UPDATE ON THE ACTIVITIES IN THE PARKS/PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

Kriegler and Maertz detailed specific physical improvements and maintenance done in 1997 and planned activity for 1998.

UPDATE AND DISCUSSION ON THE PROPOSED COMPUTER NETWORK UPGRADE AT CITY HALL

Administrator Hoyt reported that the city's e-mail and internet web access accounts expire at the end of February. The North Suburban Cable Commission provides its member cities with the hardware necessary to hook up with the Commission's internet service provider. However, a network system would be necessary in order to provide connections to each work station. Preliminary cost estimates to install a network range from \$8,000 to \$15,000. After discussion, the council directed staff to pursue the available options and bring back more specific information at a later date.

EXPLANATION/DESCRIPTION:

The attached agreement outlines the terms by which the Falcon Heights Fire Department may use St. Paul's Fire Training Center at 1683 Kasota Street. Included in the agreement are the rental rate, scheduling arrangements, and an indemnification clause holding St. Paul Fire harmless from claims resulting from use by Falcon Heights Fire.

ACTION REQUESTED: Approval of agreement between the St. Paul Fire Department and the City of Falcon Heights.

AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT made and entered into by and between the City of Saint Paul Department of Fire and Safety Services (hereafter Saint Paul Fire) and the Falcon Heights Fire Department.

WHEREAS, Saint Paul Fire and the Falcon Heights Fire Department wish to detail the terms of use of Saint Paul Fire's training facility at 1683 Kasota Street, Saint Paul, MN by the Falcon Heights Fire Department.

WHEREAS, the parties have hereinafter set forth the terms of said use by the Falcon Heights Fire Department.

NOW, THEREFORE, it is hereby agreed by and between the parties as follows:

- 1. By prior arrangement with Saint Paul Fire Chief, the Falcon Heights Fire Department may use the training facilities for fire fighters located at Saint Paul's Fire Training Center located at 1683 Kasota Street, Saint Paul, Minnesota.
- 2. Saint Paul Fire will make such training structures and devices available to the Falcon Heights Fire Department during evening and weekend hours on the dates requested by the Falcon Heights Fire Department subject to Saint Paul Fire's own prior commitments.
- 3. The Falcon Heights Fire Department will pay Saint Paul Fire the amount of one hundred dollars (\$100) per one (1) hour of use or fraction thereof for the use of the training facilities. The Falcon Heights Fire Department will pay Saint Paul Fire the amount of fifty dollars (\$50) per one (1) hour session or fraction thereof for standby service of Saint Paul Fire personnel if required. Sessions will be determined by mutual agreement between the parties and approved by Saint Paul Fire as to the precise dates and times. If a training session is canceled less than ten (10) days prior to the session's scheduled time, a cancellation fee of one hundred dollars (\$100) will be paid to Saint Paul Fire.
- 4. Facilities designated for the Falcon Heights Fire Department's use shall be the Drill Tower, the Burn Simulation Building, the Haz/Mat Training Pads, the Pump Test Pits, Training Props, and a Classroom.
- 5. The Falcon Heights Fire Department agrees to defend and hold Saint Paul Fire harmless from any claims which may be made against Saint Paul Fire in any way resulting from the use of the structures, devices, and apparatus described above by the Falcon Heights Fire Department except for any claims resulting from negligence on the part of Saint Paul Fire. The Falcon Heights Fire Department will pay Saint Paul

Fire's reasonable attorney's fees, costs, and disbursements incurred as a result of any claims brought arising out of said use.

- 6. This agreement will continue in full force and effect until such time as it is canceled by either party by giving sixty (60) days written notice to the other party of cancellation.
- 7. The Falcon Heights Fire Department will be responsible for any and all required cleanup required as a result of this usage. The Falcon Heights Fire Department will clean the training facilities to the satisfaction of Saint Paul Fire including the removal of all debris.

EXPLANATION/DESCRIPTION:

<u>Summary and Action Requested.</u> The city council is being asked to give approval to the purchase of a new character generator for the cable television system at a cost not to exceed \$3,000.00.

<u>Background.</u> The city's character generator, which displays the text information between cable TV programs, was purchased in the mid 1980's. It is limited to text-only information and to solid-color lines in its background selections.

Cable Technician Jason Ciernia is recommending the purchase of new character generator equipment. The equipment would consist of a personal computer and scan converter along with SCALA software. Future upgrades to the character generator would likely be software upgrades rather than hardware purchases.

