property damage insuring against all claims, demands or actions relating to the Contractor performance of Services pursuant to this Agreement with a minimum combined single limit of not less than \$1,000,000.00 per occurrence and \$2,000,000 in the aggregate for injury to persons (including death), and for property damage;
  - (ii) A policy of automobile liability insurance covering any vehicles owned and/or operated by the Contractor, its officers, agents, and employees, and used in the performance of this Agreement with policy limits of not less than \$1,000,000.00 combined single limit and aggregate for bodily injury and property damage;
  - (iii) statutory Worker's Compensation Insurance at the statutory limits and Employers Liability covering all of the Contractor employees involved in the provision of the Services under this Agreement with policy limit of not less than \$1,000,000.00; and
- B. All insurance and certificate(s) of insurance shall contain the following provisions: (1) name the City as additional insured as to all applicable coverage with the exception of Workers Compensation Insurance; (2) provide for at least thirty (30) days prior written notice to the City for cancellation or non-renewal of the insurance; (3) provide for a waiver of subrogation against the City for injuries, including death, property damage, or any other loss to the extent the same is covered by the proceeds of insurance. The Contractor shall provide written notice to the City of any material change of or to the insurance required herein.
- C. All insurance companies providing the required insurance shall be authorized to transact business in Minnesota.
- D. A certificate of insurance evidencing the required insurance and all endorsements shall be submitted prior to commencement of the Services.
- Section 8. <u>Indemnification</u>. The City shall not be liable for any loss, damage, or injury of any kind or character to any person or property arising from the Services of the Contractor pursuant to this Agreement. The Contractor hereby waives all claims against the City, its officers and employees (collectively referred to in this section as "the City") for damage to any property or injury to, or death of, any person arising at any time and from any cause other than the negligence or willful misconduct of the City or breach of the City obligations hereunder. The Contractor agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the City from any damages (including court costs and reasonable attorneys' fees) and actions of any kind by reason of injury to or death of any person or damage to or loss of property to the extent caused by the Contractor's negligent performance of the Services under this Agreement or by reason of any willful or negligent act or omission on the part of the Contractor, its officers, directors, employees, agents, successors or

permitted assigns (except when such liability, claims, suits, costs, injuries, deaths or damages arise from or are attributed to negligence of the City, in whole or in part, in which case the Contractor shall indemnify the City only to the extent or proportion of negligence attributed to professional as determined by a court or other forum of competent jurisdiction). This provision shall survive the termination of this Agreement.

- Section 9. <u>Termination</u>. Either Party may terminate this Agreement on 15 calendar days written notice, or if prior to such action, the other Party materially breaches any of its representations, warranties or obligations under this Agreement.
- Section 10. <u>Assignment</u>. The Contractor shall not assign or sublet this Agreement, or any part thereof, without the prior written consent of the City.
- Section 11. <u>Applicable Laws; Venue; Jurisdiction</u>. The Contractor shall be subject to all federal, state, county and municipal laws, ordinances, regulations, safety orders, resolutions and building codes relating or applicable to the Services to be performed under this Agreement. The laws of Minnesota shall govern this Agreement; and venue for any action concerning this Agreement shall be in the State District Court of Ramsey County, Minnesota. The Parties agree to submit to the personal and subject matter jurisdiction of said court.
- Section 12. <u>Default of the Contractor</u>. In the event the Contractor fails to comply or becomes disabled and unable to comply with the provisions of this Agreement as to the quality or character of the Services or of performance, and the failure is not corrected within 10 days after written notice by the City to the Contractor, the City may terminate this Agreement upon written notice to the Contractor.
- Section 13. Merger; Amendments. This Agreement contains the entire understanding of the Parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and there are no oral understandings, statements or stipulations bearing upon the meaning or effect of this Agreement which have not been merged and incorporated herein. This Agreement may only be modified, amended, supplemented or waived by a written instrument executed by the Parties except as may be otherwise provided therein.
- Section 14. <u>Severability</u>. In the event any one or more of the provisions contained in this Agreement shall for any reason be held to be invalid, illegal, or unenforceable in any respect, such invalidity, illegality or unenforceability shall not affect any other provisions, and the Agreement shall be construed as if such invalid, illegal, or unenforceable provision had never been contained in it. If the invalid, unenforceable, or illegal provision results in impossibility of performance or materially frustrates the purpose of this Agreement, the Agreement may be terminated by written consent of both Parties without further obligations.
- Section 15. <u>Notice</u>. Any notice required or permitted to be delivered hereunder may be sent by first class mail, overnight courier or by confirmed telefax or facsimile to the address specified below, or to such other Party or address as either Party may designate in writing, and shall be deemed received three days after delivery set forth herein:

# Looking to see Lauderdale raise the tobacco purchase age

### To the Editor:

It's exciting to see that Lauderdale wants to protect its youth from the predatory tobacco industry.

