The City Administrator asked to add 8C-Chris Riley Utilities, Inc. performance; change 4B Minutes and Structure to 6A; Fire Chief asked to move Fire Dept. Updates 7B to 3A. M/S/P Johnson/Conlin - to approve the Agenda as amended. (Motion passed 5-0)

2. MINUTES:

M/S/P Johnson/Conlin – to approve the Minutes of March 6, 2006, as amended. (Motion passed 4-0-1: Conlin Abstained-did not attend meeting)

3. PUBLIC INFORMATIONAL:

A. Public Inquiries:

Resident Jim McLeod, 11580 30th Street, who is currently building a home in the City, and questioned the copper main pipe requirement vs. high density pipe to run water to his home, and the type of lights allowed by City code.

M/S/P Johnson/Conlin - to direct the Planning Commission to evaluate high-glare motion detector lights. (Motion passed 3-2: DeLapp and Smith would like to wait until the Old Village design study is completed.)

B. Ginny Holder – Ramsey / Washington Cable Commission Rep. Ginny Holder indicated that the Cable Commission gave the City \$29,000 plus to help provide a new cable system. A \$50,000 Grant is available for the new City Hall cabling, with \$35,000 available immediately. The new Public Works building will have Inet capability.

7. MAINTENANCE/PARK/FIRE/BUILDING:

A. Update on Building Dept.: Jim McNamara

The Building Official reported on the operation of the car wash at the Marathon gas station located at Hwy. 5 and Manning Avenue. Reclamation-type recycling system car wash using four – 500 gallons, filtered and back into use. Meyer Sanitation pumps quarterly with filters cleaned/emptied

Building Official McNamara recognized Karl Horning receiving Full Certification as a Building Official. State of MN currently utilizes 2000 ICC and they are updated every 3 years. Revisions of ICC 2003 were never completed by State of MN. ICC 2006 will be the next edition adopted by the State in early 2007.

B. <u>Fire Dept. Updates: Chief Malmquist–Moved to Public Informational Section</u> Fire Chief Malmquist recommended new recruits Matt Mazzara and Kristine Johnson be placed on probation.

M/S/P – Johnson/Smith, to place Matt Mazzara and Kristine Johnson on probation with the Lake Elmo Fire Dept. (Motion passed 5-0)

Fire Chief Malmquist recommended that Rick Myran be moved from probation to firefighter status.

M/S/P – Johnson/DeLapp, to place Rick Myran to Firefighter status. (Motion passed 5-0)

Update on Firefighter Grant – Fifteen departments in Washington County will participate in the new 800 MHz Program at a shared cost of \$1,500,000, but the Federal Assistance to Firefighter Grant Program will pay a maximum of \$1,000,000. User's fee is \$300/year. The Fire Dept. will be celebrating 50 years in 2007, and a Committee is being formed to plan a 50th Year celebration. Help and suggestions are welcome.

8. CITY ENGINEER'S REPORT:

A. Resolution 2006-027: Award Bid for Phase IV of the Water System Interconnect Project

In his letter dated March 10, 2006, the City Engineer reported that seven bids were opened on March 10, 2006, for this project. The City Engineer recommended awarding the contract to Ellingson Drainage for their bid of \$412,758.68.

M/S/P DeLapp/Johnson—to adopt Resolution 2006-027, a Resolution awarding the bid for the Phase IV of the Water Interconnect Project to Ellingson Drainage on the amount of \$412,758.68. (Motion passed 5-0)

B. <u>Resolution 2006-029</u>: Accept Feasibility Report for 2006 Overlay – <u>Tablyn Park Neighborhood</u>

The City Engineer presented the Council the Feasibility Report for 2006 Overlay – Tablyn Park Neighborhood Project.

M/S/P Johnson/DeLapp - to adopt Resolution 2006-029, a Resolution Receiving the Feasibility Report and calling a Public Hearing on April 18, 2006, on Street Repairs for Tablyn Park Neighborhood. (Motion passed 5-0)

C. Resolution 2006-030: Chris Riley Utilities, Inc.
City Engineer Prew was notified by letter Chris Riley Utilities, Inc. will not be completing Water System Interconnection Phase I and III Contracts. Recommendation is to terminate the contract "for cause." Travelers Casualty and Surety Company was notified by Riley Utilities, Inc. for non-performance

M/S/P Johnson/DeLapp – to adopt Resolution 2006-030, authorizing and directing City Staff to initiate or continue action with respect to the City's claim on the performance bonds. (Motion passed 5-0)

9. PLANNING, LAND USE & ZONING:

A. Request regarding the application for the Haire Variance – 8160 Hill Trail
The City Planner reported that these variances to the OHW setback and minimum lot
were denied by the Council at the March 6, 2006, Council meeting. Due to the change of
the meeting night, the applicants were not in attendance. The Council agreed to allow the
applicants the opportunity to be reconsidered based on new information and written
statements at the next Council meeting.

M/S/P - Johnston/Johnson - to reconsider the Haire Variance, 8160 Hill Trail, at the April 4, 2006, Council meeting. (Motion passed 4-0-1: Conlin Abstained-did not attend the March 6, 2006, meeting)

B. <u>Variance for Septic System Setback for 7949 Hill Trail (Scharrer)</u>. City Planner Dillerud said the existing septic system at 7949 Hill Trail is no longer functioning. They are requesting a variance to Septic 700 septics / design standards to permit a replacement drain field within 15 feet of the existing house where a 20 foot setback is otherwise required.

M/S/P Johnston/Conlin – to direct Staff to come back with a Motion for denial of Resolution No. 2006-028, because applicant can construct a mound style drain field without need for set back variance, and waive the variance application fee. (Motion passed 5-0)

C. Zoning Ordinance / City Code Amendments — Home Occupations
The City Planner reported that over the past two years there have been numerous meetings with the City Council and Planning Commission, and numerous drafts prepared addressing the regulation of Home Occupations. He presented a draft set of City Code amendments that had been created and recommended by the Planning Commission, and on which the required Public Hearing had been conducted.

The Council received a handout of the City of Oak Park Heights Home Occupations ordinance. There was discussion about perpetual licenses, storage-related businesses, and not supportive of overly complex set of regulations.

M/S/P DeLapp/Johnson – to move Home Occupations to the next Council Worksho[meeting on April 11, 2006. (Motion passed 5-0)

D. Ordinance 97-167: Zoning Text Amendment – CUP in AG Zone for Outdoor Social Events

The City Planner reported that the Planning Commission conducted a Public Hearing regarding a proposal to amend the Zoning ordinance to permit "Outdoor Social Events" on properties within the AG zoning district. The Commission recommends another Conditional Use to the AG District for Outdoor Social Events with nine required conditions.

Concerns were expressed on the noise, parking, lighting and safety.

M/S/P – Johnson/Conlin – to table to the next Council Workshop, April 11, 2006. (Motion passed 4-0-1: DeLapp-he was unable able to provide comment)

E. Ordinance 97-168: Amend GB Zoning District Text Restaurant Drive-Up Facilities

The City Planner reported that the Planning Commission has conducted a Public Hearing and recommends amendment to the General Business District list of "Permitted Uses" to include drive-up service windows at cafes and restaurants, as otherwise regulated by the City Code. He noted that the Commission's recommendation specifically excludes both menu boards and intercom systems associated with the drive-up window.

Business owner Ed Gorman was in attendance and stated that customers are changing and he would like to see a menu board approved.

M/S/P DeLapp/Johnson – the City Attorney will redraft ordinance to preclude fast-food for the April 11, 2006, Council Workshop, and reconsideration to the April 18, 2006, City Council meeting when all members will be in attendance. (Motion passed 5-0)

F. <u>Village Area Master Plan Recommendations – Next Step</u>
The City Planner reported that the City Council and Planning Commission were presented the recommendations of the Village Area design team/master planners at a Workshop March 14, 2006.

M/S/P Johnson/DeLapp – to direct City Planner and Village Area Master Planner to proceed to introduce the Village Area Master Plan to the public with a dual presentation-poster board presentation, and a formal presentation. (Motion passed 5-0)

G. <u>Direction to Staff / Planning Commission for New Zoning Ordinance</u>
The City Planner reported that the Planning Commission has previously reviewed
"Performance Zoning" as an alternative to "Euclidian" zoning, and made substantial
progress with its consultant toward drafting a new Performance Zoning Ordinance for
Lake Elmo. He noted that the City must have a completed Zoning Ordinance Map and
Text corresponding with the 2030 Comprehensive Plan within 9 months of the
Comprehensive Plan being approved by the METC; approximately February, 2007.

A concern about Performance Zoning is that it is very "staff dependent," and that only a few people understood it because of its complexity, and another presentation for a better understanding of the options available.

M/S/P DeLapp/Johnson – to direct Staff to have a presentation on Performance Zoning by Lane Kendig. The Planning Commission should be invited. (Motion passed 5-0)

10. <u>CITY ATTORNEY'S REPORT:</u> None

The Council had discussion on minute structure. M/S/P Smith/DeLapp - to table the March 21, 2006 City Council Minutes. (Motion passed 3-1:Conlin asked Council to send corrections to staff prior to meeting).

(1) Water Ski Show-Joe Kiesling

Joe Kiesling, Tri-Lakes Assoc., is requesting Council approval of a Water Surface Use permit for the Annual Water Ski Show on Lake Jane, August 12, 2006. Mr. Kiesling is request a waiver from surface water rules for the day of this event and a "No Parking" permit to park from Jamaca Avenue to Jane Road North.

M/S/P Conlin/DeLapp - to approve the permit request of Joe Kiesling, on behalf of the Tri-Lakes Association, to hold a Water Ski Show on Lake Jane, August 12, 2005, based on the submittal of the appropriate information and on past favorable requests. (Motion passed 4-0).

Geoff Laramy, 9404 Lake Jane Trail, submitted a petition for installation of a stop sign on the Lake Jane Trail N. at the intersection of Jane Road North and Lake Jane Trail making that intersection a three-way stop.

M/S/P DeLapp/Smith - to refer this petition to the City Engineer and request placement of the moveable speed sign in the interim to that area. (Motion passed 4-0.)

Geoff Laramy noted a violation of the code by his neighbor in having more than three dogs at his residence. The Animal Control Officer has checked with the owners and was told the dogs are just visiting. He said if that is the case then they are visiting 24/7. The resident will follow up on this complaint with the City Administrator.

A. Request from West Lakeland for financial support to ensure the protection of ground water.

The City received a letter from John McPherson, Chair, Board of Supervisors for West Lakeland Township, regarding the XCEL Fly Ash Repository in the St. Croix Valley. Mr. McPherson is asking for the financial support of Lake Elmo in an initial amount of \$1,500 to be added to a "fly ash fund" that can be used in various ways.

