BACKGROUND:

Senator Marty and Representative McGuire will be in attendance at the March 13, 2001 meeting. Below is a brief summary of some of the critical legislative issues for the 2001 session that the Council can discuss with the legislators at the meeting.

Also enclosed in this packet are some legislative priorities set by communities in Ramsey County that was part of an area-wide meeting that was held with our representatives. This overlaps with the Lauderdale summary.

In addition to this, I have enclosed information about the legislation that Senator Marty and Representative McGuire have authored or co-authored this session.

League of Minnesota Cities and Lauderdale Legislative Issues

1. Road Funding for Cities under 5,000 Population.

Cities under 5,000 population do not receive any non-property tax funds for their collector and arterial streets.

Cities under 5,000 population that are not eligible for Municipal State Aid (M.S.A.) should be able to use county municipal accounts and the 5 percent account of the highway user distribution fund.

Uses of county municipal accounts should be statutorily modified so counties can dedicate these funds for local arterials and collector streets within cities under 5,000 population. In addition, the five percent set-aside account in the highway user distribution fund should be used to meet this funding gap.

2. Unfunded Mandates.

Mandates force cities to reduce spending for other basic services or to increase taxes and service charges. New laws calling for reporting requirements for new state mandates and restraint on new federal mandates should help address the problem, but other steps are necessary. There should be attempts to review, modify, and repeal existing unfunded mandates. New mandates should not be pursued unless full funding is provided or a permanent, stable revenue source is established.

3. Opposition to the local government sales tax.

When the state was experiencing a budget shortfall in 1992, the Legislature repealed the sales tax exemption for local government purchases. This cost or "double-tax" to city residents in the State of Minnesota costs an estimated \$100 million dollars a year, adding to the state's revenue surplus. In addition, proposals to extend the sales tax to services would have the effect of further increasing local government's costs and property taxes. Such "newly taxable" services would include engineering fees, attorney fees, and financial consultant (auditing) fees.

The state should reinstate the sales tax exemption for all local government purchases. This exemption must not be coupled with cuts in LGA or HACA.

4. Tax Increment Financing

In Minnesota, tax increment financing is the most viable tool available to all cities in their economic development and redevelopment efforts. The state has been critical of cities use of the tool and has implemented a series of restrictions over the past several years, rather than partnering with cities and encouraging their endeavors to improve and enhance the economic well-being of Minnesota and the growth and redevelopment of its cities. Critics often claim that TIF is overused. Some of these critics have proposed TIF freezes, caps, and retroactive restrictions and limitations on current districts. Cities have used tax increment financing responsibly and examples of these positive uses abound.

To effectively compete with other states, Minnesota must provide its cities greater flexibility in the use of tax increment financing and other economic development programs. The state should partner with cities in economic development and redevelopment activities, and encourage cities use of tax increment in achieving the laudable goals of long-term tax base stabilization and growth, job creation, development of low-to-moderate income housing, remediation of pollution, elimination of blight, recycling and redevelopment of the infrastructure, and redevelopment of its communities.

5. PERA Shortfall

Recent analysis has demonstrated that the PERA coordinated plan has been using overly optimistic actuarial assumptions for several years. The plan is expected to need additional funding of more than \$100 million a year over the next 25 years to cover projected pension benefits. If the additional funding comes exclusively from employer and employee payroll contributions, the increased contributions would be 30 percent higher than current levels. Contribution rate increases may reduce employee's take-home pay, strain local budgets, and result in property tax increases.

City officials recognize that employer and employee contribution rate increases are an important part of the funding solution. To reduce the magnitude of the increases, the Legislative Commission on Pensions and Retirement should:

- a. Supply PERA with state aid funded through reduced contributions to the Teachers' Retirement Association and the Minnesota State Retirement System. In 1984, PERA and MSRS sufficiencies were similarly transferred to TRA when it was under-funded.
- b. Implement pro-rated service credit. PERA is the only major Minnesota pension plan that awards a full-year's service credit to part-time employees.

- c. Exclude all seasonal employees from participation in PERA.
- d. Explore the possibility of former employees taking refunds by offering a portion of employer contributions as part of the refund.
- e. Reduce the guaranteed interest for deferred members' benefits.
- f. Increase the plan's vesting period from 3 to 5 years prospectively.
- g. Increase the amortization period for the plan's unfunded liability from 20 to 30 years.