As a mother, it's important to me to keep youth from starting an addictive and deadly habit. Raising the tobacco sales age to 21 and restricting the sale of flavored products would be a strong one-two punch at the industry, which will reduce youth tobacco use in our city. About 95 percent of youth start before they are 21. If they don't start by the time they are 21, they likely never will.

The tobacco industry has a long history of targeting youth with its products. Flavors such as strawberry, grape and chocolate are one way the industry

attempts to attract youth.

I was alarmed when I saw youth tobacco use went up for the first time in 17 years, mostly because of e-cigarette use, which is at an all-time high. Brands like JUUL are designed to pack a huge nicotine hit and deceptively look like a USB drive. Most youth are not aware of the addictive properties of nicotine.

I'm encouraged by the growing number of communities nationwide, including 11 cities here in Minnesota, that have raised the age to 21. Minnesota is often recognized as a leader in health, and city leaders have a unique opportunity to take action. I'd like to see Lauderdale join the list of cities that have passed this policy. It is an essential step to prevent young people in our community from becoming addicted to tobacco products.

I strongly support your efforts in working on an ordinance to increase the tobacco sales age to 21, as well as restricting the sale of flavored tobacco products including menthol to adult only tobacco shops.

According to the 2017 Minnesota youth tobacco survey, tobacco use among high school students has increased for the first time in seventeen years. Now more than ever, we need local governments to stand up and work to put policies in place that protect the health of our community and reduce disparities. The Saint Paul - Ramsey County Public Health Department supports the City of Lauderdale's proposed ordinance to raise the tobacco sales age to 21 and restrict the sale of all flavored tobacco to adult-only tobacco stores. Attached is a copy of the Ramsey County Board resolution supporting this action.

Despite great progress, smoking claims the lives of more than 6,300 Minnesotans each year and costs our state more than \$7 billion every year in excess health care costs and lost productivity. To reduce tobacco's negative impact and improve the health of our communities, it is critical that we prevent youth tobacco initiation. The National Academy of Medicine reports that there would be a 25 percent reduction in smoking initiation among 15- to 17-year-olds if the tobacco sales age was raised to 21.

Results from the 2017 Minnesota Youth Tobacco Survey show that for the first time in 17 years, youth tobacco use has increased. This is mainly due to electronic cigarette (e-cigs) use. One in five Minnesota high school students currently uses e-cigs, which constitutes nearly a 50 percent increase since 2014. E-cigs often contain high levels of nicotine, which is addictive and known to harm adolescent brain development. These products come in many flavors which appeals to youth, such as cotton candy, mango, and fruit punch. E-cigs also threaten to reverse the trajectory of our historic public health success in youth tobacco prevention. Therefore, it is imperative that e-cigarettes be included in local tobacco 21 ordinances.

We are particularly pleased to see that you are including menthol in your flavor restrictions. Mint and menthol flavored tobacco products mask the harshness of tobacco and cools the throat, which makes it easier for young people to start smoking. Menthol also makes it harder for people to quit.

Removing fruit, candy and mint flavored tobacco products from stores where youth shop and getting them out of the high school environment are proven strategies to reduce youth tobacco use.

Lauderdale's action to raise the tobacco sales age and restrict fruit, candy and mint flavored tobacco will prevent future generations from a lifelong addiction to tobacco. Thank you for your leadership on this significant public health issue and for making Ramsey County a healthier place to live.

WHEREAS, The harshness of the smoke is masked with menthol flavoring, making it easier for young people to start smoking and harder for people to quit; and

WHEREAS, Mentholated tobacco products have been shown to be the "gateway" product for youth who begin smoking; and

WHEREAS, National surveys show that mentholated tobacco products are particularly attractive to children with 47.7% of adolescent smokers (age 12-17) reporting menthol cigarette use compared to 40.8% of young adult smokers (age 18-25) and 31.5% of adult smokers (age 26 and older); and

WHEREAS, Data show that mentholated tobacco products are used disproportionately in communities of color, in areas of concentrated poverty, with 82.6% of African American smokers, 32.3% of Hispanic or Latino smokers, and 31.2% of Asian American smokers using mentholated tobacco products as opposed to 23.8% of White smokers; and

WHEREAS, One model of smoking in the U.S. concludes that if mentholated tobacco products were restricted, between 2010 and 2020, over 2.2 million people would not start smoking and by 2050, the number of people who would not start smoking would reach 9 million; and

Dear Mayor Gaasch and the Lauderdale City Council Members,

The American Heart Association is the nation's oldest and largest voluntary organization dedicated to building healthier lives free from heart disease and stroke – two of the leading causes of death in the United States. Our non-profit and non-partisan organization includes more than 30 million volunteers and supporters across the country and in Minnesota. Today, one-out-of-three Americans suffer from one or more forms of cardiovascular disease (CVD). We are writing to you today on their behalf and on behalf of the millions of other constituents with, or at risk of developing CVD.

