U of M strongly criticized for refuse-tainted fill dirt

Dakota County and Rosemount officials Tuesday heaped blame on the University of Minnesota for dumping soil mixed with refuse at the university's Rosemount Research Center earlier this month.

The dumping was done by the city of Minneapolis as part of a project to build a berm for the Minneapolis Police Department bomb squad disposal center, which the city rents from the university at the research center.

The city also hauled refuse-containing soil to the Freeway Landfill in Burnsville before the county halted the dumping, citing it as a violation of the county's solid waste ordinance.

The county has asked Minneapolis to test the soil to see if it is contaminated with petroleum products because it was excavated from a Minneapolis Park Board site where leaks from underground fuel oil tanks are suspected.

But county and city officials said the university also was to blame for allowing the soil and refuse dumping to happen at the center, which has been the scene of two decades of dumping that has resulted in PCB-contaminated soil and chloroform-tainted water.

"It seems like they don't care or they're not informed enough to make good decisions about the property," said Rosemount City Council member Vernon Napper. Napper, whose well is contaminated with chloroform, called on the city and county to take a "get tough" stance with the university to prevent future incidents.

County Board Chairman Steven Loeding agreed that the county needs to let university officials know that

they need to better manage what goes on at the research center. He said county officials were angered that a university official at the center said the university was taking the county's easement against the dumping of waste without county permission.

"They think they've walled into themselves and they have little regard of people around them," Loeding said.

But Al Ischhoff, maintenance superintendent of the research center, said university officials were told by Minneapolis that only black dirt would be hauled to the site.

He said university officials did not know ahead of time that any refuse would be contained in the dirt and they did not know the amount of material that would be brought there.

Fay Thompson, assistant director of environmental health and safety, also said that the university was not aware that the dirt the city was taking to the site contained refuse. But she said the university should have given advance notice to the county and Rosemount about the work.

County officials said about 3,000 yards of dirt containing varying amounts of glass, metal, ash and other refuse, had been hauled to the university site. Minneapolis officials said they intended to bring a total of about 10,000 yards of fill to the 32-acre bomb detonation site.

County Public Health Director Doug Anderson said the city has agreed to run tests for heavy metals and petroleum products on the soil. He said that although the officials said that the university showed no petroleum products

monoxide level, according to Thomson but he stresses that even a year's data is not enough to make certain statements in that regard.

The federal Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) told the PCA earlier this year that it had to come up with a plan to eliminate the carbon monoxide violations in St. Paul by Dec. 31, 1987. Since that plan is not complete and there are still at least 15 areas out of compliance the EPA can penalize the city by withholding federal sewerage treatment funds or by imposing construction bans on new sources of carbon monoxide. According to Thomson, it's uncertain how extensive those penalties will be. Thomson had applied for an extension of the Dec. 31 deadline but that extension was not granted.

As the agency continues to monitor the problem and to deal with likely penalties it is drafting proposed legislation to establish a system for inspecting cars, vans and pickup trucks to make sure they are running efficiently and the pollution control equipment is working. The PCA is hopeful that such legislation will be introduced at the next legislative session and that it will be passed then as well.

require annual inspection of vehicle models back to 1980. The inspections would be done by a private contractor, but supervised and run by the state. Each inspection would likely cost the owner \$10 or less. The program would cost the state about \$200,000 a year beginning in 1988, according to Thomson. However, the fees would support the entire program beginning about 1991 and the money paid by the state to that point would be repaid, he said.

No cars would be inspected before 1991, even if the bill passed next year, Thomson said. A contractor would have to be hired, inspection buildings set up and the rule-making process completed to set the carbon monoxide limit cars would have to meet, he said.

It's anybody's guess how many intersections there are in the metro area, but everyone knows there are a lot. What may be surprising is that the Snelling and Larpenteur intersection in Falcon Heights is the 14th busiest intersection in the metro area with 95,000 vehicles per day using the corner. That many cars means lots of people, potential shoppers and residents. That's why Falcon Heights business owners have been studying changes they can make in their

shopping area. That's why Falcon Heights residents endured fairly patiently the recent summer of street renovations on Snelling Ave. But 95,000 cars also means a lot of car exhaust fumes. Monitors set up by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency indicated that the federal carbon monoxide standard is being violated at that corner, as well as at others in the city of St. Paul. The federal standard is 9 parts per million. According to David Thomson, chief of program development and air analysis

for the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (PCA).

Larpenteur/Snelling registers at 10.2 parts per million. That reading was taken during 1987, probably last spring. There is currently a monitor at the intersection but no new infringement of the federal standard has been reported. It certainly is possible, and in fact likely, that the improvements at the intersection will show improvement or at least stabilization of the carbon

ALL MEMBERS PRESENT

Wallin, Hard, Ciernia, P. Chenoweth, and Baldwin. Also present were Wiessner, S. Chenoweth, and Attorney Marx.

ADDENDUM TO AGENDA

Council added Item F(12), Rental Fee Policy for Other Governmental Agencies, to the Policy Agenda, and Item E(9), December 7, 1987 Planning Commission Minutes, to the Consent Agenda.

MINUTES OF NOVEMBER 18, 1987 APPROVED

Council approved the Minutes of November 18, 1987 as presented.