The new character generator would give the screen a more polished look, including graphical backgrounds, scalable font lettering, and clip-art graphics. It is also capable of simple animated graphics. Since the software is Windows-based, the quality of the text and graphics is similar to what one might see in a Windows-based desktop publishing program.

<u>Cable Grant</u>. The city has received \$4,692.00 in grant money over the past two years. This money can be used only for cable equipment purchases or for special cable television programming (not for routine cable operations such as taping council meetings.)

<u>Cost.</u> Staff is still in the process of obtaining written quotes on the various pieces of equipment (personal computer, monitor, scan converter, and software.) It is anticipated that the entire package can be purchased for no more than \$3,000.00. When quotations are received, the lowest quote for each piece of equipment will be accepted.

ACTION REQUESTED: Approve the purchase of necessary equipment to upgrade the cable character generator, at a cost not to exceed \$3,000.00.

Discussion on the governance of the Central Ramsey Watershed

SUBMITTED BY:

EXPLANATION/DESCRIPTION:

Action requested. The council is being updated on the governance discussion regarding the Central Ramsey watershed. The watershed is currently organized as a water management organization (WMO) under a joint powers agreement with a board appointed by the four cities located in the watershed (St. Paul 78%, Roseville 15%, Maplewood 5% and Falcon Heights almost 3%). A petition to restructure the watershed into a watershed district, which has a board of directors appointed by the county board, has been submitted to the Board of Soil and Water Conservation (BWSR) from the St. Paul District 10 Community Council. Both a WMO and a watershed have taxing authority under state statute. A public hearing on the application will be held on April 6, 1998. Representatives from the WMO, BWSR, the District 10 Environmental Committee, Ramsey Board of Soil and Water Conservation and Ramsey County will be available to discuss this topic with the city council. A letter from a former Ramsey County Board of Soil and Water Conservation commissioner and Falcon Heights resident, Bill Downing, who was unable to attend, provides additional information.

Overall goal. To promote a community that is a good place to work, live and visit. Underlying goal: To promote cooperative relationships with neighboring communities.

Background to the discussion.

1. Governance models to promote water quality:

Water Management Organization
(WMO)

- 2. Falcon Heights is in four watershed areas. Three of these are currently organized as WMO's and one is the Rice Creek Watershed district. Property owners located in the Rice Creek Watershed district pay a levy for the district to operate. This is about \$10 a year for a \$100,000 home. (The property tax for all city services on a \$100,000 home in 1998 will be \$210 for the year.) The city pays for the WMO's through the city stormwater fund that it collects each quarter. To date the level of activity undertaken by the WMO's has been between \$20 and \$200 a year except for several thousand dollars of capital costs associated with improvements to the Gottfried Pit.
- 3. Central Ramsey. The Central Ramsey watershed covers the area of Falcon Heights north of Snelling Avenue. The Central Ramsey WMO exists as a joint powers agreement among four cities. The Central Ramsey water management organization was formed in the 1980's to comply with state statute. The organization's initial intent was to manage water quality issues on a city-by-city basis whenever possible rather than taking on projects through the WMO. Over the past years no cities, including St. Paul the largest member, proposed significant projects for the WMO. Falcon Heights has no wetlands within its geographic area directly impacted by water quality, but it is interested in promoting good water quality in all the stormwater areas such as the Gottfried Pit (north of Hamline on the northside of Larpenteur) and Como Lake.
- 4. Petition to the Board of Soil and Water Conservation (BWSR). For the past two years the St. Paul District 10 Environmental Committee has been interested in seeing water quality issues more aggressively addressed, particularly those related to water quality in Como Lake. A representative from this committee, Susan Schmidt, was recently appointed to the Central Ramsey WMO Board by the city of St. Paul. The District 10 committee recently submitted a petition to BWSR for creating a watershed district to manage water quality in the Central Ramsey area. As mandated by state statute, BWSR is proceeding with action on this petition with a public hearing scheduled for April 6, 1998.
- 5. Central Ramsey WMO Board discussion. On February 2, 1998 the Central Ramsey WMO board met to discuss the petition and future directions of the WMO. The WMO board did not come to a decision about how to proceed. One outstanding issue that may or may not be resolved through a watershed district is the management of the Troutbrook stormwater interceptor. However, this is not the only issue that is creating the momentum behind the formation of a watershed district.
- 6. Proposed options for organizing a Central Ramsey watershed district

