<u>SUMMARY AND ACTION REQUESTED</u>: The City Council is respectfully requested to consider approving the 2011 Crack Seal Project by directing staff to obtain contractor quotes and retain a contractor to complete the work for a not to exceed total project amount of \$19,000. This project is part of the 2011 Infrastructure Reserves Budget. No specific motion is needed, as this is recommended to be part of the overall approval of the *Consent Agenda*.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION AND STAFF REPORT: In accordance with the City's annual street maintenance program, certain street segments have been scheduled to be seal coated in 2012. Best pavement management practices have been established that require these streets to be crack sealed in 2011, one construction season in advance, to prepare the street for the seal coat treatment. This allows the crack sealing to fully adhere to the pavement surfaces, and also allows the Public Works staff to perform minor patching and leveling in preparation of the seal coat work. A field review was recently completed by engineering staff to field verify the proposed street segements.

**RECOMMENDATION**: Based upon the above information, it is recommended that the City Council approve as part of tonight's *Consent Agenda* the 2011 Crack Seal Project and authorize staff to retain a Contractor to complete the work in amount not to exceed a total project budget of \$19,000.

Alternatively, the City Council does have the authority to remove this item from the Consent Agenda, table this item for future consideration, or further discuss, deliberate and/or, if appropriate, amend the recommended motion prior to taking action. If the latter is done so, the appropriate action of the Council following such discussion would be:

"Move to authorize Staff to retain a Contractor to complete the 2011 Crack Seal Project in a total project amount not to exceed \$19,000. [and amended and/or modified at tonight's meeting]."

## CONSTRUCTION CONTRACT FOR THE 2011 CRACK SEAL PROJECT; PROJECT NO. 2011.109

This Contract, made this day of 2011, by the City of Lake Elmo, Minnesota (herinafter called the "Owner") and (hereinafter called the "Contractor").
WITNESSETH that the parties hereto agree as follows: The Contractor shall provide all labor, services, materials, equipment and machinery, transportation, tools, fuel, power, light, heat telephone, water, sanitary facilities, temporary facilities, and all other facilities and incidentals, including profit and overhead necessary for the performance, testing, start-up, and completion of the work as described herein:
DESCRIPTION OF WORK:
The Contractor shall route (¾" x ¾"), clean, dry, and seal existing bituminous cracks in the streets shown on the attached Location Map dated October 12, 2011. The work shall be completed per the applicable MnDOT Special Provisions (SP 2005) and in accordance with the special provisions outlined within this Construction Contract. The Contractor shall provide all necessary traffic control in accordance with the MMUTCD.
The Contractor shall provide certification that the sealant meets MnDOT 3725. Manufacturers and products are allowed only from the certified source list. Sealant materials may be placed during a period of rising temperature after the air temperature has reached 50 degrees F. The street surface must be completely dry and remain so throughout the application of the scalant material. The Contractor shall conduct the operation so that routing of cracks, cleaning, drying, and sealing are a continuous operation. Traffic shall not be allowed to knead together or damage the routed joints. Routed joints not sealed before traffic is allowed on the pavement shall be re-routed, if necessary, when routing and sealing operations resume at no additional cost to the Owner. Cleaning shall continue until the joint is dry and all dirt, dust or deleterious matter is removed from the joint and adjacent pavement to the satisfaction of the Engineer.
Bond breaker tape is to be installed and shall consist of regular masking tape or other suitable bond breaker tape designed for use with hot pour sealants. The width of the tape may be equal to but not more than 1/8 inch narrower than the width of the saw cut.
The joints shall be sealed when the sealant material is at the pouring temperature recommended by the manufacturer. The Contractor shall fill the joint such that after cooling, the sealant is flush with the adjacent pavement along the edges and the center does not sag more than 1/8 inch below the pavement or shoulder surface. Care shall be taken in the sealing of the joints so that the joints are not overfilled and the final appearance shall present a neat fine line. Sand shall not be spread on the sealed joints to allow for opening to traffic. The sealant shall be tack free before opening to traffic. A given quantity of sealant material shall never be heated at the pouring temperature for more than six (6) hours and shall never be reheated.
The Contractor shall replace any scalant that loses its bond within two years after the scalant is applied.
Actual quantities will be measured and paid per the unit price provided in the quote form completed by the Contractor. The City may add or reduce the number of streets in the project due to quote price, and the amount of crack sealing being performed.
All work shall be completed within the specified time frame and under the terms and conditions provided within this Construction Contract, and in accordance with the "General Conditions" shown in this contract. The contractor shall complete the proposed work by November 15, 2011.
The Owner will make payment for the whole contract upon acceptance by the Owner of all work required hereunder and in compliance with all the terms and conditions of this contract.
IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the parties hereto have executed this contract as of the date first above written.
(Contractor) (City of Lake Elmo)

#### GENERAL CONDITIONS

- I. CHANGES IN WORK. The Owner may at any time, make changes in the drawings and specifications, within the general scope thereof. If such changes cause an increase or decrease in the amount due under this contract or in the time required for its performance, an equitable adjustment will be made, and this contract will be modified accordingly by a "Contract Change Order". No charge for any extra work or material will be allowed unless the same has been ordered on such contract change order by the Owner and the price therefore stated in the order.
- II. INSPECTION OF WORK. All materials and workmanship will be subject to inspection, examination, and test, by the Owner, who will have the right to reject defective material and workmanship or require its correction.
- III. COMPLETION OF WORK. If the Contractor refuses or fails to complete the work within the time specified in paragraph B of this contract, or any extension thereof, the Owner may terminate the Contractor's rights to proceed. In such event the Owner may take over the work and prosecute the same to completion by contract or otherwise, and the Contractor will be liable for any excess cost occasioned the Owner thereby; and the Owner may take possession of and utilize in completing the work such materials and equipment as may be on the site of the work and necessary therefore. If the Owner does not terminate the right of the Contract to proceed, the Contractor will continue the work, in which event, actual damages for delay will be impossible to determine, and in lieu thereof, the Contractor may be required to pay to the Owner the sum of \$100 as liquidated damages for each calendar day of delay, and the Contractor will be liable for the amount thereof. Provided, however, that the right of the Contractor to proceed will not be terminated because of delays in the completion of the completion of the work due to unforeseeable causes beyond the Contractor's control and without Contractor's fault or negligence.
- IV. RELEASES. Prior to final payment, the Contractor will submit evidence that all payrolls, material bills, and other indebtedness connected with the work have been paid as required by the Owner.
- V. OBLIGATION TO DISCHARGE LIENS. Acceptance by the Owner of the completed work performed by the Contractor and payment therefore by the Owner will not relieve the Contractor of obligation to the Owner (which obligation is hereby acknowledged) to discharge any and all liens for the benefit of subcontractors, laborers, material-person, or any other persons performing labor upon the work or furnishing material or machinery for the work covered by this contract, which have attached to or may subsequently attach to the property, or interest of the Owner.
- VI. NOTICES AND APPROVAL IN WRITING. Any notice, consent, or other act to be given or done hereunder will be valid only if in writing.
- VII. CLEANING UP. The Contractor shall keep the premises free from accumulation of waste material and rubbish and at the completion of the work shall remove from the premises all rubbish, implements and surplus materials.
- VIII. WARRANTY. Contractor warrants and guarantees that title to all work, materials, and equipment covered by any Application for Payment, whether incorporated in the Project or not, will pass to Owner no later than the time of payment free and clear of all Liens. If within two years after completion of the work, any work is found to be defective, Contractor shall promptly, without cost to the Owner, correct such defective work as approved by the Owner.
- IX. IDEMNIFICATION. Contractor shall defend and indemnify the city against claims brought or actions filed against the city or any of its officers, employees or agents for property damage, bodily injury or death to third persons, arising out of or relating to contractors work under the contract.
- X. WORKERS' COMPENSATION INSURANCE. Contractor shall provide a certificate of insurance showing evidence of workers' compensation coverage or provide evidence of qualification as a self-insurer of workers' compensation.
- XI. LIABILITY INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS. A certificate of insurance acceptable to the City shall be filed with the City prior to the commencement of the work. The certificate and the required insurance policies shall contain a provision that the coverage afforded under the contract will not be canceled or allowed to expire until at least 30 days prior written notice has been given to the city. Contractor shall maintain commercial general liability (CGL) insurance with a limit of not less than \$1,000,000 each occurrence and an aggregate limit of not less than \$2,000,000. The CGL insurance shall cover liability arising from premises, operations, independent contractors, subcontractors, products-completed operations, personal injury and advertising injury, and contractually-assumed liability. The city shall be named as an additional insured under the CGL. Contractor shall maintain automobile liability insurance, and if necessary, umbrella liability insurance with a limit of not less than \$1,000,000 each accident and an aggregate limit of not less than \$2,000,000. The insurance shall cover liability arising out of any auto, including owned, hired, and non-owned autos.