NORTHOME SHOPPING CENTER FIRE CODE VIOLATION

Baldwin presented an update on the Fire Marshal's attempts to have the owner of the shopping center install sprinklers in the basement of the center as required by the Fire Code, and explained that if the sprinklers are not installed it would be necessary to close off the area. Michael Labalo, who has a financial interest in the center, explained to Council that he had been informed of the problem only two days previously. He is willing to finance the project for the present owners who are involved in bankruptcy proceedings, however, district court will have to approve his request to proceed with the sprinkler installation. A hearing is scheduled for December 14th. Tim Marx summarized his memo dated December 9, 1987 and the proposed resolution which would start proceedings for the city to abate the hazardous condition. Council discussed whether or not it was necessary to take this action since Mr. Labalo has indicated he intends to remedy the problem. Council concurred it would be prudent to start the process in the event Labalo cannot make arrangements to install sprinklers in the building and Wallin moved, seconded by Ciernia, adoption of Resolution R-87-37, with the stipulation that staff delay enactment of the resolution until December 17, 1987 awaiting the outcome of the December 14th court hearing. Motion carried unanimously.

RESOLUTION R-87-37

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING CITY OFFICIALS TO PROCEED WITH AN ACTION UNDER THE STATE HAZARDOUS AND SUBSTANDARD BUILDINGS ACT TO ABATE A HAZARDOUS CONDITION AT THE NORTHOME SHOPPING CENTER

HARVEST STATES REQUEST FOR FIRE CODE VARIANCE

Wiessner explained that Harvest States has agreed to comply with the Fire Code in the basement of their building and are working with the Fire Marshal on the matter.

APPROVAL OF VARIANCE REQUEST FROM DEAN SCHWALM, 1725 ASBURY

Wallin informed Council that at the December 7th Planning Commission that body unanimously approved the Schwalm request to construct a room addition 21 feet from the rear lot line. Wallin then moved Council approval of the request and the motion carried unanimously.

STRATFORD OFFICE PARK UPDATE - FURTHER DISCUSSION TO BE HELD ON 1/13/87

Wiessner explained the attorney for Stratford, Tim Welsch, has not provided a status report as requested by Council at the November 18th Council meeting. Marx informed Council that Stratford has instituted legal action against Juran and Moody and National City Bank which could halt construction of the additional buildings as required by the development agreement, and that there are mechanic's liens against the existing buildings. Council expressed concern that the delay in constructing the additional buildings would be a detriment to the tax increment district. P. Chenoweth suggested it might be prudent to investigate the possibility of combining tax increment districts so the healthy districts would share in assisting the Stratford project, thus limiting the city's liability. Baldwin requested that Council be provided with a summary of the costs/benefits if the city should declare Stratford in default of the development agreement, and directed staff to place the item on the January 13, 1988 agenda.

CITY TO CONTINUE SHADE TREE PROGRAM - CITY FORESTER TO ASSUME ADDITIONAL DUTIES

Wiessner requested Council consider the following items relating to shade trees: (1) continuation of the program in 1988, (2) single bid process vs. current process, and (3) change in City Forester's job description, and explained the advantages of each item. Forester Scott Knebak was in attendance and encouraged continued participation in the program as he felt it definitely deters the spread of disease. Following the discussion, Council approved continuation of the shade tree program, the single bid process, and the job description as presented.

NO ACTION TAKEN ON LIBRARY COMPROMISE RESOLUTION

Baldwin explained the proposed resolution is no longer necessary as a compromise has been reached.

PART TIME EMPLOYEE POLICY APPROVED

Council reviewed the proposed policy on benefits for part time employees and after making a few changes approved the policy.

TUITION REIMBURSEMENT POLICY TO BE DISCUSSED FURTHER AT 1/13/88 MEETING

Council discussed the proposed policy at length, made several recommendations, and requested the matter be placed on the January 13, 1988 for further discussion.

UNIVERSITY REQUEST FOR SEWER CREDIT NOTED

Wiessner explained this item was for Council information only. The matter will be presented for discussion in January after additional documentation is obtained.

KIRSTEN ECKBERG, 1549 W. HOYT, APPOINTED TO PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION

Ciernia moved the appointment of Kirsten Eckberg to the Parks and Recreation Commission to complete the term vacated by Keith Moderson, such term to end December 31, 1989. Motion carried unanimously.

JENSEN, HICKEN, GEDDE AND SOUCIE NAMED CITY ATTORNEY

Baldwin explained that thirteen firms had submitted proposals for the City Attorney position and reviewed the procedure that was implemented to screen the applicants. Council interviewed the four finalists at a workshop on December 1st and were to be prepared to make a decision at the present meeting. Wallin, Ciernia, Chenoweth and Baldwin, presented their opinions on their top two choices, after which they agreed to hire Jensen, Hicken, Gedde and Soucie as the City's legal firm for both civil and criminal matters. Hard abstained from the discussion and decision.

(3) That my inability to respond to emergency calls during all or part of the time period designated in Section (1) of this Agreement, unless excused by the acting Fire Chief pursuant to Section (4) of this Agreement, shall constitute cause for my removal from membership of the Falcon Heights Rescue Squad. Response to less than fifty (50) percent of all emergency calls between the hours of 8:00 AM and 5:00 PM during any consecutive ninety (90) day period designated by the acting Fire Chief shall be conclusive proof of my inability to respond. My removal shall be at the discretion of the acting Fire Chief, whose decision will be subject to the standard of review pursuant to ARTICLE XI of the Rules, Regulations, and Procedures. Removal under this agreement will disqualify the claimant from any unemployment compensation benefits;

(5) That this Agreement shall remain in force and have effect for a period of two years from the date I execute this Agreement.