M/S/P Johnston/Smith – to direct the staff to send a letter expressing Council support, but before the City makes a financial donation, they would invite Mr. McPherson to a meeting where he would provide an action plan, budget and the desired result. (Motion passed 4-0)

8. <u>CITY ENGINEER'S REPORT:</u>

A. Update on Chris Riley Construction-verbal

Attorney John Miller provided a Resolution authorizing the City to execute the Takeover Agreement in substantially the same for which it has been presented to the Council subject to non-substantive charges which have been approved in respect to both Phase I and Phase III of the City's Water System Interconnect Project. Riley Brothers Construction is financially able to complete a project in this nature. Penalties assessed for Phase I will cover the attorney fees.

M/S/P DeLapp/Johnston – to adopt Resolution No. 2006-032 regarding the construction of certain items related to the City's Water Interconnect Project Phase I and Phase II. (Motion passed 4-0).

9. PLANNING, LAND USE & ZONING:

A. Septic Drain Field Setback Variance - 7949 Hill Trail (Scharrer)

At its March 21st meeting the City Council directed staff to prepare a Resolution of Denial for this variance application. A draft of a Denial Resolution including Find based on the City Council discussion of the application at the March 21 meeting, was provided for Council review.

M/S/P Johnston/Conlin - to adopt Resolution No. 2006-028, A Resolution Denying the application of Jeff and Robin Scharrer, 7949 Hill Trail North, to locate a septic drain field 15 feet from a structure where Section 700 of the City Code requires a 20 foot drain field setback from structures. (Motion passed 3-1:Smith said there was discussion at the March 6th meeting on mound system versus in ground systems and she didn't know much about them, and has concerns on mounds system based on reasons stated by the City Planner that a mound system has more of a propensity to freeze up and there is an esthetic reason particularly if it is in the front yard.).

B. Reconsideration - Variances - Haire (8160 Hill Trail)

At its March 21, 2006 meeting the City Council directed that this matter be placed on the April 4, 2006 City Council agenda for reconsideration. On March 6, the Council adopted a resolution denying the variances (lot area and OHW setback). Due to the change of meeting night, a Monday rather than Tuesday, the applicants were not in attendance at the Council meeting. The applicants requested, and the Council approved, to open the matter for reconsideration. The burden is on the applicant to show a hardship.

Kevin and Gena Haire provided the Council a letter, dated March 29, 2006, to correct false information in the City Planner's report from the March 21st Council meeting. A power point presentation was made by Todd Ganz, Merit Custom Homes, of pictures of homes built along Hill Trail North to show the size of the house is not out of scale or character for the neighborhood and noted that other houses have been granted variances without concern for bedrooms.

M/S/P DeLapp/Smith – to uphold the previous Council action in adopting Resolution No. 2006-024, A Resolution Denying Zoning Variances for Kevin and Gena Haire at 8160 Hill Trail North. (Motion passed 3-1:Conlin stated the applicant stated their case well and showed that the house is not out of scale for the neighborhood and place reasonable findings could be placed that the septic system could stay sized for 3 bedrooms.)

<u>C. CDBG Project Update – Cimarron Gas Line Replacement</u>
The City Planner reported that the city's consultant notified the City which specific Cimarron units qualified for grant assistance; a new Request for Proposals was prepared and sent to 15 plumbing firms. There were no written proposals submitted.

Staff has been advised that the County CDBG consultant that HUD rules have been modified which and the consultant needs to get a new Davis Bacon Wage determination before we can start over with the vendor solicitation. There has been no indication from the County CDBG staff that there is any issue with timing of grant funds expenditures.

D. Letter from Steve DeLapp:

Council member DeLapp provided a copy of a letter he wrote to the Editor to rebut what Peter Bell, Chairman of the Metropolitan Council, had said about an article by Pioneer Press Assistant Editor Mark Yost.

The consensus of the council was they did not want to take official action on this letter because this belongs as a personal response from Steve DeLapp.

A. Carriage Station Park Improvements - verbal

The City Administrator reported the City is in the final stages of drafting the agreement in terms of the legal description of the property itself. TKDA drew a generalized plan for park improvement pieces which was shared with neighborhood reps and are in process of advising what type of improvements and equipment would fit in the area and a recommendation will be sent to the Parks Commission.

There was some discussion on possible miscommunication on the allocation of monies to upgrade the play structure versus taking money out of this allocation for the trail around the park.

B. April 19th Presentation of Village Area Master Plan, Lake Elmo Elementary School-verbal

There will be a meeting on the Village Area Master Plan on Wednesday, April 19th, at the Lake Elmo Elementary School. The formal presentation will begin at 6:30 p.m. with informal questions/answers at 7:30 p.m.

12. CITY COUNCIL REPORTS:

Mayor Johnston reported that RCFA is celebrating their fourth anniversary at the Lake Elmo site, Saturday, May 6th.

M/S/P Conlin/Smith – to approve the Mayor sending out invitations to the surrounding communities and the Met Council Chair and that the City makes a donation of \$200 for refreshments for this event. (Motion passed 4-0).

John Schultz, Lake Elmo Inn, is the first recipient of the Restaurateur of the Year and is featured in the April issue of Stillwater Living.

Council member DeLapp reported he visited section 42 housing in Oakdale, ages 59 and up, 90 flats, at \$800/month for a one bedroom. This information should be gathered for the Old Village.

Council member Smith asked for an update on emergency sirens. The City Administrator said they are working with two vendors to determine if we have to go out for bid, right size for each location, and how to finance the sirens.

Council member Smith asked for an update on the Land Trust in Sunfish Park. The City Administrator reported the Parks Commission is working on this part of the review of all the parks in order to protect the parks.

Council member Smith asked if the setbacks in Rural Residential Zoning can match the setbacks in the Residential Estates Zoning. The Council sent this item to the April 11th workshop.

The Council adjourn the meeting at 9:55 p.m. and convened the CLOSED SESSION to discuss the performance review for the City Administrator.

Appointments for the Planning Commission and Parks Commission will be made at the January 17th Council Meeting.

4. <u>Hiring of Fire Chief, Engineer, Assistant Planner and Code Enforcement – reasonableness vs. absolutism</u>

Administrator Rafferty provided a summary of planned positions of the Fire Chief, Assistant City Planner, City Engineer, and Code Enforcement Officer, anticipated hire date and budgeted salary.

Fire Chief:

Administrator Rafferty explained that in order to provide a well managed fire department through a full time addition, five areas were sited for the Chief as needed for 2006 and into the future. In addition, a new job description was developed for the Chief's position, officer positions, and fire fighter. The Finance Director supported this position, pointed out savings to the City and provided a metro salary comparison for the Fire Chief position. Council member Smith indicated this permanent position is premature and fiscally irresponsible at this time.

The Fire Chief said he would be more available for day-time response when asked by Council member Johnson if this full time position would help with the problem of daytime responders. Captain Pepin added that the Chief is also a "trainer" and this would allow the Department to have daytime drills with the Chief as a trainer. This item will be added to the January 17th Council agenda.

Administrator Rafferty noted that he would be asking a council member to work with him on future policy changes for the Fire Department employee handbook.

Assistant City Planner:

The City Administrator reported the City should get an assistant planner on board before the development season starts so the City needs to move forward. Also, the existing City Planner has indicated he may retire within 4 years. This item will be added to the January 17th Council agenda.

City Engineer:

The City Administrator reported this would be an entry level engineer that will grow into this office. With the anticipated growth, this person would do some inspections and minor design when needed. This position will also be used to set up the engineering office at the Public Works Building, moving all documentation on site and work closely with the Public Works Department. This position will be funded by redirecting fees and workload to the new engineer. Anticipated hiring date is late April or early May. This item will be added to the January 17th Council agenda.

Code Enforcement Officer

The City Administrator said a council workshop, possibly in March, is necessary dedicated strictly for code enforcement in order to classify as "quality of life issues" so that a description can be developed. He said the Washington County Sheriff indicated he would train a community service officer. Council member Smith stated in order for the City to enforce their codes, this position will be needed in the future This item will not move forward to the January 17th Council agenda.

5. Oakdale/Lake Elmo Community Playfield

The City Administrator reported he, Chuck Dillerud, Tom Bouthilet, Tom Prew, met with Oakdale representatives to discuss the 3M donation of 28 acres, by Ideal Avenue and Stillwater Boulevard for park development. There will be a joint ownership of land between Oakdale and Lake Elmo and develop a Joint Powers Board. There would be cost sharing arrangements of a 50/50 split (design, construction, and maintenance). They are talking lights for the ball fields and would limit the playfield to only kids.

The City Planner stated the issue arose as why do we need a community playfield on the west side of the community and didn't we think about having a community play field in the Old Village. The Planner said he did an investigation of cities with 24,000 population of needs for playfields. He said Oakdale has one community playfield with a population of 26,000 and that is not enough. He said we would reserve the site in the Old Village, but not build it, and concentrate developing at the 3M site.

The City Administrator said he thought it was well worth contemplating. The City Planner said the opportunity is now, and there would be a 50/50 cost split. Council member Johnson voiced her concern on financing and what would this mean to staffing. The Finance Director responded this park development would be paid through park

dedication fees. The Mayor said he was not sure if it is a good fit for half of the facility at 100 percent of the cost. He said he know the need is going to be there. Council member Conlin noted that the City of Oakdale is already there at 26,000 population, and their need is there now for use of fields. It will take Lake Elmo 25 years to get to 25,000 population.

6. Manning/Highway 36 Intersection Improvement

The City Planner reported staff and the City Engineer are working with the state and county on this intersection improvement. The City Engineer recommended some signal adjustment and now the County wants inbound lanes and more. The Planner asked what sort of equities the City wanted to pay for. He didn't think the City should have to pay the cost, but that the cost should be assessed through a 429 improvement project. The City has not assessed for an intersection improvement before.

7. Austad Drain field Plans

The City Engineer provided a utility plan for inground septic systems for the three individual lots involved – Pierre, 5665 Hytrail Avenue; Austad, 5701 Hytrail Avenue and Hurt, 5751 Hytrail Avenue. Mr. Austad presented a petition from the homeowners involved looking for the City's support in an effort to resolve the issues at their properties. Mr. Austad said he talked to surrounding neighbors informing them as to what is being proposed. The City has allowed them to perk test an area on City property behind their homes.

Mr. Austad said he counted about 15 trees that would have to go. The City Forester will look at the area and at the soils to determine what type of trees could be planted for screening.

