MINUTES SPECIAL CITY COUNCIL MEETING NOVEMBER 29, 1989

Acting Mayor Ciernia convened the meeting at 7:10 P.M.

PRESENT

Bush, P. Chenoweth, Ciernia and Wallin. Also present were Wiessner and S. Chenoweth

ABSENT

Baldwin

11/8/89 CANVASSING BOARD MINUTES APPROVED

The Canvassing Board Minutes dated November 8, 1989 were approved by unanimous consent.

11/8/89 CITY COUNCIL MINUTES APPROVED

The Minutes of the November 8, 1989 regular Council Meeting were approved by unanimous consent.

CONSENT AGENDA APPROVED

Council unanimously approved the following Consent Agenda:

POLICE CONTRACT WITH CITY OF ROSEVILLE APPROVED

Wiessner explained that the final draft of the contract has only one significant change, i.e., to guarantee a five year minimum contract term. Following a brief discussion, Wallin moved approval of the contract for police service to begin January 1, 1990, and authorizing Ciernia and Wiessner to sign the same. Motion carried unanimously.

APPROVAL OF INCREASED VOTING HOURS FOR MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS

Staff explained that there have been some complaints regarding the inconvenience of the present 12:00 Noon to 8:00 P.M. voting hours for municipal elections, and recommended that the hours be

changed to 7:00 A.M. to 8:00 P.M. Wallin then moved adoption of Resolution R-89-25 which carried unanimously.

RESOLUTION R-89-25

A RESOLUTION DESIGNATING VOTING HOURS FROM 7:00 A.M. to 8:00 P.M. FOR ALL MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS

PROPOSED ORDINANCE RELATING TO REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

Council and Staff reviwed and discussed the proposed document. Wallin indicated that he felt that adopting an ordinance requiring haulers to collect and dispose of yard waste would encourage residents to dispose of waste rather than leaving it on the lawn. This discussion was interrupted to open the public hearing scheduled for 7:30 P.M.

7;30 P.M. - PUBLIC HEARING ON PROPOSED 1990 BUDGET

Ciernia opened the hearing at 7:30 P. M. and explained that the Hearing Notice had been published in the St. Paul Pioneer Press Dispatch on November 15, 1989. Wiessner and Accountant Kelly explained the new tax law and its implications and reviewed the proposed budget for 1990.

MARK ASCERNO, 1871 TATUM, asked if the Local Government Aid distribution is at the whim of the Legislature or if the City has any control in the matter. Ciernia replied that the City has no control over the funds. Mr. Ascerno also asked how Lauderdale is charged for fire protection to which Wiessner replied that Lauderdale is charged under a formula based on assessed value, plus charges for preventative inspections and a per call charge for each fire call.

STATE REPRESENTATIVE MARY JO MCGUIRE explained that the Legislature changed the tax law to shift aid from the cities to the school districts in an attempt to make local governments more accountable, and to provide funding for state mandates handed down to school districts.

DAVE HALVORSON, 1840 PASCAL, commented on the fact that the Parks and Recreation budget had gone up 500% and asked what had been done to reduce taxes rather than increase them. Ciernia replied that a few years ago Council had looked at the park and recreation programs, felt they were not adequate, and chose to hire a part time Parks and Recreation Director to organize programs. They also implemented a more agressive park maintenance program to reduce possible liability. Wiessner explained that changes in the budgeting system created an increase due to the fact that staff time is now allocated to each department, i.e., Public Works time spent in the parks now shows up in the Park Budget.

1990 BUDGET ADOPTED

There being no others wishing to be heard, Ciernia closed the Public Hearing at 8:07 P.M. Wallin then moved adoption of the 1990 Budget as presented., Motion carried unanimously.

DISCUSSION OF PROPOSED REFUSE ORDINANCE RESUMED

Wallin felt it might be prudent to prohibit the disposal of yard waste rathern than providing for collection, and that everyone should be encouraged to leave lawn clippings on the lawn as it is beneficial. Mark Ascerno, 1871 Tatum, agreed that lawn clippings are a good source of nutrients for the lawn, but that leaves and prunings can create problems in that they are slow to compost and prunings can harbor rodents. S. Chenoweth explained that the Solid Waste Commission is also concerned, however, has recommended providing for collection of yard waste as a short term solution. Following the discussion, Wallin moved adoption of the proposed ordinance on the contingency that use/disposal of yard wastes she addressed in the near future. Motion carried unanimously.

