#### Rita Mills - President of Roseville Area League of Women Voters:

In 2016, the League of Women Voters and three students from Humphrey School of Public Affairs at the University of Minnesota did a study on affordable housing and its availability in 5 cities (Lauderdale, Falcon Heights, Roseville, Little Canada, and Maplewood). In 2017, the research summary was presented to the 5 cities but it had some concerns from City Councils. The research showed that the city of Falcon Heights did not have any African Americans household residing in owner-occupied housing. Rita stated that when it was published, reports did not show any margins of error for the data and documents. Rita clarified that there are African Americans household residing in owner-occupied housing in Falcon Heights.

#### Council Member Miazga:

Thank Rita for the clarifications because the City Council did show some concerns when it was presented last year.

#### Council Member Leehy:

Thank and appreciate Rita for the clarifications. Leehy expressed that she is an African American homeowner in Falcon Heights and would gladly pass the communication along to previous and current homeowners.

2. 2017 Year-End Audit Presentation

#### Matt Meyer:

Presented the 2017 Audit Reports and Financial Statements. For 27th years in a row, the city has received a certificate of achievement for excellence for financial reporting. This means the city is providing the most comprehensive and transparent report on the city's finances year after year.

The general fund and budget for \$2.22 million for revenue, and \$1.98 million for expenditures. Revenue is higher than anticipated at \$31 thousand better than the called for at \$2.22 million. The Actual Revenue came at \$2.05 million and this was due to licenses, permits, and charges for services. Expenditures for 2017 was less than the budgeted at 1.89 million and saved \$87 thousand. All

functions came in under the budget and Public Works is a little higher due to the snow removal cost.

The City of Falcon Heights fund balance has grown gradually over the last 5 years, brought in more revenue, and built the fund up. On April 20, 2017, the revenue was up 4.5% in the general fund and most came from property tax levy, license, and permit. Spending from the general fund went up 6%. Public Safety makes up about 50% of the budget, 35% for General Government. 10% for Public Works and 5% for Parks and Recreation.

The Sanitary Sewer Fund has been positive in the last 5 years. In 2016, the fund was a bit off due to expenses that went up because of additional repairs and televising the lines; however, the city is back on track. Storm Drainage Fund, revenue also went up and expenses were up because of repairs.

#### **Mayor Lindstrom:**

Thank Matt for the presentation and is happy to hear that the city received a certificate of achievement for excellence for financial reporting. Lindstrom also thank Roland and his interns for their hard work.

#### E. PUBLIC HEARINGS:

1. Tobacco Ordinance Amendment

#### City Administrator Thongvanh

On February 7, 2018, during the City Council workshop, Katie Engman provided a PowerPoint about on the effects of tobacco on underage youth. 260 communities and 18 states had adopt to Tobacco 21 (T21) such as California, Oregon and more. In Minnesota, Edina was the first city to adopt T21 then other cities began to follow Edina's footsteps. Shoreview just passed the Tobacco Ordinance on Tuesday and their Ordinance will be effective in July.

The proposal for the City of Falcon Heights is to raise the age to purchase tobacco to 21 and restrict the sales of flavor tobacco, including Menthol. Ordinance 18.03 Amendment chapter 14 pertaining the tobacco regulation and Ordinance 18-03 is an official summary of 18-03 03 Amendment chapter 14.

#### Katie Engman

There has been an increase in tobacco use between the ages 18 to 21. Katie expressed that tobacco is the cause of death to youth and future generations. For the first time in 17 years, the youth percentage has increased and the main demographics are African Americans, women, low-income families and the LGBT community.

In 2009, the federal government announced that they will ban fruit and candy flavors from cigarettes. This plan did not go through completely and the federal government decided to place it on local governments to address the problem. Tobacco businesses are getting more creative and design ecigarettes tools.

In Minnesota, about 19% of students used tobacco in the past 30 days and high school students are now using e-cigarettes more than regular cigarettes. About 59% of 18-19-year-olds have been asked to

buy cigarettes for underage children, in Minnesota, \$262.7 million annually are spent on medical costs that relate to tobacco. Increasing the purchase age from 18 to 21 could prevent 30,000 youth from becoming smokers in the next 15 years.

#### Tony Reamer

Owner of the BP gas station located on Snelling Ave and Larpenteur Ave. in Falcon Heights. Tony opposed the ordinance in some parts. He opposed the flavored tobacco; however, stands in neutral on the T21. Reamer attended the Shoreview City Council meeting and states that the Shoreview is more concerned about E-cigarettes. He also states that the ordinance will not change people from buying other tobacco and asked "Is it a state or city problem to change it to T21?" before ending his speech.

#### Jacob Stall

Stall attended Falcon Heights Elementary and Roseville Area High Scholl. Stall is currently a student at the U of M and would like the Tobacco Ordinance to pass. Stall states that social media plays a big influence on youth and will motivate them to do it. He wants convenient stores to stop selling flavor tobacco in order to prevent health problems.

#### Jean Nickles

An African American leadership forum representative and serves under the Ramsey County Health Community Health Services Advisory Committee agrees to the Tobacco Ordinance. Nickles declared that tobacco leads to health issues especially menthol. Tobacco targets African American, women, LGBT, low-income families and young teens. Menthol ads have increased over the last few years and it influences about 60-90% viewers, especially African Americans. The African American population and organization supports the Tobacco Ordinance Amendment to prevent health issues and save more lives.

