




















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- IN 2015, THE BUSIEST DAY OF THE WEEK FOR CALLS FOR SERVICE WAS SUNDAY WITH 19% (21 OF 108) OF THE RECORDED CALLS AND THE MONTH OF OCTOBER WAS THE BUSIEST MONTH WITH 13% (14 OF 108) OF THE RECORDED CALLS.
- IN 2014, THE BUSIEST DAY OF THE WEEK FOR CALLS FOR SERVICE WAS SATURDAY WITH 20% (24 OF 117)
 OF THE RECORDED CALLS AND THE MONTHS OF FEBRUARY AND MAY WERE THE BUSIEST MONTHS WITH
 13% (15 OF 117) OF THE RECORDED CALLS EACH.
- IN 2013, THE BUSIEST DAY OF THE WEEK FOR CALLS FOR SERVICE WAS THURSDAY WITH 22% (21 OF 94)
 OF THE RECORDED CALLS AND THE MONTH OF MAY WAS THE BUSIEST MONTH WITH 14% (13 OF 94) OF
 THE RECORDED CALLS.IN 2012, THE BUSIEST DAY OF THE WEEK FOR CALLS FOR SERVICE WAS FRIDAY
 WITH 20% (30 OF 149) OF THE RECORDED CALLS AND THE MONTH OF AUGUST WAS THE BUSIEST MONTH
 WITH 13% (19 OF 149) OF THE RECORDED CALLS.
- THE LEVEL OF DEDICATION FROM OUR MEMBERS IS EVIDENT BY THE FACT
 THAT SIX (6) OF OUR EIGHTEEN (18) ACTIVE MEMBERS MADE 50% OR MORE
 OF THE FIRE CALLS.

FIRE CALLS (108)

*NOTE-WORTHY CALLS

- IN 2015, CREWS RESPONDED TO A SINGLE VEHICLE ACCIDENT WHICH PROGRESSED INTO A FULLY INVOLVED VEHICLE FIRE RESULTING IN A FATALITY. AN INCIDENT SUCH AS THIS CAN HAVE AN IMPACT ON AND AFFECT EVERYONE DIFFERENTLY. THESE CALLS ARE UNCOMMON BUT ARE THE REALITY OF THE FIRE SERVICE AND ARE CHALLENGES WE MUST FACE.
- TYPICALLY NO TWO (2) CALLS ARE ALIKE, HOWEVER, THIS YEAR FIRE PERSONNEL RESPONDED TO THE SAME APARTMENT BULDING THREE (3) TIMES FOR THE EXACT SAME CALL TYPE OF SMOKE IN THE HALLWAY WITH A UNIT'S SMOKE DETECTOR SOUNDING. ALL THREE (3) TIMES THE 1ST ARRIVING PERSONNEL HAD TO MAKE ENTRY AND RESCUE AN UNCONSCIOUS/UNRESPONSIVE OCCUPANT FROM THE SMOKE FILLED APARTMENT.
- A HOUSE FIRE IN LAUDERDALE. THE FIRE WAS CONTAINED TO A BEDROOM WITH MINIMAL DAMAGE AS A
 RESULT OF QUICK ENTRY AND EXTINGUISHMENT BY FIRE PERSONNEL. THE CAUSE OF THE FIRE WAS
 CARELESS SMOKING WHICH IS A COMMON CAUSE AND THE LEADING CAUSE OF CIVILIAN HOME FIRE
 DEATHS.

THE MEMBERS OF THE FALCON HEIGHTS FIRE DEPARTMENT
TRAINED OVER 1500 HOURS IN 2015. THE FIRE DEPARTMENT
OFFERED 87 TRAINING EXERCISES IN 2015 WHICH IS AN AVERAGE
OF 7 PER MONTH, THESE TRAINING EXERCISES INCLUDE BUT
NOT LIMITED TO:

- MEDICAL TRAINING DRILLS,
- STATE FIRE SCHOOL EVENTS,
- IN-HOUSE EVENTS,
- PHYSICAL AGILITY TESTS,
- VEHICLE FIRES,
- VEHICLE EXTRICATIONS,
- AIR MANAGEMENTS EVENTS,
- SEARCH AND RESCUE EXERCISES
- HAZARDOUS MATERIALS TRAINING EVENTS.