There has been some discussion about combining the Central Ramsey watershed with the Ramsey Washington watershed district in order to reduce

overhead and maximize the use of an existing watershed staff. Combining with Ramsey Washington makes the Central Ramsey watershed part of a much larger organization covering portions of both Washington and Ramsey counties. In his letter to the city council, Dr. Downing cautions against making the Central Ramsey watershed part of a much larger watershed that is dealing with issues and costs related to development when the Central Ramsey watershed is dealing with issues primarily related to a fully developed area. The levy on a single family home valued at \$100,000 is \$35 for the Ramsey Washington watershed.(The property taxes for all city services on an \$100,000 home is \$210 in 1998.) Dr. Downing suggests that looking to the Ramsey County Board of Soil and Water Conservation for staffing a watershed district might provide the necessary expertise as well as more direct accountability and some administrative savings for residents and property owners in the Central Ramsey watershed if it is organized as a watershed district rather than a WMO.

There is also some discussion about combining the Southwest Ramsey watershed into the Central Ramsey watershed district which is made up of St. Paul, the State Fair, the U of M and Falcon Heights. Currently, the Southwest Ramsey WMO is inactive.

Directions.

The city may want to comment in writing on the petition to BWSR prior to the April 6, 1998 public hearing. In formulating its comments the city council may want to consider some principles for BWSR's consideration such as:

Goal: To support the most efficient and effective form of governance to manage water quality issues in the watersheds that encompass Falcon Heights while

- defining a governance model that is accountable to the citizens of the watershed;
- maximizing the focus on water quality issues that directly affect Falcon Heights and its immediate neighbors in the watershed;
- minimizing the creation of new administrative and staffing mechanisms that are ultimately paid for by the taxpayers of the watershed.

More specific proposals about how to accomplish these principles might come prior to BWSR's actions on the petition or may follow the preliminary recommendations from BWSR on the formation of the watershed district.