We are asking you to stop the start in Lauderdale and support raising the minimum sale age for tobacco products from 18 to 21, as well as restricting menthol cigarettes to adult only tobacco stores. Every day, the 1,200 Americans who die from tobacco-related diseases are replaced by two smokers under the age of 26. Menthol cigarettes are one of many products peddled to our nation's youth with the intent of addicting a new generation. Menthol cigarettes are one product that lures young people into a deadly habit and sets them on the road to early hardening of the arteries and coronary artery disease in adulthood.

The National Academy of Medicine reports that there would be a 25 percent reduction in smoking initiation among 15-to-17-year-olds if the age to purchase tobacco was raised to 21. Preventing youth from starting to smoke is essential to reducing smoking prevalence, considering that almost 95 percent of addicted adult smokers started before age 21. Increasing the age gap between kids and those who can legally buy tobacco will help remove access to tobacco products from the high-school environment and stop the start.

Several states and local governments throughout the country have already passed this life-saving policy to protect youth. Hawaii and California were the first states to raise the age to purchase tobacco to 21 and Maine, Oregon, New Jersey and Massachusetts recently joined them. More than 330 municipalities in the United States have raised the age to purchase tobacco to 21 including the city of Chicago.

In Minnesota, the cities of Edina, St. Louis Park, Bloomington, Plymouth, North Mankato, Shoreview, Falcon Heights, Roseville, Richfield, St. Peter and Minneapolis have also raised the minimum age to purchase tobacco from 18 to 21 and many cities statewide are considering adopting this policy. In 2005, Needham, MA increased the tobacco purchase age to 21 and saw the smoking rates among high school students fell by nearly half.









That is why we urge you to protect our youth and pass this life-saving policy in Lauderdale. Let's keep the momentum going in Minnesota and have Lauderdale be the next city to stop the start!

I am the Chief Executive Officer of ClearWay Minnesota, an independent nonprofit organization that works to reduce tobacco's harm in our state. I am writing to urge you to support raising Lauderdale's tobacco age to 21 and restricting the sale of flavored tobacco products to adult-only tobacco stores.

The devastating harms of tobacco addiction are well documented. For elected leaders such as yourselves, the question is not "What does smoking do?" but "What can we do to stop it?" Tobacco 21 and restricting the sale of flavored tobacco products both address that question in the best possible way: by preventing kids from starting.

The vast majority of addicted smokers start at very young ages. About 95 percent of adult smokers begin before age 21. That means everything possible should be done to stop young people from smoking before they reach that age.

Immediate action is needed because, for the first time in 17 years, youth tobacco use has risen in Minnesota. The 2017 Minnesota Youth Tobacco Survey found that more than 26 percent of high-school students report using tobacco products, up 7 percent since 2014. This frightening trend is driven largely by a sharp rise in e-cigarette use and the popularity of flavored tobacco products among youth.

Nicotine harms the developing adolescent brain, whether in a cigarette, e-cigarette, flavored cigar or other product. In a new health <u>advisory</u>, the Minnesota Department of Health called youth nicotine addiction a "major health concern" and the FDA <u>recently said youth e-cigarette use is an "epidemic</u>." Communities can – and must – do more to keep young people from getting hooked on commercial tobacco products in all forms.

Tobacco 21 prevents youth smoking by creating barriers to getting tobacco products from social sources. Most kids get cigarettes from older friends. Raising the tobacco sale age to 21 will help get cigarettes out of high schools, where there are plenty of 18-year-olds but no 21-year-olds. Restricting the sale of flavored tobacco products to adult-only stores takes this effort a step further, by removing flavored tobacco products from places youth frequent.

The tobacco industry uses kid-friendly flavors to target the next generation of smokers. Cheap cigars and e-cigarettes are commonly sold in flavors like bubble gum and cotton candy. It's not surprising then that we're seeing the following:

- 80 percent of youth tobacco users use flavored tobacco;
- Cheap cigars are commonly sold in sweet flavors, and nationally, high-school students are nearly twice as likely as adults to report smoking cigars;

• Nearly 40 percent of Minnesota high-school students have tried e-cigarettes, which come in kid-friendly flavors like gummy bear and cotton candy;

A nearly 50 percent surge in Minnesota high-school students using e-cigarettes – from 13 percent in 2014, to 19 percent in 2017.

Flavored products mask the harshness of tobacco, but they are just as addictive and dangerous as other tobacco products. Restricting the sale of flavored tobacco products prevents a lifetime of tobacco addiction and will help create a healthier future for our kids.