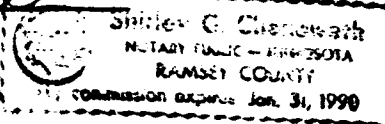

**Proposed Changes to the Ordinances
of the City of Falcon Heights**

Re: Election of Officers/Falcon Heights Fire Department

1. The Falcon Heights Fire Department shall, at their May general meeting every third year, elect a Fire Chief and two Assistant Chiefs, and shall submit the names of these elected officers to the Falcon Heights City Council, for their approval. In the event that the City Council denies any or all of the proposed officers, the membership shall vote on new proposed officers at the next regularly scheduled general meeting.

2. Existing chief officers shall serve until replaced by the City Council.

3. The Fire Chief shall appoint all officers below the rank of Assistant Chief. These appointments must be renewed at least annually and announced at the June general meeting of the Falcon Heights Fire Department. The number and rank of these officers, and their rate of pay, shall be determined by the Fire Department as part of their annual budgeting.

CHAPTER 2. OPERATIONS AND ADMINISTRATION

Part 1. The Council

2-1.01 Election of Council Members. The regular city elections for the City shall be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November in each odd-numbered year.

2-1.02 Salaries of Mayor and Council Members.

Subdivision 1. Mayor. As of January 1, 1986, the salary of the mayor of the City shall be fixed at \$375.00 per month.

Subd. 2. Council. As of January 1, 1986, the salary of the council members of the council of the City shall be fixed at \$300.00 per month.

2-1.03 Term of Mayor. Commencing in 1988, the term for the office of Mayor for the City shall be four years.

Part 2. (Reserved for Future Use).

Part 3. Fire Department.

2-3.01 Fire Department Established.

Subdivision 1. Falcon Heights Volunteer Fire Department. There is hereby established the Falcon Heights Volunteer Fire Department which shall be equipped with such apparatus and accessories as may be required from time to time to maintain efficiency.

Subd. 2. Membership. The department shall be made up of not less than fourteen (14) nor more than thirty-six (36) volunteer firemen and such paid firemen as are employed by the council. Paid firemen shall be members of the department and may be officers of the department.

The membership of the department shall consist of able-bodied persons over the age of eighteen (18) who can read and write the English language and who are of good moral character, preferably property owners living within the City limits who have telephones in their homes. All members must pass a physical examination and shall be eligible to serve on a volunteer basis while in good health until the age of sixty-five (65) years, provided, however, that members who have served the department for five years, upon reaching the age of sixty-five (65) years, shall become honorary members of the department and shall thereafter act in an advisory capacity.

Subd. 3. Officers. The fire chief and two (2) assistant fire chiefs shall be appointed by majority vote of the council each to serve for three (3) years and be eligible for reappointment. At the time a vacancy is present in any one or more of these offices, the department shall submit to the council the names of two or more persons for the office of fire chief and two names for the office of the first assistant fire chief and the second assistant fire chief, as recommendations for appointment to those positions. Candidates not selected for a given position shall be included in the vote for remaining positions. Nominations shall be restricted to members of the department. The department may, according to procedures set forth in its by-laws, elect as additional officers two (2) captains and two (2) lieutenants. These additional officers shall hold office for one year and until their successors have been elected and qualified, except that any one of them may be removed by the council for cause.

The council may, in its discretion, pay any or all of the officers of the department on a basis commensurate with their duties and responsibilities. If any of the officers are paid firemen, they may receive their pay for such positions in addition to the amount paid them as such officers.

Subd. 4. Rules and Regulations. The members of the department, by a majority vote of the recorded membership, shall propose a code of rules and regulations to control, manage and govern the department and to regulate its proceedings and business. Such rules and regulations shall not conflict with this section or future sections passed by the council.

Such proposed rules and regulations, or any changes therein, shall become effective only after approval by the council. Additional rules and regulations may be adopted by the council if required for proper operation of the department.

Subd. 5. Paid Firemen. The council shall employ such paid firemen as it deems necessary. Upon employment by the council, any paid fireman not already a member of the department shall automatically become a member and shall be subject to all the rules and regulations governing the department. The council shall, by resolution, determine the compensation and terms of employment for all such firemen while their work schedule shall be arranged by the chief, subject to council approval. The paid firemen shall perform such additional duties related to the operation of the City as are prescribed by the council provided such duties do not interfere with the efficient operation of the department.

Subd. 6. Suspension and Discharge. Any volunteer firemen or any paid fireman may be temporarily suspended by the chief without pay at any time the chief deems such action necessary for the good of the department. Any volunteer fireman may be discharged from the department for cause by the vote of two-thirds of the recorded membership. The council shall have the power to discharge paid firemen for cause. All members of the department when on duty or in the fire hall shall be accountable to the chief for their conduct.

Subd. 7. Chief's Duties and Reports. The chief shall: be accountable to the council for the proper functioning of the department, for the care and condition of all of the fire fighting apparatus, equipment, and quarters used by the department; be subject to the direction of the council; be responsible for the enforcement of the provisions of this section and of the rules and regulations of the department and shall report to the council any violations or infractions thereof which come to his/her attention; and shall make a report in January of each year to the council as to the condition of the equipment, and needs of the department. The chief may submit additional reports and recommendations at any meeting of the council. Copies of all reports furnished to agencies outside the City shall be promptly furnished to the clerk.

Subd. 8. Records. The chief shall keep a complete record of all fires and shall submit to the council a written monthly report of the activities of the department. Such record shall include the time of the alarm, location of fire, name of tenant and owner, cause of fire, type of building, purpose for which occupied, value of building and contents, amount of insurance, probable damage, names of members responding to alarm, duration of fire and such other information as s/he may deem advisable or as may be required from time to time by the council or the State Insurance Department. All records and reports shall be on forms approved by the council.