TRAINING IS AN ESSENTIAL PART OF THE FIRE SERVICE, BECAUSE NO TWO (2) INCIDENTS ARE THE SAME, WE MUST TRAIN AS OFTEN AS POSSIBLE TO KEEP OUR SKILLS SHARP, TO TEST OUR ABILITIES, TO HAVE THE OPPORTUNITY TO USE THE EQUIPMENT AVAILABLE, AND LEARN AS MUCH AS POSSIBLE ABOUT THE EVER-CHANGING ENVIRONMENT AS IT RELATES TO THE FIRE SERVICE.

HONING OUR SKILLS HAS AND WILL CONTINUE TO A VITAL PART OF THE SERVICE WE PROVIDE TO THE VISITORS AND CITIZENS OF FALCON HEIGHTS AND LAUDERDALE NOT TO MENTION OUR OWN FIRE DEPARTMENT MEMBERS.

THE LEVEL OF DEDICATION FROM OUR MEMBERS IS EVIDENT BY THE FACT THAT NINE (9) OF OUR EIGHTEEN (18) ACTIVE MEMBERS PARTICIPATED IN 50% OR MOREOF THE SCHEDULED WEEKLY DRILLS.









WHAT'S NEW FOR 2016 AND OTHER DEPARTMENTAL GOALS

- IN 2016, THE FIRE DEPARTMENT WILL BE PARTICIPATING IN THE RAMSEY COUNTY CLOSEST UNIT DISPATCHING PILOT PROGRAM AND THE PROJECT LIFESAVER TO PROVIDE TIMELY RESPONSE TO SAVE LIVES AND REDUCE POTENTIAL INJURY FOR ADULTS AND CHILDREN WHO WANDER DUE TO ALZHEIMER'S, AUTISM, AND OTHER RELATED CONDITIONS OR DISORDERS.

 OF THE RECORDED CALLS AND THE MONTHS OF FEBRUARY AND MAY WERE THE BUSIEST MONTHS WITH
 13% (15 OF 117) OF THE RECORDED CALLS EACH.

- IN 2015, CREWS RESPONDED TO A SINGLE VEHICLE ACCIDENT WHICH PROGRESSED INTO A FULLY INVOLVED VEHICLE FIRE RESULTING IN A FATALITY. AN INCIDENT SUCH AS THIS CAN HAVE AN IMPACT ON AND AFFECT EVERYONE DIFFERENTLY. THESE CALLS ARE UNCOMMON BUT ARE THE REALITY OF THE FIRE SERVICE AND ARE CHALLENGES WE MUST FACE.
- TYPICALLY NO TWO (2) CALLS ARE ALIKE, HOWEVER, THIS YEAR FIRE PERSONNEL RESPONDED TO THE SAME APARTMENT BULDING THREE (3) TIMES FOR THE EXACT SAME CALL TYPE OF SMOKE IN THE HALLWAY WITH A UNIT'S SMOKE DETECTOR SOUNDING. ALL THREE (3) TIMES THE 1ST ARRIVING PERSONNEL HAD TO MAKE ENTRY AND RESCUE AN UNCONSCIOUS/UNRESPONSIVE OCCUPANT FROM THE SMOKE FILLED APARTMENT.
- A HOUSE FIRE IN LAUDERDALE. THE FIRE WAS CONTAINED TO A BEDROOM WITH MINIMAL DAMAGE AS A
 RESULT OF QUICK ENTRY AND EXTINGUISHMENT BY FIRE PERSONNEL. THE CAUSE OF THE FIRE WAS
 CARELESS SMOKING WHICH IS A COMMON CAUSE AND THE LEADING CAUSE OF CIVILIAN HOME FIRE
 DEATHS.



MINUTES Wednesday, March 2, 2016

1) Curtiss Field Recommendations

- Call to order 6:30. Mayor Lindstrom
- General discussion on history or Curtiss Field going back to 2014. Council members
 discussed results from survey/open houses. Sack Thongvanh provided a brief history
 of parks planning and updates from 2013-current. Council asked general questions
 regarding recent progression of Curtiss Field. City Administrator moved on to discuss
 results from surveys and open houses. He explained the process of how the
 commission solicited desires of residents.
- City Administrator Sack Thongvanh moved on to discuss the top priorities provided through the survey results. They include a park building, greenspace, beautifying the park, and providing amenities for all ages. Council discussed utilizing parks as destinations rather than utilizing all amenities at all parks. Council asked general questions regarding what primary uses would be for a new building. Staff explained it would primarily be used for programming, rentals and special events.
- City Administrator Sack Thongvanh explained staff is looking for direction from council for next steps. The letter of recommendation included multiple priorities to consider. Without discussing specific options or costs, the city administrator explained funding options including tax abatement. Tax abatement is a mechanism that 'captures' property taxes and allocates to specific funds.