We all bear the costs of tobacco use, which is the leading cause of preventable death and disease in Minnesota. Tobacco costs our state an estimated \$7 billion in health and lost productivity, and takes the lives of more than 6,300 Minnesota residents each year. Preventing youth from ever starting tobacco will help reduce this tremendous burden on our state.

Momentum is growing to reduce youth tobacco use through common-sense policy. Six U.S. states and more than 330 municipalities across the country, including 12 in Minnesota, have already raised the tobacco sales age to 21. As you continue to discuss increasing the tobacco age in Lauderdale, please move forward with an ordinance that does not include penalties related to purchasing, using and possessing tobacco products (often called PUP penalties).

Stopping youth smoking doesn't just prevent future disease and death, it also reduces excess medical costs, which are an enormous burden on individuals, families and taxpayers. I hope Lauderdale will consider and pass these life-saving policies. Thank you.

# CITY OF LAUDERDALE ORDINANCE NO. 18-02

An Ordinance Amending Title 3, Chapter 6 of the Code of Ordinances Regarding Tobacco, Tobacco Products, Tobacco-Related Devices, Nicotine or Lobelia Delivery Devices, and Electronic Delivery Devices

The city council of the city of Lauderdale ordains as follows:

SECTION 1. Title 3, Chapter 6 of the Lauderdale City Code is amended by deleting the stricken material and inserting the <u>double-underlined</u> material as follows:

### CHAPTER 6

# TOBACCO, TOBACCO PRODUCTS, <u>TOBACCO-RELATED DEVICES</u>, <u>NICOTINE OR LOBELIA DELIVERY DEVICES</u>, AND ELECTRONIC DELIVERY DEVICES

### SECTION:

3-6-1: Purpose

3-6-2: Definitions

3-6-3: License Required

3-6-4: Basis for Denial of License

3-6-5: Prohibited Sales

3-6-6: Self-Service Sales

3-6-7: Responsibility

3-6-8: Compliance Checks and Inspections

3-6-9: Exceptions and Defenses

3-6-10: Violations and Penalties

3-6-11: Severability

### 3-6-1: PURPOSE:

The City recognizes that marketing and public health research and tobacco industry documents reveal that tobacco companies have used fruit, candy, and alcohol flavors as a way to target youth and young adults and that the presence of flavors in tobacco products can make it more difficult for youth, young adult, and adult tobacco users to quit. The City further recognizes that young people are particularly susceptible to the addictive properties of tobacco products, and are particularly likely to become lifelong users. National data show that roughly 95 percent of adult smokers begin smoking before they turn 21 years of age. The ages of 18 to 21 are a critical period when many smokers move from experimental smoking to regular, daily use. Tobacco use has been shown to be the cause of several serious health problems which subsequently place a financial burden on all levels of government.

The purpose of this ordinance is to regulate the sale, possession, and use of tobacco, tobacco products, tobacco-related devices, nicotine or lobelia delivery devices, and electronic delivery

devices for the purpose of enforcing and furthering existing laws, to protect minors adolescents against the serious effects associated with the illegal use of tobacco, tobacco products, tobacco-related devices, nicotine or lobelia delivery devices, and electronic delivery devices, and to further the official public policy of the State of Minnesota in regard to preventing young people from starting to smoke as stated in Minnesota Statutes, section 144.391.

### 3-6-2: DEFINITIONS:

The following words and phrases, as used in this Chapter, shall have the meanings ascribed to them.

CHILD-RESISTANT PACKAGING: Packaging that meets the effectiveness specifications set forth in Code of Federal Regulations, title 16, section 1700.15(b) and that was tested in accordance with the method described in Code of Federal Regulations, title 16, section 1700.20.

COMPLIANCE CHECKS: The system the City uses to investigate and ensure that those authorized to sell tobacco, tobacco products, tobacco-related devices, and electronic delivery devices regulated products are following and complying with the requirements of this ordinance. Compliance checks shall involve the use of minors persons under the age of 21, which may include minors, as authorized by this ordinance.

ELECTRONIC DELIVERY DEVICES: Any product containing or delivering nicotine, lobelia, or any other substance intended for human consumption that can be used by a person to simulate smoking in the delivery of nicotine or any other substance through inhalation of vapor from the product. Electronic delivery device shall include any component part of such a product whether or not sold separately. Electronic delivery device shall not include any product that has been approved or otherwise certified for legal sale by the United States Food and Drug Administration for tobacco use cessation, harm reduction, or for other medical purposes, and is being marketed and sold solely for that approved purpose.