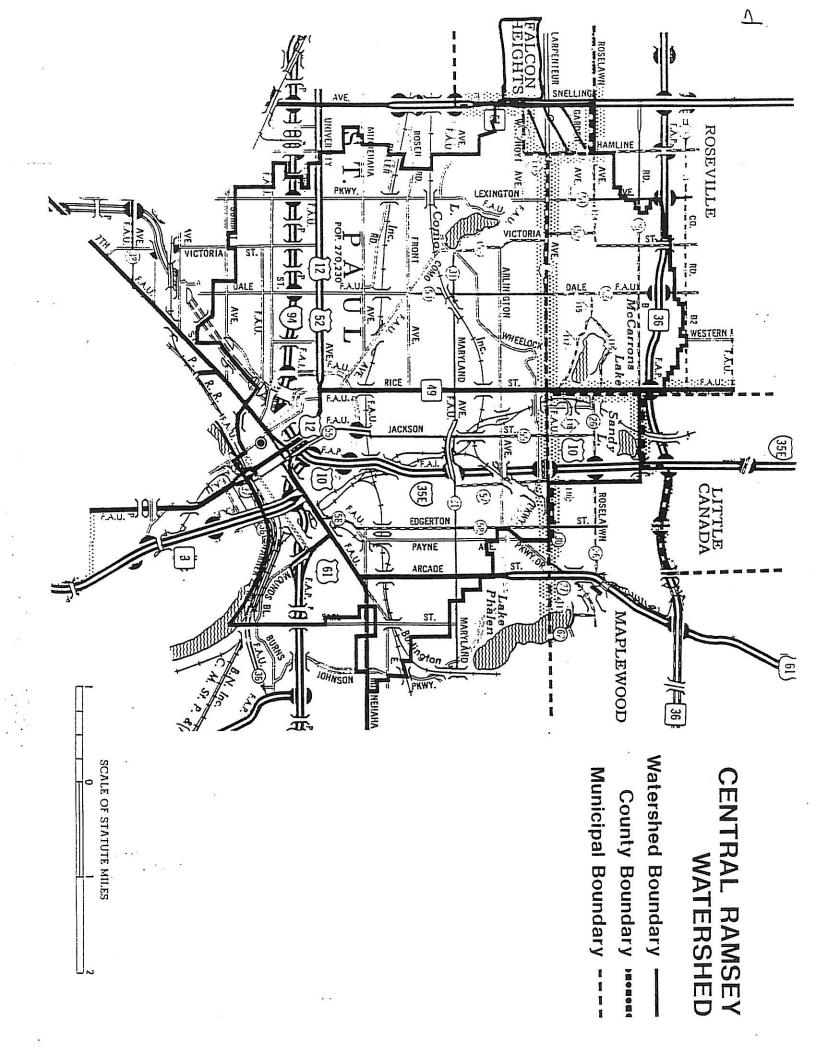

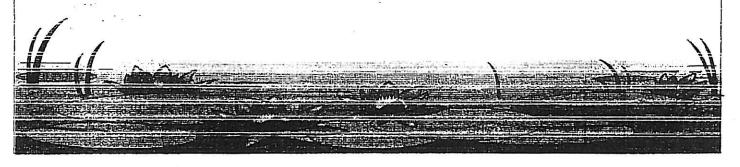

The Minnesota Board of Water and Soil Resources (BWSR) is the lead agency for coordinating the state-level review and conducting administrative hearings and procedures. The statutes include several minimum times for compelling the process forward. While these minimums make it theoretically possible for the process to be completed in as little as three months, statutes allow for continuation of establishment hearing as necessary to bring the process to a workable conclusion.

We have received the Ramsey SWCD's February 7, 1998 letter regarding the petition BWSR has received for establishment of a watershed district in the central Ramsey watershed area.

The District's first request is that BWSR assist the District in facilitating several public meetings before the public hearing on the establishment petition. We are very willing to provide such assistance and suggest a meeting be scheduled promptly.

The second of the District's two requests concerns delaying the public hearing on the establishment petition. We are unable to comply with this request since Minn. Stat. § 103D.221, Subd. 1 (c) requires the hearing to be held in a timely manner. The planned hearing date of April 6, 1998 is the latest date BWSR has determined the hearing can be held. Memo to: Falcon Heights City Council Subject: Water Management

I regret that I have a long-term plan to be in Chicago at the time of your February 25 meeting, when you will be discussing a subject of great importance to me. Your Administrator, Susan Hoyt, has therefore suggested that I put my thoughts on paper, with copies to be sent out with the Agenda.

Synopsis. I suggest that the Falcon Heights City Council:

- Support the formation of a Watershed District that would combine the territories now covered by Central Ramsey Joint Powers WMO and Southwestern Ramsey Joint Powers WMO.
- Avoid merging that Watershed District with Ramsey-Washington Metro Watershed District.
- Save Watershed District money through use of free or inexpensive services provided by Ramsey Soil and Water Conservation District's own staff, plus its conduits to County, State and Federal expertise.

Rationale:

- Although our city of Falcon Heights occupies only a small part of the four watersheds within its boundaries, our effect on surface water far outweighs our area. As high land, we need to be very careful about the quality of water we send on. Como Lake is the most visible recipient of our water, and the deteriorating quality of water in that lake shows that the watershed management now in place is not working adequately.
- 2. As you know, according to Minnesota Statutes we have only two choices. Every watershed in the metropolitan region must be under the control of a Water Management Organization, which can either be a Joint Powers organization or a Watershed District. Although my own preference is to use the JP Joint Powers technique wherever feasible—it keeps local control, uses existing expertise wherever possible to avoid unnecessary consultant use, and avoids an additional layer of government with its accompanying administration and taxation—nevertheless it requires more cooperation than we have available in the Central Ramsey JP WMO. The squabble over the "Trout Brook Interceptor", and the inability of the present JP group to write an acceptable Plan, are demonstrations of the incompatibility of the goals of the units of government involved.
- 3. There is therefore only one other choice: a Watershed District WMO, as petitioned by the citizens around Como Lake in St. Paul's District 10. The Minnesota Board of Water and Soil Resources (MBWSR) has the authority to organize this, and will hold hearings, and for the reasons presented here, I believe that the Falcon Heights City Council should support that formation.
- 4. Southwest Ramsey watershed is contiguous with Central Ramsey watershed, and is faced with the same kind of urban problems as the Central Ramsey watershed. To me it makes sense to combine the two watersheds within a single Watershed District WMO. The Managers can write a single Plan, formulate a single taxing system, and probably can solve some adjoining water problems with a single solution. I believe this combination would save taxpayers' money.
- 5. On the other hand, I doubt that combining with Ramsey-Washington Metro Watershed District would be cost-effective, and feel sure that it would be cumbersome. I tend to be wary of large Administrations, and this one would be very large, covering a big area with diverse water problems; and it would develop into an immense and powerful administrative and taxing authority. For nearly two decades its thrust has been in the adjoining areas of Washington and Ramsey Counties, employing a consulting engineering firm rather than less costly local, state and federal resources to carry out its many projects. Our watershed would be an added appendage to its present procedures, rather than an individual approach to our particular problems. In any event, dual tracks would be required even if the two Watershed Districts were combined—the existing Plan, administration, and

