### 8. PUBLIC HEARINGS

A. Height Variance for 1605 Eustis Street. Administrative Analyst James Bownik stated that the Children's Home Society, 1605 Eustis Street, is applying for a height variance for the construction of a new building on their site at 1605 Eustis Street. The current height regulation in a B-1 District is 35 feet. Children's Home Society is requesting a building height of 46 feet, as indicated on the application.

The Mayor opened the public hearing at 7:36 p.m.

Wayne Sisel, Plan Commission Chair, asked for clarification on the height variance that is being requested. The height request on the application (46 feet) is different than the height request on the plans (43 feet). John Tietz, of the consulting firm Nelson, Tietz and Hoye, stated that the variance request is for a 43 foot building height, as indicated on the plans and drawings.

The Mayor closed the public hearing at 7:39 p.m.

#### ACTION

A. Height Variance for 1605 Eustis Street. John Tietz addressed the variance request. He stated that the need to exceed the height limitation is based on constructing a building that is residential in nature with a pitched style roof. The three story building also fits best on a site that contains mature oak trees that the applicant would like to retain, along with the site possessing a retention pond that utilizes lot space. Overall, the applicant feels that a smaller, but taller building footprint will minimize lot coverage and impervious surface and increase the overall usability of the site.

Council member Gower asked for clarification on how the elevation changes on Eustis Street impact the proposed height of the building and the other buildings adjacent to the Children's Home Society site on Eustis Street.

The Mayor asked for information on the parking and traffic impacts of the new building.

Plan Commission member Charles Smith questioned the status and condition of the sanitary sewer lines in the area.

Motion by Christensen, second by Gill-Gerbig to grant an 8-foot height variance, from 35 feet to 43 feet, to the Children's Home Society with the rationale that the that a smaller, but taller building footprint will minimize lot coverage and impervious surface and increase the overall usability of the site. ### **BACKGROUND:**

# PLEASE BRING BUDGET INFO FROM PREVIOUS MEETINGS

State Statute requires that cities certify their proposed levies to the County Auditor on or before September 15, 2000. As I noted at a previous meeting, the final levy is certified in December. Also at that December meeting the final 2001 Budget is adopted.

In certifying the final levy in December the Council can decrease the amount from the proposed levy amount from September, but it can not increase the amount. Also, the proposed levy amount is the information given to all residents for the TNT Hearing.

For the first time in four years, the State Legislature did not change the class rates for determining tax capacity. Based on this non-change, and the fact that median property values continue to increase at a brisk pace, the Lauderdale tax capacity should increase for the second year in a row. This is extremely important because the Council may not need to consider a raised tax rate, and thus higher taxes throughout the city as a result of increased tax capacity. In past years, when class rates were lowered and tax capacity decreased – taxes were vulnerable to rising for residents of Lauderdale because of the major burden shift from the commercial, industrial and public utility property owner to the residential property owner regardless of whether the levy was increased or not.

As was stated in last week's Friday report, Ramsey County may not be able to provide tax capacity figures to the cities because of the conversion to a new property records system. Unfortunately, the tax capacity figures can not be calculated at this time so I used a conservative extrapolation of last year's percentage increase in tax capacity as a benchmark for considering this year's preliminary levy.

If I receive the tax capacity data by Tuesday afternoon I will provide at the meeting on Tuesday evening.

Based on the extrapolation and discussions with the County, we will assume that the overall total market value of the city has increased along with the tax capacity from \$1.21M to an estimate of \$1.27M.

While the City will not have a lot of room to capitalize on the increase in market value, the tax capacity should increase to a point where some additional revenue can be captured without increasing tax collections.

### **COUNCIL ACTION REQUESTED:**

Based on Council discussions at budget meetings and the financial data presented, I am presenting three options for the City Council to approve a preliminary levy.

## OPTION A SAME LEVY AS 2000 (SEE SPREADSHEET A)

This was the option that was selected for the 1999 Levy and resulted in a very slight 1% increase in the tax rate. The effect of choosing this option for the 2001 Levy is similar to the consideration of the 2000 Levy, but it has a much different effect than 1999.

As you can see from the Option A spreadsheet, if the levy is kept the same as 2000 the local tax rate will *decrease 5%*. This means that a 0% levy increase will result in lower tax bills, with property values being equal. The average residential tax bill in Lauderdale (on a \$90,450 house) will decrease by \$14.66. This is due to the minor reduction in the tax rate. In 2000, it was due to the lower tax rate and the decreased state class rates.