#### **SUMMARY AND ACTION REQUESTED:**

Purchase new holiday street lighting for the downtown area of Lake Elmo.

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION:**

The current holiday lights are in 13 years old and in poor shape. The current lights were donated by the Jaycees, but unfortunately they were purchased without consulting staff. The lights are too wide and have been hit numerous times by truck traffic. The lights are also too heavy to be put up by ladder, so a boom truck has to be rented for installation and removal. The new lights are significantly lighter, narrower, and LED powered which is a more durable and energy efficient light. The lights are placed primarily on Lake Elmo Ave between 33<sup>rd</sup> Street and TH5, along TH5 from Gorman's Restaurant to Hagbergs, and on the corner of Laverne and 36<sup>th</sup> Street.

#### STAFF REPORT:

Two quotes for 24 new lights (12 ea. bell, 12ea. flame candle) were as follows:

Main Street Design

\$5,508.00 plus tax (no shipping charges)

• Temple Display

\$6,420.00 plus tax and \$513.00 shipping

Funding has been requested to the Jaycees, but we will not know how much, if any, until they meet again on November 3<sup>rd</sup>. Current funding will be from the Fall Festival Fund and any donated money from the Jaycees will go back to the fund.

Some of the pole outlets have to be repaired or new outlets added. Cost is undetermined because it is a by the hour electrician cost, but a not to exceed \$800.00 figure be included in this request.

**RECOMMENDATION**: Purchase the Holiday Lights from Main Street Designs for \$5,508.00 plus tax, and a not to exceed \$800.00 electrical budget from the Fall Festival Fund and any donated money reimbursed to the fund.

**SUMMARY AND ACTION REQUESTED**: The City Council is respectfully requested to consider Ordinance No. 08-054 regarding the proposed modifications for "No Parking" sings on Laverne Avenue North at Highway 5.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION & STAFF REPORT: This item has been scheduled at the request of the City Public Works Department. It has been reported that increased traffic from parents bringing/picking up their children at the Lake Elmo Elementary School have safety concerns for the intersection of Laverne Avenue North and Highway 5. <u>SUMMARY AND BACKGROUND INFORMATION</u>: The City Council has scheduled this item to accept resident petitions and discuss possible revisions to City Ordinance Section 97.21 governing operation of motor craft and the hours of "no wake" speeds on area lakes. These lakes include Olson-Demontreville, Jan and Elmo.

Lake Elmo has restrictions in place on area lakes for "no wake" operation from sunset to 12 noon the following day. However, there is no record of any significant enforcement actions taken with respect to this provision. Enforcement is undertaken by the Washington County Sheriff's Office on behalf of the City of Lake Elmo.

In August, area property owners from Lake Jane submitted a petition to the City requesting the City Council changes these "slow, no wake" provisions to sunset to 9 AM. Earlier this week, other property owners from Lake Jan submitted a petition to the City opposing such changes. Property owners along lakes Olson-Demontreville and Elmo have spoken predominantly against such changes.

Attached for Council information are the state regulations governing surface water activities and restrictions. According to state officials, Lake Elmo's current time restrictions have been previously deemed acceptable (they mix clearly-stated approved time restrictions found in Section 6110.3700 Subpart 6). The City Council has the option of leaving the current restrictions as is, adopting a set of restrictions currently enumerated by the MNDNR, or changing the current restrictions and seeking a variance from the MNDNR should these new time restrictions not follow enumerated options.

Additionally, the MNDNR has opined that any change in such restrictions should, at a minimum, be applied to all connected bodies of water (Olson-Demontreville, for example). Restrictions

which change between different connected bodies of water, or vary from lake to lake within a jurisdiction are noted to be more difficult to post and enforce but are not, however, prohibited outright. It is also noted that, as public lakes, non-adjacent property owners, other residents of Lake Elmo, and other Minnesotans and non-residents utilize these lakes in accordance state and local regulations.

As the State of Minnesota's Department of Natural Resources has jurisdiction and statutory review over such local ordinances (to ensure they are not in conflict with State law), any action taken by the City Council will have to be submitted to MNDNR for final approval.

**OTHER CONSIDERATIONS**: The Minnesota DNR has not undertaken its review of the City's Ordinance, including both recently made or previously adopted but apparently not submitted for DNR review. It is anticipated that this effort will be initiated sometime this fall, after the City Council considers tonight's issue.

**RECOMMENDATION**: It has been requested that the City Council accept the residents' petitions and consider possible changes to Ordinance Section 97.21 Regarding "Slow, No Wake" Provisions relating to hours of operation on area lakes. The City Attorney can advise the City Council, should the Council wish to take specific action at tonight's meeting. Should formal changes be made to the Ordinance, however, it should be noted that DNR approval will still be required.

