BACKGROUND:

At the October 2023 City Council meeting, the City selected Bolton and Menk to develop and prepare a new Parks Master Plan. The purpose of an updated parks master plan would help guide commissioners, council and staff over the next ten years but also provide insight on potential changes, additions and an evaluation of the current park system.

Bolton and Menk spent the next eight months gathering data and preparing documents for the next Master Plan. During this time an advisory committee was developed and included commissioner Kasler from the Parks Commission. The advisory group meet four times during the preparation of the document to assist in recommendations, suggestions and ideas for the future plan. Community input was gathered from an online survey and two pop up events held during Light up Lake Elmo and the Arbor Day tree give away event.

ISSUE BEFORE THE COMMISSION:

Would the Parks Commission like to recommend the Parks Master Plan to City Council?

PROPOSAL DETAILS/ANALYSIS:

Part of the development for a new Parks Master Plan, Bolton and Menk was asked to provide the following items in the Master Plan:

- Goals, objectives, and policy statements with a clear vision and direction for the City
- An updated City Park inventory, evaluation of existing park use layout and its facilities
- An updated trail system and network plan, identify the gaps in the existing/planned trail system
- Evaluation of existing park use, layout and facilities
- A summary of existing conditions and level of service analysis
- A major park infrastructure repair and replace schedule, considering potential changes in the existing infrastructure
- Charts, graphs, maps, and other data as needed to support the plan

In addition, Bolton and Menk was asked to consider researching and including additional information which would help map the future of Lake Elmo and the park system, they included;

- Demographic Trends
- Include compatibility with current ADA requirements
- Recommendations on removal of any obsolete facilities and inclusion on new types of recreational facilities or amenities to engage the community.

- Prioritizing recommendations for improvement to current park facilities and identify opportunities for undeveloped parks.
- Create a prioritization strategy to guide decision making and investments in the park system.
- Phased implementation plan and 20 year CIP
- Identify ideal funding sources such as grants or recreational funding

FISCAL IMPACT:

There are no financial oblations to accepting the Parks Master Plan. Funding for the plan was taken from the professional services budget.

Lake Elmo provides an expansive system of parks, trails, and open spaces for its community members and visitors to enjoy. The city's parks and trails are clean and well-maintained, and community members feel safe when visiting them. Residents frequent the park and trail system, with many making weekly trips to local neighborhood playgrounds and recreational trails. While residents value their park and recreational amenities, the city recognizes a need to keep their park system current, continue to meet the needs of the community, and continue to offer quality amenities to its residents.

The Lake Elmo Park System Plan does not seek to reinvent the park and trail system or stray too far from the original intent of past planning efforts. Instead, the plan advocates for thoughtful, community-driven improvements to the city's existing parks and trails that are rooted in an understanding of the system's history, ecology, and intended purpose.

CONTEXT

The City of Lake Elmo is located near the confluence of the St. Croix and Mississippi Rivers, just west of the Minnesota-Wisconsin border and east of St. Paul. The population of Lake Elmo is currently 13,756 people, but the city is projected to grow to upwards of 18,000 people by 2030, making it the fastest growing city in the state of Minnesota. Despite Lake Elmo's booming growth, the city has maintained a charming rural look and feel for many years, due its many acres of agricultural and farm land. The city encompasses approximately 24 square miles of land (including woodland, meadow, lakes, and wetlands) and borders many adjacent communities, including:

- Grant to the north
- Oak Park Heights, Baytown and West Lakeland Townships to the east
- Woodbury to the south
- Oakdale to the west.

With an interesting mix of rural features, natural scenery, and suburban comfort, Lake Elmo is a desirable location due to its proximity to

Minneapolis and St. Paul, accessible and high-quality neighborhoods, and many lakes and natural areas. With its picturesque farms, rolling hills, and extensive park and trail system, Lake Elmo offers a peaceful retreat from the hustle and bustle of urban life. With 18% of the city's land acreage protected as park or open space and an additional 11% of private land areas protected with a conservation easement, Lake Elmo is committed to preserving its existing natural resources and open space framework so that residents have sufficient opportunities to enjoy the great outdoors for many years to come.



COMMUNITY DEMOGRAPHICS

Taking a closer look at Lake Elmo's demographic makeup reveals a few key characteristics and insights, including:

- The city has a predominantly white population, along with smaller communities of Asian, Hispanic, and African American residents
- The median household income in Lake Elmo exceeds national averages, reflecting a relatively affluent community with well-maintained infrastructure, quality services, and thriving businesses
- The city highly values education; in fact, nearly two-thirds of the population has a bachelor's degree
- The unemployment rate in Lake Elmo is 3.5%, reflecting a healthy job market and economy
- Only 3% of households in Lake Elmo are below poverty level





THE PROCESS + PURPOSE

This park system planning process was a ninemonth project that began with an inventory and analysis of each city-owned park and open space amenity. This analysis documented park amenities, site furnishings, and notable site features, in addition to the general condition of these items at each location.

In order to provide a useful, user-friendly, and sustainable planning document for Lake Elmo, the planning team - made up of landscape architects, parks planners/designers, and community engagement specialists - had many discussions with city staff and Advisory Committee members to uncover issues affecting the city's parks, trails, and open spaces. Discussions with city staff and the Advisory Committee were facilitated by the consultant team, to better understand the history of park and trail improvements and evaluate the existing conditions of each park in the system. The Advisory Committee provided valuable insight into how community members and visitors use the park system, as well as relevant information about changes affecting the city's resources over the years.

Early in the planning process, the public was engaged through an online survey. This survey was conducted over an eight week period and resulted in participation from over 500 community members. Results from this survey helped inform the needs analysis and plan recommendations.