Subd. 9. Training and Drills. The chief shall call the entire department together at least once every month for the purpose of conducting suitable drills in the operation and handling of equipment, first aid and rescue work, salvage, a study of buildings in the City, and all other matters generally accepted as having a bearing upon good firemanship. The chief shall submit to the council a monthly report covering all training activities.

Subd. 10. Razing of Buildings. The chief, or in her/his absence the officer in charge, shall have the power to compel inhabitants to aid in the extinguishment of fires and to raze such buildings in the vicinity of a fire as the chief, or in her/his absence the officer in charge, may direct to prevent the fire from spreading to other buildings.

Subd. 11. Right of Way. When the warning device of any emergency fire or police apparatus shall be sounded, all other vehicles shall draw to the right side of the street, stop and permit such apparatus to pass.

Subd. 12. Following Fire Apparatus. No unauthorized person shall ride upon, race with, trail or follow within five hundred (500) feet, any apparatus belonging to the fire or police department when actively responding to a fire alarm.

Subd. 13. Driving Over Fire Hose. No person shall drive any vehicle over a fire hose except upon specific orders from the chief or fireman and then only with due caution.

Subd. 14. Parking Near Fire Station or Hydrant. No person shall park any vehicle of any description or place any material or obstruction within twenty (20) feet of the driveway to any fire station, or within fifteen (15) feet of any fire hydrant or fire cistern, nor park any vehicle within three hundred (300) feet of a fire.

Subd. 15. False Alarm. No person shall maliciously give or place a false fire alarm.

Subd. 16. Use of Fire Equipment. No person or persons shall use any fire apparatus or equipment for any private purpose, nor shall any person wilfully and without proper authority remove, destroy, take away, keep or conceal any tool, appliance or any other article used by the fire department.

Subd. 17. Penalties. Any person violating the provisions of subdivisions 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, or 16 shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

Subd. 18. Duties of Police Officers. It is hereby made the special duty of such police officers as are available at the time, to respond to all fire alarms and to assist the department in the protection of life and property of the citizens, and the property of the department, and in controlling and regulating traffic and maintaining order, particularly in reference to violations of subdivisions 11, 12, 13, 14, 15 and 16 of this section.

Subd. 19. Police Powers. The chief, the two assistant chiefs, or in their absence the officer in charge, shall have all necessary special police powers for the purpose of enforcing the provisions of this section.

Subd. 20. Fire Service Agreements. The council may make agreements with other communities for supplying fire service to them and shall determine the rates and conditions under which such service shall be rendered.

2-3.02 Uniform Fire Code.

Subdivision 1. Uniform Fire Code. The Uniform Fire Code, 1973 Edition, as promulgated by the International Conference of Building Officials and the Western Fire Chiefs Association, prescribes regulations governing conditions hazardous to life and property from fire or explosion, and is the fire code for the City except for such portions as are modified or amended by subdivision 5 herein .

Subd. 2. Enforcement.

a. The chief of the fire department or his/her representative serving the City shall enforce the provisions of this section. All administrative duties required by the Uniform Fire Code or amendments thereto shall be performed by the fire chief or his/her authorized representative.

b. The chief of the fire department may designate whenever necessary members of the fire department as inspectors. The chief of the fire department may recommend the employment of technical inspectors, who, when such authorization is made, shall be selected through an examination to determine their fitness for the position. The examination shall be open to members and nonmembers of the fire department, and appointments made after examination shall be for an indefinite term with removal only for cause.

Subd. 3. Definitions.

a. Wherever the word "jurisdiction" is used in the Uniform Fire Code, it shall be held to mean the City.

b. Wherever the term "Corporation Counsel" is used in the Uniform Fire Code, it shall be held to mean the attorney for the City.

Subd. 4. Establishment of Limits.

a. The limits referred to in section 15.201 of the Uniform Fire Code in which storage of flammable or combustible liquids in outside aboveground tanks is prohibited, are hereby established as the municipal boundaries of the City.

b. The limits referred to in section 15.601 of the Uniform Fire Code, in which new bulk plants for flammable or combustible liquids are prohibited, are hereby established as the municipal boundaries of the City.

c. The limits referred to in section 20.105(a) of the Uniform Fire Code, in which bulk storage of liquified petroleum gas is prohibited, are hereby established as the municipal boundaries of the City.

d. The limits referred to in section 11.106(b) of the Uniform Fire Code, in which storage of explosives and blasting agents is prohibited, are hereby established as the municipal boundaries of the City.

Subd. 5. Amendments made in the Uniform Fire Code. All amendments to the Uniform Fire Code as adopted by the Minnesota Department of Public Safety, State Fire Marshal's Division, are hereby adopted as amendments to and made a part of this section with the following exceptions:

a. Fire Marshal Regulation 33(c), which deleted Section 1.203 of the Uniform Fire Code, is not adopted. The following is adopted.

Fire Prevention Bureau

Sec. 1.203. A fire prevention bureau is established within the fire department under the direction of the fire chief, which shall consist of such fire department personnel as may be assigned thereto by the fire chief. The function of this bureau shall be to assist the fire chief in the administration and enforcement of the fire prevention provisions of this Code.

b. Fire Marshal Regulation 33(d), which deleted Sec. 1.204 of the Uniform Code, is not adopted. The following is adopted.

Fire Prevention Engineer or Fire Marshal

Sec. 1.204. 1. The chief may designate a member of the fire department to exercise the powers and perform the duties of fire prevention engineer as set forth in this Code. She/he may also be known as fire marshal.

2. The chief of the fire department may detail to the bureau of fire prevention such members of the fire department as may from time to time be necessary.

c. Fire Marshal Regulation 33(e), which deleted Sec. 1.205 of the Uniform Fire Code, is not adopted. The following is adopted.

