CALL TO ORDER

Chair Williams called the meeting to order.

ROLL CALL

APPROVALS

Chair Williams asked if there were any proposed changes to the agenda or minutes of the December 17, 2024 commission meeting. There being none, the meeting proceeded.

DISCUSSION / ACTION ITEM

A. Defining Grass Roots Work Together

Mayor Gaasch explained that the City Council was highly committed to and excited about partnering with the Commission. She said the City Council wouldn't set goals or a schedule for the Commission. Like the work of the City Council, the Commission will be driven by the mission and vision of the members and members' roots in Lauderdale. The City has limited financial resources to devote to the work of the Commission but the best work will be done in a grass roots fashion.

B. Topics of Interest

Commissioners were asked to send in three environmental topics of interest to them. Butkowski said the three most common responses were related to pollinator health, native plantings / forestry, and stormwater management. If the Commission agrees, staff could prepare a schedule for exploring those topics. Staff suggested inviting Russ Henry to the next meeting to kick off the discussion around pollinators and native plantings. The Commission agreed.

C. Sustainability Fair Partnership with Falcon Heights

Staff shared the materials sent by Falcon Heights staff regarding the sustainability fair scheduled for Saturday, September 26. Butkowski said the increase in funding from Ramsey County for recycling allows Lauderdale to be a financial partner in the event which will provide Lauderdale residents with access to the textile, electronics, and shredded paper recycling along with resources from vendors at the fair. Falcon Heights is offering their residents free food scrap containers paid for by the recycling funds. City staff will order some to distribute to Lauderdale residents. Commissioners offered suggestions for additional fair vendors that staff will share with Falcon Heights.

D. City Website and Information Sharing

Butkowski explained that the two primary systems the City has for sharing information is the City's website with email distribution list and the city newsletter that is published quarterly. The Commission has a page on the City's website. Information about events or opportunities can be posted there and then emailed through the website to those that have signed up to receive notices. Similarly, commission articles can be published in the city newsletter. Sharing information about the Sustainability Fair can happen through these channels. To get the word out and energize people to attend will take more effort. Ideas can be discussed at future meetings.

E. Establish Subcommittees

Some Commissioners expressed interest in devoting more time to environment and sustainability efforts in the city beyond the monthly meeting. So long as the subcommittees are limited to four commission members, meetings will not violate the open meeting law. The group discussed options for doing this when time during the meetings is not sufficient to complete the work of the Commission.