The City Engineer said there would be a pumping station which would have a manhole at grade. The City Engineer said he would prefer not to have the manhole in the back and will look at other areas. He said that the construction of the system privately and then turned over to the City has not been discussed. Usual monthly fees contributed and cost of installation will be paid for by the residents. There would be a wide enough path with a firm base and grass for someone three times a week to check on the system.

The City Engineer explained the design has a backup. The portion of the sliding hill does not have enough room to meet our requirements for two drainfields. Mr. Austad said the three house system, drainfield, tree removal would cost about \$75,000.

The Council noted they were behind solving this problem in an unobtrusive manner as much as possible.

A specific proposal will be presented at the January 17th Council meeting.

8. Bergmann Easement

The City Engineer said he is working with the Bergmann's on easements.

9. Public Works – Gen Set (generator)

The new Public Works Facility will be used as an emergency center. Our Public Works Supervisor has worked with the City of North St. Paul because they bought several Gen Sets for one of their buildings that were too small. Mike Bouthilet said North St. Paul offered it to us for half the price, \$10,000. There is no warranty for this standby generator. He said the self-contained unit automatically comes on if we lose power at garage. He said they had planned for this and put money in CIP for \$7,000 in two years. The Public Works corrected that amount to \$15,000 after the meeting.

LAKE ELMO CITY COUNCIL WORKSHOP MINUTES

FEBRUARY 14, 2006

Mayor Johnston called the workshop to order at 6:00 p.m. in the Council Chambers. PRESENT: Conlin (arrived 6:04 p.m.), Smith (arrived 6:03 p.m.), Johnson, DeLapp, City Engineer Prew, City Planner Dillerud, Finance Director Tom Bouthilet and City Administrator Rafferty.

1. AGENDA

Postponed Revisions to Fee Schedule and Insurance Premiums; Changed the order of the agenda.

M/S/P DeLapp/Conlin – to approve the February 14, 2006 Council Workshop agenda, as amended. (Motion passed 5-0)

- 2. MINUTES: January 10, 2006 Postponed Council member Johnson did not receive her mailed agenda/minutes.
- 3. Oakdale/Lake Elmo Community Playfield—Task Force Agreement
 The City Administrator reported on the history of the 3M donation of 26 acres located in Lake Elmo, how he read in the newspaper that there would be an Oakdale/Lake Elmo community playfield on land donated by 3M. He said he met with Oakdale representatives and talked about their thoughts for this playfield. He pointed out there would be zoning actions required from Lake Elmo. An agreement was drafted that would bring together City representatives to sit down to discuss items, with no strings attached, to get to the final decision. The Lake Elmo City council asked for more discussion at this workshop. The Planning Commission and Parks Commission both looked at this proposal and asked to go ahead and explore the options.

Council member Conlin asked is this where we want a park. She said we have a needs assessment for planning a park with early public participation and forums to make sure the public wants it. This is a 26 acre parcel and we would only have 10 percent use. There are no public facilities nearby. She said we should consider pedestrian and vehicular traffic. She felt this is doing it backwards. Lake Elmo should decide if we want a park there and then share it with Oakdale.

Todd Bruchu, Park Commissioner, stated with the current population we don't need more fields is inaccurate. He said he is active on Lake Elmo Baseball and loves the ball fields, but we are cramped. Lake Elmo Baseball is branching out of Lake Elmo into surrounding playfields. There were 213 kids signed up, three are not from Lake Elmo, and this will make 18 teams. He said a lit field can support 6 teams and an unlit field would support 4 teams. Youth baseball starts at age 10 thru 15 and then there are 16-18 yr.old teams. He has coached 9 years and has made nice improvements to the city fields. This is an opportunity for new community playfields in the near term with minimal investment. Todd Bruchu said he would volunteer to serve on the task force.

Steven Amasky stated he lives in Parkview Estates and is active in the Oakdale Athletic Association and that there is a dire need for baseball fields. He said most of the developments surrounding Parkview Estates go to #622 schools and are in OAA. There are no borders for OAA. He said T-ball kids can play on grass fields and hat the gravel infield in Stonegate was too small. He thought this was a fantastic opportunity for Lake Elmo and thought any concerns could be addressed.

Council member DeLapp stated the City of Oakdale has chosen to have parks in Lake Elmo and not in Oakdale because they want to develop. Park dedication is required and Oakdale has chosen park land in Lake Elmo.

Larry Moody, who lives adjacent to this parcel, understands there are needs for fields, but this is not the right site for playfields because this is a rolling hills parcel. He said the 26 acres may come free from 3M, but the earthmoving needed on the site will cost tremendously. He asked if Tablyn Park could be expanded. He said his own personal desire is not to have light pollution because then he cannot use his telescope at night. He said daily there are deer, a red fox family, and eagles and hawks use the trees to catch rodents and don't want to loose this. He believes 3M thinks this is less than ideal developable land.

Rolf Larson, parks commissioner, stated there would be terracing issues, lighting can be designed and turned off early. This can be done true to the city's ordinance to take advantage of this opportunity. He added that if this parcel becomes a community park, care must be taken to protect the stream and grove of oaks along the south side of the parcel.

Pat O'Malley said the trees are going to have to grow to shield the lights. He asked who is gong to govern. He said he has a daughter that played fast pitch and lights were not needed. He said the adult ball situation in Oakdale will be brought to Lake Elmo if we have lights. He added that it is Oakdale's problem there are no parks...they should have not built so many houses.

The City Administrator said there is no design feature to place lights in this field. He added we would always have equal say. Council member Smith said it does say a youth athletic complex in this draft agreement.

Don Gustafson, who lives one block from Tablyn Park, said CSAH13 is like a race track with all the shopping malls. By adding ball fields, it's going to be a mess. He thought the City should talk about the creek with DNR.

Joan Ziertman asked what type of park we are going to have and agreed that the City was putting the cart before the horse. She said the City should decide if we want a park there. She voiced her concern on the amount of money paid for a park for Oakdale residents and maybe we should think about where we would want parks for our residents. These items should be discussed before we enter into an agreement.

Bob Helwig, Planning Commission Chair, stated that this proposal is the tail wagging the dog. The City does need ball fields, but let us get the right land. He suggested looking in the Old Village Area plan to place 4-5 new fields. He noted that the site proposed is sizable, and would support many houses toward the mandated 2030 population of 24,000.

Council member Smith said there would be 12 houses on the 26 acres of the proposed site. She observed that 3M owns the land in Oakdale, and they could give land to Oakdale for the playfield instead of Lake Elmo land. She said that the Oakdale Athletic Association is a powerful force and will dictate what they want in a joint playfield, including lighted fields. She said she views this to be primarily an Oakdale park for its ballfields.

Terry Aronson asked why this Lake Elmo land was being donated when 3M has so much other land in Oakdale. He asked why the City can't update the existing parks we have now.

Mayor Johnston said you better decide what you need, define it and work it down; and that it would be an error to rush to judgment on the proposal without the benefit of a Lake Elmo needs analysis. He said the City should restart the process regarding the playfield proposal.

Council member Johnson said she doesn't quarrel with the high need for fields, but feels the City should do a need assessment, and then decide where we are going to place multiuse fields. She observed that if the City can't meet our playfield needs now, what we are going to do when we are 24,000 population.

The Administrator said that this needs to go back to the parks commission to determine the need for playfields, and where would they be.

Council member Smith pointed out the Parks Dept. talked about a possible skating rink/winter activity in the Sunfish Park area and asked what about the 20 acres in front of Sunfish Park to use as temporary fields.

Planner Dillerud said he has provided the Parks Commission a needs assessment done by Oakdale that could act as a process guide for the Lake Elmo Park Plan update. He noted that you don't do an updated park plan before you do a land use plan. Now that the 2030 land use plan is all but completed, the Parks Commission is on their way with the Park Plan update—including community playfields. In response suggestion that the neighborhood parks be used for playfield type activities he advised the Council that most of the organized and city-wide activities at community play fields cannot be accommodated at most neighborhood parks without negative impacts on the neighborhood. There may be some neighborhood parks of a size and location that might host those activities without negatively impacting the neighborhood, but that strategy is not good park planning.

Council member DeLapp pointed out there are 175 acres of 3M property in Lake Elmo and if developed park dedication would be available from that site.

Margaret Carlson said she was surprised 3M would give land for a specific use and suggested we should go back and look at this. She said she would be surprised that Oakdale would not place lights there. She said if there is a Task Force to review this playfield proposal she suggests having an independent body on the task force.

Bob Helwig said he supported Council members Smith's suggestion to use the open space in front of Sunfish Park as Sunfish is a public park.

Council member Conlin stated there is broad criteria for selecting location for parks in our Comp Plan that have to be looked at and to keep in mind the trails system and how the trails would work for kids to ride bikes or walk to the playfields.

A resident said traffic on Stillwater Blvd. would have to have some traffic control and that Raleigh creek cannot hold anymore runoff. He asked what about the land next to the public works building that 3M owns. It would be cheaper maintenance if playfields were next to the public works building.

Gary Carlson, Tablyn Park resident, stated Oakdale is contentious and no matter what happens there will be lights there if Oakdale wants lights. He said when Marty talked to Oakdale it was just an idea and he agrees with Council member Conlin we need to decide if the City wants a park in that location.

Scott Deutsch, Lake Elmo Heights, said we are looking at it and some trees will be blocking the lights. They call it a park which we think of as picnic, etc, but Oakdale is really talking about a sport complex.

5. Manning/Highway 36 Intersection Improvement

The City Planner said a matter has come up on how to deal with the intersection of Manning Avenue and TH36. He said that he and the City Engineer were called down to meet with Washington County, MnDOT and was told MnDOT would like us to build a 3 or 4 lane intersection. The City Engineer recommended that a feasibility report would be preformed to determine the intersection configuration and cost and financing.

This item will be brought to the Feb 21st Council meeting.

Mayor Johnston left the meeting at 8:10 p.m. to attend the Fire Dept. Relief Assoc. meeting.

4. Animal Control RFP

The Administrator provided a draft Animal Control RFP and a budget sheet. He said a number of cities the same size of Lake Elmo are looking at vendor services and some have CSO's. He said he has met with three applicants, Kathi Pelnar, Mike Smith, and Animal Control Services out of White Bear Lake.

In regard to the wording in the RFP...shall respond "as soon as practicable", Council member Conlin asked why can't we insert if the situation is threatening, safety issue, we expect response be in such (?) time.

Mayor Johnston had a concern that people weren't calling in because there was no response. It should state our average response isso people understand we are responding.

Council member Johnson said if it is an emergency due to safety reasons, the resident should call 911 and not the ACO.

The Administrator stated he was comfortable with the language in the Animal Control RFP.