Authority of Fire Chief to Exercise Powers of Police Officer

Sec. 1.205. The chief of the fire department shall have the powers of a police officer in performing her/his duties under this Code.

d. Fire Marshal Regulation 33(g), which deleted Sec. 1.207 of the Uniform Fire Code, is not adopted. The following is adopted.

Inspections and Unsafe Buildings

Sec. 1.207. 1. The Fire Prevention Bureau shall inspect, as often as may be necessary, all buildings and premises, including such other hazards or appliances, as the chief may designate for the purpose of ascertaining and causing to be corrected any conditions which would reasonably tend to cause fire or contribute to its spread, or any violation of the purpose or provisions of this Code and of any other law or standard affecting fire safety.

2. All buildings or structures which are structurally unsafe or not provided with adequate egress, or which constitute a fire hazard, or are otherwise dangerous to human life, or which in relation to existing use constitute a hazard to safety or health, or public welfare, by reason of inadequate maintenance, dilapidation, obsolescence, fire hazard, disaster, damage, or abandonment, as specified in this Code or any other effective ordinance, are, for the purpose of this Section, unsafe buildings. All such unsafe buildings are

hereby declared to be public nuisances and shall be abated by repair, rehabilitation, demolition, or removal in accordance with the procedures specified in Chapters 4 through 9 of the Uniform Code for the abatement of dangerous buildings or by any other procedures provided by law.

An official copy of all amendments to the Uniform Fire Code, together with copies of this Code, shall be placed on file in the office of the clerk.

Subd. 6. Subsequent Amendments. Whenever reference is made in this section to the Uniform Fire Code such reference shall include all subsequent amendments thereto, together with all subsequent amendments adopted by the Minnesota Department of Public Safety, State Fire Marshal's Division. An official copy of the amendments shall be placed on file in the office of the clerk.

Subd. 7. Appeals. Whenever the chief shall disapprove an application or refuse to grant a permit applied for, or when it is claimed that the provisions of the Code do not apply or that the true intent and meaning of the Code have been misconstrued or wrongly interpreted, the applicant may appeal from the decision of the chief to the council within 30 days from the date of the decision appealed. The decision of the city council on the appeal shall be final.

Subd. 8. New Materials, Processes or Occupancies Which May Require Permits. The clerk, building inspector and the chief shall act as a committee to determine and specify, after giving affected persons an opportunity to be heard, any new materials, processes or occupancies, which shall require permits, in addition to those now enumerated in said Code. The chief shall post such list in a conspicuous place in his/her office, and distribute copies thereof to interested persons.

Subd. 9. Penalties.

a. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this Code hereby adopted or fail to comply therewith, or who shall violate or fail to comply with any order made thereunder, or who shall build in violation of any detailed statement of specifications or plans submitted and approved thereunder, or any certificate or permit issued thereunder, and from which no appeal has been taken, or who shall fail to comply with such an order as affirmed or modified by the council or by a court of competent jurisdiction, within the time fixed herein, shall severally for each and every such violation and

noncompliance, respectively, be guilty of a misdemeanor. The imposition of one penalty for any violation shall not excuse the violation or permit it to continue; and all such persons shall be required to correct or remedy such violations or defects within a reasonable time; and when not otherwise specified, each day that prohibited conditions are maintained shall constitute a separate offense.

b. The application of the above penalty shall not be held to prevent the enforced removal of prohibited conditions.

2-3.03 Service Pension and Death Benefit

Subdivision 1. Service Pension. The by-laws of the Fire Department Relief Association of the City may provide for payment of a lump sum service pension to any person who has performed active duty for 20 years or more as a volunteer fireman of the fire department of the City and who has reached the age of 50 years. For all service prior to January 1, 1974, the amount of the pension shall not exceed \$400 for each full year of service. For all service after January 1, 1974, the amount of the pension shall not exceed \$600 for each full year of service.

Any increase resulting in a benefit in excess of \$400 for each full year of service shall apply only to service after October 10, 1974. Provided, however, that no person may perform active duty as a volunteer fireman in excess of 20 years unless her/his service is approved jointly by a majority of the members of the council and a majority of the members of the association, and in no event shall any person perform service as a volunteer fireman who has reached the age of 65.

Subd. 2. Payment of Death Benefit Where Member is Entitled to Service Pension. The by-laws of the Fire Department Relief Association of the City may provide for payment of a lump sum death benefit to the widow/widower of a deceased member or dependent child in the event the wife/husband predeceases the employee, or to the estate of the member, in an amount not more than the benefit for which the member was eligible at the time of his/her death as authorized by subdivision 1 herein.

Subd. 3. Payment of Death Benefit Where Member is Not Entitled to Service Pension and Dies Not in the Line of Duty. The by-laws of the Fire Department Relief Association of the City may provide for payment of a death benefit in a lump sum

of not more than \$100 for each full year of service to the widow/widower of a deceased member who has not died in the performance of his/her duties as a volunteer fireman for the City and who has not become eligible for a service pension as authorized by subdivision 1 herein.

Part 4. Planning Commission.

2-4.01 Planning Commission.

Subdivision 1. Establishment of Commission. A city planning commission is hereby established. The commission shall be the city planning agency authorized by Minn. Stat., §462.354, subd. 1 (1982).

Subd. 2. Composition and Qualifications. The city planning commission shall consist of not less than seven and not more than nine citizen members. The members shall be eligible voters residing within the City, appointed by the mayor and approved by the council. One member may be a member of the council.