6. Tax Reform and the "The Big Plan"

Minnesota's state and local government finance system is complex and intertwined. This complexity has been the subject of ongoing legislative scrutiny and has most recently resulted in a governor's initiative to review the system with the goal of developing a reform proposal for the 2001 Legislature. While cities rely on their partnership with the state to provide local services, they also must respond to the needs and desires of their residents. To that end, cities need flexibility in determining how to finance needed local services. In 1997, the Legislature began making changes to Minnesota's property tax system that have impacted the ability of cities to fund necessary services. Those changes, including the reimposition of levy limits, significant class rate compression, and changes to the limited market value law all have resulted in varying unintended consequences.

To remedy existing and avoid potential future unintended consequences of additional property tax changes, we support:

- a. Reviewing the combined impacts of property tax changes since 1997 and changing economic circumstances for taxpayers and for local governments so that policy makers can better understand where the system may need further changes;
- b. Expanding available city revenue sources to reduce the reliance on the property tax.

Opposition to the local government sales tax (*Arden Hills, Lauderdale, North St. Paul, Vadnais Heights*)

This is especially important, considering the administration's proposal to expand sales tax into more areas such as the provision of services.

Opposition to major Tax Increment Financing (TIF) Reform (*Lauderdale, Vadnais Heights*)

There should not be TIF freezes or caps. Minnesota needs TIF to properly compete with other states to redevelop property. Counties and school districts are currently involved in cities' development decisions through current requirements and everyone should recognize the benefits received, without any risk assumed, due to the cities prudent uses of TIF.

Property tax (revenue) protection to prevent losses to cities (*North St. Paul*)

Prevention of Electric deregulation (*North St. Paul*)

Road Funding for Cities under 5,000 population (*Lauderdale*)

Proposals that have been previously introduced to include funding for cities under 5,000 should continue to be pursued. These small cities should be able to use county municipal accounts and the 5% highway user distribution fund.

Telecommunications issues (*Lauderdale*)

In light of recent proposals from the administration and some legislators, cities such as Lauderdale could lose considerable local authority, revenue, and other benefits (i.e., institutional networks) from the loss of franchising authority.

Transportation Funding (*Arden Hills*)

Unfunded Mandates (*Lauderdale*)

There should be attempts to review, modify, and repeal existing unfunded mandates. New mandates should not be pursued unless full funding is provided.

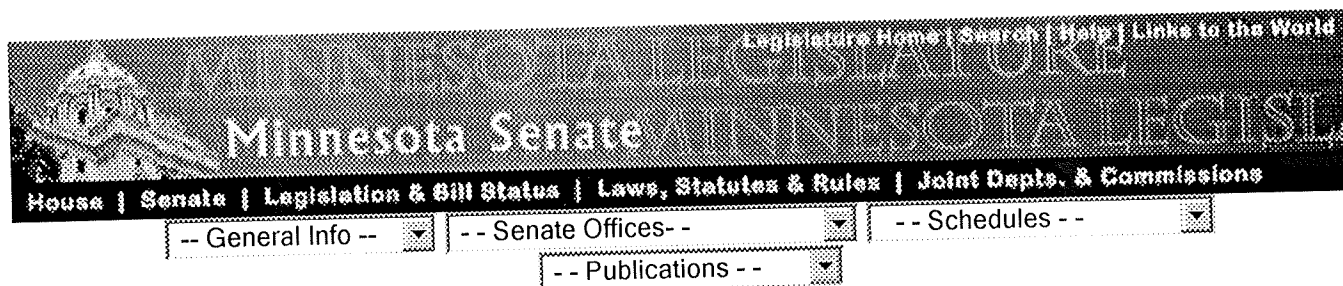

- eliminate the cross subsidy of special education programs by general education funds.
- allow school districts with middle school programs to weigh 6th grade students who are in middle schools at 1.3, the same weighting factor used for the 7th and 8th grade students in the same program.
- increase the State's commitment to early childhood education funding (e.g. Early Childhood Family Education (ECFE), Early Childhood Special Education (ECSE), School Readiness, and Head Start), in order to improve student achievement, without shifting funds away from K-12 programs.
- establish permanent funding for gifted and talented programs as a component of general education revenue.
- fully fund (or repeal) its 1997 mandate requiring all school districts to increase the length of the school year by three instructional days.