5. Report on Old Village Plan Presentation

The City Administrator reported on Friday, February 17th, we will try to get these two plans married and then there will be a presentation to the Council. We are looking at the March 6th council meeting for Bob Engstrom to give a presentation and council will give direction. The Administrator said this council will then send this plan to the Planning Commission for a Comp Plan amendment or it can go to a workshop. Council member DeLapp said the City needs to have an open house.

Council member Conlin said she is disappointed in getting this plan in a timely manner. It seems we have had to force the deadline with the Met Council. Council member Johnson agreed with the lack of updates and communication. Council member Smith said she stayed in touch with Marty and Chuck and they moved forward as quickly as possible. There has been so much thrown on our plates. Council member Johnson asked about the contract we have with them who has the authority to change the contract...certain dollar amount in a certain timeframe. The Administrator said there is no change in the dollars.

Council member DeLapp said he told everyone we would have a presentation in November and asked if there has been contact with Engstrom and staff. The Administrator said there has been contact and the owners retained their own planner the same time we did. Council member Conlin said we all went into this understanding there were many parties involved and Engstrom thought he could put it all together. She felt the City did not get as advertised and it seemed to her Engstrom sat back and waited when they were supposed to be drivers. The City Administrator responded we were aggressive to get it done by November, and we have received great service from Engstrom.

St. Croix Regional Family Center - Mayor reported the Early Childhood Ed project of the center wants to go ahead and will be approaching the school board. He said Lake Elmo is the perfect location for the family center.

The City Administrator said it is noted on the Old Village plan where the family center is going to be as well as the city hall. Council member DeLapp said there is a conflict of interest because the mayor is on the Board. The Mayor responded he is on the committee that is working on the organizational interest and there is no financial gain for him.

Zoning Variance - A zoning variance request needs 3 votes to pass and the Mayor and City Planner will not be in attendance at the February 21st meeting. The Planner will advise the applicant that his variance request will be on the March 6th meeting.

OLICY:

It is our policy to treat all animals in an humane manner regardless of pecies, breed, or disposition. If an animal is picked up wearing identification, t is returned to the owner, only if it is the first time we have picked it up. e give the owner a verbal warning and an explaination of the leash and licensng laws. All pick ups of the same animal there after, said animal is taken to he cities impound facility regardless of identification. We then try to notify he owner of the animal in a timely manner, of its where abouts. From that poin n the owner is responsible for retrieving his animal and paying ALL fees ncured. The city makes arrangements with the impound facility for any fees ccrued that are due to them. We are not equipt to hold or kennel strays for an onger than a few hours and our fees do not reflect this expense. It is , thereore imparative that the city/township/village make arrangements with an mpound facility and notify us as to where the stray animals are to be held.

All wildlife calls are treated as a pickup. The disposition of the wild nimal will be determined by the person responding to the call. Wildlife will ither be relocated, taken to a proper wildlife facility, or euthanized in an

umane manner.

We will not set live traps from October 1 to May 15 or during inclimate eather. There may be exceptions to this policy if the situation is life threat

ning and the animal can not be cought by any other means.

Injured animals will be taken to the cities impound facility, or if the njury is, in the opinion of the response person, severe or life threatening, he animal will be taken to a veterinarian. The veterinarian will be instructed o perform only stabilizing treatment not to exceed \$\forall 10000 00 00 cost. If the nimal is unclaimed at the end of the impound period, the city will absorb his cost. The city will also still be responsible for the impound fees accordng to their agreement with their impound facility.

All animals picked up are immediately taken to the impound facility durng their open hours unless they fall into previously described areas. Animal ay need to be housed briefly at my residence if pickups are made after shelter ours. The period of time for this temporary housing will not exceed 12 hours.

Il animals will be taken to the impound facility as soon as possible.

OMPLAINT POLICY:

All complaint type calls are handled between 7:30a.m. and 7:30p.m. Caller ay leave a message on the machine, however if it is after hours they will need o waite until the next day for a response.

First Complaint: A warning letter is sent informing the animal owner of the complaint and advising them of the cities ordinances. A request to correct the riolation and contact animal control are also stated in the letter.

Second Complaint: A visit is made to the home of the animal owner or to the pla the animal is housed. The owner is verbally warned of the violation, informed again of the laws and the consiquences if corrections are not made immediately. The animal owner is also provided with suggestions on how to correct the proble

Third COmplaint: A police officer is contacted and/oxacitation is issued.

There is an answering machine on at our phone number 715-386-7789 at all times. If no one is currently available instructions are given to leave a message or call our pager. There is seldom more than an hour lag time before a It is the policy of animal control to live trap only animals that are:

- 1. A physical threat to the welfare of a human being or that human being's companion animal.
- 2. Injured animals or animals that are stray and can not be captured by other more conventional means.
- 3. Ferrel or wild animals causing property damage.(ie. raccoons, squirrels, etc. inside attics, garages, or living type structures. This includes the problem of ferrel cats.)

We will not set live traps from Oct.1 thru May 15 or during inclimate weather. There may be exceptions to this policy if the situation is life threatening and the animal con not be captured by other means. Strict precautions will be taken to ensure the well being of said animal and traps will be set only inside an enclosure.

Humane Animal Control Service

Policy:

It is the policy of Humane Animal Control Services to treat All animals in a humane manner regardless of species, breed, or disposition.

We feel it is our responsibility to:

1) Relocate animals that are lost, injured, stray, or displaced to an appropriate situation, holding facility or environment that is more suitable to their immediate

2) Exhaust All means, at my disposal, to return stray domestic animals to their rightful owners.

3) To educate the public on responsible pet ownership and what is required, per city ordinance, for them to safely and legally own pets in their community.

4) To offer assistance to the public to solve problems caused by animals not under restraint or displaced from their normal environment.

5) To use my knowledge and training to assist in enforcing the state statutes and local ordinances pertaining to animals, their keeping and humane treatment.

6) To see that the public is aware that there are penalties should there laws not be adhered to.

In some or all cities this may include but is not restricted to:

1) Transporting stray dogs and cats to an impound facility.

2) Relocating displaced wildlife

3) Relocating stray or displaced exotics to a proper rescue organization or locating their proper owner.

4) Issuing citations for violations of local animal ordinances.

5) Investigating complaints of animal abuse or neglect, nuisance complaints, or other situations in which animals are causing a disturbance to the public.

6) Keeping accurate records of my activities, telephone log, lost and found animal report log and all complaints reported log to insure accuracy of reporting should a situation become serious enough to require judicial intervention.

7) To do, with in legal boundaries, what is asked by the city officials to monitor and control any situation involving animals within the city limits.

Oualification

1) 30 years of experience in animal related fields.

2) Associate of Science degree in Veterinary Technology/animal health

3) Certification in Minnesota as a Certified Veterinary Technician for 24 years

4) Certified in Wisconsin as a Certified Humane Investigator

5) Certified nationally through the National Animal Control Association having completed all 3 training courses as a Certified Animal Control Officer.

Qualifications cont.

6) I hold Certifications in OCAT/pepper spray use, Bite Stick, Chemical capture, and euthanasia.

7) Have worked for Stillwater Veterinary Clinic, Humane Society of Ramsey County, and Animal Emergency Clinic on University Ave. in St. Paul, Mn., Hudson Pet Hospital, Humane Society of Pierce and St. Croix and have been doing animal control work as a private contractor for over 20 years.

8) Was a member of the board of directors at the Humane Society of Pierce and St.

Croix when they first built their shelter.

9) Volunteer work for 6 years at Carpenter Nature Center doing Wildlife rehabilitation. Como Zoo docent working with primates and reptiles, Farm work both while attending school at U.W.River Falls and privately, and various animal related courses through out the years including a dog grooming course.

10) 40 plus hours of continuing education in the technical field per year for the past

23 years to maintain my certifications.

I have de-oiled ducks and geese, bottle fed everything from deer to squirrels, bandaged and medicated apes, dogs, raccoons, cats, opposums, song birds, rapters. I've flown and released eagles and hawks, cared for and released beavers and mink, transported owls and other birds to wildlife rehabilitation facilities, and handled all nature of reptile there is. I have also done farm work working with horses, cows, sheep, pigs and foul. I can honestly say though that I have never had any hands on experience with an elephant or a whale.

Contract Animal Control

THIS AGREEMENT made this _____ day of __January, ___ by and between Kathi Pelnar (hereinafter referred to as "Contractor"), and the City of _____, a municipal corporation located within the County of Washington and State of Minnesota (hereinafter referred to as "City").

WITNESSETH:

In consideration of the covenants and agreements hereinafter set forth, it is mutually agreed by and between the parties hereto as follows:

- 1. This agreement shall be effective as of

 January , and shall continue in effect

 until December 31, , unless otherwise
 cancelled pursuant to Paragraph 15 hereof.
- 2. Contractor shall provide services in accordance with the attached schedule (ANIMAL CONTROL PROPOSAL). Contractor agrees to patrol the public streets of the City in a vehicle designated for transportation of small animals. Contractor shall be directly responsible to the City Administrator for the City. Contractor further agrees to ensure service and maintain said equipment in good working order.
- 3. Any call out after the Contractor's scheduled workday shall be paid at the rate specified within the attached schedule (ANIMAL CONTROL PROPOSAL). The Contractor shall do all patrolling unless other personnel have been approved by the City Administrator for the City, to perform such services at the Contractor's direction and under her supervision.

For regular patrol, in the manner provided within Paragraph 2 above, the Contractor shall be provided payment by the City in the amount prescribed within the attached schedule (ANIMAL CONTROL PROPOSAL). Such payment shall be due and payable after the Contractor has provided the monthly report to the

City in the manner specified within Paragraph 7 hereof.

- 4. The Contractor shall provide liability insurance on her automobile and shall provide her own automobile for purposes of supplying the services provided under the terms of this contract.
- 5. The City authorizes the Contractor to apprehend and retain dogs and other animals, and/or issue citation tags for violations of the City Ordinances related thereto. However, the Contractor shall not invade private property contrary to the wishes of an owner of said property nor forcibly take an animal from any person without the approval and assistance of a Peace Officer of the City.
- 6. The Contractor shall respond as soon as practicable to any call, reported during service response hours, involving a bite case or injured animal reported through the Sheriff's Department or the offices of the City Clerk of the City.
- 7. The Contractor shall provide a monthly report to the City which indicates the hours patrolled, the number of animals impounded, warning letters and violation notices issued, and any other such information as requested by the City Administrator for the City.
- 8. All animals impounded shall be kept at a licensed animal shelter facility to be designated by the City for this purpose. While in her custody, Contractor agrees and warrants that all animals impounded shall be kept in a comfortable and humane manner. It is mutually agreed that the Contractor may temporarily board at an emergency facility access and/or treatment that is not immediately available at the contract facility. All captured wildlife is to be delivered to an appropriate wildlife center as determined by the Contractor with report to be provided to the City Administrator for the City.
- 9. The Contractor shall supply her own automobile and equipment necessary for Animal Control Services as may be determined by the City Administrator for the City. The Contractor shall also supply a copy of her automobile and general liability insurance

policy to the City Clerk for the City annually. The city, through the offices of the City Clerk, shall administer all licensing, impounding and boarding fees and charges as may be provided by the City Ordinances. The Contractor shall furnish monthly reports to the City as may be required to allow the City Clerk to determine appropriate impound fees in connection with each animal so impounded.