ORDINANCE 0-89-17

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 5-4.01 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE RELATING TO COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL OF REFUSE AND YARD WASTE

PRESENTATION BY STATE REPRESENTATIVE MARY JO MCGUIRE

Representative McGuire reviewed items addressed at the special legislative session, and presented an update on upcoming issues to be discussed by the Legislature.

APPRROVAL OF PROPOSED ORDINANCE INCREASING INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS FOR LICENSING CONTRACTORS

S. Chenoweth explained that Doug Holm, Loss Control Consultant with North Star Risk Service, Inc., has recommended that liaibility limit requirements for licensing all contractors be increased to be more in line with the City's liability coverage. Bush moved adoption of Ordinance O-89-18 increasing the limits as recommended. Motion carried unanimously.

ORDINANCE 0-89-18

AN ORDINANCE INCREASING INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS FOR LICENSING OF ALL CONTRACTORS, AMENDING SECTIONS 5-14.02, 5-12.01, 5-12.02, 8-4.03, SUBD. 2(b), AND 4-6.01, SUBD. 5 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE

CITY TO PARTICIPATE IN ICE RINGETTE SPORTS PROGRAM

Bush explained that the sport is a winter activity similar to hockey but designed for girls, and that the Minnesota Amateur Sports Commission is offering free start-up equipment kits.

Following a brief discussion, Bush moved that Falcon Heights participate in the effort to organize the Ice Ringette sport in our area. Motion carried unanimously.

DISCUSSION - LEAGUE OF MINNESOTA CITIES' IMPOSITION OF INSTITUTIONAL FEE ON LMCIT

Ciernia explained that the League of Minnesota Cities Insurance Trust is an insurance pool which provides insurance for Minnesota cities and is an arm of the League of Minnesota Cities. Since the League provides services on behalf of the LMCIT a 1.5% institutional fee is being charged to cover the cost of these services and several cities have expressed opposition to the charge. Carol Carlson, a member of the League Board, explained that she had voted for the charge to help defray costs of special projects, however, she was of the opinion that some board members might be willing to reconsider the matter. Wallin felt that there should be more direct accountability of cost rather than the generic percentage. Council agreed that there should be direct user cost relationships and objected to the present system. Carol Carlson will present the Council's views to the League Board.

PURCHASE OF NEW COPY MACHINE AUTHORIZED

Kelly explained that purchase of the Konica 3290 is being recommended due to the fact that it is user friendly, the price is competitive, and it will be serviced by our present service department with whom we are satisfied. Wallin moved authorization to purchase the Konica 3290 at a cost of \$7,433 to be funded from proceeds of the Capital Notes which are to be issued in the near future. Motion carried unanimously.

ESTABLISHMENT OF A SPECIAL REVENUE FUND FOR POP MACHINE REVENUE

Wiessner explained that a committee of city employees has recommended that either (1) the price of the pop be lowered to actual cost, or (2) keep the price high enough to generate a small profit and set up an employee fund with the proceeds. Following discussion at a staff meeting, the City staff agreed to request that the pop machine revenue be placed in a special revenue fund for the purpose of employee recognition. Council unanimously agreed to the establishment of a Special Revenue Fund and authorization of expendidtures from the fund for purposes such as: employee picnics, holiday parties, flowers for special occasions, kitchen items, etc.

LIONS CLUB REQUEST TO USE CITY PARK FOR SALE OF CHRISTMAS TREES, CHRISTMAS TREE LICENSE #387 AND TEMPORARY SIGN PERMITS TO BE ISSUED UPON RECEIPT OF APPLICATIONS AND FEES

Sam Jacobs, representing the Falcon Heights/Lauderdale Lions Club, requested that Council consider allowing the Club to install 50 steel posts and 500 feet of snow fence at the City Park as an enclosure for their annual Christmas Tree sales lot. He also requested permission to place a temporary warming shelter and satellite at the site. Following a brief discussion Wallin moved approval of the requests contingent upon receipt of the necessary license and signage documents. Motion carried unanimously.