PAST PLANNING EFFORTS

There are a handful of past planning efforts that were considered during the creation of this report. Key plans, reports and standards that helped inform the development of this report include:

- Lake Elmo's 2040 Comprehensive Plan
- Washington County's 2040 Comprehensive Plan
- The Central Greenway Regional Trail Master Plan
- Lake Elmo's 2009 Comprehensive Parks and Recreation Plan
- Lake Elmo's Design Guidelines and Standards

The planning team used these documents to obtain background information on the city, to understand what goals and strategies have been previously developed for the city's park and trail system, and to inform the development of the recommendations (and eventual implementation strategies) included in this plan.

Some key takeaways from past planning documents related to parks, trails and open spaces in Lake Elmo include (but are not limited to):

KEY GOALS AND PRINCIPLES FROM PAST PLANNING DOCUMENTS

• Lake Elmo's 2040 Comprehensive Plan

- » Enhance existing natural resources, open space and trails to make a more complete system
- » Strengthen the existing trail network in the City, increase public connections, and improve accessibility (including pedestrian and bikeway connections)
- » Endorse and maintain the protected public open space and natural areas throughout the City
- Protect and strengthen existing park facilities and program uses according to demands of residents that use the facilities, and plan for appropriate programming and facilities in new neighborhoods
- » Explore opportunities to improve the quality of degraded, but important, natural resources in the City (i.e., impaired lakes, streams, and wetlands)

Lake Elmo's 2009 Comprehensive Parks and Recreation Plan

- » Showcase, preserve, and respect the city's natural resources and let the location of natural resources guide the placement and use of parks
- » Locate parks so that all current and prospective neighborhoods have a local park (where practical and appropriate)
- » Connect city parks to each other and to prominent destination within and outside of the city through a system of trails
- » Locate a significant park at the heart of Lake Elmo that can serve as a community gathering place and landmark

TRENDS ANALYSIS

With changes in demographics, technologies, and social and recreational trends, Lake Elmo city staff and other decision makers will need to consider how park and recreation facility and programming needs will be met as the future unfolds. After all, park and recreation trends are ever-changing, can vary by region or climate, and are often impacted by social influences. In order to better adapt to future demands, city staff will need to be nimble and flexible in response to the ever-changing needs and desires of the public.

THE IMPACTS OF CLIMATE CHANGE

Unfortunately, climate change has already started to have and impact on parks, trails, and other recreational environments. Heatwaves, droughts, floods, and other extreme weather events have become more frequent in the last decade, impacting not only the landscape but also the enjoyability of parks, trails and open spaces. In coming years, communities must develop strategies to adapt and evolve to the changing conditions the world is facing.

Implementing green infrastructure (e.g., rain gardens, permeable pavements, bioswales, etc.), preserving, protecting and expanding natural resources, and integrating climate resilience into park planning and management are just a few ways to counteract the impacts climate change is having on our health and well-being.

Since the COVID-19 pandemic began in early 2020, the workplace has shifted quite substantially. As communities around the world went on lock-down, a large portion of the workforce began working from home. As a way to get outdoors and engage in physical activity while still adhering to social distancing guidelines, many community members turned to their city's parks, trails and open spaces to recreate, and continue to do so post-pandemic.

Many workers have reallocated the time they spent commuting to activities that enhance their wellbeing and leisure time, including walking, biking, and outdoor recreation.

TECHNOLOGY IN THE PARK SYSTEM

Technological innovation, including the use of artificial intelligence, has already had a large impact on the park and recreation industry in recent years. For example, advancements to AI chatbots, AI algorithms, and AI-assisted analytics have allowed park and recreation staff to more quickly respond to shifts in park usage and public demand for informations, more efficiently process data to make operations and maintenance decisions and predictions, and more accurately monitor community safety and security.

Location analytics companies such as StreetLight can analyze geolocated devices without compromising privacy, therefore providing park and recreation agencies with more detailed information about their community members' interactions with the park system.






Figure 2.9: Electronic and interactive wayfinding kiosks provide helpful information to park users

TREND 5 PICKLEBALL

As the fastest-growing recreational sport in the nation, pickleball can be found in many communities across the country. However, there are concerns over the noise that comes from pickleball courts. These concerns have prompted many park and recreation agencies to reconsider where to site new pickleball courts. Demand for new courts may warrant the conversion of underutilized tennis courts to pickleball courts.

Recreation trends generally shift based on societal changes and preferences over time. In recent years, there has been a rise in non-traditional and informal recreation in parks, trails, and open spaces across the country. Often times, non-traditional and informal activities are more inclusive and appeal to a wider range of people, which encourages participation from folks of all backgrounds and age groups.

As recreation in parks and trails continues to become more informal, cities will need to reconsider their recreational offerings and adjust accordingly. A few examples of informal recreation include mountain biking, hiking, horseback riding, disc golf, dancing, geocaching, pickleball, skateboarding, and seasonal/holiday-themed sports.



Inventory and analysis is an essential component to the park system planning process. In order to make informed and appropriate decisions to address the diverse park and trail-related needs of the community, a deep understanding of the current state of the city's parks and trails is required.

This assessment looks at the quantity, distribution, quality, and current use of the various elements of the systems. The data is collected and compared to standards and benchmarks provided by the National Recreation and Parks Association (NRPA), as well as park planning principles including level of service. Local input from residents, volunteers, and city staff also provide critical information about the system and its use.

OVERVIEW

APPROACH

The recreational opportunities that Lake Elmo's parks, trails, and open spaces provide are vital to maintaining the quality of life that community members in the city value. These public spaces are integral parts of the city's infrastructure and are proactively managed.

As part of the park and trail system planning effort, the planning team collaborated with city staff and key stakeholders to develop near-term and long-range improvements that will assist them in directing decision making and allocating resources toward a clearly defined vision for the community's park and trail system. Community input was gathered using a comprehensive and engaging outreach process that prioritized accessibility for all park and trail users. This approach created opportunities for the public to inform and educate the planning team about the future park and trail system they'd like to see.