FLAVORED PRODUCT: Any regulated product that contains a taste or smell, other than the taste or smell of tobacco, that is distinguishable by an ordinary consumer either prior to or during the consumption of the product, including, but not limited to, any taste or smell relating to chocolate, cocoa, menthol, mint, wintergreen, vanilla, honey, fruit, or any candy, dessert, alcoholic beverage, herb, or spice. A public statement or claim, whether express or implied, made or disseminated by the manufacturer of a regulated product, or by any person authorized or permitted by the manufacturer to make or disseminate public statements concerning such products, that a product has or produces a taste or smell other than tobacco will constitute presumptive evidence that the product is a flavored product.

INDIVIDUALLY PACKAGED: The practice of selling any tobacco or tobacco product wrapped individually for sale. Individually wrapped tobacco and tobacco products shall include but not be limited to single cigarette packs, single bags or cans of loose tobacco in any form, and single cans or other packaging of snuff or chewing tobacco. Cartons or other packaging containing more than a single pack or other container as described in this definition shall not be considered individually packaged.

INDOOR AREA: All space between a floor and a ceiling that is bounded by walls, doorways, or windows, whether open or closed, covering more than 50 percent of the combined surface area of the vertical planes constituting the perimeter of the area. A wall includes any retractable divider, garage door, or other physical barrier, whether temporary or permanent.

LOOSIES: The common term used to refer to a single cigarette or any other tobacco product that has been removed from its packaging and sold individually.

MINOR: Any natural person who has not reached the age of 18 years.

MOVABLE PLACES OF BUSINESS: Any form of business operated out of a truck, van, automobile, or other type of vehicle or transportable shelter and not a fixed address store front or other permanent type of structure authorized for sales transactions.

NICOTINE OR LOBELIA DELIVERY DEVICE: Any product containing or delivering nicotine or lobelia intended for human consumption, or any part of such a product, that is not tobacco as defined in this section, not including any product that has been approved or certified by the United States Food and Drug Administration for sale as a tobacco-cessation product, as a tobacco-dependence product, or for other medical purposes, and is marketed and sold for such an approved purpose.

<u>REGULATED PRODUCTS:</u> The term that collectively refers to any tobacco, tobacco-related device, nicotine or lobelia delivery device, or electronic delivery device.

RETAIL ESTABLISHMENT: Any place of business where tobacco, tobacco products, tobacco-related devices, or electronic delivery devices regulated products are available for sale to the general public.

SALE: Any transfer of goods for money, trade, barter, or other consideration.

SMOKING: Inhaling or exhaling smoke from any lighted or heated cigar, cigarette, pipe, or any other lighted or heated tobacco or plant product, or inhaling or exhaling vapor from any electronic delivery device. Smoking shall include carrying a lighted or heated cigar, cigarette, pipe, or any other lighted or heated tobacco or plant product intended for inhalation.

TOBACCO or TOBACCO PRODUCTS: Tobacco and tobacco products includes cigarettes and any product containing, made, or derived from tobacco that is intended for human consumption, whether chewed, smoked, absorbed, dissolved, inhaled, snorted, sniffed, or ingested by any other means, or any component, part, or accessory of a tobacco product including, but not limited to; cigars; cheroots; stogies; perique; granulated, plug cut, crimp cut, ready rubbed, and other smoking tobacco; snuff; snuff flour; cavendish; plug and twist tobacco; fine cut and other chewing tobaccos; shorts; refuse scraps, clippings, cuttings and sweepings of tobacco; and other kinds and forms of tobacco. Tobacco excludes any tobacco product that has been approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration for sale as a tobacco cessation product, as a tobacco dependence product, or for other medical purposes, and is being marketed and sold solely for such an approved purpose.

TOBACCO-RELATED DEVICES. Tobacco-related devices includes any tobacco product as well as a pipe, rolling papers, ashtray, or other device intentionally designed or intended to be used in a manner which enables the chewing, sniffing, or smoking or vaping of tobacco or tobacco products. Tobacco-related devices shall include components of tobacco-related devices, which may be marketed or sold separately.

VENDING MACHINE. Any electric or electronic mechanical device which dispenses tobacco, tobacco products tobacco related devices or electronic delivery devices regulated products upon the insertion of money, tokens, or other form of payment directly into the machine by the person seeking to purchase the tobacco, tobacco product or tobacco-related device regulated products.