DISCUSSION OF UNIVERSITY'S INTENT TO SELL LEASE RIGHTS IN IN UNIVERSITY GROVE

Baldwin explained that the University of Minnesota is considering the sale of the lease rights of the University Grove property to the homeowners in the neighborhood, and has inquired as to whether or not the City would be interested in purchasing the common areas. Wallin explained that the Planning Commission at their November 6th meeting, recommended the City not purchase the common areas. Council concurred and will not pursue purchase.

CITY TO VACATE A PORTION OF EASEMENT ON EXTENSION OF FOLWELL AVE. PUBLIC HEARING SCHEDULED FOR 11/13/89, 7:30 P.M.

Wiessner explained that the University has requested the City to vacate its easement on the extension of Folwell so the University may sell the additional land as a part of Lot C for a dwelling unit. Wallin explained that the Planning Commission felt the City should not give up more than 25 feet of the easement as it may be used for pedestrian access to the proposed walkway included in the City's Park Plan. Following the discussion, Council agreed to vacate the west 25 feet of the easement as long has there is no cost to the City. Council then scheduled a public hearing on the proposed vacation for 7:30 P.M., December 13, 1989.

REQUEST FROM GARY AFFOLETER, 1892 HOLTON, FOR A PERMITTED ACCESSORY USE PERMIT TO CONSTRUCT A STORAGE BUILDING DEEMED UNNECESSARY

Wallin explained that Mr. Affoleter had begun to construct a temporary lean-to on the side of his garage for boat storage, but has now decided to make it a permanent structure. The Planning Commission had a lengthy discussion as to whether or not an Permitted Accesory Use Permit was necessary and by a 6 to 1 vote did recommend approval of the permit. Council also questioned whether an Accessory Use Permit was appropriate or if the structure was an addition to the garage which would only require a building permit. Mr. Affoleter informed Council he

Bob announced that he felt it was a source of potential conflict of interest for Sue, his wife, to be on the city council, and for him to be a representative on the body that makes recommendations to the city council. He therefore was resigning from the Parks and Rec. Commission. We all thanked him for his diligence and help during his years as a commission member. He will be missed.

2. Update on Parkland

Pat gave an update on the status of the university-owned parkland in Falcon Heights. Tom and Jan went to the last Board of Regents meeting. They were able to change the listing of the land from "sale" to "sale or lease". Subsequent to this, Tom Baldwin, Jan Wiesner and Pat Bush went to see Gus Donhowe at the University. The final word is that the city can continue to lease the parklands for 20 years at the current lease arrangement of \$1/year. In addition, if the University should decide to sell the land at some future date the University will amortize any improvements in the parks. Thus we could option to buy it and have the full value of any improvements made by the city taken from the purchase price. The Board of Regents must approve this at their next meeting, either late Jan. or early Feb. It was agreed that the bids for construction (and demolition) of the park building would go out when approval was made by the Regents.

3. Minnesota Beautiful Grant

Carol talked to the granting agency representative, who told Carol that a formal extension needs to be made. She felt there would be no problem, since they understood the cause for the delay was beyond our control. The one requirement is that the building be completed in time to have a "celebration" in accordance with the grant requirements.

4. Ice Ringette

Carol has been contacted by a state agency that is trying to promote Ice ringette, a form of ice hockey for girls and women played with straight sticks and a ring, instead of a puck. The state is willing to give us Ice Ringette equipment in exchange for promoting the sport. This can be in conjunction with the efforts of surrounding communities. We have organized with Roseville to offer lessons. Both cities will share promotion of the activity. The city needs to also support the efforts, but this includes ice preparation and maintenance, hockey board erection and maintenance, etc. The current plan is to offer two classes, one for 3,4 and 5th graders and a second for 6, 7 and 8th graders. An advertisement will go to the Roseville area schools. There is a contract, so it will need to go the the City Council for approval. The general consensus of the commission members was to go for it.