This can be redirected to parks specific funds. The city can bond for parks improvements and equipment, but not for a building. A bond could be placed on an election. Council members asked how the message would be shared with residents and were concerned that raising taxes without a clear message would be undesirable. Ultimately, bonding can be done with or without a ballot. Council expressed concern with bonding on individual projects (parks) as opposed to all long term bonding projects (street improvements, reclaim, etc...)

- City Administrator Sack Thongvanh discussed that ongoing strategic planning includes long term budget planning. Council will need to establish priorities for staff.
- Council members expressed understanding that staff is looking for direction for next steps. This can be cost related info... more
- Council expressed concern with a building as it might limit greenspace at the park.

- General discussion on long range planning with the budget including streets, parks, and capital purchases.
- City Administrator Sack Thongvanh explained that once council gives direction to staff, council can consider estimates and prioritize options going forward.
- Discussion on building including plumbing and what type of access the public would have to bathrooms.
- Council asked whether we receive complaints about activities at Curtiss Field at night. Council expressed that it is well patrolled by SAPD.
- Council expressed it would be beneficial to have costs associated with the recommendations. Having a more tangible set of recommendations makes considerations easier to understand.
- Council suggested that there could be a range of facilities (size, amenities, how it general functions...)
- Council expressed needing more data to consider more priorities.
- Council expressed interest in hearing costs associated with desires recommended by the Parks Commission.
- Council also expressed interest in community organizations becoming a part of planning including landscaping.
- Staff will respond to requests to find costs associated with recommendations; staff will move forward on better understanding all costs associated with short term projects including completing sidewalks and exploring landscaping options.

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MUTUAL AID AGREEMENT TO PROVIDE FOR THE AUTOMATIC DISPATCH OF THE CLOSEST EMERGENCY RESPONSE UNIT REGARDLESS OF JURISDICTIONAL BOUNDARIES

This Mutual Aid Agreement ("Agreement") is made and entered into this ____ day of ______, 2016 by and among Cities of Saint Paul, Roseville, Little Canada Fire Department Inc., Maplewood, Falcon Heights, North Saint Paul, Vadnais Heights, New Brighton, White Bear Lake, and the Lake Johanna Fire Department Inc. (collectively the "Cities" or "Parties" and individually the "City" or the "Party").

RECITALS

- A. The Cities/Parties desire to enter into this Agreement to authorize their respective fire departments to provide, and for the participating Cities/Parties to receive, automatic mutual aid to dispatch the closest equipment and personnel to emergency events to provide assistance in the form of fire, rescue, and related services;
- B. The Cities/Parties are authorized under Minnesota Statutes, section 471.59 to cooperatively exercise their commonly held powers and mutual aid agreements are critical to providing and supporting emergency services;
- C. The Cities/Parties determine that providing for the automatic dispatch of the closest emergency unit as is authorized in this Agreement is in their best interests and they desire to create an opportunity for other cities and towns to participate in this Agreement.

AGREEMENT

In exchange for the mutual promises made herein, the Parties hereby agree as follows:

I. DEFINITION OF TERMS

For the purposes of this Agreement, the terms defined in this section shall have the meanings given them below.

- 1. "Agency" means the fire department, fire station, or fire unit called upon to provide Assistance to an Emergency Event.
- 2. "Assistance" means the provision of fire personnel and equipment in response to an Emergency Event.
- 3. "Dispatcher" means the person at the applicable public safety access point that receives reports of Emergency Events and selects the appropriate Agency to respond to and provide Assistance for the Emergency.
- 4. "Emergency" any request for fire department assistance.

