CALL TO ORDER

City Administrator, Heather Butkowski, welcomed the group to the Lauderdale Environment and Sustainability Commission Meeting.

APPROVALS

Commissioner Williams made a motion to adopt the agenda and minutes of the November 19, 2024 commission meeting. Sisel seconded the motion and it carried unanimously.

DISCUSSION / ACTION ITEM

A. Open Meeting Law:

Butkowski mentioned that commissioners asked about sharing of information at the last meeting. She said the commission must follow the rules of the Open Meeting Law (OML). This means that staff will post notices of meetings at City Hall. Commissioners shall not meet as a quorum unless notice of the group has been posted. Unplanned meetings of a quorum are not OML violations if commission business isn't discussed. If commissioners have information to share between meetings, they may send to Jim or Heather for distribution. Williams shared an audio recording that captured the highlights of the OML.

B. Election of Chairperson and Vice Chairperson

Williams offered to serve as chairperson.

Commissioner Williams made a motion appoint himself as chairperson. Carlson seconded the motion and it carried unanimously.

Winkelaar offered to be vice chairperson.

Commissioner Winkelaar made a motion appoint herself as vice chairperson. Williams seconded the motion and it carried unanimously.

C. Green Step Cities Discussion

Butkowski explained that Green Step cities is a voluntary recognition program hosted by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency. It is set up to challenge cities to do more for the environment. It consists of 29 best practices that are broken down into 180 actionable items. The City became a Step 1 city in 2015 by adopting a resolution. The City achieved Step 2 status in 2016 by completing six best practices. The City has been given credit for completing 13 best practices.

Included in the packet was the 2023 Green Step Cities Assessment for Lauderdale. Page three of the document lists required best practice to achieve Step 3 status. The checked boxes have been completed by the City; unchecked boxes are required. The Committee reviewed the items the City would need to achieve Step 3 status. Some will be easy to accomplish and others will require more thought. The group decided not to make achieving Step 3 status a goal but instead focus on group interests and priorities. The extent to which they align with Green Step Cities, the City will receive credit.

D. Topics of Interest

City staff presented the topics of interest collected during the previous meeting's discussion. With time running short, the group will submit priority topics to staff ahead of the next meeting to spark discussion at the next meeting. Staff also mentioned that Falcon Heights invited Lauderdale to participate in their Sustainability Fair. Information will be forthcoming at the next meeting.

The agenda will include finalizing first topics for discussion, the Falcon Heights – Lauderdale Sustainability Fair, and establishing subcommittees.