Minutes, 11/13/89 continued.

5. Breakfast with Santa

The date on the calendars is December 9. Carol has arranged to have "The Flyers" perform, at a cost of \$225. Santa is at no cost (a fireman!). Carol said that the Professors wanted to charge \$3.90 per breakfast. She felt we should keep the cost at \$5, and we couldn't do it at that price. Another option is McDonalds, who will furnish either hotcakes or an egg McMuffin, juice and milk for about \$2.00 each. One concern raised by Pat was the problem of styrofoam packaging. We discussed the solid waste issue, and the general consensus was that it was better to have the kids eat the breakfast and at the same time keep the cost down. Every other option, e.g. cooking ourselves, just getting eggs delivered etc., all would entail plastic plates and plastic cups, etc. No one wanted to get into the breakfast catering business either. Carol said she would talk to McDonald's further. McDonald's will also provide toys for Santa to distribute.

6. Winter Programs

Due to popular demand, Carol is going to offer some type of skating instruction, as well as the Ringette classes in conjunction with Roseville Park and Rec. Pat said that she knew a school in St. Paul offered ice skating classes and suggested Carol talk to them. Carol said that she would offer the same selection of classes as last winter. The flyer will go out early January to the elementary schools.

7. Other Business

Pat said that the city would approve the 5 year Capitol Improvement Plan at the next city council meeting. In the 1990-1994 plan park improvements are 76% of the total Capitol Improvement plan, at a total of \$454,000, 7.4% is Public Works, 13% is Fire, 3% General (mostly things needed at city hall). Included in the plan was the need to raise money from donations and grants totaling \$178,000 over 5 years.

Pat also indicated that the time spent by the maintenance staff on park maintenance was estimated. Vince and his co-worker each felt they spend about 30% of their time in park maintenance, and a part-time employee spends about 40% of his time doing park maintenance.

8. As there was no other business the meeting was adjourned at 8:30p.m.

(f) No detached garages or other accessory buildings shall be located nearer to the front lot line than the principal building on that lot with the exception of an attached garage in an R-l Zone. Motion carried unanimously. A public hearing will be scheduled for January 8, 1990.

- (6) The property owner will post on the exterior of the premises "No Loitering" and will prevent any loitering in common areas within the building or in the parking areas and sidewalks adjacent to the building.
- (7) Any person who has been convicted of a felony, controlled substance abuse, or gambling law violation within the past five years is prohibited from working as an attendant at the game room.
- (8) The interior of the game room will be free of obstructions to visual supervision by attendants and will be adequately lighted.
- (9) Game room management will take all reasonable action to expel intoxicated persons and will allow no disorderly conduct on the premises, parking areas and adjacent sidewalks.
- (10) Adequate adult supervision will be provided until one-half hour after closing to ensure that the health, safety and welfare and existing community standards of peace and quiet are maintained. At Council's discretion, additional supervisory and/or security personnel may be required.
- (11) First review period of this conditional use will be within three months after opening with annual reviews to follow on anniversary date of opening. Review will also be required upon a change in proprietorship or focus of the business. The purpose of reviews will be for addition of conditions to address any concerns created by the business.
- (12) All advertising, signage or promotion of the business will focus on attracting family oriented business.
- (13) At least fifty (50) percent of the interior space will be designated as a "No Smoking" area.

WHEREAS City costs for construction on Hoyt Avenue (County State Aid Highway No. 56) and Roselawn Avenue (County Road No. 114)

were included in Agreement No. 63866 and should now be deleted since they are County Roads; and

WHEREAS significant City cost supplemental sanitary sewer and water main construction has been performed in connection with the construction of Trunk Highway No. 51 (Snelling Avenue) and should now be added to the City's cost share so that the amount advanced by the City more accurately represents their total cost share.