### 3-6-3: LICENSE REQUIRED:

- A. TOBACCO RETAILER LICENSE REQUIRED: No person shall sell or offer to sell any tobacco, tobacco products, tobacco-related devices, or electronic delivery devices regulated products without first having obtained a license to do so from the City.
- B. LICENSE FEE: The annual license fee shall be as established from time to time by resolution of the City Council. No license shall be issued until the appropriate license fee is paid in full. For periods shorter than one year the license fee shall be the full amount.)
- C. APPLICATION: Every person or business desiring to obtain a license to sell tobacco, tobacco products, tobacco-related devices, or electronic delivery devices regulated products shall file an application in writing with the City Clerk. The application must state the full name of the applicant, the applicant's residential and business addresses and telephone numbers, the name of the business for which the license is sought, whether such business is that of an individual, sole proprietor, firm, partnership, or corporation and the address where the business is to be conducted. If the City Clerk determines that an application is incomplete, he or she shall return the application to the applicant with notice of the information necessary to make the application complete. Upon receipt of a completed application and the annual license fee, the City Clerk shall forward the application to the City Council.
- D. INVESTIGATION; ISSUANCE: The City Clerk shall present the application to the City Council and the City Council shall order such investigation as it deems necessary. After the investigation, the City Council shall grant or deny the application. In the event of the application being granted, the City Clerk shall issue the license. If the City Council denies the license, notice of the denial shall be given to the applicant along with notice of the applicant's right to appeal the City Council's decision as provided in 3-6-10.
- E. TERM OF LICENSE: The license shall expire on December 31 following its issuance.
- F. SEPARATE LICENSE REQUIRED: A license shall permit the licensee to sell tobacco, tobacco-related products, tobacco devices, or electronic delivery devices <u>regulated products</u> at the one location specified in said license. A separate license shall be required for each location.

- G: TRANSFERS: All licenses issued under this section shall be valid only on the premises for which the license was issued and only for the person or business to whom the license was issued. No transfer of any license to another location or person shall be valid without prior approval of the City Council.
- H: MOVABLE PLACE OF BUSINESS: No license shall be issued to a moveable place of business. Only fixed location businesses shall be eligible to be licensed under this section.
- I: DISPLAY OF LICENSE: The license shall be displayed by the licensee in a prominent and conspicuous place at the licensed location.
- J: REVOCATION OR SUSPENSION: Any license issued under this section may be revoked or suspended as provided in 3-6-10.
- K: ISSUANCE AS PRIVILEGE AND NOT A RIGHT: The issuance of a license under this section shall be considered a privilege and not an absolute right of the applicant and shall not entitle the holder to an automatic renewal of the license.
- L: SMOKING PROHIBITED IN TOBACCO RETAIL ESTABLISHMENTS: Smoking shall not be permitted and no person shall smoke within the indoor area of any establishment with a tobacco retailer license. Smoking for the purposes of sampling tobacco, tobacco products, tobacco related devices, or electronic delivery devices regulated products is prohibited.

### 3-6-4: BASIS FOR DENIAL OF LICENSE:

- A. Grounds for denying the issuance or renewal of a license under this chapter include but are not limited to the following:
  - i. The applicant is under the age of 18 21 years.
  - ii. The applicant has been convicted within the past five years of any violation of federal, state, or local laws, ordinance provisions, or other regulation relating to tobacco, tobacco products, tobacco-related devices, or electronic delivery devices regulated products.
  - iii. The applicant has had a license to sell tobacco, tobacco products, tobacco-related devices, or electronic delivery devices regulated products suspended or revoked by any issuing authority within the preceding 12 months of the date of the application.
  - iv. The applicant fails to provide any information required on the application, or provides false or misleading information.
    - v. The applicant is prohibited by federal, state, or other local law, ordinance, or other regulation from holding a license.
- B. Except as may otherwise be provided by law, the existence of any particular ground for denial

does not mean that the City must deny the license.

C. If a license is mistakenly issued or renewed to a person, it shall be revoked upon the discovery that the person was ineligible for the license under this chapter.

### 3-6-5: PROHIBITED SALES:

<u>A.</u> It shall be a violation of this chapter for any person to sell or offer to sell any tobacco, tobacco products, tobacco related devices, or electronic delivery device regulated products as follows:

- a.i. To any person under the age of 18 21 years.
- b.ii. By means of any type of vending machine.
- e-<u>iii.</u> By means of self-service methods whereby the customer does not need to make a verbal or written request to an employee of the licensed premise in order to receive tobacco, tobacco products, tobacco-related devices, or electronic delivery devices regulated products and whereby there is not a physical exchange of the tobacco, tobacco products, tobacco-relate devices, or electronic delivery devices regulated products between the licensee, or the licensee's employee, and the customer.
- d.iv. By means of loosies.
- e.<u>v.</u> Containing opium, morphine, jimson weed, bella donna, strychnos, cocaine, marijuana, or other deleterious, hallucinogenic, toxic, or controlled substances except nicotine and other substances found naturally in tobacco or added as part of an otherwise lawful manufacturing process. It is not the intention of this provision to ban the sale of lawfully manufactured cigarettes or other tobacco products.
- B. In every transaction involving the sale of regulated products, the seller, whether the licensee or its employee or agent, must verify the buyer's age as at least 21 years by means of a government-issued photographic identification. Said verification is not required for a person over 30 years of age. However, that the buyer appeared to be 30 years of age or older does not constitute a defense to a violation of this subsection. Notice of the age verification requirement and legal sales age shall be posted conspicuously at each licensed premises.
- C. It shall be a violation of this chapter for any person to sell or offer to sell any liquid which is intended for human consumption and use in an electronic delivery device, whether or not such liquid contains nicotine, in packaging that is not child-resistant. Upon request, a licensee shall provide the City with a copy of a certificate of compliance or a full laboratory testing report to verify compliance with this paragraph.
- <u>D.</u> It shall be a violation of this chapter for any person to sell or offer to sell any flavored products. This prohibition shall not apply to licensed establishments that:
  - i. Prohibit persons under 21 from entering at all times;