- 5. "Emergency Events" means any Emergency incident in which an Agency may be called upon by a Dispatcher to provide Assistance within the scope of the Agency's service capabilities as determined by the respective member Cities and communicated in writing to the Emergency Communications Center.
- 6. "President" means the president of the Ramsey County Fire Chiefs Association.
- 7. "Protection Area" means the area within the Cities of Saint Paul, Roseville, Little Canada, Maplewood, Falcon Heights, North Saint Paul, North Oaks, Shoreview, Arden Hills, Lauderdale, New Brighton, Vadnais Heights, and any additional city or town that joins this Agreement as provided herein.
- 8. "Requesting Party" means a Party which requests assistance from another Party to this Agreement and each such responding Party is considered a Sending Party.
- 9. "Sending Party" means a Party called upon to provide Assistance to another Party and which actually provides Assistance to the Requesting Party.
- 10. "Specialized Activities" means the provision of non-emergency assistance including, but not limited to, training of personnel and associated equipment and facilities.

II. AUTHORIZATION

Each of the Cities participating in this Agreement hereby authorize their respective fire Agencies to respond to and receive automatic mutual aid services pursuant to the terms of this Agreement and to otherwise take such actions as are needed to provide and receive Assistance as provided herein.

III. TERM AND TERMINATION

This Agreement shall be effective as of the date first written above and shall be ongoing until terminated as provided herein. Each City shall act by resolution to adopt this Agreement and shall forward a fully executed copy of its resolution and a signed original of this Agreement to the President of the Ramsey County Fire Chiefs Association.

Any Party may act by resolution to opt out of its participation in this Agreement. No such resolution shall be effective until the Party provides at least 60 days' written notice of termination to the President, the applicable County Emergency Communications Center, and each of the other Parties. The resolution must indicate the date of withdrawal from this Agreement, which must be sufficiently in the future to allow for the 60 day notice. The notice shall include a fully executed copy of the termination resolution.

IV. AUTOMATIC MUTUAL AID PROCEDURE

1. Whenever a Party to this Agreement receives a call for Assistance for an Emergency Event occurring within its jurisdictional boundaries, that call will automatically be

dispatched to the Agency having primary jurisdiction, as well as to any Agency for which the Dispatcher or Computer Aided Dispatch System (CAD) determines may provide a more timely response. The Sending Party shall respond to the call and make necessary Assistance available without undue delay. The typical response from the Sending Party shall be one apparatus and crew.

The extent of Assistance provided by the Sending Party shall be determined solely by the Sending Party based on its established response criteria and procedures. In the event a Sending Party determines it will not be able to provide Assistance, the fire official for the Agency making that determination shall immediately notify the Requesting Party.

- 2. The first arriving unit shall be in command of the emergency scene, until relieved by the Requesting Party. The Sending Party's fire official shall retain direction and control of the Sending Party's fire personnel and equipment on the scene.
- 3. Each Party, whether it be the Requesting Party or a Sending Party, shall be responsible for injuries or death of its own personnel. Each Party shall maintain workers' compensation insurance or self-insurance coverage covering its own personnel while they are providing Assistance pursuant to this Agreement. Each Party waives the right to sue the other Party for any workers compensation benefits paid to its own employee or their dependents, even if the injuries were caused wholly or partially by the negligence of the other Party or its officers, employees.
- 4. Each Party shall be responsible for damages to or loss of its own equipment. Each Party waives the right to sue the other Party for any damages to or loss of its equipment, even if the damages or losses were caused wholly or partially by the negligence of the other Party or its officers, employees, or volunteers.
- 5. Specialized Activities of non-emergency nature may be requested and/or provided by both parties to the Agreement. There is no obligation on the part of a Sending Party to provide Specialized Activities.
- 6. No charge shall be made to either party for Assistance rendered under this Agreement for incidents with duration under eight (8) hours. Provided, however, that in the event the Requesting Party is reimbursed for said personnel, equipment, or any other costs from a party or parties responsible for the Emergency, or is otherwise reimbursed by a third party source, then reimbursement, on a pro-rata basis, shall be made to the Sending Party for any equipment or personnel charges.

V. COOPERATIVE IMPLEMENTATION

The Parties agree to work in good faith through their respective Agencies to cooperatively establish any specific response criteria or procedures as they may determine are needed to implement this Agreement. Such criteria and procedures do not necessarily need to be the same for each Party, but they shall not be contrary to the

primary purpose of this Agreement. Each Party shall be responsible for communicating in writing its response criteria and procedures to each of the other Cities, the President, and the applicable County Emergency Communications Center.