#### ORDINANCE NO. 08-050

## AN ORDINANCE TO ALLOW THE CITY COUNCIL TO EXTEND THE "NO WAKE" REQUIREMENTS UNDER THE WATER SURFACE USE ORDINANACE

Section 1. The City Council of the City of Lake Elmo hereby ordains that Section 97.21 subdivision (B) is hereby amended to read as follows:

- (B) Hours of operation.
  - (1) Normal Conditions No person shall operate any motorboat at a speed other than a slow, no-wake speed between sunset and noon the following day.
  - (2) High Water Conditions No person shall operate any motorboat at a speed other than a slow, no-wake speed when a lake level exceeds the ordinary high water mark.
  - (3) Other Conditions Alternative or modified no-wake time periods may be established by the City Council by Resolution as part of a special event or other condition. No person shall operate any motor boat in a manner which creates a wake when no-wake signs are posted.

#### Section 2. Adoption Date

This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon adoption and publication in the official newspaper of the City of Lake Elmo.

This Ordinance No. 08-050 was adopted on this 19<sup>th</sup> day of July, 2011, by a vote of Ayes and CNays.

## Water Surface Use Rules And Statutes

## Dear Water Surface Use Manager:

Each year the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources (DNR) receives numerous inquiries regarding water surface use management. This packet contains general information concerning the rules and statutes that may govern the water surface of lakes and rivers in Minnesota.

Water surfaces are managed through numerous statutes and rules. Minnesota Rules parts 6110.3000-.3800, Water Surface Use Management (WSUM) Rules describe the goals of the rules, require an assessment of the water surface use conditions, and establish water surface management standards or parameters, which may be included in an ordinance. For more specific information, a copy of the statutes and rules are enclosed. Also, see the note on "Enforcement" in the sample ordinance that is enclosed.

Governmental units formulating, amending or deleting controls for water surface use must submit the following information to the DNR for review prior to adopting a proposed WSUM ordinance:

- · A water surface worksheet with a map of the water body, highlighting the affected areas.
- A statement explaining the necessity for the ordinance and the solution to the problem this ordinance will offer.
- A copy of the proposed ordinance (sample wording is included).
- An account of the public hearing held concerning the proposed controls, including an account of the statements of each person who testified.

Generally, if more than one governmental unit at the same level (town to town, city to city or county to county) has jurisdiction over the particular body of water, they all must have an ordinance with identical restrictions and have a signed joint powers agreement. All of the affected governmental units must submit the required information to the DNR for approval. Enclosed is an example of a WSUM ordinance that was approved by the DNR. If for some reason the DNR denies the proposed ordinance, then the denial will be sent in the form of a letter, which will explain the reasons for denial. The governmental unit may amend the proposed ordinance in accordance with the denial letter and resubmit the proposed ordinance for a second review by the DNR.

The DNR will notify the governmental unit in writing of approval or denial within 120 days after receiving all of the above information. The governmental unit adopting an ordinance must provide for notification of the ordinance to the public, which involves placing signs at public watercraft launch sites outlining essential elements of the ordinance.

## MINNESOTA WATER SURFACE USE MANAGEMENT RULES

## 6110.3000 POLICY.

It is the policy of this state to promote full use and enjoyment of waters of the state, to promote safety for persons and property in connection with such use, and to promote uniformity of laws relating to such use.

Statutory Authority: M.S. § 361.25

#### 6110.3100 SCOPE.

As part of implementing that policy, Minnesota Statutes, sections 378.32 and 459.20 authorize counties, cities, and towns to regulate by ordinance the use of surface waters by watercraft, upon approval of any such ordinance by the commissioner. Minnesota Statutes, section 361.26, subdivision 2a authorizes the commissioner to regulate such use by rule, upon request of a county, city or town, and after the rule is approved by the majority of the counties affected. Parts 6110.3000 to 6110.4200, however, shall not apply to units of government other than counties, cities, and towns, or to counties, cities, or towns adopting ordinances identical to and on the same body of water as a lake conservation district ordinance.

Statutory Authority: M.S. § 361.25

## 6110.3200 GOAL OF WATER SURFACE USE MANAGEMENT.

The goal of water surface use management shall be to enhance the recreational use, safety, and enjoyment of the water surface of Minnesota and to preserve these water resources in a way that reflects the state's paramount concern for the protection of its natural resources. In pursuit of that goal, an ordinance or rule shall:

- A. where practical and feasible, accommodate all compatible recreational uses;
- B. minimize adverse impact on natural resources;
- C. minimize conflicts between users in a way that provides for maximum use, safety, and enjoyment; and
  - D. conform to the standards set in part 6110.3700.

Statutory Authority: M.S. § 361.25

#### 6110,3300 STATUTORY AUTHORITY.

Parts of 6110.3000 to 6110.4200 are required by Minnesota Statutes, section 361.25. They provide procedures for the development and approval of rules and ordinances for resolving water surface use conflict by regulating:

- A. type and size of watercraft;
- B. type and horsepower of motors;
- C. speed of watercraft;
- D. time of use;
- E. area of use: and
- F. the conduct of other activities on the water body where necessary to secure the safety of the public and the most general public use.

Statutory Authority: M.S. § 361.25

#### 6110.3400 JURISDICTION OF COMMISSIONER.

The commissioner shall exercise his discretion under Minnesota Statutes, section 361.26, subdivision 2 to regulate a water body when so requested by a county, city, or town only when the water body:

- A. is traversed by a state or international boundary; or
- B. is within the jurisdiction of two or more counties which cannot agree on the content of

ordinances; and

shoreline;

C. regulation is necessary to achieve the goals in part 6110.3200.

In all other cases, water surface use regulation shall be by county, city, or town ordinance as specified in Minnesota Statutes, sections 378.32 and 459.20. If a body of water is located within the jurisdiction of two or more cities or towns which cannot agree on the content of ordinances, any such city or town may petition the county in which they are located to adopt an ordinance.

Statutory Authority: M.S. § 361.25

## 6110.3500 EXISTING ORDINANCES AND RULES.

All existing ordinances and rules adopted on or after January 1, 1975 affecting water surface use shall be brought into compliance with parts 6110.3000 to 6110.4200 within a reasonable time period after promulgation of these parts.

Statutory Authority: M.S. § 361.25

## 6110.3600 ASSESSMENT OF CONDITIONS.

Subpart 1. Factors to consider. The commissioner of any governmental unit formulating, amending, or deleting controls for surface waters shall acquire and consider the following information, noting factors that are not relevant:

## A. Physical characteristics:

- (1) size: normal surface acreage, if available, or the basin acreage listed in the Division of Waters Bulletin No. 25, An Inventory of Minnesota Lakes;
  - (2) crowding potential: expressed as a ratio of water surface area to length of
  - (3) bottom topography and water depth;
  - (4) shore soils and bottom sediments;
  - (5) aquatic flora and fauna;
- (6) water circulation: for lakes, the existence and locations of strong currents, inlets, and large water level fluctuations; for rivers and streams, velocity and water level fluctuations;
- (7) natural and artificial obstructions or hazards to navigation, including but not limited to points, bars, rocks, stumps, weed beds, docks, piers, dams, diving platforms, and buoys; and
- (8) regional relationship: the locations and the level of recreational use of other water bodies in the area.