- staff would do for the present sector in Ramsey and Washington Counties; and a new Plan, administration and staff would be required for our western sector; plus the additional administration to administer the two. I do not doubt that it *could* be managed that way, but I believe it would be better to establish a separate District to solve *our* watershed problems, effectively and at minimum cost.
- 6. As a former 20-year Supervisor of the Ramsey Soil and Water Conservation District, I have observed that both the Ramsey-Washington Metro and the Rice Creek Watershed have held themselves aloof from the S&W Conservation Districts in their territory; and this distancing seems both irrational and detrimental to their interests. The Ramsey S&W Conservation District, for example, has worked jointly with Ramsey County Environmental Services in McCarron's and other lakes, and jointly with the U. S. Soil Conservation Service in Vadnais, Johanna and other lakes, to protect water quality, while using its own and other agency expertise to reduce cost and increase efficiency. I suggest that the Falcon Heights City Council use its influence to have the new Watershed District work in close conjunction with the Ramsey S&W Conservation District, at least in its initial formative and planmaking stages. Farther along, I believe a path well worth exploring is a shared administration of the Watershed District and the Ramsey S&W Conservation District, providing cost-effectiveness for both; taking advantage of the Conservation District's conduits to the County, State, and Federal engineering and environmental expertise; and using joint personnel for office and field work.

I appreciate this opportunity to place my viewpoint before you for consideration.

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Emerging Watershed Issues, Central Ramsey Watershed Re: Management Organization

The Board of Water and Soil Resources has become aware of several watershed management issues and opportunities within the boundaries of the Central Ramsev Watershed Management Organization (CRWMO) that you, the member cities, should be aware of. You are encouraged to attend a meeting we are facilitating at 9:00 A.M. on Friday, December 19, 1997 in our conference room located at One West Water Street, St. Paul. Representatives from the Met Council and the St. Paul District 10 Environmental Committee will be asked to be present to express their issues and concerns.

The issues we want to discuss with each member of the CRWMO present include:

- The need to revise the CRWMO joint powers agreement to become 1. compliant with current law and the likelihood that a new agreement may not be supported by all members.
- The apparent inadequacy of draft watershed management plan revisions to 2. address some specific issues and problems such as:
 - a) the transfer of the Trout Brook Interceptor from the Metropolitan Council to a local entity.
 - b) the lack of provisions to address the water management opportunities in the Swede Hollow area of St. Paul.
 - c) the lack of provisions to address the water quality problems on Como Lake, a significant metropolitan resource.
- The possibility of a petition to create a watershed district being filed with 3. the BWSR by a group of concerned citizens.
- The possibility of special legislation being proposed to create a watershed 4 district to replace the CRWMO.
- The possibility of a complaint being filed with the BWSR pursuant to 5. Minnesota Statutes Section 103B.132, Subd. 13.

While we believe the above items are all related, the necessity to revise the joint powers agreement is probably the most important issue. Unless there is some assurance that a new joint powers agreement can be drafted and promptly agreed to by the member cities to enable the CRWMO to effectively deal with the water management issues involved, the discussion should center on the need to establish a watershed district. Based on our knowledge of the issues, we have concerns that a compliant joint powers agreement may not be able to be executed. If the CRWMO is determined to have failed in carrying out its responsibilities, the responsibility shifts to Ramsey County. The County's only option is to petition for a watershed district.

Please understand that it is the BWSR's desire to see a strong and viable water management organization in place to carry out comprehensive water management in the watershed. We want to see the current structure succeed, however we also recognize that water can be controversial and in many instances communities cannot agree, therefore the legislature has provided for an alternative administrative framework in those instances.

Re: Summary of Central Ramsey WMO Issues Meeting

Thank you for representing your city with your attendance at the December 18, 1997 meeting we held to discuss some specific water management issues dealing with the Central Ramsey Watershed Management Organization. Attached is a copy of the attendance roster for your reference.