FACILITIES

In the 2001 Session, the Mounds View Public Schools urges the Legislature to:

- adequately fund necessary deferred maintenance needs for public schools in Minnesota based on the age of each facility.
- reinstate the sales tax exemption for expenditures relating to construction on all property owned by a public school district.
- provide assistance to school districts to help cover the additional costs of heating fuel this year

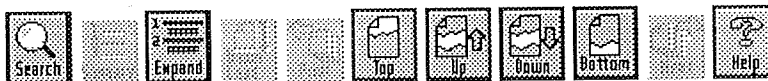

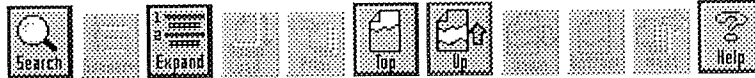

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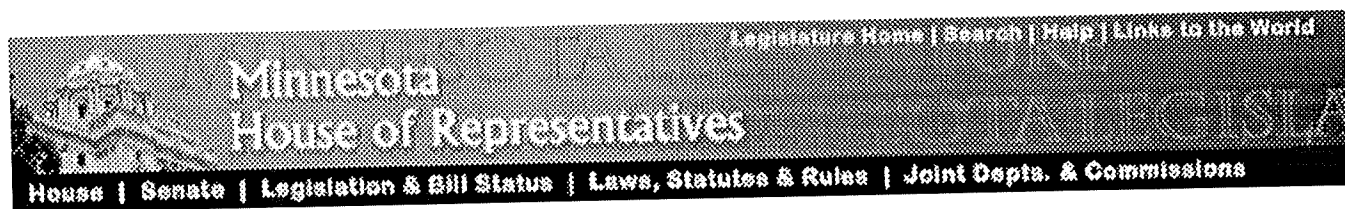

Agenda Item: Highway 280 Reconstruction Update- MNDOT

BACKGROUND:

On February 22, 2000 I reported to the City Council that MNDOT had received federal (STP/ISTEA) funds for reconstructing the portion of Highway 280 that is a principal arterial (Larpenteur Avenue to Highway 36/35W). Since that time, MNDOT has been undertaking preliminary design and survey work. Most right-of-way acquisition work was completed between 1995-2000.

MNDOT representatives will be attending the meeting to provide an update to the City Council on how their preliminary design process has been going and will provide a tentative layout of the reconstruction. The project has been planned for construction in 2003, but could very well be pushed back to at least 2004. The federal funds are only guaranteed through 2004, so if the state does not complete the project by that time, the \$5.5 million in federal dollars is lost.

Once MNDOT knows when construction will occur, they will be conducting a public informational meeting or series of meetings on the reconstruction for all affected jurisdictions that include Minneapolis, St. Paul, Lauderdale, and Roseville. Following that meeting(s), MNDOT will conduct a required official public hearing on the project's environmental assessment. This public hearing could take place anywhere between the Winter of 2001 through the Spring of 2002. It is following this public hearing that the State would seek final municipal approval of the designed plans. This usually involves a request of the affected municipality to pass a resolution approving the project.

As was stated at the outset, the presentation for Tuesday is an informal informational presentation aimed at updating the City Council and staff on the current status and possible design elements of the reconstruction.

The City sent a request for quotes to four companies for street sweeping (three were returned). The quotes include sweeping in April and again in October. The quotes also include the cost of hauling the October sweepings. The April sweepings will be disposed of in the park. I have attached the quotes for your review.

Last year's cost was \$ 1072.00 from McPhillips; his quote was not to exceed \$1200.00. However, last year the streets were only swept once, and a dump truck was not needed to haul away the sweepings.

The City has used McPhillips the last five years, and staff has been pleased with the quality and timeliness of his work. He has only charged the City for the actual hours worked, and did not charge for travel time. Also, his charges have always been less than the quoted amount. Thus, past experience with McPhillips has been positive.