## B. Existing development:

- (1) Private: to include number, location, and occupancy characteristics of permanent homes, seasonal homes, apartments, planned unit developments, resorts, marinas, campgrounds, and other residential, commercial, and industrial uses.
- (2) Public: to include type, location, size, facilities, and parking capacity of parks, beaches, and watercraft launching facilities.
- C. Ownership of shoreland: to include the location and managing governmental unit of shoreline in federal, state, county, or city ownership as well as private, semipublic, or corporate lands.
- D. Public regulations and management: to include federal, state, or local regulations and management plans and activities having direct effects on watercraft use of surface waters.
  - E. History of accidents which have occurred on the surface waters.
- F. Watercraft use: to include information obtained in the morning, afternoon, and evening on at least one weekday and one weekend day, concerning the number and types of watercraft in each of the following categories: kept or used by riparians, rented by or gaining access through resorts or marinas, using each public watercraft launching facility, in use on the waterbody.
- G. Conflict perception and control preferences: to include opinions gained by surveys or through public meetings or hearings of riparians, transients, local residents, and the public at large.
- Subp. 2. Written statement. Any governmental unit formulating, amending, or deleting controls for surface waters shall submit to the commissioner the following:
  - A. the information requested in subpart 1, portrayed on a map to the extent reasonable;
  - B. a statement evaluating whether the information reveals significant conflicts and

explaining why the particular controls proposed were selected;

- C. the proposed ordinance; and
- D. a description of public hearings held concerning the proposed controls, including an account of the statement of each person testifying.
- Subp. 3. Commissioner review and approval. The commissioner shall require the ordinance proposer to provide additional information of the kind described in subpart 1 when needed in order to make an informed decision. The commissioner shall approve the ordinance if it conforms with these rules.

Statutory Authority: M.S. § 361.25

## 6110.3700 WATER SURFACE MANAGEMENT STANDARDS.

Subpart 1. **Purpose.** To promote uniformity of ordinances or rules on the use of watercraft on surface waters of this state, to encourage compliance and to ease enforcement, the commissioner and any government unit formulating such ordinances or rules shall follow these standards. When formulating an ordinance or rule, it is not required that all the standards listed below be incorporated into every ordinance or rule. Rather, the commissioner or governmental unit shall select from the standards listed below such standard(s) as are needed to regulate the surface use of waters.

- Subp. 2. Watercraft type and size. Controls may be formulated concerning the type and/or size of watercraft permissible for use on surface water body(ies) or portions thereof.
- Subp. 3. Motor type and size. Controls, if any, concerning the maximum total horsepower of motor(s) powering watercraft on surface waters shall utilize one or more of the following horsepower cutoffs or motor types: 25 hp; 10 hp; electric motors; no motors.
- Subp. 4. **Direction of travel**. Directional controls, if used, shall mandate watercraft to follow a counterclockwise path of travel.
- Subp. 5. Speed limits. Controls, if any, concerning the maximum speeds allowable for watercraft on surface waters shall utilize one or more of the following miles-per-hour cutoffs:
- A. "Slow-No Wake" means operation of a watercraft at the slowest possible speed necessary to maintain steerage and in no case greater than five mph.
  - B. 15 mph.
  - C. 40 mph.

Subp. 6. Effective Time. Controls must use one or more of the following time periods:

- A. sunrise to sunset or sunset to sunrise the following day:
- B. 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. or 6:00 p.m. to 9:00 a.m. the following day;
- C. noon to 6:00 p.m. or 6:00 p.m. to noon the following day:
- D. all 24 hours of the day.

Controls must be in effect during one of the following calendar divisions: all year; Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day weekend; on all weekends and legal holidays occurring within Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day weekend.

Controls governing the use of watercraft may be adopted which are placed into effect based upon specific water elevations.

Subp. 7. Area zoning. Controls shall clearly specify which portion of the water body is affected by such controls.

Area controls may be formulated concerning any of the subject matter covered in the water surface management standards in subparts 2 to 9.

Controls concerning a "Slow-No Wake" shall be established for the entire water body or portion thereof according to the following criteria: within 100 feet or 150 feet from the shore; or where watercraft speed or wake constitutes a hazard to persons, property, or the natural resources; or where it has been determined that such control(s) would enhance the recreational use and enjoyment of the majority of users.

- Subp. 8. Conduct of other activities on a body of water. Controls formulated by a governmental unit which restricts other activities (such as swimming or scuba diving) shall conform to part 6110.3200.
  - Subp. 9. Emergencies. In situations of local emergency, temporary special controls may be

enacted by a county, city, or town for a period not more than five days without the commissioner's approval. The commissioner shall be notified, however, as soon as practicable during this five-day period.

Subp. 10. Additional evidence. A government unit may submit additional evidence if it feels that variance from the afore-stated standards is necessary to best address a particular problem. The commissioner will review such evidence and shall grant a variance if there are circumstances peculiar to the body or bodies of water in question of such magnitude as to overshadow the goal of uniformity.

Statutory Authority: M.S. § 361.25

## 6110.3800 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS.

Subpart 1. **Enforcement and penalties**. Any government unit adopting ordinances pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, sections 378.32 and 459.20 shall provide for their enforcement and prescribe penalties for noncompliance. Rules established pursuant to Minnesota Statues, section 361.26 shall be enforced by conservation officers of the Department of Natural Resources and the sheriff of each county.

Rules or ordinances shall contain a provision exempting authorized resource management, emergency, and enforcement personnel when acting in the performance of their assigned duties. They may also provide for temporary exemptions from controls through the use of permits issued by the unit of government adopting the ordinance or rule.

Subp. 2. Commissioner's approval for proposed ordinances. Any governmental unit formulating ordinances or desiring amendments and deletions to existing ordinances shall submit the written statement required by these rules with the proposed ordinance to the commissioner pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, section 378.32 for his approval or disapproval. Determination of approval or disapproval shall be based upon the written statement and the compatibility of the ordinance with these rules. If the proposed ordinance is disapproved by the commissioner and a satisfactory compromise cannot be established, the governmental unit may initiate a contested case hearing to settle the matter.

The commissioner shall notify the governmental unit in writing of his approval or disapproval of proposed ordinances within 120 days after receiving them pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, section 378.32. Failure to so notify shall be considered approval.

Subp. 3. **Public notice**. Any governmental unit adopting ordinances shall provide for adequate notification of the public, which shall include placement of a sign at each public watercraft launching facility outlining essential elements of such ordinances, as well as the placement of necessary buoys and signs. All such signs and buoys shall meet requirements specified in Minnesota Statutes, section 361 and parts 6110.1500 to 6110.1900.

The commissioner shall publish and update at his discretion a listing of watercraft use rules and ordinances on surface waters of the state for distribution to the public.