- 10. The City shall furnish to Contractor any special forms or receipt forms specified within the Ordinance and adopted by the City Administrator for the City. Contractor shall keep all records of all animals impounded, together with a description of each animal, in a manner specified by the City Administrator.
- 11. Attached hereto is a list/schedule of fees, charges and service performance criteria. The same is incorporated by reference herein.
- 12. The Contractor shall assume all liability for all harmed animals due to her negligence or that of her employees, in not properly caring for same, and agrees to defend all lawsuits arising there from. The Contractor agrees to defend and indemnify and hold the City harmless, including its officers, employees, or agents, from any and all claims, suits, losses, damages, or expenses on account of bodily injury, sickness, disease, or death and of property damage including injury to animals as a result of, or alleged to be as a result of the Contractor's Animal Control Operation.
- 13. The Contractor agrees that during the period of time of this Contract, she will not, within the State of Wisconsin or elsewhere, discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment, because of race, color, creed, sex, national origin, or ancestry, and will include a similar provision in all subcontracts entered into for the performance hereof. This paragraph is inserted into the Contract to comply with the provisions of Wisconsin State Statutes.

- 14. Either party hereto may cancel this Contract after thirty (30) days written notice thereof to the other party.
- 15. It is understood and agreed that the Contractor is not an employee of the City but is an Independent Contractor, solely responsible for her own payment of federal, state and Social Security withholding taxes. Further, the Contractor provides her own equipment excepting for some equipment that may be made available for her use by the City in its discretion. The Contractor at no time shall hold herself out as an employee of the City but will always identify her as an Independent Contractor.
- 16. The City shall provide to the Contractor the following materials:
 - a. Map of the City,
 - b. Monthly list of animal licenses,
 - c. Copy of City animal control laws,
 - d. Police contact procedures,
 - e. City Hall hours,
 - f. Any required identification signs,
 - g. Description of animal licensing fees and procedures.

I work hard to provide the very best service possible to the Cities and their residents. ACSI believes that animals belong at home and not at the pound, we insure this belief by providing what I like to call doorstep education to the pet owners. This will in turn reduce your animal control cost (proactive animal control).

ACSI also believes that animal owners should be the ones paying for the privileges of owning a pet. So my fees relate more to pet owners. ACSI will assume all liability and carries general liability insurance in the amount of \$1,000,000.00, eoc insurance of \$250,000.00, and automobile insurance in the amount of 350,000.00. My insurance agent is James Strande with Advance Insurance. If you need to you can reach him by calling (952) 842-1107. ACSI will provide proof at the time it is requested and will send out a current certificate once a year as well.

ACSI at the present time has three Animal Control Officers and provides 24 hour 7 days a week services. We work with the Washington County Sheriff's Department currently in some of our other cities that are in Washington County. Normal Call-Out respond time should only take an hour or less.

The kennel is located at 1283 Hammond Road in White Bear Township. The facility is licensed through the board of animal health. All animals are treated in a very humane manner, and held in accordance to Minnesota State Statute \$35.71. The animals which are adoptable will be rescued to many different rescue agencies. All animals are walked at least twice per day by trained staff. The kennel is open from 8am to 6pm during the spring, fall, and winter, and from 8am to 9pm during the summer.

ACSI will provide service for wildlife as part of its contract if the issue becomes a public health problem. Such as animal related biters and rabies. ACSI will not remove wildlife from the inside of residences. There are private vendors who provide this service. If the city wishes, ACSI will provide these services at an agreed upon rate. Other cities at present do not provide wildlife services to their residents. They leave wildlife issues up to the homeowner. Some wildlife requires a permit to be removed unless there is serious property damage.

Injured dogs and cats will be treated with veterinary care only to relieve any pain and suffering. The fees will be charged to animal owners upon reclaiming. If the owner is not known the fee is to be paid by the City. During normal business hours I utilize Hillcrest Animal Hospital, and after hours St. Paul Emergency Vet.

ACSI will not discriminate against any employee or applicant due to race, creed, sex, and national origin.

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ANIMAL CONTROL CONTRACT

This agreement made this day of Month of 2006, by and between Animal Control Services, Inc., a Minnesota Corporation, hereinafter, referred to as "ASCI", and the "City" of LAKE ELMO located in the County of Washington, and the State of Minnesota, hereinafter referred to as "City", witness to:

In consideration of the covenants and agreements, hereinafter set forth, it is mutually agreed by and between the parties, hereto, as follows:

- 1. This agreement will be effective as of 2006 and will continue in effect until December 31, 2006, unless canceled, pursuant to Paragraph 15.
- 2. "ACSI" agrees to patrol the public streets of the "City" of: LAKE ELMO in a vehicle especially designed for the transportation of small animals, in accordance with City Ordinances and a schedule agreed upon by both parties. If such schedule is not agreed upon, the agreement shall be null or void. The vehicle shall have proper identification displayed on two sides. "ACSI" further agrees to insure, service, and maintain said equipment.
- 3. "ASCI" agrees that competent personnel, trained in the handling of animals, shall do patrolling. Said employees shall perform their duties only while in proper uniform and shall have with them, at all times while on patrol, proper identification as to indicate employee's name, title, and place of employment.
- 4. The "City" shall authorize "ACSI" to apprehend and retain dogs, and or issue citation tags for violations of the "City" Ordinances. "ACSI" will only impound cats at the request of the City of LAKE ELMO. "ACSI" will not invade the private property contrary to the wishes of the owner of said property nor forcibly take an animal from any person without the approval and assistance of a Washington County Sheriff Deputy
- 5. In addition to the regular hours of patrolling referred to, "ACSI" agrees to maintain one (1) vehicle for standby service to attend to cases outside regular patrol hours at the specific request of the CITY OF LAKE ELMO "ACSI" shall respond immediately to any Callout agreed upon by the "City" of LAKE ELMO and confirmed to be a Callout
- 6. "ACSI" represents and agrees that all animals impounded shall be kept at WHITE BEAR KENNEL, 1283 HAMMOND ROAD, WHITE BEAR TOWNSHIP, MN. "ACSI" agrees and warrants that all animals impounded shall be kept in a comfortable and humane manner for a period required by the "City" Ordinance. It is mutually agreed upon that "ACSI" may temporarily board at an emergency facility if access and or treatment is not immediately available at the contract facility. Any fee differential for boarding an animal between the contracted facility and the facility in White Bear Township will be paid by the animal owner. If an animal is unclaimed, the "City" of LAKE ELMO will pay the boarding cost at the contracted facility. The fee schedule(s) for any other facility to be used by "ACSI" shall be posted prominently at the White Bear Township facility and be given to the "City" for public information purposes.

- 7. At the time that an animal impounded under this contract is reclaimed, "ACSI" or its agent shall collect the impounding fee and boarding charges as provided by "Contract". All impounding fees and/or any other penalty fees collected by "ACSI" or its agent shall be remitted to "ACSI".
- 8. In the event an animal impounded and boarded by order of the "City" Health Officer or placed under quarantine by ruling of the State Board of Health, said animal shall be boarded as required by said order or ruling. At the end of such period, the "City" shall release all of its interest, rights and control over said animals that may then be disposed of at the discretion of "ACSI". AT THE TIME THE ANIMAL IS TO BE DISPOSED OF ACSI WILL INDICATE ON THE IMPOUND SLIP HOW AND WHERE AND WHAT HAPPENED TO THE ANIMAL BEING DISPOSED OF. In the event that any dogs, cats, or other impounded animals are unclaimed after six (6) days, they shall become the property of "ACSI" and may be disposed of or sold at their discretion. All proceeds from the disposition of such animals may be retained by "ACSI" including any proceeds received from any animals disposed of in accordance to Minnesota Statutes 35.71.
- 9. The "City" shall furnish to "ACSI" any special forms or receipts specified in the "City" Ordinance and "ACSI" shall keep records of all animals impounded together with a description of the same.
- 10. "ACSI" shall assume liability for all harm to animals due to is negligence or that of its agents in not properly caring for the same, and agrees to defend the "City" against any lawsuits arising there from. "ACSI" shall defend, indemnify, and hold the "City" harmless including its officers, employees or agents from any and all claims, lawsuits, losses, damages, or expenses on account of bodily injuries, sickness, disease, death, and property damage including injury to animals. "ACSI" shall provide the "City" proof of public liability insurance including comprehensive automobile liability in an amount of at least \$350,000.00 per each claimant and \$1,000,000.00 per occurrence and E.O.C insurance in the amount of \$250.000 per occurrence.
- 11. The "City" agrees to pay "ACSI" for services in the performance of this contract as follows:
 - A. Price per hour/per vehicle for scheduled patrol based on of patrol per week for actual time in service. Price per call—per vehicle for service during scheduled or regular working hours. \$28.50

- 13. All payments shall be made by the "City" of LAKE ELMO, upon receipt of monthly statements by "ACSI". Invoices for services rendered will be due not 30 days from the date of invoice and will be subject to a 1.5% service charge on balance due each month.
- 14. "ACSI" agrees to provide emergency veterinary services to help stop any suffering to impounded animals as needed at cost to the "City" of LAKE ELMO however, veterinary service that was deemed necessary may be charged to the owner upon reclamation of the animal. If owner dose not claimed the animal fees will be paid by the City. \$100.00
- 15. "ACSI" agrees that during the period of this contract, it will not within the State of Minnesota, discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, creed, sex, national origin, or ancestry and will include a similar provision in all subcontract(s) entered into for the performance, hereof. This paragraph is inserted in the contract to comply with the provisions of Minnesota Statutes 181.59.
- 16. "ACSI" agree to comply with the Minnesota Data Practices Act and all other State and Federal laws relating to data privacy or confidentiality. "ACSI" agrees it will immediately report to the "City" of LAKE ELMO any requests from third parties for information relating to the Agreement.
- 18. "ACSI" agrees to promptly respond to inquiries from the "City" of LAKE ELMO concerning data requests.