#### Javi Monardez

A student at the U of M and works at Hennepin Healthcare, and a board member of the Commonwealth. Javi expressed that in order to reduce future health problems they need the support from the community and is happy that Falcon Heights issue the Tobacco Ordinance and hopes that they pass it.

#### Roseville Area High School

A junior at Roseville Area High School and supports the Tobacco Ordinance. Students at the school influence and pressured to use tobacco and e-cigarettes by tobacco businesses who market it as a safe and cool by using bright colors and flavor such as mango, strawberry and more to disguise the effects it will have on health. Tobacco businesses are also creating vape sweaters so that it will be easier for students to vape at school without teachers noticing it. She expressed that smoking is a big impact on students because it affects their education and attendance. In addition, students who are 18 years old sell tobacco to underage students at school and advertise it as 'cool'. She also stated that if the Tobacco Ordinance Amendment is passed it will make it harder for students who are 18 years old to sell it to underage students at a school.

#### Susan Cent

Owner of Simply Vapour in Maplewood and does not support the Tobacco Ordinance. Susan explained that vape and flavor tobacco helps people get out of deadly tobacco. She also stated that vape liquid doesn't contain any tobacco in it but it has nicotine. Vape is safe because fresh air is going into our lungs and has safe chemicals. Cent expressed that changing the age will not help and will create a bigger black market.

#### Jake Holland

Tobacco is a health issue in Minnesota and nationwide. Holland supports the Tobacco Ordinance because his mother used to smoke menthol a lot then transitioned to flavor because of the appearance how it was market on T.V. and at stores. She currently smokes vape and cannot put it down and this has caused an addiction. Tobacco market towards people who are the most vulnerable, which is why it is hard to quit. Holland said vape is unknown and does know the health issues it will cause in the future to not just his mother but people who are addicted to vape also. He supports local businesses but wants them to make better choices to create better health for their customers.

#### Scott Wilson

Wilson is a former smoker and supports the Tobacco Ordinance. He does not want his daughters and other teenagers to have any smoking challenge with nicotine. Currently, works at Minnesota Medical Association as a physician and all doctors believe in one common goal and that is to have everyone stay out of tobacco and nicotine. Vape looks like it does not harm our health by creating flavors but it contains nicotine. Nicotine is bad and creates health problems.

#### Esha Sac

Supports the Ordinance and it will help create a better and healthy community.

#### **Tony Fischer**

Mr. Fischer reference to a research study that 2-4% are youth smokers, but account for 18-24% tobacco sales. Mr. Fischer supports the Tobacco Ordinance because the city is in the position to save lives and use this impact to build more resource for youth to stay out of tobacco.

#### Council Member Miazga

Financial plays a major part and \$3 billion per year is an unacceptable cost. It is important to stop it. Smoking causes addiction and tobacco targets African American population and vulnerable people and needs to protect them from tobacco and addiction. Votes Yes to the Tobacco Ordinance.

#### Council Member Leehy

Smoking is the number one cause of lung cancer, which leads to death. Smoking causes risk to the youth communities and make their living hood hard and life expectancy short. Tobacco 21 will help them live longer and let them breath free. Age 21 is still a young age but it prevents the youth generation to not smoke. Votes Yes to the Tobacco Ordinance.

#### Council Member Brown Thunder

In 2009, Minnesota and City of Falcon Heights should have regulated it and push the age to 21 when it was issued by the federal government but it did not. Council Member Brown Thunder stated that he understands the risk and health issues that come with tobacco but it is all about the principle. Age 18 is considered an adult age and has the choice to smoke or not smoke, such as going to college for an example. It is all about the principles and making the right choice for themselves. He will vote no to the tobacco ordinance.

#### Council Member Gustafson

There are compelling arguments to the evils of tobacco smoking. I personally have battled nicotine addiction, and I freely share that experience with the hope others will not have to. However, the issue before us is not about tobacco – it is about the reach and role of city government.

At present, legal age limits are the responsibility of state and federal governments. Should we decide that in this city, for this product, that 21 is the right age because the brain development of 20-year-old adults is not sufficient to resist the evil temptations of smoking? What does that mean?

If brain development is our benchmark to make informed decisions, what does that mean for those that currently have legal rights to live on their own at the age of 18? Do we next say the residents of our city cannot enlist in the Army until they reach 21? What about the keys to 2,000-pound machines that we give to 16-year-old adolescents to drive down our streets unsupervised?

It soon becomes a slippery slope when our city creates ordinances to show support for special causes. I believe the issue of establishing age limits on the activities of individuals, or the sale of legal products is the responsibility of the state or federal government. It is not a municipal issue.

If we create a 2.23 square mile island, here in the 170 square miles of Ramsey County, and the 86,943 square miles of Minnesota – is there a benefit to those who live, work, recreate, or visit Falcon Heights?

I will be voting no.

#### **Mayor Lindstrom**

Thank all the audience and their opinions. 95% are adult smokers who did it before the age of 18, 26% high school students smoke tobacco products in the last 30 days, 62% high school and 57% middle school students smoke e-cigarettes and purchase it from friends at school who are 18.

The city of Falcon Heights has received a lot of letters who supports the Tobacco Ordinance Amendment to limit the access to purchase tobacco. Ordinance 18-03 amending Chapter 14 Article 9 pertaining to tobacco regulation, motion officially, the official summary of Ordinance 18-03 amending Chapter 14 Article 9. Asked with City Administrator Thongvanh if he can combine the two Ordinance in one motion.

#### City Administrator Thongvanh

Verified that Mayor Lindstrom can combine both Ordinance because one is the Ordinance and the other one is a summary of the Ordinance for the publication.