## RELEVANT WATER SURFACE USE STATUTES

#### CHAPTER 86B

## 86B.201 STATE LAW AND LOCAL ORDINANCE AUTHORITY.

- Subdivision 1. **Application of state law.** The provisions of this chapter and of other applicable laws of this state shall govern the operation, equipment, numbering, and all other related matters for a watercraft operated on the waters of this state, or the time when an activity regulated by this chapter may take place.
- Subd. 2. Local authority to adopt ordinance. (a) This chapter does not limit the authority of a political subdivision of this state to adopt regulations that are not inconsistent with this chapter and the rules of the commissioner relating to the use of waters of this state that are wholly or partly within the territorial boundaries of a county or entirely within the boundaries of a city.
- (b) A city of the first class of over 200,000 or the park board of the city may forbid the use of motorboats or boats with attached motors on its lakes.
- Subd. 3. **Nonmotorized carry-on access.** A person may access any public waters through public land with a hand-carried nonmotorized watercraft.

## 86B.205 WATER SURFACE USE ORDINANCE.

Subdivision 1. Assistance. The commissioner shall develop and publish guidelines to assist counties adopting water surface use ordinances for waters within their jurisdiction.

- Subd. 2. Surface use ordinances. (a) A county board may, by ordinance, regulate the surface use of bodies of water located entirely or partially within the county and not located entirely within the boundary of a single city or lake conservation district established by law.
- (b) If a body of water is located within more than one county, a surface use ordinance is not effective until adopted by the county boards of all the counties where the body of water lies under section 471.59 or placed into effect by order of the commissioner under subdivision 9.
- (c) With the authorization of an affected city or lake conservation district, a county board may assume and exercise the powers in subdivisions 2 to 5 with respect to bodies of water lying entirely within that city or lake conservation district. The regulation by the county of the surface use of a portion of a body of water located within the boundary of a city must be consistent with any city regulation existing on May 25, 1973, of the surface use of that portion of the body of water. After January 1, 1975, the ordinance must be consistent with the provisions of this chapter and rules of the commissioner under this chapter.
- Subd. 3. **Prior ordinances invalid without approval**. A surface use zoning ordinance adopted under subdivisions 2 to 5 by a local governmental unit after May 25, 1973, is invalid unless it is approved by the commissioner.
- Subd. 4. **Approval of ordinances**. A proposed surface use zoning ordinance must be submitted to the commissioner for review and approval before adoption. The commissioner must approve or disapprove the proposed ordinance within 120 days after receiving it. If the commissioner disapproves the proposed ordinance, the commissioner must return it to the local governmental unit with a written statement of the reasons for disapproval.
  - Subd. 5. County regulatory authority. A county board may:
- (1) regulate and police public beaches, public docks, and other public facilities for access to a body of water, except:
  - (i) regulations are subject to subdivision 6;
  - (ii) a county board may not regulate state accesses; and
  - (iii) a municipality may by ordinance preempt the county from exercising power under this

subdivision within its jurisdiction;

- (2) regulate the construction, configuration, size, location, and maintenance of commercial marinas and their related facilities including parking areas and sanitary facilities in a manner consistent with other state laws and the rules of the commissioner of natural resources, the pollution control agency, and the commissioner of health, and with the applicable municipal building codes and zoning ordinances where the marinas are located;
- (3) regulate the construction, installation, and maintenance of permanent and temporary docks and moorings in a manner consistent with state and federal law, permits required under chapter 103G, and sections 86B.111 and 86B.115;
- (4) except as provided in subdivision 6, regulate the type and size of watercraft allowed to use the body of water and set access fees;
  - (5) subject to subdivision 6, limit the types and horsepower of motors used on the body of water;
- (6) limit the use of the body of water at various times and the use of various parts of the body of water;
- (7) regulate the speed of watercraft on the body of water and the conduct of other activities on the body of water to secure the safety of the public and the most general public use; and
  - (8) contract with other law enforcement agencies to police the body of water and its shore.
- Subd. 6. **Public access restrictions.** The county board must allow the same types and sizes of watercraft and horsepower of motors to access and enter the lake or water body as are generally allowed to be operated on the lake or water body. Special use exceptions that are not dependent on lakeshore or property ownership may be granted by permit.
- Subd. 7. **County acquisition of public access**. A county board may acquire by purchase, gift, or devise land for public access to a lake or stream and may improve the land as a park or playground if the land is less than ten acres and is contiguous to the meander line of a navigable lake or stream wholly or partly within the county and not entirely within the corporate limits of a city.
- Subd. 8. Advisory assistance. The county board may invite any municipal council or town board or the soil and water conservation district board of supervisors or watershed district board of managers to designate a representative to advise and consult with the county board on water use regulation and improvement.
- Subd. 9. Watercraft use rules for local waters. (a) On request of a county, city, or town, the commissioner may, after determining it to be in the public interest, establish rules relating to the use of watercraft on waters of this state that border upon or are within, in whole or in part, the territorial boundaries of the governmental unit.
- (b) The rules shall be established in the manner provided by sections 14.02 to 14.62, but may not be submitted to the attorney general nor filed with the secretary of state until first approved by resolutions of the county boards of a majority of the counties affected by the proposed rules.
  - (c) The rules may restrict:
  - (1) the type and size of watercraft and size of motor that may use the waters affected by the rule;
  - (2) the areas of water that may be used by watercraft;
  - (3) the speed of watercraft;
  - (4) the times permitted for use of watercraft; or
  - (5) the minimum distance between watercraft.
- (d) When establishing rules, the commissioner shall consider the physical characteristics of the waters affected, their historical uses, shoreland uses and classification, and other features unique to the waters affected by the rules.
- (e) The commissioner shall inform the users of the waters of the rules affecting them at least two weeks before the effective date of the rules by distributing copies of the rules and by posting of the public accesses of the waters. The failure of the commissioner to comply with this paragraph does not affect the validity of the rules or a conviction for violation of the rules.
- (f) The cost of publishing rules and of marking and posting waters under this subdivision shall be paid by the counties affected by the rules, as apportioned by the commissioner.
- (g) Regulations or ordinances relating to the use of waters of this state enacted by a local governmental unit before January 1, 1972, shall continue in effect until repealed by the local

governmental unit or superseded by a rule of the commissioner adopted under this subdivision.