The goal of this park system planning process is to support the vision of a healthy, sustainable, and maintainable park and trail system and to discover creative, efficient, and long-term solutions to issues affecting those systems. Lake Elmo needs a plan they can use to guide decision making - a plan they can reference when deciding to take topics and considerations to the parks commission or city council.

PROCESS PRINCIPLES

The planning process was guided by seven overarching principles. These principles aim to provide a plan that propels Lake Elmo's parks and trails system into the next 10 years and beyond.

VISIONARY

The plan should reflect the community's shared concerns, aspirations, and anticipated future growth

COMMUNITY ORIENTED

The plan should engage the community throughout the process to ensure outcomes are responsive and authentic of Lake Elmo and embraced by the community

INCLUSIVE

The plan should intentionally incorporate changing demographics, disparate viewpoints, needs, and accessibility with the intent of hearing and acknowledging all voices

ACCESSIBLE

The plan should be easy to read and use, avoid technical terms when possible, and emphasize visuals (e.g., photos, infographics, etc.)

ACTION ORIENTED

The plan should focus on implementable tools with specific, measurable outcomes while being adaptable to future change

CONNECTED

The plan should create opportunities for all stakeholders to connect to open space, greenways, trails, parks, and conservation areas, thereby building environmental stewardship and strengthening relationships to the outdoors and healthy lifestyles

STRATEGIC

The plan should be thoughtful and pragmatic while challenging conventional wisdom when needing to achieve an outcome, as well as recognize and incorporate the economic benefits of a strong park and recreation system

INVENTORY OF THE SYSTEM

INVENTORY

With over 500 acres of city parkland and more than 80 miles of trails, Lake Elmo has quite an extensive park and trail system for residents and visitors to enjoy and explore. In late 2024, the planning team and city staff had an opportunity to conduct an inventory of the city's substantial park and trail system to better understand each park's existing amenities and features, as well as record the condition/state they're currently in. With an updated and in-depth inventory of Lake Elmo's many parks, trails, and open spaces, the city will be able to better track the condition of their park equipment and implement a plan and timeline for their continued maintenance and replacement.

Currently, Lake Elmo's park and trail system supports a variety of recreational opportunities, including organized sports, casual play, nature appreciation, hiking, cross-country skiing, horseback riding, picnicking, relaxing, and many other outdoor activities. Each park in the system provides quality recreation facilities and open spaces for the community to use while still maintaining the history, setting, character, and use that makes each park unique.

To better understand how well Lake Elmo is meeting the recreational needs of the community, each park's assets (e.g., natural resources, recreational facilities, amenities, etc.) And issues (e.g., environmental limitations, infrastructure problems, accessibility, etc.) were identified during the park inventory process. Some key takeaways and insights drawn from the park inventory process include:

- Park acreage and distribution and trail mileage in Lake Elmo are good; most of the gaps in park and trail connectivity occur in the north-central and southeastern portions of the city
- Lake Elmo has a nice variety of park types, including mini parks, neighborhood parks, community parks, and a Washington County regional park, all of which serve the community in important ways
- Lake Elmo's park facilities and amenities are generally in good, working condition; however, some park features (e.g., playgrounds, ballfields, shelters, etc.) are currently not meeting the needs of the community or not functioning to meet demand
- Park and trail connectivity is reduced by a lack of wayfinding, infrastructure restraints, and unsafe pedestrian crossings on busy streets





FIGURE 3.4 | EXISTING + PROPOSED TRAILS MAP



PARK CLASSIFICATIONS

NRPA PARK CLASSIFICATION STANDARDS

Lake Elmo contains a variety of park types which can be distinguished from one another based upon their unique sizes, characteristics, and intended uses. To help park and recreation professionals more effectively manage their park systems and resources, the NRPA developed a set of park classifications, agency benchmarks, and service area and facility quidelines (all described in further detail in following pages) for agencies to utilize. Many park and recreation agencies use these resources to compare how their community's amenities stack up against other communities at a national level. Incorporating these metrics into the park system master planning process can lead to more informed decisions, better resource allocation, improved equity, and a higher likelihood of successful implementation and long-term sustainability.

According to Lake Elmo's 2040 Comprehensive Plan, the city contains the following park classifications:





EXISTING PROGRAMMING

COMMUNITY PROGRAMMING + EDUCATION OPPORTUNITIES

Lake Elmo offers a variety of recreational facilities and amenities in their park system, but the city has limited staff and lacks a recreation programming department to assist in facilitating programmed events and opportunities. In the future, the city should consider developing a programming coordinator position to get the ball rolling on a programming to help activate Lake Elmo parks.

The Stillwater Area Public Schools Community Education organization offers Lake Elmo residents of all ages, including infants, children, teens, parents, adults, and seniors, opportunities to recreate, socialize, and get involved locally. Some of their offerings for this spring and summer include (but are not limited to):

- 50 adult classes for activities like strength and conditioning, golf skills, pickleball and tennis lessons, kayaking lessons, bird watching, social media use, etc.
- 129 youth classes and camps for activities like golf, cheer, ninja/parkour, sports, architecture and design, art, theater, etc.
- 23 early childhood family education classes

Washington County also offers a variety of programs and events for folks in Lake Elmo to engage in. Some of these events and programs include bird hikes, dog days in the ravine, yoga in the park, learning to bike, forest bathing, and more. Many of these activities occur in Lake Elmo Park Reserve, which is situated in the heart of the city and easy for residents of Lake Elmo to access.