Subd. 3. Terms, Vacancies, Oaths. The term of office of all members of the Planning Commission shall terminate December 31, 1982. Three members shall then be appointed for an initial term of one year, three members shall be appointed for an initial term of two years and not less than one nor more than three members shall be appointed for an initial term of three years. Thereafter all members shall be appointed for terms of three years. Except for appointments to fill a vacancy, an appointment in any year shall be deemed effective as of January 1 of such year for purposes of computing the term of office. No member shall serve more than two consecutive three year terms or more than eight consecutive years on the Planning Commission and until an existing term of office expires. For purposes of calculating consecutive years of service, service on the Planning Commission in existence prior to January 1, 1981 shall be considered. Members shall hold office until their successors are appointed and qualified. Vacancies during the term shall be filled by the Mayor, subject to Council approval for the unexpired portion of the term. Every appointed member shall before commencing upon his or her duties take an oath for the faithful discharge of duties of the office. All members shall serve without compensation, but may be reimbursed for expenses as authorized and approved by the City Council."

Subd. 4. Removal. Members shall be subject to removal only for cause, by a four-fifths vote of the city council. Failure to attend meetings regularly shall be one basis for removal.

We recently noted Subdivision 1 of the present Code excludes fire false alarms, while Subdivision 2 stipulates there is a fee of \$50 for the third and all subsequent fire false alarms within a calendar year. Since it will be necessary to amend the Code to correct this item, we felt it was an appropriate time to review the entire section.

Based upon false alarm ordinances obtained from other communities, we drafted this proposed amendment. Some of the substantive changes are:

1. Inclusion of fire false alarms,
2. Addition of penalty section,
3. Provision for assessment of delinquent fees,
4. Allowing 30 days for payment rather than 10 days, and
5. Deleting the fees from this section of the Code and adding it to the list of other city fees to be reviewed annually. (See Agenda Item F-).

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING PART 5 SECTION 3-5.01 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE RELATING TO FALSE ALARMS.

The City Council of the City of Falcon Heights does ordain as follows:

3-5.01 Regulation.

Subdivision 1. Scope and Purpose.

- (a) Scope. This Ordinance provides regulation for the use of fire, burglary, and safety alarms, establishes users' fees, and establishes a system of administration.
- (b) Purpose. The purpose of this Ordinance is to protect the public safety services of the City from misuse of public safety alarms and to provide for the maximum possible service to public safety alarm users.

Subdivision 2. Definitions.

- (a) Alarm Systems. An alarm installation designed to be used for the prevention or detection of burglary, robbery or fire and located in a building, structure or facility.
- (b) Alarm User. The person, firm, partnership, association, corporation, company or organization of any kind in control of any building, structure, or facility wherein an alarm system is maintained.
- (c) ^{Security} False Alarm. An alarm eliciting a response by personnel of the (Ramsey County Sheriff's Department) or Falcon Heights Fire Department) when a situation requiring a response does not, in fact, exist, and which is caused by the

activation of the alarm system through mechanical failure, pet movement, alarm malfunction, improper installation or the inadvertence of the owner or lessee of an alarm system or of his/her employees or agents. False alarms do not include alarms caused by climatic conditions such as tornadoes, thunderstorms, utility line mishaps, violent conditions of nature or any other conditions which are clearly beyond the control of the alarm manufacturer, installer or owner.

Subdivision 3. False Alarm Fee Required. The responding Police or Fire Department shall file a written report of each false alarm with the Clerk Administrator. Upon receipt of the first false alarm report, the Clerk Administrator shall notify the alarm user of the provision of the Code. Upon receipt of a third and all subsequent false alarms at an address within one calendar year, the Clerk Administrator shall, by mail, notify the alarm user of the fee enforced for said false alarm, such fees to be established and revised by Resolution.

Subdivision 4. Payment of Fees.

- (a) When and Where Due. Payment of user fees provided for under Subdivision 3 must be made to the City Treasurer within thirty (30) days of the date of notice by the City to the alarm user. Failure to pay within said thirty (30) day period will cause the alarm user to be considered delinquent and subject to a penalty of a full ten percent (10%) of the fee in addition to the fee due.
- (b) Delinquencies. All delinquent charges for user fees shall be certified by the Clerk Administrator to the Ramsey County Department of Property Taxation for collection with taxes due against the property on which the alarm system is installed. This certification process shall take place on a yearly basis by October 10 of each year or by such earlier date as is necessary to have delinquent charges collectible with taxes due and payable against the property in the next calendar year.

Subdivision 5. Enforcement. Failure or omission to comply with any Section of this Ordinance shall be deemed a misdemeanor and may be so prosecuted, subject to the penalties hereinafter provided.

b. Fires. No person shall start or maintain a fire in any park site, except small recreational fires in fireplaces and grills provided or intended for that purpose in areas specifically designated for such use.

c. Waste and Litter. No person shall deposit, scatter or abandon in any park, any paper, bottles, cans, sewage, waste, trash or other debris, except in receptacles provided by the City for such purpose.

d. Loitering. No person over the age of 6 shall enter any comfort station or restroom, washroom or toilet facility set apart or designated for the opposite sex. No person shall lurk or loiter in or around any toilet or other park structure except to use such facility for the purpose for which it is intended.

e. Alcoholic and Intoxicating Beverages. No person shall transport, possess, offer for sale, consume or be under the influence of any beer, wine, liquor or other alcoholic or intoxicating beverage in any park site except with a special permit or in such areas and at such times as may be designated by the council or clerk.

f. Unlawful Sales. No person shall sell, offer for sale, hawk, peddle or lease any object, merchandise or service or carry on any manner of business or commercial enterprise except those concessions authorized by the council.

g. Law Enforcement Officers and Employees. No person shall willfully resist, refuse or fail to comply with any order, direction or request lawfully given by any law enforcement officer or city employee acting under the authority of the council and in accordance with this section.