IT IS THEREFORE, MUTUALLY AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

ARTICLE I - AMENDMENT OF ARTICLE II OF AGREEMENT NO. 63866

The City Cost Participation Construction description under Article II, Section A. of Agreement No. 63866 dated March 10, 1987 is hereby amended and modified to read as follows:

CITY COST PARTICIPATION CONSTRUCTION

All of the following construction to be performed upon, along and adjacent to Trunk Highway No. 51 (Snelling Avenue) from Engineer Station N.B. 239+51.696 (Hoyt Avenue) to Engineer Station N.B. 279+06.16 (Roselawn Avenue) within the corporate city limits under State Projects No. 6216-91 (T.H. 51=125) and No. 6216-100 (T.H. 51=125).

100 PERCENT shall be the City's rate of cost participation in all of the City owned sanitary sewer and water main facilities

construction, except for the adjustment of valve boxes and frame and ring castings covered below under "40 Percent" and "9.3 Percent".

100 PERCENT minus all anticipated Federal-aid funding shall be the City's rate of cost participation in all of the following construction to be performed along and adjacent to the Trunk Highway No. 51 (Snelling Avenue) roadway from Engineer Station N.B. 239+51.696 (Hoyt Avenue) on the east side of the roadway and from Engineer Station N.B. 246+00 (a point approximately 175 feet south of Hollywood Court) on the west side of the roadway to Engineer Station N.B. 260+00 (a point approximately 350 feet north of Crawford Street) under State Project No. 6216-100 (T.H. 51=125):

1. Except for the driveway located on the west side of the Trunk Highway No. 51 (Snelling Avenue) West Frontage Road roadway at Engineer Station 249+75, all of the construction of concrete driveways including their aggregate base to be performed along the west side of the Trunk Highway No. 51 (Snelling Avenue) West Frontage Road roadway and along the east side of the Trunk Highway No. 51 (Snelling Avenue) East Frontage Road roadway.

- 2. All of the construction of concrete walk including its aggregate base to be performed along the east side of the Trunk Highway No. 51 (Snelling Avenue) East Frontage Road roadway.
- 3. Except for excavation, all of the construction to be performed upon and within the Hollywood Court approach to Trunk Highway No. 51 (Snelling Avenue) West Frontage Road. Said construction includes, but is not limited to, removal of curb and gutter, sawing bituminous pavement, granular borrow, bituminous surfacing and concrete curb and gutter.
- 40 PERCENT minus all anticipated Federal-aid funding shall be the City's rate of cost participation in all of the following construction to be performed along and adjacent to the Trunk Highway No. 51 (Snelling Avenue) roadway from Engineer Station N.B. 239+51.696 (Hoyt Avenue) on the east side of the roadway and from Engineer Station N.B. 246+00 (a point approximately 175 feet south of Hollywood Court) on the west side of the roadway to Engineer Station N.B. 260+00 (a point approximately 350 feet north of Crawford Street) under State Project No. 6216-100 (T.H. 51=125):
- 1. Except for excavation and removal of pavement, all of the construction to be performed upon and within the Crawford Street and Falcon Center Crossover approaches to Trunk Highway No. 51

(Snelling Avenue). Said construction includes, but is not limited to, removal of concrete curb, sawing bituminous pavement, granular borrow, bituminous surfacing, concrete curb and gutter and curb ramps.

- 2. All of the sodding including its topsoil borrow to be performed along the west side of the Trunk Highway No. 51 (Snelling Avenue) West Frontage Road roadway and along the east side of the Trunk Highway No. 51 (Snelling Avenue) East Frontage Road roadway.
- 3. All of the grubbing to be performed along the west side of the Trunk Highway No. 51 (Snelling Avenue) West Frontage Road roadway.
- 4. All of the adjustment of City owned sanitary sewer and water main facilities.
- 5. All of the construction of concrete walk including its aggregate base to be performed in the following locations:
- a. The northeast quadrant of the Trunk Highway No. 51 (Snelling Avenue) Hoyt Avenue intersection.