NRPA AGENCY BENCHMARKS

PARK AND RECREATION AGENCY BENCHMARKS

To support the wide range of needs, interests and lifestyles of park and trail users in their communities, park and recreation agencies must offer a variety of facilities, amenities, and programming opportunities. This requires the right amount of staff to support the development and continued maintenance of those facilities and amenities.

In the 2024 NRPA Agency Performance Review report, a number of top-line findings pertaining to park facilities, programming, the responsibilities of park and recreation agencies, staffing, budget, agency funding, and policies are described. Some highlights from those top-line findings are shown to the right. The table on the next page provides a brief overview of various NRPA agency benchmarks and compares the typical U.S. park and recreation agency to Lake Elmo. A few key takeaways from the table include:

- In terms of the number of parks, park acreage, trail mileage, and acres of parkland per 1,000 residents, Lake Elmo is well above the typical park and recreation agency
- Lake Elmo has very limited park and recreation agency staffing and therefore has fewer fulltime staff members per 10,000 residents than is typical; more staff is needed to accommodate an ever expanding city and park and trail system
- Lake Elmo spends much less in operating expenditures than the typical park and recreation agency; annual operating expenditures are also much lower than the typical agency

SERVICE AREA + FACILITY GUIDELINES

RECREATION FACILITY SERVICE STANDARDS

The recreation facility service standards included in the following pages identify a minimum level of service needed for convenient access to recreation in indoor and outdoor facilities. The following standards also list the minimum number of facilities recommended in the community (per population), the recommended service area of each of the indoor and outdoor facilities, the target range/recommended quantity of each facility type, the current number of each facility in Lake Elmo, the amount of excess or deficit of each facility based on the minimum number recommended, and any additional notes that speak toward the proximity of each facility in adjacent communities or areas. In general, Lake Elmo lacks indoor recreation

facilities (e.g., aquatic centers, community centers, indoor ice rinks, senior centers, etc.), although a number of indoor recreation facilities are located in nearby communities, like Stillwater and Oak Park Heights. On the other hand, there are a number of outdoor recreation facilities in Lake Elmo for folks to utilize. The community does like iconic facilities like a splash pad, outdoor swimming pool, and skate park, though.

As outlined in Chapter 2 of this report, park and recreation trends are constantly shifting. As new activities and programs gain popularity in the community, the city will need to remain flexible and responsive to the changing needs of its residents.




FIGURE 3.7 | PLATTED RESIDENTIAL DEVELOPMENT MAP







FIGURE 3.8 | NEIGHBORHOOD PARK GAP MAP (Hwy 36) DEMONTREVILLE PARK Keats Ave N KLEIS PARK CARRIAGE STATION PARK Lake Olson Lake DeMontreville TANA RIDGE PARK Jane Old Elementary School Site LAKE JANE HILL PARK PEBBLE PARK Manning Sunfish Lake Ave N VFW PARK LIONS PARK Stillwater Blvd REID PARK 0 TABLYN PARK HEIGHTS PARK HERITAGE PARK Lake Elmo Inwood Ave 0 Downs Lake RIDGE PARK Eagle Point Lake Horseshoe Lake **Future Elementary** School D 10th St N Goose Lake Armstrong Oakland GOOSE LAKE PARK Middle School **IVYWOOD PARK** Lake Elmo Ave STONEGATE PARK Keats Ave N Kramer Lake (1-94) (1-94) 0.5 Miles 0 0 Legend Municipal Boundaries School Site Regional Parks Markgrafs 1/4 Mile Railroads Community Parks Walking Radius 1/2 Mile Walking Radius Water Bodies Neighborhood Parks Rivers & Streams Natural Resource Protection Areas











FIGURE 3.13 | ALL PARK DISTRIBUTION AND GAP ANALYSIS MAP



PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT SUMMARY

COORDINATION WITH CITY STAFF AND THE ADVISORY COMMITTEE

With an invigorated interest in completing a park system plan to help quide the future of their parks, trails and open spaces, the city decided to prioritize the development of this report in 2023. Throughout the planning process, the planning team has worked closely with city staff and a number of Advisory Committee members in the overall development of the plan, as they have been able to provide local expertise on the park and trail system, highlight potential deficiencies, and guide outcomes of the project (in conjunction with input collected through public engagement). There were several meetings with members of city staff during the development of this plan and four meetings with the Advisory Committee. These meetings focused on topics ranging from existing conditions in the parks to potential improvement recommendations for improvement.

PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT EVENTS

During the development of this plan, the planning team hosted two in-person engagement events: Light Up Lake Elmo and the Arbor Day Tree Giveaway. Light Up Lake Elmo is an annual event and gathering downtown where community members can engage in winter activities, meet Mr. and Mrs. Claus, and take part in a tree lighting ceremony. The Arbor Day Tree Giveaway event also occurs annually. It provides residents with an opportunity to pick up a tree sapling they can take home and plant in appreciation of Arbor Day. Both events were a success, with many stopping by to provide feedback on the plan and its recommendations. Key findings from those events are included in the following two pages.

COMMUNITY SURVEY OVERVIEW

The planning team launched the community survey to residents of Lake Elmo in December of 2023. The survey was live for approximately four months and was accessible online through a shareable web link. While the survey was live, city staff, the Advisory Committee, and the planning team spread the word throughout Lake Elmo. In the end, over 500 participants provided input through the community survey.

The following pages provide a summary of the community input received from the community survey and various in-person engagement events. A full report of results from the survey can be found in the appendix of this plan.