- ii. Derive at least 90 percent of their revenues from the sale of regulated products; and
- iii. Adhere to all of the following building or structural criteria:
  - (1) Share no wall with and have no part of their structure adjoined to any other business or retailer unless the wall is permanent, completely opaque, and without doors, windows, and pass-throughs to the other business or retailer;
  - (2) Share no walls with and have no part of their structure directly adjoined to another licensed tobacco retailer; and
  - (3) Are only accessible by the public through an exterior door.

Any licensee that sells flavored products shall, upon request by the City, provide the City with financial records that document annual sales and blueprints of the licensed premises that provide for its structural layout.

- 3-6-6: SELF-SERVICE SALES: All tobacco, tobacco products, tobacco related devices, or electronic delivery devices regulated products shall either be stored behind a counter or other area not freely accessible to customers, or in a case or other storage unit not left open and accessible to the general public. This subsection shall not apply to licensed establishments that otherwise meet the standards set forth in subsection 3-6-5(D)(i)-(iii).
- 3-6-7: RESPONSIBILITY: All licensees under this chapter shall be responsible for the actions of their employees in regard to the sale of tobacco, tobacco products, tobacco-related devices, or electronic delivery devices regulated products on the licensed premises, and the sale of an item by an employee shall be considered a sale by the license holder. Nothing in this section shall be construed as prohibiting the City from also subjecting the clerk employees to whatever penalties are appropriate under this chapter, state, or federal law, or other applicable law or regulation.
- 3-6-8: COMPLIANCE CHECKS AND INSPECTIONS: All licensed premises shall be open to inspection by the City's contracted police department or other authorized city official during regular business hours. From time to time, the City's contracted police department shall coordinate compliance checks by engaging minors persons over the age of 15 years but less than 18 21 years to enter the licensed premise to attempt to purchase tobacco, tobacco products, tobacco related devices, or electronic delivery devices regulated products. Minors used for the purpose of compliance checks shall be supervised by city designated law enforcement officers or other designated city personnel.

Minors Persons under the age of 21 used for compliance checks shall not be guilty of unlawful possession of tobacco, tobacco products, tobacco-related devices, or electronic delivery devices regulated products when those items are obtained as part of the compliance check. No minor person used in compliance checks shall attempt to use a false identification misrepresenting the minor's person's age, and all minors persons lawfully engaged in a compliance check shall truthfully answer all questions about the minor's person's age asked by the licensee or his or her employee

and shall produce any identification, if any exists, for which he or she is asked.

3-6-9: EXCEPTIONS AND DEFENSES: Nothing in this chapter shall prevent the providing of tobacco, tobacco products, tobacco-related devices, or electronic delivery devices regulated products to a minor any person as part of a lawfully recognized religious, spiritual, or cultural ceremony. It shall be an affirmative defense to the violation of this chapter for a person to have reasonably relied on proof of age as described by state law.

### 3-6-10: VIOLATIONS AND PENALTIES:

Any person, firm, or corporation who violates any provision of this code for which another penalty is not specifically provided, shall, upon conviction, be guilty of a misdemeanor under Minnesota Statutes. Section 609.03 as it may be amended from time to time by the Minnesota Legislature. The cost of prosecution may be added. A separate offense shall be deemed committed upon each day during which a violation occurs or continues.