Subd. 5. Penalties for Violation. Any person violating any of the provisions of this section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

Part 5. Intrusion Alarm Systems.

3-5.01 Regulation.

Subdivision 1. Definitions.

a. "Alarm Systems" means an assembly of equipment and devices, a single device such as a solid state unit which plugs directly into a 110 volt AC line or a group of

such devices at a single location arranged to signal the presence of a hazard requiring urgent attention and to which police are expected to respond. Fire alarm systems and alarm systems which monitor temperature, humidity or any other condition not directly related to the detection of an unauthorized intrusion into a premises or an attempted robbery at a premises are specifically excluded from the provisions of this ordinance.

b. "Alarm User" means the person, residence, firm, partnership, association, corporation, company or organization of any kind on whose premises an alarm system is maintained.

c. "False Alarm" means the activation of an alarm system resulting in unnecessary police or fire department assistance. Accidental activations caused by utility mishaps, tornadoes, thunderstorms or earthquakes do not constitute false alarms.

Subdivision 2. False Alarm Fee Required.

When an alarm user incurs three false alarms at an address within a calendar year, the alarm user shall be required to pay an alarm user's fee to City Clerk. There shall be a \$25.00 fee for a police false alarm and a \$50.00 fee for a fire false alarm. The responding fire or police department shall file a written report of each false alarm with the Clerk Administrator. Upon receipt of a third and all subsequent false alarm reports at an address, the Clerk Administrator shall by mail, notify the alarm user of the fees imposed for said false alarm. The alarm user shall have ten (10) days after receipt of the notice to pay the fee owed to the City of Falcon Heights.

Subdivision 3. Penalties.

Upon the failure of an alarm user to pay the alarm user fee pursuant to Section 2, an alarm user shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. Thereafter and until all alarm user fees are current, each additional false alarm shall be treated as a new offense.

ANIMAL CONTROL SERVICE CONTRACT

THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered into this day of December 1987, by and between the City of New Brighton, a municipal corporation, hereinafter referred to as New Brighton, and the City of Falcon Heights, a municipal corporation, hereinafter referred to as Falcon Heights.

WITNESSETH: That New Brighton, in consideration of the covenants and agreements of Falcon Heights hereinafter contained hereby covenants with Falcon Heights that New Brighton will provide animal control services to Falcon Heights pursuant to the following provisions:

1. That New Brighton shall provide pick up services of dogs and cats in Falcon Heights in a vehicle appropriate for the transportation of small animals. These services shall not include the areas within the State Fairgrounds, the University of Minnesota Campus, the University Golf Course, and Commonwealth Terrace, which areas are not patrolled by the city's police service at the present time. On-call pick up service shall be provided during those hours the New Brighton Community Service Officer is on duty at the rate described hereinafter. Call-out services requested while the New Brighton Community Service Officer is off-duty shall be at the rates described hereinafter.
2. On-duty calls in 1988 shall be charged at \$18.50 per hour in quarter hour increments. Call-out service calls in 1988 shall be charged at \$18.50 per hour in quarter hour increments with a two (2) hour minimum. Falcon Heights shall pay the reasonable expenses New Brighton incurred for any pharmaceuticals used in capture or control of any animals.
3. No patrol service shall be provided except that which is incidental to a call for pick up service and which shall be billed time as described above.
4. New Brighton agrees that pick up service shall be done by competent personnel. New Brighton shall not forcibly take an animal from any person unless that person's animal is in violation of a Falcon Heights ordinance and New Brighton may request assistance of a regular officer of Falcon Heights' police service provider at New Brighton discretion.
5. That New Brighton shall equip, service, and maintain all vehicles used by them for animal control with communication devices.

- 6: That all animals picked up by New Brighton shall be impounded at Falcon Heights' designated pound, Brighton Veterinary Clinic.
7. That New Brighton has no responsibility or liability for any animal once it is delivered to the pound.
8. That New Brighton shall keep accurate and detailed records of all cats and dogs picked up and furnish a monthly report to Falcon Heights.
9. New Brighton shall save Falcon Heights harmless and indemnify Falcon Heights from any damages, costs (including attorneys fees), actions or causes of actions for claims made against Falcon Heights for any harm, loss, damages or expenses arising out of or in any way related to New Brighton's performance of its obligations under this agreement, other than damages caused by acts or omissions of Falcon Heights, its contractors, agents or employees. This agreement to save harmless and indemnify does not constitute a waiver by New Brighton of any immunity or limitations on liability provided by Minnesota Statutes 1986, Chapter 466, as amended.

AND Falcon Heights, in consideration of said covenants and agreements of New Brighton hereinbefore contained, hereby covenants with New Brighton that Falcon Heights will obtain animal control services from New Brighton pursuant to the following provisions:

10. This agreement shall cover the period from January 1, 1988 to December 31, 1988.
11. That Falcon Heights shall appoint the Community Service Officer of New Brighton as Falcon Heights' animal control officer with powers to enforce Falcon Heights' animal ordinances.
12. That Falcon Heights will provide/obtain animal control services when New Brighton is unable to do so as a result of the absence of it's CSO or when the service is beyond the scope of dog or cat pick up, and shall do so without liability to New Brighton.

THIS CONTRACT shall be in full force and effect from the day of January 1988 to the 31st day of December, 1988, unless earlier cancelled by either party upon thirty (30) days written notice to the other party of the cancellation thereof.