SWOT ANALYSIS

Early in the planning process, the Advisory Committee was asked to assist in developing a visual SWOT (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, Threats) Analysis. The findings from that exercise are listed below. These findings were strongly supported by community feedback both in the survey and at engagement events. Key takeaways from the exercise include:

STRENGTHS

- » Excellent culture around parks and nature
- » County and state partnerships
- » Many park, facility and activity options, especially for a smaller town
- » Considerable acreage for well-used parks
- » City is not entirely developed (there is open space for further park + trail development)
- » Sunfish Lake Park a 280 acre natural park that provides a great nature experience
- » Lake Elmo Park Reserve (Washington County)
- » Tranquil feel in neighborhood and community parks

- » Lack of conservation of natural open areas
- » Many areas impacted by invasive species





HOW LONG HAVE YOU BEEN A RESIDENT?







Although the community developed a city-wide vision statement in the 2040 Comprehensive Plan, it was not entirely specific to Lake Elmo's park and trail system. To ensure the long-term success of this park system plan, the planning team engaged with a variety of stakeholders to develop an updated vision statement - a statement that can be adapted over time to more accurately reflect the community's needs and aspirations for their park and trail system - as well as several guiding principles and values.

The vision statement and guiding principles in this section of the report are meant to serve as a guiding framework for the successful development and management of Lake Elmo's park and trail system. As the community's needs related to parks, trails, and open spaces evolve, the city should reflect on this vision statement and set of guiding principles and make adjustments as needed.

THE VISION

VISION STATEMENT

It's no secret that the urbanization of some areas in Lake Elmo is happening and has accelerated over the years. With a massive boom in growth over the past decade, preserving and improving Lake Elmo's park and trail system is of the utmost importance. While the city has adequately maintained park facilities and amenities thus far, they will need to adapt their offerings and increase staff support to satisfy the needs of residents in the future.

In order to best plan for the future of Lake Elmo's park and trail system, the planning team collaborated with a number of stakeholders, including city staff, Advisory Committee members, and the general public to develop a unified community vision statement. It reads:



Lake Elmo's parks, trails, and open spaces shall provide convenient access to a wide range of opportunities for all residents to recreate and connect.

THE GUIDING PRINCIPLES

GUIDING PRINCIPLES

Similarly, collaboration with city staff, the Advisory Committee, and the community led to the creation of four guiding principles specific to Lake Elmo's parks, trails, and open spaces. These guiding principles provide an overarching framework to help inform the development of the goals, policies, and initiatives found in the recommendations section of this report. During the planning process, they helped define the actions that should be taken to achieve the vision for Lake Elmo's park and trail system. Guiding principles for this plan include:

This plan should provide guidance and recommendations that are implementable, maintainable, and sustainable.

This plan should assist the city in adapting to ever-changing trends in park and recreation, as well as Lake Elmo's rapidly growing population



RECOMMENDATIONS

The following recommendations were informed by community input and engagement, feedback from a variety of stakeholders and city staff, and an in-depth inventory and analysis of the existing conditions, city context, and amenities and facilities in Lake Elmo's parks and trail system. The following recommendations are meant to provide a comprehensive approach to preserving, restoring, and enhancing Lake Elmo's parks, trails and open spaces. Depending on available funding and partnership opportunities in the community, it is intended that the following improvements will be phased. The information provided here is intended for planning and budgeting purposes, and each project will require additional exploration and design to refine project scope and cost expectations.

This section of the report dives into recommended improvements for five aspects of the system: parks, facilities, connectivity, open space and preserves, and operations and maintenance. Preliminary budgetary costs for specific actions associated with select initiatives are identified in further detail in the next section of this report.

OVERVIEW

The following pages provide a set of goals, policies, and initiatives that the city can follow to improve their parks, facilities, connectivity, open spaces and preserves, and operations and maintenance. The recommendations in this section of the report are organized in the following way:

1. Goal 1.1 Policy1.1.1 Initiative

Goal = broad statements that describe a desired outcome and are often long-term

Policy = the general way in which programs and activities are conducted to achieve a goal, and reflect underlying values or principle

Initiative = practices that support policy statements and may identify the "who, what, when, where, and how" of achieving a goal or policy

PARK RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Provide access to parks for all residents to foster community connectedness, health, and wellbeing

- 1.1 Ensure all residents have safe and convenient access to a great park within a 10 to 15 minute walk from their home (1/2 mile to 3/4 mile radius)
 - » 1.1.1 Work to fill the park access gap in the southeast and north central areas of the city when development occurs
 - » 1.1.2 Plan for future park integration by:
 - * Adding parks as the community grows
 - * Requiring the dedication of parkland in strategic locations that aligns with the long term goals for park size, access and amenities
 - * Locating parks with at least one side along a public road
 - * Planning for the inclusion of off-street parking areas
 - » 1.1.3 Connect parks to neighborhoods, destinations, and other parks by adding trail and sidewalk connections that link to a greater trail network
- 1.2 Provide a distributed network of neighborhood parks that meet resident's current and future day-to-day needs
 - » 1.2.1 Ensure every neighborhood park has a playground or play feature, a flex field for informal play and recreation, and a special or distinctive feature to distinguish it from other parks
 - » 1.2.2 Ensure every neighborhood park has a seating option, picnic table, bike rack, shade (trees or structure), trash and recycling receptacles, and park identification sign.
 - » 1.2.3 Classify Hidden Knoll and Pilot Park as neighborhood parks, and Reclassify Firefly and Hammes from a Natural Resource Protection Area to a neighborhood park
- 1.3 Provide a network of special use parks that provide residents access to unique features and special places
 - » 1.3.1 Reclassify Goose Lake Park to special use, providing visitors with access to Goose Lake
 - » 1.3.2 Reclassify Sunfish Lake Park from community park to special use
 - » 1.3.3 Look for opportunities to develop a special use or mini park in the Old Village, and/or support the private development of public space in the Old Village