## 86B.211 WATER SAFETY RULES.

The commissioner shall adopt rules that relate to:

- (1) the application for, form, and numbering of watercraft licenses;
- (2) the size, form, reflectorized material, and display of watercraft license numbers, which must comply with the requirements of the federal watercraft numbering system;
- (3) placement and regulation of docks, piers, buoys, mooring or marking devices, and other structures in the waters of this state;
  - (4) rules of the road for watercraft navigation;
- (5) standards for equipment used in the towing of persons on water skis, aquaplanes, surfboards, saucers, and other devices;
  - (6) standards for lights, signals, fire extinguishers, bilge ventilation, and lifesaving equipment;
  - (7) standards of safe load and power capacity;
  - (8) accounting, procedural, and reporting requirements for county sheriff;
  - (9) designation of swimming or bathing areas;
  - (10) standards of safety for watercraft offered for rent, lease, or hire;
- (11) the use of surface waters of this state by watercraft as provided and in accordance with section 86B.205, subdivision 9, paragraphs (c) and (d), including:
  - (i) standards and criteria for resolving conflicts in the use of water surfaces by watercraft;
  - (ii) procedures for dealing with problems involving more than one local governmental unit;
  - (iii) procedures for local enforcement; and
  - (iv) procedures for enforcing the restrictions in section 86B.205, subdivision 9, paragraph (c); and
- (12) other rules determined by the commissioner to be necessary to implement the provisions of this chapter.

## STATUTES ON LAKE IMPROVEMENT DISTRICTS

## 103B.551 BOARD OF DIRECTORS.

Subdivision 1. **Membership.** After a lake improvement district is established, the county board, joint county authority, or commissioner that established the district shall appoint persons to serve as an initial board of directors for the district. Subsequent board members must be elected by persons owning

property in the district at the annual meeting of the district. The number, qualifications, terms of office, and method of election, removal, and filling of vacancies of directors shall be as provided in the order creating the board of directors. The initial and all subsequent boards of directors must include persons owning property within the district, and a majority of the directors must be residents of the district.

- Subd. 2. Compensation. The directors shall serve with compensation as determined by the property owners at the annual meeting and may be reimbursed for their actual expenses necessarily incurred in the performance of their duties in the manner provided for county employees.
- Subd. 3. **Powers.** County boards, joint county authorities, statutory and home rule cities, and towns may, by order, delegate the powers in this section to the board of directors of a district to be exercised within the district. Programs and services undertaken must be consistent with the statewide water and related land resources plan prepared by the commissioner of natural resources and with regional water and related land resources plans. A body of water may not be improved by using authority granted under this section unless the public has access to some portion of the shoreline. County boards, joint county authorities, statutory and home rule cities, and towns may delegate their authority to a district board of directors to:
- (1) acquire by gift or purchase an existing dam or control works that affects the level of waters in the district;
- (2) construct and operate water control structures that are approved by the commissioner of natural resources under section 103G,245;
- (3) undertake projects to change the course current or cross section of public waters that are approved by the commissioner of natural resources under section 103G.245;
  - (4) acquire property, equipment, or other facilities, by gift or purchase to improve navigation;
- (5) contract with a board of managers of a watershed district within the lake improvement district or the board of supervisors of a soil and water conservation district within the district for improvements under chapters 103C and 103D;
- (6) undertake research to determine the condition and development of the body of water and the water entering it and to transmit the results of the studies to the pollution control agency and other interested authorities;
  - (7) develop and implement a comprehensive plan to eliminate water pollution;
  - (8) conduct a program of water improvement and conservation;
- (9) construct a water, sewer, or water and sewer system in the manner provided by section 444.075 or other applicable laws;
- (10) receive financial assistance from and participate in projects or enter into contracts with federal and state agencies for the study and treatment of pollution problems and related demonstration programs;
- (11) make cooperative agreements with the United States or state government or other counties or cities to effectuate water and related land resource programs;
  - (12) maintain public beaches, public docks, and other public facilities for access to the body of water;

- (13) provide and finance a government service of the county or statutory or home rule city that is not provided throughout the county or, if the government service is provided, the service is at an increased level within the district; and
  - (14) regulate water surface use as provided in sections 86B.205, 103G.605, and 103G.621.

## PARK DISTRICT STATUTES

#### 398.08 GENERAL POWERS.

Park districts shall have all the rights, powers, privileges and immunities of a municipal corporation at common law and they shall be subject to the duties of a municipal corporation at common law. Except as otherwise limited in this chapter they shall have perpetual succession, may sue and be sued, may use a corporate seal, may acquire by lease, purchase, gift, condemnation or otherwise such real and personal property as the purposes of the board may require and may hold, manage, control, sell, convey, lease or otherwise dispose of such property or its interests therein. The board shall have full authority to exercise all the powers of the district, to make all necessary or desirable contracts, to procure public liability and other insurance protection as may be necessary or desirable, to hire and employ help and assistance as its needs require, to exercise the power of eminent domain, to enact ordinances and to declare that the violation thereof shall be a penal offense and to prescribe the penalties, thereof, not to exceed a fine of \$100, or imprisonment in a statutory city or county jail for a period of not more than 90 days, or both, and in either case the cost of prosecution may be added to the penalties imposed. The board shall have full power and authority to acquire and establish parks and to operate, maintain, protect, improve and preserve a park system and to conduct a recreational program in its parks.

## 398.09 SPECIFIC POWERS (Subd. (a) only).

Park district boards in addition to the foregoing general powers shall have these specific powers:

(a) The power to regulate by ordinance the use of the waters of any lake lying wholly within a park established under this chapter and the use of any lake shore which is within a park established under this chapter and the waterfront immediately abutting such lake shore for not to exceed 300 feet therefrom, by all persons, including persons boating, swimming, fishing, skating or otherwise, in, upon or about said lake, lake shore and abutting waterfront, subject to regulation by the state of Minnesota.

## STATUTES REGARDING CITIES AND TOWNS

## 459.20 AUTHORITY OVER PUBLIC WATERS.

The governing body of any home rule charter or statutory city or town in the state has, with respect to any body of water situated wholly within its boundaries, all the powers to improve and regulate the use of such body of water subject to section 86B.205, subdivision 6, as are conferred on county boards by sections 86B.205 and 103F.801, and to establish and administer lake improvement districts under sections 103B.501 to 103B.581. With respect to any body of water situated wholly within the contiguous

boundaries of two or more home rule charter or statutory cities or towns or any combination thereof, the city councils and town boards may, under the provisions of section 471.59, jointly exercise such powers to improve and regulate the use of the body of water subject to section 103F.751, as are conferred on county boards by sections 86B.205 and 103F.801, and to establish and administer lake improvement districts as provided under sections 103B.501 to 103B.581, provided that no home rule charter or statutory city or town may establish and administer a lake improvement district or exercise any of the powers granted in this section if a lake improvement district covering the same territory has been created by a county board under sections 103B.501 to 103B.581. References in sections 86B.205, 103B.501 to 103B.581, and 103F.801 to the county board shall be construed to refer to the governing body of a home rule charter or statutory city or the board of supervisors of a town.