- 19. "ACSI" agrees to hold the "City" of LAKE ELMO, its department heads and employees harmless from and claims resulting from the unlawful disclosure of the use of the data protection under State and Federal laws.
 - 20. "ACSI" agrees to abide by the requirements and regulations of the Americans with Disabilities Act 1990 (ADA) the Human Rights Act (Minnesota Chapters 363 and Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. These laws deal with discrimination based on race, gender, disability, religion, sexual preference, and sexual harassment. Violation of any of the above laws can lead to termination of this agreement.
- 21. Either party, hereto, may cancel this contract after Thirty (30) days written notice, thereof, to the other party.

Background Information for April 18, 2006:

The City Council approved the OP Development Stage Plan, Preliminary Plat and OP Conditional Use Permit for this 28 lot neighborhood on August 16, 2005. The plat specified that no more than 25 lots be platted as buildable lots, but that 3 potential future lots be platted as outlots pending OP density/zoning amendments then contemplated during 2006. While those amendments have not as yet taken place, it continues to appear that they will be undertaken for compliance with the recently approved Comprehensive Plan in 2006.

This is the first OP plat for which we have submitted the Final Landscape Plan to the City Forester for recommendations. A copy of her review memo is attached. It is suggetesd that Final Plat approval be subject to compliance with those recommendations in adtion to the normal conditions for final plats. The Conservation Easements and HOA Declarations continue to be under construction/review by the City Attorney and Minnesota Land Trust - normally not completed until after City Council Final Plat approval.

It appears that the Final Plat (and final construction plans as approved by the City Engineer) comply with the provisions of Section 400 of the City (platting) and Section 301 (Open Space Development) as well as the approved Preliminary Plat, including conditions of approval. Staff has preapred a draft Development Agreement for the plat which has also been reviewed by and concurred in by the City Engineer.

I have reviewed the proposed planting plan (dated 3/24/06) which has been submitted for the Discover Crossing development, and have the following comments:

Email of Bob Charles Hillory

1. Design Concept

There seems to be little in the way of design for this planting plan, possibly because the plan represents supplemental planting along the roadways in a development where there are already a number of existing trees. On such a site, informal, naturalistic plantings best complement the existing native woodland and planted evergreens and fruit trees. The plan is a bit confusing in that new trees are being placed in and among existing trees. The identification labeling of existing and proposed trees is often difficult to read. In a number of cases, the plan makes it look as if new trees are being planted in locations where there are already existing trees. Are the existing trees in these cases to be removed? Are existing trees being represented by smaller icons and then the larger circles represent their combined canopies? A plan legend which also contains identification of the icons for the different types of existing trees would be helpful.

2. Plant Species

For the most part, species appear to be appropriate for the site. I have specific recommendations regarding some of the species or cultivars, however:

a. 'Patmore' green ash – the emerald ash borer is a serious insect pest in other Midwestern states. Minn. Dept. Agriculture anticipates its arrival in Minnesota in the next few years. I recommend limiting the number of ash in the plan to limit future damage to plantings. Substitute 1/3 to 1/2 of the proposed ash with a mix of other species such as hackberry, river birch, 'Whitespire' birch, ironwood, disease-resistant elms, or bicolor oak.

b. sugar maple – this species does best on sites which have a loamy soil with generous amounts of organic matter. Very sandy or heavy clay soils are not suitable for growth of sugar maple. In those types of soils, limit use of sugar maple and plant cultivars of red maple or "Freeman" maples instead.

c, Colorado (green and blue) spruce – Colorado spruce is not native to Minnesota and suffers site stresses which make it susceptible to several serious fungal diseases as it ages. Limit the use of Colorado spruce and substitute some 'Black Hills' white spruce, white pine, and site-tolerant non-

native species such as Norway spruce, or concolor fir instead.

d. Amur maple – this large shrub/small tree is becoming more of a problem in

regard to invading native woodlands, due to its prolific seed production and

its tolerance of a wide range of sites. It is a beautiful plant which establishes

well, but should be used sparingly. Substitute serviceberry, pagoda dogwood, viburnums and black chokeberry for some of the Amur maple. Serviceberry and pagoda dogwood do particularly well in semi-shaded locations. Dwarf bushhoneysuckle is a native shrub which is smaller but does well in a wide range of site conditions.

e. Crabapple cultivars -- 'Pink Spire', 'Radiant' and 'Snowdrift' are susceptible to the fungal disease, apple scab, which can make flowering crabs high maintenance plants. Use more disease-resistant varieties such as

'Professor Sprenger', 'Prairie Fire', 'Thunderchild' and 'Indian Summer'.

3. Tree Protection

Soil disturbance around roots of trees to be saved should be limited as much as possible to avoid permanently damaging trees which the developer intends to save. I see little protective fencing being used on site. What means are being (will be) used to protect trees from construction impacts? The Planting Plan contains the following note regarding Existing Trees "field verify and flag trees to be protected and saved with Owner and Consultant". Has this been done for the development phase or it is only being done at the individual lot level? Does "Consultant" refer to a consultant hired by the development company or the Lake Elmo Forestry Consultant? Trees to be retained in any phase of development should be protected and fenced out to their branch spread, if possible. It is much more effective to protect trees during

development than attempt to improve their health after the construction impacts have caused irreversible damage.

- **4. Planting Detail** there is no 'Planting Detail' attached to the plan showing the method which will be used for tree and shrub planting. This is usually a standard attachment for any landscape or planting plan.
- **5. Required No. of Trees** Lake Elmo Zoning Code requires that there be at least 10 trees per building lot. The submitted Planting Plan contains the Note that "Lot planting by Owner/Builder will meet City minimum of 10 existing and/or planted trees."

DEVELOPMENT AGREEMENT March 17, 2006

Discover Crossing

- 1.00 Parties. This Agreement is dated the day of 2005, and is entered into by and between City of Lake Elmo, a Minnesota municipal corporation (herein "City"); and Discover Crossing Investments LLC, a Minnesota limited liability company (herein "Developer").
- 2.00 <u>Property Description</u>. The Developer represents that it is the record fee owner of property described on *Exhibit A*, attached and incorporated herein, which will be platted as Discover Crossing.
- 3.00 <u>Final Plat Approval</u>. On the day of , 2005, the City Council approved the final plat of Discover Crossing, which is attached and incorporated as *Exhibit B*. The City's approval was conditioned upon the Developer entering into this Development Contract.
- 4.00 <u>Terms and Conditions</u>. NOW, THEREFORE, in reliance upon the representations contained herein; in compliance with the City's Zoning and Subdivision Regulations; and in consideration of the mutual undertakings herein expressed, the parties agree as follows:
 - 4.01 <u>Developer Improvements.</u> The Developer shall construct the following improvements in compliance with plans and specifications which have been reviewed and approved by the City's Consulting Engineer, which are attached and incorporated herein as *Exhibit C*:
 - A. <u>Site Grading and Turf Restoration</u>. Site grading improvements shall include common excavation, subgrade correction, embankment and pond excavation. Turf restoration shall include seeding, mulching and erosion control.
 - 1. Site Grading Improvements shall be completed on or before the 31st day of August, 2006.
 - 2. Turf restoration improvements shall be completed on or before the 31st day of October, 2006.
 - B. <u>Landscaping</u>. Developer shall complete all landscaping improvements on or before the 30th day of June, 2007.

- C. <u>Storm Sewer</u>. Storm sewer improvements include all necessary storm sewers, catch basins, culverts, and other apparatus. Storm sewer improvements shall be completed by the 31st day of August ,2006.
- D. <u>Street Improvements</u>. Street improvements include subgrade preparation, gravel base, bituminous surfacing, bituminous curb and concrete curbs, where required.
 - 1. Unusable material within the roadway shall be removed by the Developer.
 - 2. All subgrade excavation and filling shall be completed by the Developer in accordance with MNDOT's specifications. The City reserves the right to test as necessary, at the Developer's expense, all grading work. A test roll of the street subgrade shall be passed prior to acceptance of the subgrade by the City.
 - 3. Subgrade and the initial course of street improvements shall be completed by the 30th day of September, 2006. The final wear course of the street shall be completed by the 31st day of August, 2007.
- E. <u>Waste Water Treatment System/Drain Field</u>. The waste water treatment system/drain field shall be comprised of a series of pipes, septic tanks, treatment ponds, drain fields and appurtenances, and shall be completed prior to the issuance of any certificates of occupancy.
- F. <u>Street Signs</u>. The City will order and install street signs. The Developer shall pay for all costs incurred by the City.
- G. <u>Water Main</u>. Water main improvements include pipes, hydrants and appurtenances and shall be completed on or before the 31st day of August, 2006. Developer is over-sizing water mains and the City shall reimburse Developer in the amount of \$182,689 for such over-sizing.

4.02 <u>Estimated Cost of Developer Secured Improvements</u>. The estimated costs of Developer constructed improvements are as follows:

- 4.03 Improvement Security. Prior to the City's endorsement of approval on the final plat, the Developer shall deposit security with the City Administrator in an amount equal to 125% of the City Engineer's estimate of the cost of constructing the Developer secured improvements which have not been completed and accepted by the City prior to final plat approval. The security may be in the form of a cash escrow fund, a performance bond, or a letter of credit. The form of security shall be approved by the City Attorney.
- 4.04 Reduction of Security. Upon completion of required improvements for the Property and acceptance by the City, the City Council shall reduce the amount of security for the completed improvements provided that in no case shall the total remaining security be equal to less than 125% of the estimated costs of the incomplete improvements.
- 4.05 <u>Administrative Fees</u>. Developer agrees to pay an administrative fee to the City in an amount equal to 2.5% of the Developer's secured improvements. The administrative fee for this project equals \$40,400.
- 4.06 <u>Utility Company Improvements</u>. The utility improvements include underground gas, electric, and telephone service as installed by the appropriate utility company at the direction of the Developer. The Developer shall arrange for the installation of underground gas, electric, telephone and cable television before the final lift is started. Utility improvements shall be completed by the 31st day of October, 2006.