- A. GENERALLY. The license holder shall be responsible for the conduct of its agents or employees while on the licensed premises. Any violation of this article shall be considered an act of the license holder for purposes of imposing a civil penalty, license suspension, or license revocation. Each violation, and every day in which a violation occurs or continues, shall constitute a separate offense
- B. NOTICE OF VIOLATION. Upon the occurrence of a violation, the police department shall inform the city administrator of the violation. The city administrator shall then send to the license holder a written notice of the civil violation. The notice shall advise the license holder of the penalty and the license holder's right to request a hearing regarding the violation of this article.
- C. ADMINISTRATIVE CIVIL PENALTIES; LICENSEE: Each license issued hereunder shall be subject to suspension or revocation for violation of any provisions of this chapter or the laws of the State of Minnesota as follows:
  - (i) First violation: The first violation of this chapter shall be punishable by a civil penalty of \$200.00.
  - (ii) Second violation: A second violation of this chapter within any twenty-four-month period shall be punishable by a civil penalty of \$400.00 and a three-day suspension of the license.
  - (iii) Subsequent violation: A third or subsequent violation of this chapter within any twenty-four-month period shall be punishable by revocation of the license for one year plus a civil penalty of \$800.00.
- D. ADMINISTRATIVE CIVIL PENALTIES; INDIVIDUALS: An individual who sells a regulated product to a person under the age of 21 years shall be charged an administrative penalty of \$50.

<u>DE</u>. HEARING: Following receipt of a notice of a violation and penalty issued under this section, the license holder or individual may pay the penalty or request a hearing before the City Council. A request for a hearing shall be made by the individual or license holder in writing and filed with the city administrator or designee within ten days of the mailing of the notice of the alleged violation. Following receipt of a written request for hearing, the individual or license holder shall be afforded an opportunity for a hearing before the council.

<u>EF</u>. FINDINGS: If after the hearing the license holder or individual is found in violation of this chapter, the council shall impose a penalty. Based upon the findings, the penalty may be adjusted at the discretion of the council. <u>The decision that a violation has occurred must be in writing.</u>

FG. DEFAULT: If the individual or license holder has been provided written notice of the violation and if no request for a hearing is filed within the ten-day period, then the civil penalty, suspension or revocation imposed in this chapter shall take immediate effect by default. The city administrator or designee shall mail notice of the fine, suspension, or revocation to the individual or license holder.

### 3-6-11: SEVERABILITY

If any section or provision of this chapter is held invalid, such invalidity will not affect other
sections or provisions that can be given force and effect without the invalidated section or
provision.

### DESCRIPTION OF ISSUE AND PAST COUNCIL ACTION:

The proposed budget balances at \$1,437,074 for 2019, an increase of 3.6% (\$50,650) over 2018. The balanced budget requires a levy increase of 5.8% or \$44,590. The impact of the city's levy increase is approximately \$39.00 on a median valued home (\$206,300) as residential property values in Lauderdale are up 9.1% over last year.

In addition to adopting the resolution establishing the levy at this meeting, the Council must also establish the date and time of the public hearing prior to adopting the final budget and levy later in the year. Usually the rules regarding this meeting require it to be held at our last meeting of the year in December. This year the timing works such that the public hearing can be held on November 27. Staff prefer holding the public hearing early so that feedback can be worked into the budget prior to adoption on December 11.

### DESCRIPTION OF ISSUE AND PAST COUNCIL ACTION:

At the last meeting, Fakhri Alaghbash expressed interest in buying 2430 Larpenteur Avenue from the City for a food establishment or a retail violin store. Subsequently, staff sent him a note explaining that the City sells property through purchase and development agreements so that it can ensure what the property is being sold for is what ultimately gets built. Staff have been developing a comprehensive list of things Mr. Alaghbash will need to prepare for further Council consideration with the assistance of the City's financial advisor, attorney, planning consultant, and Ramsey County's traffic engineer.

Some items on that list are different if the building is repurposed versus a new structure being built. It would help clarify expectations if prospective buyers knew whether building reuse was an option. Functionally and thinking ahead to the long term use of the structure, the current building is not in an ideal location on the site. Among the items that prospective buyers would have to address in the reuse of the building include:

- Traffic circulation. Ramsey County's traffic engineer said owners would be limited to one access point (right in and right out) and traffic can't queue on Larpenteur Avenue.
- Ingress and egress. Identifying a location for ingress/egress where cars can see each
  other entering and exiting the same access point (view not restricted by the building).
- Handicapped Parking. Parking would be in rear of the building including the handicap stall. An accessible path would need to be built from rear to front of building.
- Set backs. The building is not positioned in a way to integrate with adjacent parcels. Current zoning in the business district allows for building to the property line.
- Size of building. The current zoning allows for 28% lot coverage. The current building covers about 18% of the lot. A new building could be about a third bigger.

In speaking with Ramsey County's traffic engineer they pointed out that any reuse of this building would require right in and right out and that traffic would not be permitted to make U-turns at Eustis and Larpenteur. That is not an issue we have discussed before as the assumption was that the lot would be assembled with a neighboring parcel that already had satisfactory ingress/egress.

After the Council decides on this matter we will begin drafting the list of item that Mr. Alaghbash will need to submit for further consideration. As staff develop that list we will look towards the new land use designation that will take effect upon adoption of the Comprehensive Plan and the new zoning that will be drafted next year.