- 1.4 Provide a network of community parks that provide residents and visitors a place to gather for special occasions or use
 - » 1.4.1 Combine Ivywood and Stonegate Parks into one park, reclassify the combined park as a community park, and rename it with a hybrid of Ivywood and Stonegate:
 - * Develop a long-range plan for this new park, working with the community to evaluate the addition of off-street parking and recreational amenities
 - » 1.4.2 Reclassify Lions Park, Pebble Park, Tablyn Park, and Reid Park from neighborhood to community park
 - » 1.4.3 Ensure every community park has a seating option, picnic table, bike rack, shade (trees or structure), trash and recycling receptacles, entry signage, informational kiosk, a drinking fountain, and shelter
 - » 1.4.4 Develop Lions Park as Lake Elmo's destination community park:
 - * Develop a long-range plan for Lions Park that maximizes its functionality as a community gathering place for larger events and strengthens its connection to downtown
 - * Track opportunities to expand Lions Park
- 1.5 Provide a network of athletic parks dedicated to meeting the needs of recreational, league, and tournament play baseball and softball
 - » 1.5.1 Reclassify VFW Park from neighborhood to athletic park and support competitive and town ball play here
 - » 1.5.2 Develop a new athletic park to support baseball and softball (competitive and town ball for ages 9+)
- 1.6 Encourage residents to take an active role in the development of their parks
 - » 1.6.1 Continue to engage residents and park users in the planning and design process when updating existing or adding new parks
 - » 1.6.2 Support volunteer efforts at parks for/after gatherings, events, and clean-up days
 - » 1.6.3 If demand warrants, provide extra amenities at parks such as portable restrooms and posting boards




Figure 5.6: Pocket parks provide gathering opportunities in relatively small spaces, often transforming underutilized areas into community assets

2. Provide a system of recreational facilities to meet the active and passive needs of residents

- 2.1 Provide a mix of recreational activities to meet a wide range of needs
 - » 2.1.1 Look to add a special facility to meet the needs of tweens, teens, and young adults; consider a challenge-course facility, skate park, or disc golf course
 - » 2.1.2 Look to provide additional court facilities in the southeast area of the city; engage with neighbors to determine type of court (tennis, pickleball, basketball, volleyball, or other)
 - » 2.1.3 Look to provide additional field space in the southeast area of the city; engage with neighbors, clubs, and organizations to determine type and size of field (flex, lacrosse, football, soccer, etc.)
- 2.2 Provide places for larger group gatherings by providing higher amenity shelters at select community parks
 - » 2.2.1 Look to develop a reservable shelter with potable water, electrical, and permanent restrooms
- 2.3 Distribute playgrounds or play features for children of all ages and abilities throughout the community, taking into consideration the needs and demographics of the surrounding neighborhood
 - » 2.3.1 When replacing or adding new equipment, add play features designed for the following age ranges:
 - * 6 to 24 months
 - * 2 to 5 years
 - * 5 to 12 years
 - * Ages 13+
 - » 2.3.2 When replacing or adding new equipment, incorporate inclusive play features that are accessible to those using mobility devices

- 2.4 Provide year-round opportunities for outdoor recreation
 - » 2.4.1 Look to add winter facilities and activities in the city (e.g., ice skating, cross country skiing, etc.)
 - » 2.4.2 Explore the opportunity to add fire pits into parks where appropriate, beginning with a pilot site to test success
- 2.5 Communicate regularly with local organizations, associations, and clubs to understand their changing needs
- 2.6 Increase access to water-based recreation opportunities
 - » 2.6.1 Support the addition of a fishing pier in Sunfish Lake Park
 - » 2.6.2 Look for opportunities to add boat launches, fishing piers, and swimming beaches
 - » 2.6.3 Share and publicize the locations of fishing piers, boat launches, swimming beaches, and nearby aquatic facilities in online and paper maps
 - » 2.6.4 Explore the possibility of partnering with Washington County to give Lake Elmo residents free access to Lake Elmo Park Reserve, which has boat launches, a fishing pier, and a sim pond




Figure 5.14: Fishing piers provide park visitors with increased access to water-based recreation opportunities

FIGURE 5.16 | PARK AMENITY DISTRIBUTION MAP




FIGURE 5.17 | WINTER ACTIVITY DISTRIBUTION MAP




FIGURE 5.18 | WATER ACCESS DISTRIBUTION MAP





FIGURE 5.19 | PLAYGROUND DISTRIBUTION AND SCHEDULED REPLACEMENT MAP



CONNECTIVITY RECOMMENDATIONS

- 3. Provide a system of trails and sidewalks that connect neighborhoods, parks, schools, community destinations, and neighboring communities safely throughout the city to encourage active living and recreation
- 3.1 Work to fill existing gaps in the trail system, prioritizing safety, connectivity, and cost
 - » 3.1.1 Address gaps identified in the Connectivity Recommendations + Search Corridors Map
 - » 3.1.2 Explore additional trail connections to and through the southeastern and north-central portions of the city (through easements or land purchases)
 - » 3.1.3 Prioritize trails that connect to schools, neighborhood and community parks, and other community destinations to improve safety for younger populations




Figure 5.24: Lake Elmo does not currently have a snow removal plan for trails, which causes confusion for some community members


FIGURE 5.26 | CONNECTIVITY RECOMMENDATIONS + SEARCH CORRIDORS MAP

8. Expand the city's capacity to maintain and grow the park and trail system

- 8.1 Explore partnerships to supplement the city's capacity for maintenance, programming, and improvements (work with recreation clubs and associations, businesses, and other public agencies)
 - » 8.1.1 Explore opportunities for revenue generation
 - » 8.1.2 Explore opportunities for the use of volunteers to support maintenance or programs
 - » 8.1.3 Investigate the use of bonds or tax levies to support the system
 - » 8.1.4 Work with private property owners who may be interested in donating land or granting easements
- 8.2 Explore staffing and departmental updates to respond to increased demands on the system
 - » 8.2.1 Explore the creation of dedicated Parks and Forestry departments
 - » 8.2.2 Explore the addition of a program manager to begin offering programming in parks and preserves to activate parks, such as yoga in the park or stargazing events

This section will touch on the importance of establishing priorities for recommendation improvements, explore potential funding mechanisms and opportunities, and suggest a path to implementation moving forward. Public partners and local community groups - including residents, the local government, the school district, local businesses, developers, and other partnering agencies - must work together to fully realize the vision for Lake Elmo's parks, trails, and open space system.