VI. LIABILITY AND INDEMNIFICATION

- 1. For the purposes of the Minnesota Municipal Tort Liability Act (Minnesota Statutes, chapter 466), the employees and officers of the Sending Party are deemed to be employees (as defined in Minnesota Statutes, section 466.01, subdivision 6) of the Requesting Party. For all other purposes, all personnel remain the employees of their respective Party during the performance of duties under this Agreement.
- 2. The Requesting Party agrees to defend and indemnify the Sending Party against any claims brought or actions filed against the Sending Party or any officers, employees, or volunteers of the Sending Party for injury to or death of any third person or persons, or damage to the property of any third person or persons, arising out of the provision of Assistance by the Sending Party under this Agreement.

Under no circumstances, however, shall a Party be required to pay on behalf of itself and other Parties, any amounts in excess of the limits on liability established in Minnesota Statutes, chapter 466 applicable to any one Party. As provided in Minnesota Statutes, section 471.59, subdivision 1a, for the purposes of determining total liability the Parties shall be considered a single governmental unit and the total liability for the Parties shall not exceed the limits on governmental liability for a single governmental unit as specified in Minnesota Statutes, section 466.04, subdivision 1. Nothing in this Agreement shall be interpreted as any of the Parties waiving any exemptions or limitations on liability available to them under law.

The intent of the indemnification requirement of this section is to impose on each Requesting Party a limited duty to defend and indemnify any Sending Party for claims arising within the Requesting Party's jurisdiction subject to the liability limits under Minnesota Statutes, chapter 466. The purpose of creating this duty to defend and indemnify is to simplify the defense of liability claims by eliminating conflicts among defendants, and to permit liability claims against multiple defendants from a single occurrence to the defended by a single attorney.

3. No Party to this Agreement, nor any officer of any Party, shall be liable to any other Party or to any other person for failure of any Party to furnish Assistance to any other Party, or for recalling Assistance.

VII. ADDING MEMBERS

Any other city/town/fire department corporation adjacent to the Protection Area may join this Agreement upon the written consent of all of the existing Parties to this Agreement that abut upon the boundaries of the joining Party, the adoption by the joining Party a resolution authorizing execution of this Agreement, and the filing of a copy of the

executed resolution and this Agreement with the President. The Ramsey County Fire Chiefs may impose reasonable conditions on the admission of additional cities and establish procedures for removal of a Party for cause. The addition of a Party to this Agreement as provided herein does not require an amendment to this Agreement. The joining Party shall become subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement as of the effective date of its participation in the sharing of services under this Agreement as determined by the President.

VIII. MISCELLANEOUS

- 1. This Agreement may be amended by written agreement of the all of the Parties.
- 2. The Parties will execute this Agreement in any number of duplicate originals, each of which constitutes an original, and all of which, collectively, constitute only one Agreement. Each Party will deliver enough executed counterpart signature pages so that all of the Parties will have a fully executed original of this Agreement. The President will coordinate the delivery of the signature pages and compiling and delivering originals of the Agreement to each of the Parties.
- 3. This Agreement is made under the law of the State of Minnesota.
- 4. This Agreement is entered into for the benefit of the Parties and is not intended to provide any rights to any third parties.
- 5. This Agreement is not exclusive and is not intended to replace any other mutual aid agreements any of the Parties may have in place.

IX. EXECUTION

Each Party has read, agreed to, and executed this Agreement on the date indicated below.

- You are planning to invest in renewable energy and energy efficiency measures
- You are facing a real energy related infrastructure need and need to develop comprehensive solutions that improve your city's entire system
- You are trying to fix a water contamination problem and see an energy dimension in that issue
- You have developed a clean energy or GHG emissions reduction plan for your community and want to implement projects
- You are a member of the Green Step Cities program and want to accelerate your community's transition to a cleaner energy footprint
- You want to explore energy solutions together with your area's farms

Rationale:

Municipalities of all sizes will be key players in the next decade's rush to reposition the world community so that collectively we may win this century's climate challenge. The recent COP21 climate talks in Paris underline the urgency for simultaneous action at both the policy and implementation levels. Communities are at the nexus of impacts. They are also the location for comprehensive solutions.

The program "Climate-Smart Municipalities: Modeling Integrated Energy Communities for the 21st Century in Minnesota and Germany" taps and develops energy expertise in Minnesota and the German state of North Rhine-Westphalia (NRW) to model what communities of different sizes, with specific microeconomies and distinct local government structures can do to reduce their carbon footprints while assuring economic prosperity. Economic growth, recent data suggests, no longer is inextricably tied to increasing emissions.

The emphasis is on systems—the municipality as a complex economic and social system and energy as a key element for comprehensive sustainability practice.