At the meeting the following perspectives were brought forward:

- The BWSR feels that the ownership, operation and maintenance of the Trout Brook Interceptor and a management plan for the Como Lake watershed are two main inter-community issues that need to be properly addressed in the second generation watershed plan for the Central Ramsey WMO. The current CRWMO joint powers agreement is not compliant with state law and rule and may need substantial revision if the WMO is going to be actively involved in managing inter-community watershed issues. The current draft of the WMO plan is wholly inadequate at this point with regard to these issues. There are other issues that the plan should address that aren't being addressed.
- The Metropolitan Council does not have legislative mandate to own and manage the Trout Brook Interceptor and to continue to do so is inconsistent with the intent of the Metropolitan Surface Water Management Act. To no avail, the Met Council has been attempting to negotiate transfer of the interceptor system to the four cities that discharge surface runoff into the system since 1994. Roseville has consistently been opposed to the terms of the transfer. The Council has determined that the system must be conveyed to the local units of government and have considered possible legislation to cause that to happen.
 - The St. Paul District 10 Environmental Committee has brought several issues to the attention of the Central Ramsey WMO as part of their review of the draft Watershed plan with no success, most notably of which is a water management plan for Como Lake. The citizens are also dissatisfied

with the fact that St. Paul has 70 percent of the land area of the CRWMO but only twofifths of the vote. They view this as potentially limiting in terms of possible management and financial support for watershed based solutions. In January or February, 1998 the Committee will be submitting a petition to the BWSR for the establishment of a watershed district and will be lobbying the St. Paul City Council to not sign an amended joint powers agreement for the CRWMO.

- The City of Roseville has been opposed to the basic terms of conveyance of the Trout Brook Interceptor that the Met Council has negotiated with the affected communities. Roseville desires that the interceptor system be brought up to a specific standard and conveyed to the communities much like county roads are conveyed to a city.
- The Trout Brook Interceptor is the City of St. Paul's major issue. If that can't be resolved, the Public Works Department would support the creation of a watershed district to manage the watershed and assume ownership and maintenance of the Trout Brook Interceptor. The City has had a good experience with the Ramsey Washington Metro Watershed District assuming ownership of the Middle Beltline Interceptor as well as with other watershed management issues. Another important issue facing St. Paul is related to the EPA National Pollution Disposal Elimination System (NPDES) permit it needs for its storm water system.
- The City of Falcon Heights is concerned about creating another layer of government to
 deal with the issues but would like to learn more about the administrative costs associated
 with a watershed district. The current joint powers agreement is not working and an
 alternative administrative structure needs to be explored.
- The City of Maplewood is well satisfied with their experience with the Ramsey Washington Metro Watershed District. The district has served as an effective manager of the Middle Beltline Interceptor and provided the city a number of water management services that the city would have otherwise had to fund or manage. The cost of a watershed district to affected taxpayers depends upon how active the district is, especially with respect to capital projects.
- If a watershed district is considered, some consideration should be given to including the Southwest Ramsey WMO. The University of Minnesota is a member of that organization, however, a U of M attorney has advised the U of M to not sign the JPA for the Middle Mississippi WMO. We expect the U of M to act likewise on the Southwest Ramsey WMO revised JPA if and when that document is circulated for signature.

At the wrap up of the meeting, the BWSR asked each representative to go back to their elected officials to explain the issues and develop positions. At the February 2, 1998 meeting of the Central Ramsey WMO, each member agreed to come prepared to commit to a common course of action. And that would be to either sign a new Joint Powers Agreement that provides enough

authority to the WMO to address all the financial and management issues it needs to face or to support the establishment of a watershed district. If the latter is supported, any preferences as to the below options should be considered.

- 1. A new WD replacing the current CRWMO.
- 2. A new WD replacing the current CRWMO and the Southwest Ramsey WMO.
- 3. Expansion of the current Ramsey Washington Metro WD to include the current CRWMO.
- 4. Expansion of the current Ramsey Washington Metro WD to include the current CRWMO and the Southwest Ramsey WMO.

Falcon Heights asked for some details on the administrative costs of a watershed district. The following are some information related to that issue.

- All watershed districts in the state can levy up to \$125,000 for their administrative expenses. In the Seven County Metro Area, all watershed districts except one have had their administrative levy raised to \$200,000 through special legislation.
- In the Metro Area, there are 12 watershed districts. The administrative levies range from about \$2 to \$8 per typical \$100,000 home.
- In addition to the administrative levy, a WD can create a survey and data acquisition fund with the proceeds of a levy once every five years not exceeding \$50,000.
- The Metro Surface Water Management Act allows WDs an unlimited ad valorem levy to implement capital improvement projects and programs that are sufficiently identified in their approved and adopted watershed management plan. Each county and city has opportunity to review and comment on these water management plans. Some inactive WDs are not using this authority to any extent. Some of the more project oriented WDs have used this levy authority to varying amounts, ranging from anywhere from \$6 to \$40 per \$100,000 home. The county board can disapprove of capital projects if county funds are proposed to be used.