SETTING PRIORITIES

Over the years, Lake Elmo has worked to align funding and mechanisms for land acquisition, facility additions and improvements, trail development, and operations and maintenance. Without a formal parks and recreation department in place, however, the city has been unable to develop an efficient process for prioritizing improvements and identifying potential funding resources. The city is in need of an adaptable and flexible framework to help guide the development, improvement, and projected maintenance of future park, trail, and open space assets.

The priorities in this plan are drawn from the improvement recommendations identified in the Chapter 5. They are organized into five key topic areas, including:

- Parks
- Facilities
- Connectivity
- Open Space and Preserves
- Operations and Maintenance

Many factors informed the prioritization of recommendations in this report, including community and stakeholder input, the availability of city resources (e.g., time, staff, funding, etc.), and alignment with past planning documents, among other factors. Depending on staff resources, funding, and need, some initiatives will be easier and faster to achieve, while other may warrant a long-term commitment to implement. This plan anticipates the cumulative improvements for the park and trail system will be completed in phases as funding is available and opportunities for public and private partners arise.

In the future, as city staff prepares to implement park and trail-related improvements, they should continue to keep residents involved/updated through social media outlets and the city website's "Park Notices" tab (Home > Departments > Parks > Park Notices).

The following pages include an implementation matrix which provides information about the improvement recommendations' priority levels and planning-level budget estimates. Following the matrix is a compilation of funding resources for Lake Elmo to explore.



Q4 What age groups are represented in your household? (Select all that apply)





Q5 How important are parks, trails, and open space to the overall quality of life in Lake Elmo?





Q11 Which of the following park/open spaces do you visit most often? (Select up to three)






Q12 Of the parks you visit most, how frequently do you visit?







BACKGROUND:

As part of the March 19, 2018 Parks Commission Meeting a proposal was brought forward and discussed with the recommendation of the Parks Commission to transform the existing tennis court area into a multi-use Pickle Ball and Hockey Rink with boards which encompassed the area. This proposal was approved by City Council and construction was completed in 2019.

In the past two years staff have had an increase in the number of complaints regarding the conditions of the pickle ball courts at Lions Park which included cracking of the surface and pealing of the color coating. In April, 2024 staff removed one of the playing nets from the area due to the surface causing a tripping hazard. Staff noticed under the surface layer of paint was also a deteriorating layer of asphalt. C&H Sport Surfacing provided the city with a review of the courts. It was noted, deterioration of the asphalt will likely continue and resurfacing the courts with paint would not hold up.

Using the area as an ice rink in the winter and pickle ball courts in the summer has created issues with the pickle ball surface and underlying asphalt. The freeze and thawing action of the ice during our winter months causes the current cracks to become larger and more define in a short period of time. In order to hold water in the rink, the center drain is plugged in the winter months. This causes the water to sit on the surface longer and go through the freeze/thaw cycle for an extended period of time. Staff suggests using the area for only one sport to minimize court damage.

ISSUE BEFORE THE COMMISION:

What would the parks commission recommend to do with the multi-use area?

PROPOSAL DETAILS/ANALYSIS:

The pickle ball courts at Lions Park have been heavily used since their install in 2019 and the sport has seen a large increase in the amount of players. The city currently has one other pair of pickle ball courts in Ivywood Park and is awaiting the completion of 10 additional courts in Pebble and Tablyn Parks before June. Benefits of keeping pickle ball in Lions Park is the ability to have lighting in early summer and fall and its proximity to the downtown area. Pickle ball courts have minimal maintenance for staff. Set up and removal of the nets in the spring and fall

along with weekly garbage pickup. Courts should be resurfaced every 5-7 years, cost to resurface the area could cost \$10,000-\$14,000.

Currently Lions Park is the only city owed ice rink within our parks system. In the past staff has flooded additional areas near the rink to make for an additional pleasure rink. Benefits of keeping the rink is the lighted area and Dasher Boards for the use of hockey. Keeping the area as an ice rink has more associated maintenance cost. Flooding of the rink takes up to several days of staff time in the early mornings to establish good ice and then routine flooding a fewtimes a week to maintain a top layer of ice for skating. Each year staff can use 10,000 gal of water to fill the rink for its first use. Snow removal from the rink is normally completed 1-2 days after a snowfall and depends on staff availability, the season temperatures and snow fall totals.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Costs of utilizing the court for one sport may vary over time. Commissioners should consider future funding to resurface the area as soon as 2025 if the intent is to keep it for pickle ball use. If the intention is to keep the area hockey, Public Works would being making changes in 2025, which would include PW labor and equipment, disposal of the existing asphalt, the use of our existing millings stock pile and some additional class 5 lime rock on the surface to lessen the dark color that the sun would use to melt ice. Estimated cost for this would not exceed \$5000 and would be funded from Public Works Operating Expenses

Keeping the area for pickle ball only could cost up to \$75,000 the first year and an additional \$10,000 - \$14,000 every 7 years. Due to the deteriorating the surface layer, staff would suggest milling the top wear course of the asphalt and resurfacing the playing areas.

OPTIONS:

Option 1: Utilizing the area as an Ice Rink Only.

Making use of the area as an ice rink only will eliminate the cost of resurfacing the area every 5-7 years. Staff would cap the center drain, remove the asphalt and fill the area flat with aggregate material. This will provide a flat area to make ice and eliminate the soft spot which is created by the drain.