Be it ordained and enacted by the ( <u>County Board of Commissioners</u> , <u>City Council or Town Board</u> ), State of Minnesota, that these amendments following, by this act, hereby replace and nullify those like numbered clauses now existing and a part of ( <u>County, City or Town</u> ) Ordinance No, or are newly enacted sections which, upon their enactment, become a part of ( <u>County, City or Town</u> ) Ordinance No
Section 1: PURPOSE, INTENT AND APPLICATION: As authorized by Minnesota Statutes 86B.201, 86B.205, and 459.20, AND Minnesota Rules 6110.3000 - 6110.3800 as now in effect and as hereafter amended, this Ordinance is enacted for the purpose and with the intent to control and regulate the use of the waters of in (County, City or Town), Minnesota, said bodies of water being located entirely within the boundaries of (County, City or Town), to promote its fullest use and enjoyment by the public in general and the citizens of (County, City or Town) in particular, to insure safety for persons and property in connection with the use of said waters; to harmonize and integrate the varying uses of said waters; and to promote the general health, safety and welfare of the citizens of (County, City or Town), Minnesota.
Section 2: DEFINITIONS: Terms used in this ordinance related to boating are defined in M.S. § 86B.005.
<u>Section 3</u> : SURFACE ZONING OF <u>(specify body of water)</u> BY RESTRICTING SPEEDS DURING CERTAIN HOURS (items given are samples only to assist in drafting an ordinance – alternate restrictions may also be appropriate):
(a) During the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. on each and every day of the week, watercraft shall be subject to a 40 MPH speed limit.
(b) During the hours of 6:00 p.m. and 9:00 a.m. on the following day, on each and every day of the week, no watercraft shall be operated in excess of fifteen (15) miles per hour.
(c) Slow-no wake speed 24 hours per day when the lake level on Lake exceeds feet as measured at the gauge located at Such restrictions shall become effective upon publication in a local daily newspaper as a news item or on a specified date, whichever is later. All public watercraft accesses shall be posted prior to and during the time restrictions are in place. In addition, notice of said restrictions shall also be posted at the (Courthouse / City Hall).



As I reflect on the needs of our lake community I think there are many key points that must be considered and we should ask our representatives at the city, county and state Gov't to change the current regulations that govern our land use. As a land owner, Tri Lakes Board member, business owner and neighbor I think we must respect our environment but must also have fair use and apply distributive justice in our regulations. This is not the current state.

The use of Lake Jane and all Tri lakes are already governed but DNR and State regulations. In the 80's and the 90's additional city regulations were instituted at a time when lake levels were not controlled. With the advent of water level control with wiers and Valley Branch Watershed water control the original drivers no longer exist. As of this date Lake Jane is still well below normal water levels and the OHW and would benefit from additional water. Recent discussion about the OHW mark needs to be revisited also as it is only beneficial for building and benchmark for regulating construction via ordinance and has little meaning for the immediate lakeshore environment. I would suggest that more contemporary governance be instituted to reflect current land and water needs with change in regulations that responds to the tax base and landowners.

It is unfortunate that some of our more vocal neighbors have attempted to reclaim additional land during the recent lower water levels and now are suffering damage to their retaining walls, but the forces of nature will prevail if history is our teacher. I would suggest the city be more cautious in granting the permits to build these in times of low water and not attempt to restrict the majority from using the lake environment to protect the structures at times of normal water levels. I have reviewed the recent data from the scientific community showing that wind and weather are far more distractive than boat traffic and suggest the city/DNR be reminded of same.

I observe that the current state regulations are not usually enforced. The abuse primarily appears to be from non residents and in effect penalizes those of us that attempt to comply withy city regulations. On Lake Jane the early morning fishermen with high speed boats with wakes, Jet skis within 150 of shorelines or other boaters as well as their use in the hour before sunset is the norm not the exception. These are not usually our neighbors. Those of us that wait until noon are often the last to have access to the lake, and I suggest that it is our taxable lakeshore that allows and funds their enjoyment while we are abiding by the restrictive regulations.

It seems odd to me that in the winter that I have cars, snowmobiles and 4 wheelers within inches of my shoreline at all hours of the day and night and they have equal or more environmental impact not to mention noise and light pollution without restriction. Why can we not have summer regulations allowing us as landowners to have similar water use?

I suggest that safety be considered as well, as we compress the time for lake use we concentrate the heavy use to often half of the day, observing the chaos between noon and 1 I believe is soon to create accidents as we have already had a couple accidents as well as several near misses with kids on tubes or swimming. Expanded hours would distribute the boaters and I believe improve safety.

Lake shore values will continue to suffer more if we choose to regulate and restrict our home owners with unreasonable lake restrictions. These do not exist on many

other metro lakes and my realtor friends note that this will be a bigger problem going forward. Lets try and change to at least competitive property values by equalizing water use.

The lakes have evolved into recreational lakes. The idea of creating environmental lakes no longer exists amongst the rank and file. Though a rare individual may want to eliminate any motorized use, the funding by the state continues to drive broad use recreation and it is time we adapt by regulation for us property owners as well as off lake visitors to utilize the water as well. Stocking, ramp access, enforcement and water maintenance continues to suggest wanting diverse use not restricted use.

I would accept a 9 AM compromise for boat waves as I believe this would be accepted by most of my neighbors. I am happy to discuss this further and you are welcome to share this with the city, DNR or State.

The reason for this letter is to oppose and ask for an ordinance change of no wake restrictions on Lake Jake.

My name is Jerry Heroff; as a homeowner on the lake since 2001, my family and I strongly oppose the no wake till noon rule for many reasons:

- 1) With busy schedules (a family of five) it affects our quality time on the lake together, especially on the weekends. As we all know, summers in Minnesota are very short and our time on the lake is limited to about 3 months a year. We find ourselves staring at a lake that we cannot enjoy until 12 noon every day. We ask ourselves why and the reason we hear is because of "boat noise" which is no different from passing cars, snowmobiles, planes, dogs or any other "noise" affiliated with being alive. This makes no sense to us.
- 2) At noon on the lake, everyone is out all at once which could lead to a dangerous situation because of the sudden traffic. There is usually an all-at-once rush to be out on the lake (especially on weekends/holidays).
- 3) As a property owner and tax payer on the lake, this major restriction costs home owners thousands if not millions (combined) in lost resale value and severely deters potential buyers. It adds to the time a lakeshore property remains on the market. I experienced this myself in 2008-2009 when a potential sale of my property was lost due to this rule. The no wake till noon rule was the only reason the buyer purchased elsewhere (on a lake with no restrictions). People do not like government rules, especially when they cater to very few over all and have no valid purpose.

To summarize my take on the no wake till noon rule—it is bad for active families, discriminatory, costs the homeowners money, is unfair and does not make sense.

I ask the Mayor and the Council to please give Tri-Lakes lakeshore property owners the reasoning behind this rule other than citing "noise".

We are Jeff and Laurie Ylinen. We have lived on Lake Jane at 9401 Lake Jane Trail No. for 30 years.

We are writing to ask you to listen to the lake owners of Lake Jane, Olson and Demontreville and allow us (and the public) to use our Lakes. Please rescind the no wake decision that was put into effect on Aug 9, 2011. We think that although you thought you were trying to do the right thing, you acted too quickly and were under informed when you made that decision.