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At the program's center are 8-10 municipalities in Minnesota and NRW. Selected competitively and paired as non-identical twins, they will move at different speeds and in different national contexts but learn together and from each other. Each municipal pair will be linked to research capacity at the University of Minnesota and a regional research institution in NRW to enable expert analysis and to integrate knowledge from multiple disciplines in the community's effort to transform itself. To tap and make visible the role of business and the private sector in reducing any community's carbon footprint, the communities in MN will be linked to appropriate private sector partners. Connections between electrical generation and thermal output, between waste management and energy, and between agricultural production and energy are of interest. Education and a communications strategy involve local citizens and students. Finally, the communities' strategies and data collected over the project's three year run will provide key information for future efforts to scale up comprehensive sustainable energy initiatives in municipalities across Minnesota and NRW.

Climate-smart Municipalities Program elements:

Element #1 collaborative workshop-study tour for MN municipal leaders and stakeholders to NRW to meet with partner communities and experts

A one-week intensive seminar and fact-finding study tour will expose the delegation to state-of-the art examples in NRW that demonstrate how to integrate sustainable strategies and achieve maximum value for the community and local economy. <u>Each selected municipality participates annually with two representatives</u>. An additional seat will be made available for a state legislator from the district.

Element #2 tailored work programs established by partnered municipalities and connected to research at U of M and NRW research institutions

Each twinned community will establish and work through a catalogue of measures and actions to reduce the community's carbon footprint and achieve resilience and economic benefits. Communities will conduct regular virtual meetings to exchange notes and updates.

Flement #3 forum events in Minnesota to share information and learning with broad community Presentations by program municipalities at 2-3 regional stakeholder conferences.

Element #4 Study tour for NRW partner community leaders and experts to Minnesota A matching one-week intensive workshop-study tour for a delegation from Germany that includes time for the twinned communities to work together and strengthen the cooperative relationship between the twinned communities.

The program will be run with these elements each year for three years (2016, 2017, and 2018).

What is expected of the participating municipalities?

- You commit to being fully engaged over the program's three year run time and participate in all elements at the leadership level
- You are willing to mentor other MN communities
- You are committed to accelerating your community's clean energy transition and will create a plan with benchmarks
- You are eager to tap expertise and technical help from partners
- You will provide funds to cover your two community representatives' airfare to Germany. Estimated transatlantic airfare during summer is \$1,800/person.

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RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR AND CITY ADMINISTRATOR TO APPLY FOR THE CLIMATE-SMART MUNICIPALITIES: MODELING INTEGRATED ENERGY COMMUNITIES FOR THE 21ST CENTURY IN MINNESOTA AND GERMANY REQUEST FOR PROPOSAL

WHEREAS, the City of Falcon Heights is a leader in climate change resiliency, engaging in green technology, education, and infrastructure; and

WHEREAS, in 2015 the City of Falcon Height and the Great Plains Institute co-developed a Climate Change Resiliency Study and Action Plan through the Environmental Assistance Time Sensitive Grant program to study the City's capacity to respond to climate change related disruptions and recommendations for future consideration; and

WHEREAS, in January of 2011 the City became a Green Step city providing cost-effective sustainable development best practices in the following five categories: (1) Buildings and Lighting; (2) Transportation; (3) Land Use; (4) Environmental Management; and (5) Economic and Community Development, and has attained the status of Green Step level 3 and is currently engaged in the process of reaching level 4; and

WHEREAS, the Climate Smart Program, a Program jointly administered through the University of Minnesota and the German state of North Rhine-Westphalia, will increase and diversify the City's understanding of climate change related issues through the required elements including: a reciprocity of knowledge through a three year commitment to participate in all elements of the program at the leadership level, willingness to mentor other Minnesota communities, committed to accelerating a clean energy transition and will create a plan with benchmarks, engage with experts in technical fields from partners, and will provide funds to cover two representatives' airfare to Germany (\$1,800/person); and

WHEREAS, the City is a regional example of climate change resiliency and adaptation through analysis, planning, and development; and

WHEREAS, the City seeks to engage with international partners from the German state of North Rhine-Westphalia to deepen a shared desire to become more resilient climate change.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Falcon Heights, Minnesota direct staff to apply for the Climate-Smart Municipalities: Modeling Integrated Energy Communities for the 21st Century in Minnesota and Germany request for proposals.