- b. The southwest, southeast and northeast quadrants of the Trunk Highway No. 51 (Snelling Avenue) Larpenteur Avenue (County State Aid Highway No. 30) intersection.
- c. The bus stops located in the southwest and northeast quadrants of the Trunk Highway No. 51 (Snelling Avenue) Larpenteur Avenue (County State Aid Highway No. 30) intersection.
- 23.26 PERCENT shall be the City's rate of cost participation in all of the following construction to be performed under State Project No. 6216-91 (T.H. 51=125):
- 1. All of the construction of concrete walk including its aggregate base and all of the construction of concrete and bituminous driveways including their aggregate base and the removal of pipe culvert therefor to be performed along the west side of the Trunk Highway No. 51 (Snelling Avenue) West Frontage Road roadway and along the east side of the Trunk Highway No. 51 (Snelling Avenue) East Frontage Road roadway.
- 2. Except for excavation, all of the construction to be performed upon and within the Ruggles Avenue approach to Trunk Highway No. 51 (Snelling Avenue) East Frontage Road. Said construction includes, but is not limited to, sawing bituminous

pavement, granular borrow, bituminous surfacing, concrete curb and gutter and curb ramps.

- 19.8 PERCENT of 50 PERCENT minus all anticipated Federal-aid funding shall be the City's rate of cost participation in all of the cooperative joint-use storm sewer facilities construction as shown and/or described in "Red" color on the attached EXHIBIT "A".
- 9.3 PERCENT shall be the City's rate of cost participation in all of the following construction to be performed under State Project No. 6216-91 (T.H. 51=125):
- 1. Except for excavation and removal of pavement, all of the construction to be performed upon and within the Falcon Center Crossover and Garden Avenue approaches to Trunk Highway No. 51 (Snelling Avenue). Said construction includes, but is not limited to, miscellaneous removals, sawing bituminous pavement, granular borrow, bituminous surfacing, concrete curb and gutter and curb ramps.
- All of the sodding including its topsoil borrow to be performed along the west side of the Trunk Highway No. 51 (Snelling Avenue) West Frontage Road roadway and along the east

side of the Trunk Highway No. 51 (Snelling Avenue) East Frontage Road roadway.

- 3. All of the adjustments of City owned sanitary sewer and water main facilities.
- 7.6 PERCENT minus all anticipated Federal-aid funding shall be the City's rate of cost participation in all of the cooperative joint-use storm sewer facilities construction as shown and/or described in "Brown" color on the attached EXHIBIT "A".
- 4.7 PERCENT of 50 PERCENT shall be the City's rate of cost participation in all of the cooperative joint-use storm sewer facilities construction as shown and/or described in "Blue" color on the attached EXHIBIT "A".
- 4.1 PERCENT of 50 PERCENT shall be the City's rate of cost participation in all of the cooperative joint-use storm sewer facilities construction as shown and/or described in "Pink" color on the attached EXHIBIT "A".

ARTICLE II - AMENDMENT OF ARTICLE III OF AGREEMENT NO. 63866

Article III, Section A. of Agreement No. 63866 dated March 10,

1987 is hereby amended and modified to read as follows:

It is estimated that the City's share of the costs of the contract construction plus the construction engineering cost share is the sum of \$133,826.61 as shown in the attached SCHEDULE "I". Upon award of the construction contract the State shall prepare a revised SCHEDULE "I" based on construction contract unit prices and shall submit a copy of the revised SCHEDULE "I" to the City. The City shall advance to the Commissioner of Transportation the City's total estimated cost share as shown in the revised SCHEDULE "I" be it more or less than the sum of \$133,826.61 in accordance with the following advancement schedule.

CITY COST SHARE ADVANCEMENT SCHEDULE

First Payment: Upon execution of this agreement and upon receipt of a request from the State for such advancement of funds, the City shall advance to the Commissioner of Transportation an amount equal to the City's total cost share of the new water main facilities construction as set forth in the revised SCHEDULE "I".

Second Payment: On or before July 15, 1990, the City shall advance to the Commissioner of Transportation an amount equal to 50 percent of that amount of the City's total cost share as set forth in the revised SCHEDULE "I" which has not been advanced by the City.

Third Payment: On or before July 15, 1991, the City shall advance to the Commissioner of Transportation an amount equal to the City's total cost share as set forth in the revised SCHEDULE "I", or the final SCHEDULE "I" if available, less the total of all funds previously advanced by the City.