# OPTION B SAME NET (LOCAL) LEVY AS 2000 (SEE SPREADSHEET B)

This is the same as Option A, except that the net or local levy takes the fiscal disparities contribution into account. (See the top of spreadsheet B where the regular levy is in the third column and the net or local levy is highlighted in the fifth column). The regular levy in the third column is the one that is certified to the state and the county, while this local levy subtracts the fiscal disparities for our own examination.

Since the fiscal disparities contribution is increasing slightly from 2000, adopting Option B is different than Option A in that there is a slight regular levy increase of \$1102 or two-tenths of 1% or .2%. The tax rates for Options A and B both decrease, but there is a slightly higher decrease presented with Levy Option A (27.555% vs. 27.641%).

### OPTION C SAME TAX RATE AS 2000 (SEE SPREADSHEET C)

This was the option chosen by the Council for the 2000 Levy. The levy was increased 4%, going from \$469,656 to \$488,406 with an increase in revenue of \$18,750.

The Option C spreadsheet illustrates that there is a levy increase with keeping the tax rate the same as 2000. The option of keeping the tax rate the same will produce the same tax bill for the average Lauderdale home, with property values being equal. Since there are no changes in the class rates for 2001 payable taxes for the first time in four years, the same tax rate produces the same tax bill.

This option produces an additional \$18,697 of revenue for the 2001 Budget, thus raising the tax levy 3.8% to \$507,103 from \$488,406.

Thus, with this option the tax rate remains at the 2000 level, producing the same tax bill, while also increasing tax revenue.

### **BACKGROUND:**

Minnesota Statute 275.065 outlines the procedures for holding public hearings to comply with Truth in Taxation requirements. It makes the County Auditor responsible for the coordination of the selection of hearing dates for cities and school districts within the county. This includes both the initial hearing dates and the continuation hearing dates.

The meeting dates must be between November 29<sup>th</sup> and December 20<sup>th</sup>. The hearings must be scheduled after 5:00 p.m., if scheduled on a day other than Saturday. The counties and the school districts make their selections before the cities. No city may select the second Tuesday or the third Monday in December for either its initial or continuation hearing date, since these are the dates set aside for county initial hearings and county continuation hearings, respectively.

# **BACKGROUND**

In the past few years, members of the League of Minnesota Cities have become concerned about what some state legislators and other groups are saying about city government. More and more comments seem to describe cities as special interest groups, rather than as representatives of Minnesota citizens. Add to that a disconnection from government felt by a growing number of Americans, especially among young people, and League leaders decided to take action.

Cities are the means to "community." We work in the interest of the families and businesses that live and work in our communities, and we are major contributors to quality of life in Minnesota. This is the message we must make clear to "key influencers" – legislators, the media, other influential groups – and directly to our citizens.

Last year, the LMC Board of Directors worked with a public relations firm to obtain candid feedback from citizens and key influencers to determine what quality of life means to them and how their city government helps contribute to that quality of life. Through focus groups and one-on-one interviews, we heard from citizens and key influencers about their top priorities for a high quality of life.

### **Top Priorities of Quality of Life**

- Safety
- Family
- Job opportunities
- Good health care
- Good schools
- Recreational opportunities
- Strong sense of community

From these findings, we developed key messages and the foundation of the Building Quality Communities effort. Since many of these priorities reflect the services cities provide to Minnesota citizens, city officials can begin to connect the value of city services to the values of our citizens.

## The mission of Building Quality Communities

- 1. To enhance the perception of Minnesota city governments and city officials.
- 2. To reinvigorate and increase citizen involvement in city government.
- 3. To reinstill a sense of pride in public service, inspiring young people to seek careers in city government.

The key to achieving this mission is a grassroots effort among all cities, focusing on clearly and consistently making the connection between the work of city governments and the high quality of life Minnesotans experience.

#### We also will work to:

- Seek effective ways to get citizens involved in building their community.
- Continue improving our partnership with legislators and the media.
- Strengthen our collaboration with other community groups.

### Table of contents for Chapter 415

415.11 Second to fourth class cities; governing body salaries.

Subdivision 1. **Set by ordinance**. Notwithstanding the provisions of any general or special law, charter, or ordinance, the governing body of any statutory or home rule charter city of the second, third or fourth class may by ordinance fix their own salaries as members of such governing body, and the salary of the chief elected executive officer of such city, in such amount as they deem reasonable.

Subd. 2. After next election. No change in salary shall take effect until after the next succeeding municipal election.