- 4.07 <u>Recording Requirements</u>. Prior to the conveyance of any of the lots in Discover Crossing, and except as hereinafter provided, prior to the issuance of any development permits, the Developer shall provide the City with evidence that the following documents have been recorded.
 - A. Plat.
 - B. A Declaration of Covenants in a form approved by the City's Attorney. The Declaration of Covenants shall include the following provisions:
 - Require the Homeowner Association to be responsible for the Owner's obligations as contained in the appropriate Conservation or Open Space Easements.
 - 2. Require the Homeowner Association to maintain and operate the waste water treatment system/drain field.
 - 3. Provide that, in the event of a failure by the Homeowner Association to satisfy the obligations defined in Section 4.07B and its subdivisions of this Development Agreement, as determined by the City's Consulting Engineer, the City may undertake such obligations and assess all costs incurred to the Homeowner Association; and in such event, the Developer for itself and for the Homeowner Association hereby waives the requirements otherwise imposed by MS 429.
 - 4. Provide that any provisions in the Covenants relating to the obligations defined in Section 4.07B and its subdivisions of this Development Agreement may not be repealed or amended without consent of the City.
 - C. Homeowner Association Articles of Incorporation.
 - E. A Conservation Easement from the fee owners of the Open Space Outlots to the Minnesota Land Trust and the City, attached and incorporated as herein *Exhibit D*.
 - F. Valley Branch Watershed District permit.
- 4.08 <u>Public Use Dedication</u>. The Developer's public use dedication requirement for Discover Crossing shall consist of the following:
 - A. a payment in the amount of \$173,880;

4.09 Inspection. The City shall provide the services of a Resident Project Representative (and assistants as agreed) at the site to provide more continuous observation of the Contractor(s) work. The Resident Project Representative's dealings in matters pertaining to the on-site work shall in general, be only with The City and the Developer, and dealings with contractors shall only be through or with full knowledge of the Developer. Through the observations of the work in progress and field checks of materials and equipment by the Resident Project Representative shall endeavor to provide further protection for the City against defects and deficiencies in the work of the Contractor; but the furnishing of such resident Project representation will not make City responsible for construction means, methods, techniques, sequences or procedures or for safety precautions or programs, or for the Contractor's failure to perform his work in accordance with the Contract Documents. The developer shall pay the City the sum of \$35,000 for the City inspection services.

The City shall be provided a minimum of 24 hours notice prior to the commencement of underground pipe laying; and prior to subgrade, gravel base, and bituminous surface construction. Developer's failure to comply with the terms of this section shall permit the City Engineer to issue a stop work order which may result in rejection of the work and which shall obligate the Developer to take all reasonable steps, as directed by the City's Engineer, to insure that the improvements are constructed and inspected pursuant to the terms of this Agreement; and shall further result in the assessment of a penalty in an amount equal to 1%, per occurrence, of the amount of security required in Section 4.03 of this Agreement.

- 4.10 Prior Land Occupancy. No Certificate of Occupancy shall be issued for any homes until the first course of a public street is completed and approved by the City Engineer, and the developer has provided the City a certified "as built" of the mass grading of the site which complies with the approved grading plan. If homes are occupied prior to completion of street improvements and acceptance by the City, Developer shall provide all maintenance necessary for such streets including snowplowing, until final acceptance by the City.
- 4.11 <u>Binding Effect</u>. The terms and provisions of this agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the heirs, representatives, successors and assigns of the parties hereto and shall be binding upon all future owners of all or any part of the Property. This Agreement, at the option of the City, shall be placed of record so as to give notice thereto to any subsequent purchasers and encumbrancers of all or any part of

the Property and all recording fees, if any, shall be paid by the Developer.

4.12 <u>Notices</u>. Whenever in this Agreement notice is required to be given by one party to the other, such notice shall be delivered personally or shall be sent by certified mail, return receipt requested to the following addressees. Such notice shall be deemed timely given when delivered personally or when deposited in the mail in accordance with this section.

- 4.13 <u>Incorporation by Reference</u>. All plans, special provisions, proposals, specifications and contracts for the improvements furnished and let pursuant to this Agreement shall be and hereby are made a part of this Agreement by reference as if fully set out herein.
- 4.14 <u>Default</u>. The occurrence of any of the following shall be considered an "event of default" in the terms and conditions contained in this Agreement:
 - A. Failure of the Developer to comply with any of the terms and conditions contained in this Agreement.
 - B. The failure of the Developer to comply with any applicable ordinance or statute with respect to the development of the Property.
- 4.15 <u>Remedies.</u> Upon the occurrence of any event of default, the City, in addition to any other remedy which may be available to it, shall be permitted to do any of the following:
 - A. City may make advances or take other steps to cure the default, and, where necessary, enter the Property for that purpose. The Developer shall pay all sums so advanced or expenses incurred by the City, upon demand, with interest from the dates of such

advances or expenses at the rate of 10% per annum. No action taken by the City pursuant to this section shall be deemed to relieve the Developer from curing any such default to the extent that it is not cured by the City or from any other default hereunder. The City shall not be obligated, by virtue of the existence or exercise of this right, to perform any such act or cure any such default. The Developer shall save, indemnify, and hold harmless, including reasonable attorney fees, the City from any liability or other damages which may be incurred as a result of the exercise of the City's rights pursuant to this section.

- B. Obtain an Order from a Court of competent jurisdiction requiring the Developer to specifically perform its obligations pursuant to the terms and provisions of this Agreement.
- C. Exercise any other remedies which may be available to it including an action for damages.
- D. Withhold the issuance of any or all building permits and/or prohibit the occupancy of all building(s) for which permits have been issued.
- E. In addition to the remedies and amounts payable as set forth herein, upon the occurrence of an event of default, the Developer shall pay to the City all fees and expenses, including reasonable attorney, engineering and consulting fees, incurred by the City as a result of the event of default, whether or not a lawsuit or other action is formally taken.

A RESOLUTION APPROVING THE OPEN SPACE PRESERVATION DEVELOPMENT STAGE PLAN, PRELIMINARY PLAT, AND CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT OF DISCOVER CROSSING.

WHEREAS, on the 21st day of April, 2005, MBM Development, LLC ("Applicant") and Elizabeth Lundquist submitted a completed application requesting that the City of Lake Elmo approve an Open Space Preservation Development Concept Plan for 24 residential lots on 71.6 acres; and

WHEREAS, on the 9th day of May, 2005, at a public hearing, the Lake Elmo Planning Commission reviewed the Development Application, the City Planner's reports and comments, the comments of the Applicant and the Applicant's representatives, and recommended approval of the Development Application; AND

- 2. The application generally complies with the OP Ordinance Design Standards.

- 4. The Preliminary Plat and Plan, upon compliance with the City Engineer's recommendations, comply with the Development Stage Plan and design standards of the Subdivision Code.

And subject to the following Conditions:

- 1. Deletion of the project monument sign.
- 2. The Final Plat shall include no more than 25 building lots unless the Comprehensive Plan/Zoning Ordinance has been officially amended to allow a higher lot count. The final platting of Outlots A, B and/or C will only be on the basis of the Zoning Ordinance density allowed for OP development.
- 3. Compliance with Valley Branch Watershed District recommendations as determined to be applicable by the City Engineer.
- 4. Compliance with the recommendations of the City Engineer, specifically as to street widths.

- 5. Compliance with the recommendations of the City Attorney, specifically as to the City's liability regarding the use of "color-stamped" roadway paving to encourage pedestrian/bike utilization.
- 6. The Final Plat shall include right-of-way for a future Highway 36 service road in a location and to a width recommended by the City Engineer.
- 7. The applicant and City Engineer are encourage to maintain private utility placement within 3 feet of the paved road surfaces to preserve existing trees.







Agenda Item: OP Development Stage Plan/Preliminary Plat and CUP – "Hidden Meadows"

Background Information for April 18, 2006:

The Planning Commission considered this OP Plan/Plat/CUP to create 26 single family lots (25 new and 1 existing) at meetings March 27 and April 10, 2006. The Official Public Hearing was conducted on March 27, and the applications were then tabled pending resolution with the City Engineer of several infrastructure design issues, and submission by the applicant of a screening plan along the east site boundary to comply with OP standards where a 100 foot OP buffer is proposed. The majority of the infrastructure design issues were resolved with the City Engineer by April 10, and the applicant presented the screening plan at the April 10 Commission meeting. Following substantial discussion the Commission decided to recommend the applicant's proposed screening plan to be compliant with the intent of the OP buffer standards.

Public Hearing testimony focused on a request by an adjoining (at the extreme southwest corner) property owner for a public street extension to the south plat boundary. That neighboring 20 acre parcel is accessed via an easement to Keats that was created when a 40 acre parcel was divided, with City approval, into 2 "shotgun" 20's several years ago. The property owner advised the Commission that he desires a direct public street access through this plat to eliminate a long easement driveway and enhance the potential to further divide the 20 acre parcels (perhaps to 10's) in the future. The Commission does not recommend the street extension be required.

A second adjoining property owner requested that the trail along the west perimeter of the plat be moved away from the property line. The applicant has agreed to do so.

The Commission has unanimously recommended that the OP Plan/Plat/CUP be approved.

A RESOLUTION APPROVING THE OPEN SPACE PRESERVATION DEVELOPMENT STAGE PLAN, PRELIMINARY PLAT, AND CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT OF HIDDEN MEADOWS OF LAKE ELMO.

WHEREAS, on the 30th day of June, 2005, Pat Kinney of Hidden Meadows Development, LLC ("Applicant") submitted a completed application requesting that the City of Lake Elmo approve an Open Space Preservation Development Concept Plan for a residential subdivision on 69.68 acres of a 108.62 acre parcel; AND

WHEREAS, on the 25th day of July, 2005, at a public hearing, the Lake Elmo Planning Commission reviewed the Concept Plan, the City Planner's reports and comments, the comments of the Applicant and the Applicant's representatives, and recommended approval of the Concept Plan; AND

WHEREAS, on the 20th day of September, 2005, the Lake Elmo City Council reviewed changes to the Concept Plan, the City Planner's reports and comments dated September 6, 2005, the comments of the Applicant and the Applicant's representatives, and recommended approval of the Concept Plan.

WHEREAS, on the 27th day of March, 2006, at a public hearing, the Lake Elmo Planning Commission reviewed the Development Stage Application, the City Planner's reports and comments, the comments of the Applicant and the Applicant's representatives, and recommended approval of the OP Development Stage Application, Conditional Use Permit, and Preliminary Plat of HIDDEN MEADOWS OF LAKE ELMO based upon the following Findings:

- 1. The OP Development Stage Plan and Preliminary Plat are generally compliant with the approved OP Concept Plan, and condition of Concept Plan approval.
- 2. The Development Stage Plan is compliant with the standards of Section 301 of the City Code (Open Space Development).
- 3. The Preliminary Plat and preliminary construction plans are compliant with Section 400 of the City Code (platting).
- 4. The Conditional Use Permit complies with the pertinent findings required by Section 300.06 of the City Code.

And subject to the following Conditions:

- 1. Compliance with the recommendations/requirements of the City Engineer.
- 2. Compliance with the recommendations/requirements of the Valley Branch Watershed District as found to be appropriate by the City Engineer.
- 3. Relocation of the trail along the west property line to a location further to the east.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Lake Elmo City Council hereby approves the Open Space Development Stage Plan, Preliminary Plat, and Conditional Use Permit for HIDDEN MEADOWS OF LAKE ELMO, as illustrated on the Preliminary Plat prepared by Kimley-Horn and Associates, Inc., dated March 3, 2006.