ARTICLE III - AMENDMENT OF ARTICLE IV OF AGREEMENT NO. 63866

The first paragraph of Article IV, Section D. of Agreement No. 63866 dated March 10, 1987 is hereby amended and modified to read as follows:

It is hereby understood and agreed that, upon the satisfactory completion of State Projects No. 6216-91 (T.H. 51=125) and No. 6216-100 (T.H. 51=125) construction, the City shall thereafter provide for the proper maintenance, without cost or expense to the State, of all of the City owned utility facilities constructed within the corporate City limits under said state projects and that neither party to this agreement shall drain any additional drainage into the storm sewer facilities constructed within the corporate City limits under said state projects that is not included in the drainage for which said storm sewer facilities were designed without first obtaining permission to do so from the other party.

AFTICLE IV - AGREEMENT NO. 63866

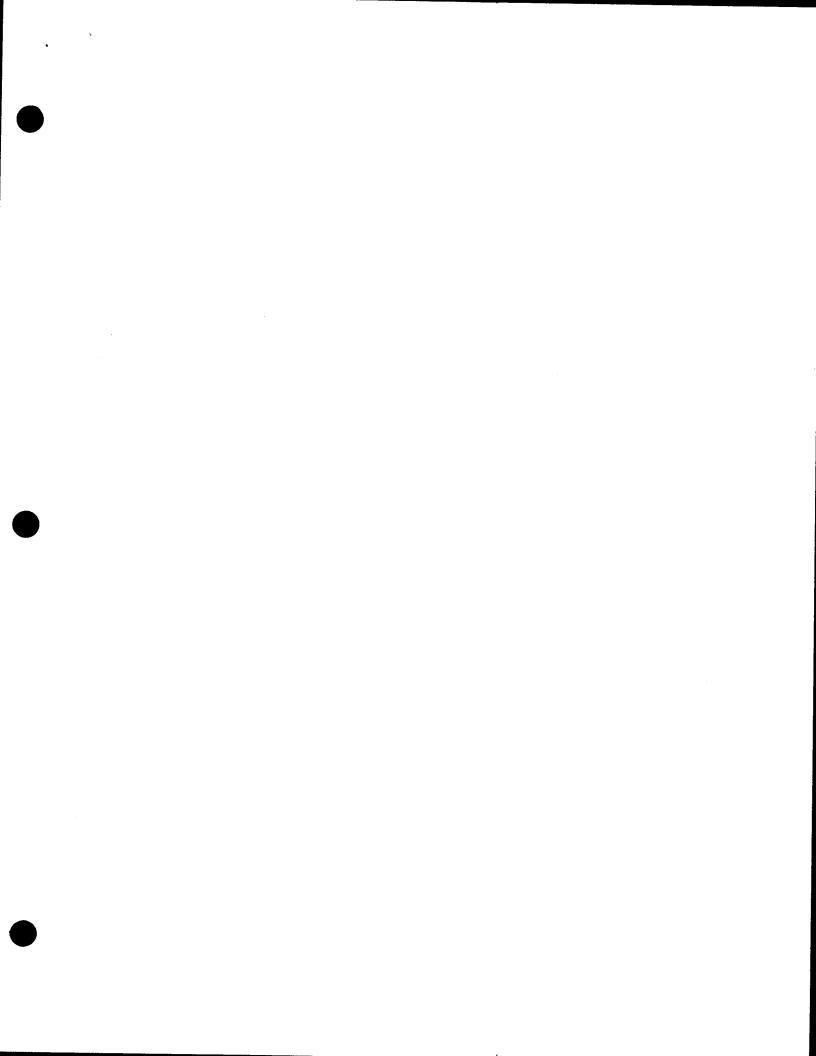
Except as amended and modified herein, all of the terms and conditions set forth in Agreement No. 63866 dated March 10, 1987 shall remain in full force and effect.

Before this supplemental agreement shall become binding and effective, it shall be approved by resolution of the City Council of the City and shall also receive the approval of such state officers as the law may provide in addition to the Commissioner of Transportation or his authorized representative.