We also are asking you to remove the current no wake before noon and only drive counter clockwise rules because these rules create an unsafe and confusing condition on the lakes. Over the years we have observed that when you restrict when people can use a lake for waterskiing, tubing and other boating activities that create a wake, you cause congestion during the times that it can be used for these activities. In other words, the less time people can use a lake creates congestion during the times people can use the lake and therefore creates an unsafe and frankly not fun condition. If people could use the lake all day as Minnesota law provides, boating activity would be spread out over the day and therefore would create a more fun and safer condition on the lakes of Lake Elmo. As a homeowner on Lake Demontreville, I feel the City Council is taking away property rights of the residents by creating a "new" ordinance to please a small percentage of owners on Lakes Demontreville/Olson. Is it not the responsibility of the resident who has chosen to live on a lakeshore and/or waterway to realize that shore erosion is probable and not to build and or plant below the natural water level? Should "new" ordinances not be brought to the attention of all residents in the area that you are imposing a "new" ordinance?

Placing more restrictions on the homeowners of Lakes Demontreville/Olson, will decrease our property values because you are limiting the use of the lakes. Prospective buyers will choose to purchase homes on more user friendly lakes, thus decreasing our home values even more. This ordinance does not only effect the residence living directly on the lake, but effects all homeowners in and around Lakes Demontreville/Olson.

Dear City Council,

My family and I have lived on Lake Jane for 23 years. We love this community and the people within it and we love our lake. One of the benefits of living on a small lake in the St. Paul suburbs is that you don't have to stop talking when you are outside because of overhead plane noise or massive amounts of boat traffic. Even on a busy day like last Saturday, there were only 9 boats and 2 jet skis on the lake at the same time. Those who boat here are responsible – following the rule of boating in the same direction, and whether skiing or fishing the boat drivers are friendly, helpful, and welcomed by one another and the homeowners.

I don't believe we need to create new regulations and rules on the lake for proper use of our waters. I do believe that adding "laws" and creating "rules" which require legal enforcement, especially those that are different from 80%+ of the other lakes is completely unnecessary.

I do not ski. I do have several neighbors, however, that are very good at skiing who cannot use the calm morning waters to practice their high-level barefoot skiing. The average time any one skier barefoots is probably less than 30 minutes, and though they own their lake homes on Lake Jane, they are not allowed to use the water for the practice of their sport. That is not right.

Hove to fish. When boaters are pulling tubes full of kids or skiers around the lake, they are cautious and respectful of those sitting still and fishing. The lakes should be for everyone's use. I do not believe the mutual respect is because of regulations. I believe our rules for using and caring for Lake Jane should be the same as other Minnesota lakes.

Shoreline erosion is a concern for anyone who owns shoreline. Each homeowner needs to plan their landscaping to slow erosion and add sand as needed. For those that landscaped during the year(s) when the lake was low, the higher water levels may seem unfortunate. For those that have lived here for 2 decades and use their beaches – we have them back! The high water is a GOOD thing for many homeowners who now have access to their shore stations and can finally use their pontoons again!

At this time, we are selling our home and moving to the other side of the lake. Additional regulations that restrict lake use can only lengthen the market time (in an already long market) and lower the price (in an already depressed market).

Please, City Council, be "small government" and "by the people" rather than attempting to be "Big Government" forcing rules down everyone's throats. I would like to see the ordinances on Lake Jane removed so that they are in line with other Minnesota lakes and do not limit use.

## Dear Mayor Johnston:

I am writing to you as a former Lake Elmo resident to share with you some of our concerns with the direction of the City of Lake Elmo and why we ultimately chose to leave Lake Elmo.

I grew up in Lake Elmo on beautiful Olson Lake. When I was married, we purchased my parents home and I could think of nothing more wonderful than raising my family on Olson Lake. The biggest attribute of Lake Elmo is the small town, country feel of both the community and the landscape. For me, it was a diamond in the ruff; to find an area so untouched by the growing metropolis, while being so close to the pulse of downtown. The outdoors are an important part of our lives and raising our children to enjoy that is very important to us. Thus, Olson Lake was the perfect place to raise a family!

Over the years (34 of them) on Olson Lake, I have seen a lot of changes to the area. Over time, we did not feel the direction Lake Elmo was moving was in line with what we wanted. Thus, we decided it was in our best interest to find another lake front property and area that would better follow our vision of where we wanted our children to grow up.

Of the 34 years I spent on the shores of Olson Lake, I can count on one hand the amount of lake homes that went up for sale in the area and recall their time-on-market was always much, much shorter than the average. The bottom line . . . no one moved, and when they did, there was no shortage of people wanting a lakefront home in Lake Elmo.

When we finally put our house on the market, we fully understood the current market situation and priced our house to sell in a buyer's market. In addition, we are also part of a large water ski community (involved with several water ski teams in the area) and have access to a large network of families who are interested in lake front property.

We were shocked by what the next two years brought us. One of the biggest turn-offs to our 'desirable' lake front property was the no-wake time restrictions on the lake. Our belief was that the majority of people, who desire to live on a lake, do so for the recreational value of the lake (swimming, fishing, boating). This belief was confirmed with the numerous negative comments we received from potential buyers who were no longer interested once they discovered the no-wake time restrictions. We fully

understood that trying to sell a house in a buyer's market would be difficult; however, we consistently had showings and second showings for two full years. Although we always struggled with the unique lake restrictions, we had no idea that this would affect the sale of our home. We now have no doubt that the restrictions on the lake, not only put-off potential buyers; it ultimately contributed to the drastic drop in the value of our home.

As I drive through the neighborhood, I am amazed by the number of lake homes for sale, but even more amazed by the length of time these homes are sitting on the market and how their values continue to drop. As Mayor, you may be aware of the number of homes for sale in Lake Elmo (and the values they sell for vs. what they appraised for), but we wanted to share with you some of the comments from potential buyer's that you would otherwise not have access to (i.e. some insider insight into why lake homes in Lake Elmo aren't selling).

A lake is one of nature's beautiful gifts. It is there not only to sit as a beautiful backdrop, but also a gift for us to enjoy fully by swimming, fishing, and also boating!

- Hi, My house was for sale all of 2008. while I had it on the market, I had numerous prospective buyers that where very interested in the house. Absolutely loved it & the lay out etc, but when they found out that:
- 1. No wake or water skiing or towing the kids around on rafts or jet skiing until noon & only until the moment the sun sets, that changed their minds & they went to looking to other lakes where they could ski in the AM before going to work & use the lake like a lake should be used.
- 2. So I lost many prospective buyers that would have made an offer on my house.
- 3. It seemed also that when late spring & summer rolled around, people who wanted to live on a lake wanted to use the lake at all day light hours for water skiing, rafting, jet skiing, fishing with their bass boat & not having to go at a no wake speed to get to the other side. Less people come to my house & went to lakes such as White Bear, Bald Eagle, the ones on Hwy 36 (can't remember names). They wanted more user friendly lakes.

I eventually took my house off the market & leased it. 