Preliminary Plat Continued: HIDDEN MEADOWS OF LAKE ELMO

The Planner explained this application was tabled after the Public Hearing was conducted on March 27, 2006. The City Engineer's Memo reflects a few items of concern and there remains the issue of increasing the vegetative screening buffer on the easterly boundary because it is reduced from 200 to 100 feet with the neighboring parcel being eligible for OP development in the future.

An e-mail received from the Engineer this afternoon was distributed.

M/S/P, Deziel/Lyzenga, to remove from the table. Vote: 8:0.

Paul Danielson, Kimley-Horn Associates

Mr. Danielson presented a slide show with photographs of the site and the church site. He presented his plans for landscaping within the buffer zones that showed the planting of six foot spruce trees at the edge of the tree line within the new backyards. He said the site is gently rolling and the area of the buffer is at the toe of a slope where it would be impractical to try to build a berm where there are already concerns for drainage due to the topography of the site.

Mr. Dyer

Mr. Dyer asked about access for his neighbor who is landlocked. That neighbor has an ingress and egress easement across his property. He said he has approached the applicants several times since 2004, not just three or four months ago. He was hoping that as a good neighbor, the applicants would provide access for the landlocked parcel as well as for him to subdivide. It would increase tax revenue and might help with density issues. The developer would be better served by doing it. He asked if it is incumbent upon the developer to think about the effect on neighboring parcels. He is not a fan of pocket developments. Church members have no other options to get out of the site toward Lake Elmo Avenue. He said our pocket developments are like Minnetonka. He asked if Minnetonka has had issues with that type of development or is it successful.

The Planner said the City can and often has established street stubs. To what extent it is done is relative to policy. Minnetonka had few if any through streets in the 1960's and 1970's. It was successful in some cases and in others it created public safety problems. The City of Minnetonka corrected some of the problems at considerable expense. The Lake Elmo City Council's desires have been, during his tenure, to maintain pocket neighborhood communities with a tight grid of thoroughfares.

The Planner questioned whether the existing tree line would be year round effective, and he has not been to the site to make that determination. Evergreen trees and the planting scheme would be fine under normal circumstances. Those new trees will essentially be in people's backyards and may not be maintained by the property owners. To screen the new houses might be impossible due to topography. Another option would be not to build two-story houses.

STREET WAS FOLDS

The Planner explained that the original preliminary plat had a street stub to the south boundary as recommended by the Planning Commission but the City Council ordered it removed. A new plan for trail relocation was submitted to the City Engineer today.

Public Hearing: Preliminary Plat, Development Stage Plan and Conditional Use Permit for HIDDEN MEADOWS OF LAKE ELMO (Formerly known as Deer Glen)

The Planner said the applicant has submitted two related applications on a 108.62 acre site at Keats and Highway 36. The preliminary plat is for a 68 acre portion of the 108 acres. The balance of the site has been previously preliminarily platted including the church site, the homestead site, and the roadway.

Staff observed the preliminary plat essentially responds to the Concept Plan layout as approved. The Landscape Plan for the project is responsive to the OP Ordinance and Section 400 Subdivision requirements. Condition Number 5 for the east property line appears to have an existing tree line substituting for the 200 feet buffer. The City is looking for cross-sections to demonstrate the effectiveness of that buffer. The City Engineer indicates a number of items in an e-mail memo dated March 23, 2006, where there was not enough information provided by the applicant for him to finish a review. Staff recommends waiting for that supplemental information because of their number.

Amended/Approved: 4/10/06

Paul Danielson, Engineer, Kimley-Horn and Associates

A change was made for the residential portion of the site and it was his intent to wait for a favorable response from the Planning Commission before submitting all of the engineering plans. He asked for a recommendation of removing some box elders in order to plant evergreens within that tree line. He said the conditions of the City Engineer are not a deal breaker and they could comply with submission requirements in time for the City Council Meeting. The cul-desac on the southwest corner was an issue. That was what was proposed at Concept Stage and the purpose is to slow down traffic and provide more green spaces. City standards for cul-de-sacs need to be provided. Cross sections for retaining walls were submitted. Those that require guard rails based on State standards will receive them. He is not sure it is necessary to get VBWD approval in order to get City approval. Storm sewer profiles were included in the submittal but he will provide as necessary. Septic system was provided in package for the church. Watermain sizing is not a huge issue. Trail widths and locations are not part of the City system so they were changed to loop within the neighborhood. Stubbing the trail to the east was discouraged by the Council. Conifers require a certain amount of light and the box elder canopy is too dense for them to survive. Roundabout was to calm traffic and to add nodes of common green space and broke up asphalt.

THE CHAIRMAN OPENED THE PUBLIC HEARING AT 7:35 P.M.

Jim Dyer, 5435 Keats Avenue

The Keats/Highway 36 intersection is going to fail and something needs to be done. It may not be the developer's fault or fully their responsibility. Pockets of development are all that are being created and you can't drive through neighborhoods anymore like you can in the Tri-lakes Area. Another parcel of land south of Outlot E or Outlot F of 20 acres will be further landlocked to the north by this development. The developers are not interested in providing access to the south property line. That outlot would be a nice driveway for the landlocked parcel to the south. Maybe residents could drive down this street instead of Keats Ave.

Steven Ziertman, 5761 Keats Avenue

Owner to west of the church location. The trail changed from the original design. He would like to be sure the trail maintains the appropriate setback from his property line. The road is already in going into the church in the development. The city is putting the horse before the cart. The road should not have gone in until this application was approved.

THE CHAIRMAN CLOSED THE PUBLIC HEARING AT 7:41 P.M.

Mr. Dyer contacted the church asking the question about right of way. At this point we are too far into the plans to change them now. The Council did not want the road going through to the east, why would they put one in to the south. The southeast corner is hilly. They would have to redesign the whole plat two years into it.

As of the agenda closing time for the meeting of April 10 the City Engineer had not received plans from the applicant's engineer that reflect the required infrastructure design modifications or previously incomplete plan sheets. The two engineers have been conversing regarding these matters and I understand from both parties that most of the issues raised by the City Engineer regarding the plans (or lack thereof) can and will be resolved by April 10. I have requested (and will receive) a memo from the City Engineer to that effect by Monday's meeting.

I have also conversed with the applicant's engineer regarding the buffer screening plans that are required to demonstrate the year-round effectiveness of screening in lieu of the full 200 foot OP buffer. As of the agenda publication time those plans are not completed, but I am assured they will be by Monday's meeting. Since "effectiveness" is clearly a judgment call, I have advised the applicant's engineer that I will place the applications on the April 10 Planning Commission agenda without staff review of the buffer plans. Those plans may be available prior to the meeting – allowing a brief staff review – but, will for certain be available at the meeting for Commission review.

I have attached all of the agenda materials regarding these applications that the Commission first received for the March 27 Hearing.

Requested Action: OP Development Stage Plan/Preliminary Plat and CUP - "Hidden Meadows

Land Use Plan Guiding: RAD

Existing Zoning: RR

Site History and Existing Conditions:

A Preliminary Plat of Deer Glen was approved by the City Council on April 28, 2005 concurrently with several other related applications for 108 acre site. That Preliminary Plat specified a partial street right-of-way extending into the site from Keats Avenue and a 20 acre Lot 1, Block 1 – the site reguided and rezoned PF to accommodate the (now) Rock Point Church. The balance of the 108 acres was "outlotted" in the Deer Glen plat pending a revised OP Concept Plan for the residential portion of the project. The 2005 approval of the Deer Glen Preliminary Plat did specify that the portion of the lands adjacent to State Highway 36 and north of the public street could be excluded from the OP project, and remain an outlot with no designated use.

On September 20, 2005 the City Council approved an amended OP Concept Plan for the residential portion of the project south of the public street. It is this area (and the original homestead site north of the public street) that is the subject of the OP Development Stage Plan. The Preliminary Plat covers the actual OP development and the remaining Outlots north of the public street.

Discussion and Analysis:

City review of OP Development Stage Plans and accompanying Preliminary Plats includes findings of both compliance with the approved OP Concept Plan and compliance of the preliminary infrastructure plans with City engineering standards and OP design standards. The City Engineer's review of those infrastructure plans is the critical component of this development review stage since the general neighborhood design/lot count/required amenities are established at the Concept Plan Stage.

OP Development Stage Plan/CUP

1. The proposed lot count and lot configuration (including OP buffer areas) are responsive to the approved Concept Plan (September 20, 2005).

2. The Landscape Plan proposes 470 trees to be introduced to the site with deciduous trees partly 2.5 inch and partly 1.5 inch caliper (depending on species), and coniferous trees 6 feet and 8 feet in planted height (dependent on species). This count and quality of trees will

respond to both OP and Section 400 standards for landscape – particularly considering significant existing tree population on some of the proposed lots that will be retained.

- 3. We do not find a Landscape Plan response to Condition #5 of the OP Concept Plan approval resolution, "5. The Development Stage Plan shall demonstrate the year-round effectiveness of screening measures that support the 100 foot OP buffer on the east side of site." While the Landscape Plan notes existing tree groupings along the east side of the plat, we find no indication of the species, spacing and sizes of the trees in that grouping that would demonstrate that this would be effective year-round screening of the homes within the plat. Together with a listing of the trees proposed as effective year-round screening, the preferred method to demonstrate that effectiveness is providing cross sections from house through screen to adjacent land.
- 4. With the exception of #3 above we find that the applicable conditions of the Concept Plan approval resolution are complied with.

Preliminary Plat

The City Engineer has presented a March 23, 2006 Email outlining a number of infrastructure related review comments, including a finding that certain information required to complete his review has not been submitted by the applicant.

Findings and Recommendations:

Where City Engineer or Watershed review comments address minor plat modifications we usually recommend the plat go forward to the City Council with a condition requiring compliance by the applicant with those comments and recommendations. In this case the City Engineer's review recommends more substantial modifications than we have seen previously, and the need for additional information to complete his review. This concern coupled with the lack of a plan demonstration screening effectiveness leads staff to recommend that this Preliminary Plat be tabled by the Commission pending applicant's plan adjustments and submission of the information we do not as yet have.

The Noticed Public Hearing regarding the plat and CUP should be conducted by the Commission on March 27, as scheduled. Based on the above comments the City does not have a "completed application" as of this date. We suggest, however, that the meeting at which the Commission should next consider this matter is April 24, and the meeting at which the City Council should act is May 2, 2006.