Option 2: Resurface for Pickle ball only

Utilizing the area for pickle ball only will reduce staff time and reduce water use. Staff would contract a frim to mill the wear layer, repave the courts followed by resurfacing the area.

BACKGROUND:

A Capital Improvement Program, or CIP, is a multi-year capital expenditure plan for a City's infrastructure (such as streets, parks and utility systems), equipment and public buildings. The CIP identifies the major projects needed and desired by the community, their potential costs and how they would be financed. A project or purchase identified and budgeted through the CIP does not commit the City to that project. The City Council must specifically authorize each one and the associated funding for the expenditure before any project may proceed. When the CIP is reviewed (ideally annually, in conjunction with the budgeting process) projects may go forward as planned, advance ahead of schedule, be removed entirely, or new projects may be added. These adjustments are dependent upon changes in circumstances and priorities.

The Minnesota Land Planning Act requires that the implementation plan portion of the Comprehensive Plan include a CIP for major infrastructure needs (transportation, wastewater, water supply, parks and open space) for a five-year time period. Cities often expand the scope of their CIPs to include other capital needs (major equipment replacements, for example) and sometimes look beyond the five-year time period, up to 20 years in the future for some projects. Such projects represent more of a "wish-list" that can be evaluated each time the plan is updated.

As a part of the Comprehensive Plan, the CIP has some legal standing. Minnesota Statutes Chapter 473.865 provides that "a local governmental unit shall not adopt any official control or fiscal device which is in conflict with its comprehensive plan." A fiscal device includes a budget or bond issue; so it is important that the plan and CIP be kept up to date and in synch with city budgets.

The primary benefit of a CIP is as a financial planning tool, to help the City plan for the impact of capital needs on future budgets and property taxes, and to help forecast the need for borrowing to undertake major projects. The information developed as part of the capital planning process can help document the need for various projects and help the City Council sort out competing priorities.

Lake Elmo's CIP includes all capital projects that cost at least \$25,000 and have a useful life span of five years or longer.

ISSUE BEFORE COMMISSION:

What park improvements would the Commission like recommend in the 2025-2034 CIP?

PROPOSAL DETAILS/ANALYSIS:

The following items carry over from the 2024-2033 CIP and address the next five years of CIP items:

Dedication Funds

- 1. New Ballfields Grants/ Donations (\$1,000,000)
- 2. Central Greenway Regional Trail (\$300,000)
- 4. Stonegate Park- Play equipment replacement 2027. (3) (\$125,000)
- 5. Carraige Station-Play equipment replacement 2028. (3) (\$125,000)
- 6. Ridge Park Play equipment replacement 2026. (3) (\$125,000)
- 7. Klies Playground Replacement 2025. (3) (\$65,000)
- 8. Tablyn Park Play equipment replacement 2026 (3) \$(95,000)
- 9. Lions Park Concession Building updates 2027. (3) (\$65,000)
- 10. Court Resurfacing 2026. (3) (\$30,000)

Staff recommends adjusting and adding the following to the 2024-2033 CIP:

- 1. Reid Park Parking lot **2025** (3) \$227,000
 - -Replace existing pavement & Curb, increase parking area and reconstruct trail from 30th to the ballfield.
- 2. Increase Lions Park Play Equipment Replacement by \$125,000 move up **2026** (3) Total: \$250,000 -Larger playset for central park location
- 3. Move PR-046 Outdoor Fitness Park to 2026.
 - Find suitable location with use of PMP.
- 4. Increase Utility Vehicle/Trail groomer by \$10,000. **2026** (3) Total: \$50,000 -Due to increase in product
- 5. Add Pavilion/Trails/Basketball to Tablyn Park Playground Replacement. **2026** (3) \$210,000 -Make project to include additional items in one year vs multiple.
- 6. Increase Lions Park Concession Building Updates by \$210,000. **2027** (2) Total: \$275,000 -Make appropriate ADA bathrooms and make needed improvements to the concession area and building
- 7. Increase Carriage Station Play Equipment replacement by \$125,000 **2028** (4) Total \$250,000 Multiple playsets and include concrete boarder
- 8. Court Resurfacing **2030** (3) \$30,000
 - -Resurface pickle ball courts which were installed in 2024
- 9. Trail Connection from Wildflower into Tana Ridge. **2029** (4) \$200,000
 - -Acquire easement or land to construct a trail connection.
- 10. Park Entrance Sign replacement. 2030 (4) \$225,000
 - -Redesign Park entrance sign for all city parks

Other Items? If there are other items that the Parks Commission would like to see added or removed in the 2024-2033 CIP they should be identified at this time. The Commission should also assign a priority to each project, both new and existing based upon the following framework:

- 1. Critical or urgent, high-priority projects that should be done if at all possible; a special effort should be made to find sufficient funding for all of the projects in this group.
- 2. Very important, high-priority projects that should be done as funding becomes available.
- 3. Important and worthwhile projects if funding is available; may be deferred to a subsequent year.
- 4. Less important, low-priority projects; desirable but not essential.
- 5. Future Consideration.

When determining a project, the Commission should keep in mind the requirements set out in the City Code. Section 154.15 (F) Park Dedication Fund

- (1) A cash contribution paid to the City shall be placed in a special fund. <u>The money shall be used only for:</u>
 - (a) The acquisition and development or improvement of parks, recreational facilities, playgrounds, trails, wetlands or open space based on the approved park systems plan;
 - (b) Redevelopment or rehabilitation of existing park facilities or sites; or
 - (c) Debt service in connection with land previously acquired or improvements thereto previously constructed.

(2) <u>No funds shall be used for ongoing operation or maintenance</u> of existing parks recreational facilities or sites or City vehicles.