IT IS MUTUALLY AGREED, by and between the parties hereto, that all the covenants and agreements herein contained shall extend to and be obligatory upon the successors and assigns of the respective parties.

RE: RECOMMENDATIONS ON HIRING PARK AND RECREATION PROGRAM DIRECTOR

I am recommending some changes in the Park and Recreation Program Director position recently vacated by Pat Bush. The major change is that responsibilities would be expanded to include Public Information and other related Community Services. The title would be changed to Community Services Director to reflect these changes.

Responsibilities:

In addition to the existing responsibilities, the change would include working with the City's Cable TV Access Committee, coordinating the City's use of the local access channel, and supervising the part-time Cable Technicians. It also would involve using other resources to improve the information provided to the public about City services by writing news releases for local newspapers, assisting staff with the City newsletter, as well as preparing program brochures. (At one time we also considered including responsibility for the recycling program but Shirley Chenoweth will be continuing to coordinate this service.) One example of other services which might be included as needs arise might be to set up crime prevention programs in neighborhoods.

A revised job description (draft) is attached for your review and recommendation.

Budget:

It is expected that the additional responsibilities will require more time (10-20 hours per week compared to approximately five hours per week currently spent). I recommend that the existing budget (\$4,000) be supplemented with \$1,000 from expected increases in revenues from the Cable Franchise fees and \$1,200 from expected increased revenues from the Recreation program fees and \$2,000 from the City's Contingency Account. This would allow for an average of slightly over 15 hours/week from March-December, 1988.

Qualifications:

I agree with your recommendation that a Parks and Recreation background is preferable. Additional experience with Cable TV and other Public Information functions would be desirable but could be learned.

Recommended Process for Hiring:

- January 11 - Review and recommendation by Parks and Recreation Commission
- January 13 - Review and approval by City Council
- January 15 - Publicize job opening through the following:
 - . Newspaper ads in Minneapolis and St. Paul Papers
 - . City Newsletter
 - . Parks and Recreation Department at U of M
 - . MRPA
- February 10 - Application Deadline
- Feb. 15-19 - Screening of applications and interviews of five candidates by a panel made up of Parks and Recreation Commission, Cable Committee representatives.
- February 22 - Interview recommended one (or two) finalists by administrative staff
- February 24 - Recommendation to City Council, Approval
- March ? - Starting date as early as individual as available.

The program has expanded under Pat's leadership and she will surely be missed in her past capacity. I believe that the groundwork has now been laid to continue the growth pattern as residents recognize the quality and variety of programs offered by the City. I believe the services proposed will complement each other and will strengthen the Parks and Recreation Program as well as improve residents' knowledge of City services.

EXPLANATION/SUMMARY (attach additional sheets as necessary):

City Staff has been involved in discussions with representatives of the University of Minnesota, Hewlett-Packard, and Ramsey County regarding their traffic/safety problems at the Prior and Gortner intersections at Larpenteur Avenue. Ramsey County has the Larpenteur Avenue project on their proposed long range plan (1989-1990), however, a local concensus is required regarding the specific plans. State legislation may be necessary to provide funding for the University of Minnesota's portion.

Hewlett-Packard has offered to host a meeting (January 20 at 4:00 P.M.) with the City Council and other interested parties to try to reach a concensus. This meeting would have to be a public meeting with appropriate public notice given. Terry Maurer will be present (1-13-88) to provide Councilmembers with a brief update on the alternatives in preparation for the January 20th meeting.

RE: Larpenteur/Prior Intersection

Dear Council Members:

Over the past few months, there have been several meetings held with representatives of Ramsey County, University of Minnesota, Hewlett Packard and City staff to discuss alternatives for signaling of the Larpenteur/Prior/Gortner intersection. At the last meeting, Ramsey County presented four alternatives for realigning Prior and Gortner for purposes of signaling the intersection.

After reviewing these four alternatives we feel Alternative 1 is the best. It proposes to accomplish all of the realignment on the Gortner side. This would require approximately 1.4 acres of property which is currently field. Leaving Prior on its current alignment would provide the best geometrics and site distances for emergency vehicles entering the intersection.

The second best alternative is Number 4 which realigns both Prior and Gortner and provides approximately an 80 degree intersection. As it is currently sketched, the realignment hits the Hewlett Packard building. However, we feel this could be adjusted slightly to miss the building and still have a similar intersection. This alternative would require some University field and some of Hewlett Packard's parking lot.

The remaining two alternatives are not desirable due to the tight horizontal curves on the Prior side. These would make it very difficult for an emergency vehicle entering the intersection.

Other ideas which were discussed included signaling either Gortner or Prior on their current alignments. Also, the closing of the Gortner median opening was discussed. Since most of the accidents at this intersection involved turning movements it was felt this would greatly reduce them. However, it would do nothing to address the issue of emergency vehicles.

According to Ramsey County a traffic signal is warranted at Gortner but not at Prior. This means the County could use State-Aid construction funds for their portion of a signal at Gortner but not at Prior. Therefore if the intersection is realigned and signalized or not realigned and Gortner is signalized, the City would pay for one-half the signal cost plus any realignment and land acquisition costs. If the intersection is not realigned and Prior is signalized the City would have to pay the full cost since the signal is not warranted.

We feel it would be a mistake to signalize Gortner and leave Prior as is. This could potentially make the emergency vehicle situation worse since the signal could be green, just releasing a flow of vehicles west bound, or could be red backing up vehicles east bound. Either case would cause problems for an emergency vehicle attempting to enter the intersection. Depending on the cost of land acquisition and street realignment, it may be less expensive to signalize the Prior intersection and close the Gortner median opening.

If you have any questions we will be in attendance at your January 13 City Council meeting.