We are preparing to finance the costs of two projects requiring bond approving attorneys early in 1990: (1) the 5 Year Capital Improvements and (2) the City's costs related to Hamline Avenue.

Estimated costs of improvements:

- 1. \$335,000 Equipment (4 years)
- 2. \$115,000 Hamline Ave. (10 years)

Dear Jan:

As we discussed, the City of Falcon Heights is considering the possible issuance of up to \$335,000 G.O. Capital Notes and \$115,000 G.O. 429 Improvement Bonds. When debt is issued by a municipality, it requires the opinion of a bond approving attorney. The opinion states that the bonds are properly issued and are exempt from state and federal taxes. This opinion is generally provided by firms which specialize in this area and who are well known to underwriters and bankers.

The City has not issued debt since 1986. Since then on an informal basis we have asked two law firms for informal opinions on the bonds issued for TID Nos. 1-1, 1-3 and 1-4. The two firms that provided the informal advice were Holmes & Graven and Dorsey & Whitney. As a result, I was asked to discuss these possible projects and solicit proposals for their opinion in the possible issuance of these debt issues from these firms. Fees for those services for both issues were quoted as follows:

Holmes & Graven
Dorsey & Whitney

\$3,000 \$2,000

In addition each firm would likely have out of pocket expenses in the range of \$50. At this point the City needs to decide which firm should prepare various bond documents should the City decide to proceed to issue debt.

The subject of the present City Code requiring the belling of cats has been discussed briefly several times. We have surveyed several neighboring communities regarding regulation of cats and a summary of that survey is attached. Also attached is a copy of the Falcon Heights regulations.

ACTION REQUESTED: For Discussion Only

ARDEN HILLS

No separate Ordinance, rely on Public Nuisance Ordinance (health, morals, comfort, etc.).

ROSEVILLE

Prohibits all animals from disturbing the peace and quiet by habitually crying/howling, causing damage to plantings or structures, or depositing fecal matter on property of others.

NEW BRIGHTON

Cats must be restrained, cannot run at large - cats damaging property, biting, depositing fecal matter on the property of others, or habitually crying or mewing is considered a public nuisance.

SHOREVIEW

Cats six months old and over must be licensed and restrained and owner/keeper must clean up after animal when off owner's property.

ST. PAUL

Required to wear rabies tag, no leash law, no bell. Special permit required for more than three cats.

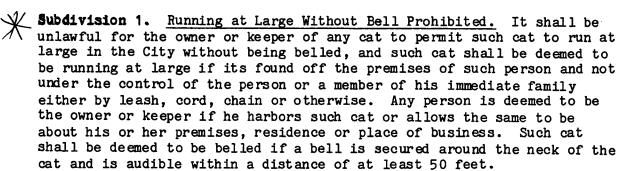
LITTLE CANADA

Cats over three months old must be licensed (\$10.00 for two years). Requires owner/keeper to clean up after animal.

CHAPTER 5. MUNICIPAL REGULATION AND LICENSING

PART 1. CATS

5-1.01 Regulation of Cats



Subdivision 2. Enforcement. The council may appoint such person. persons or firm as the council may deem necessary and advisable to enforce the terms of this section. It shall be the duty of such person to apprehend any cat found running at large contrary to these provisions and to impound such cat in a place designated by the council. The poundkeeper upon receiving any cat shall make a complete registry, entering the breed, color and sex of such cat. Not later than three (3) days after the impounding of any cat, the poundkeeper shall notify the owner if known or if the owner of the cat is unknown shall see that a written notice is posted for three (3) days at a conspicuous place within City Hall describing the cat and the place and time of taking. The owner of the cat so impounded may claim such cat upon payment of a \$10.00 impounding fee plus \$2.00 for each day the cat is confined in the pound as the cost of feeding or such greater sum as the council may determine to be necessary for purposes of fully compensating the City for all costs and charges incurred. It shall be the duty of the poundkeeper to keep all cats so impounded for a period of five (5) days from the day of notice as herein provided. If at the expiration of such five day period, the cat has not been redeemed, it may be sold or painlessly put to death.

Subdivision 3. Misdemeanor. Any person violating the provisions of this section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.
