CITY OF LAKE ELMO CITY COUNCIL MINUTES OCTOBER 1, 2013

Mayor Pearson called the meeting to order at 7:00 P.M.

PRESENT: Mayor Pearson, Council Members Nelson, Smith, and Bloyer.

ABSENT: Council Member Reeves

Also Present: City Administrator Zuleger, Associate City Attorney Brekken, City Engineer Griffin, Finance Director Bendel, and City Clerk Bell.

PLEDGE OF ALLIGENCE

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Mayor Pearson asked that Item H be postponed until next Council meeting when Council Member Reeves returns; to move Item 4 to immediately before Item 9; and to move Item 8 to the end of the Regular Agenda.

MOTION: Council Member Bloyer moved **TO APPROVE THE OCTOBER 1, 2013 CITY COUNCIL AGENDA AS AMENDED.** Council Member Smith seconded the motion. **MOTION PASSED 4-0.**

ITEM 1: ACCEPT MINUTES

THE SEPTEMBER 17, 2013 CITY COUNCIL MINUTES WERE APPROVED AS AMENDED BY CONSENSUS OF THE CITY COUNCIL.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Library Director Orsted spoke on partnering with local businesses; Joni Fletty COO of Retail Construction Services, spoke on a giving garden and sustainability; library now has a red worm compost bin – "Wormy Acres"; Oktoberfest partnering with Lake Elmo Wine Company. There will be education as well as sampling microbrews.

PRESENTATIONS

ITEM 2: OUALITY STAR AWARD - ALYSSA MACLEOD

City Administrator Zuleger presented the Quality Star Award to Alyssa MacLeod for her effort to improve communication with taxpayers, promote civility with Civility Project, and work on Lake Elmo Days.

MOTION: Council Member Nelson moved **TO APPROVE THE CONSENT AGENDA AS AMENDED.**Council Member Smith seconded the motion. **MOTION PASSED 4-0.**

Public Comments

Bob Cusick 5470 Highlands Trail: spoke on lot next door parking issues. He was not happy that City issued a permit to his neighbor to park a trailer on his property. Mayor Pearson said that he

may visit the site and acknowledged that the issue is difficult. City Administrator Zuleger explained the City's actions. Mayor Pearson asked if the issue is resolved as far as the city is concerned. Mr. Zuleger said Building Official Chase says it is. Mayor Pearson said it he would stop by and take a look.

ITEM 4: AUTHORIZE CERTIFICATION TO WASHINGTON COUNTY AUDITOR FOR THE UNPAID STORM WATER UTILITY BILLS; RES. 2013-79

Gaylen Springborn 8989 55th St.: spoke on his appeal of storm water fees. His complaint is that he maintains all the water of his area. Mr. Zuleger said \$265.69 was reduced to \$66.42. This was the maximum reduction in credit policy. There is intentional retention and regional retention. This is the maximum credit that the City employs. Mr. Springborn invited the Council to personally view the property. The Council discussed whether action on the item should occur now or later during the meeting. It was decided to postpone the item to the end.

MOTION: Council Member Smith moved **TO POSTPONE THE ITEM UNTIL THE END OF THE AGENDA.** Council Member Bloyer seconded the motion. **MOTION PASSED 4-0.**

REGULAR AGENDA

ITEM 9: VARIANCE - 09.029.21.22.0025 (HILL TRAIL NORTH); RES. 2013-82

Planning Director Klatt provided overview of the variance application and background. The proposal does not meet the buildable lot size requirement imposed by City Code. It was determined that 60% of one acre is 26,136 square feet (43,560*0.6). The site is 0.27 acres short. The proposal does meet all other code requirements. Washington County did determine that there is enough room for a suitable septic system even though it does not meet the City requirements. Staff limited its review to the immediate area and not the larger tri-lakes area.

Council Member Smith asked if all the smaller lots that do not have lake access were used to arrive at the average. Mr. Klatt stated that staff used all the lots of the neighborhood. Ms. Smith does not believe that the smaller lots should be used to calculate the average.

Mr. Klatt explained the required variance findings: 1) practical difficulties; 2) unique circumstances; 3) character of the locality; and 4) adjacent properties and traffic. It was explained that the state also requires two other findings: variance is in harmony with the general purpose, and intent of the ordinance and consistent with the comp plan.

Staff received letters from neighbors opposed and the applicants and owners supporting the variance. Mr. Klatt explained that the Planning Commission found that the application did not meet three of the findings: 1) was not consistent with comp plan; 2) there are no unique circumstances; and 3) the variance would lead to a degradation of water quality. Planning Commission vote was 5-2 to deny the variance.

Clarification was given on the adjacent vacant lots and the ability or inability to split the lots for building. Ms. Smith asked if the lot was buildable at the time of purchase. Whether it was buildable at the time of purchase was discussed; however, due to the amount of time that has passed and the lack of specific records, the original build-ability cannot be easily determined.

Council Member Nelson asked how many houses were built in area since 1979. Mr. Klatt thought 2 had variances granted. Mr. Nelson asked to confirm that out of 64 lots, 3 would meet the 1.5 acres size. It was explained that staff could not determine exactly what rules were in place back in 1978. The 1979 Municipal Code was the first adoption of a City Zoning Code. It was explained that the previous rules are not really relevant because the City does have rules in place now that must be followed.

Ms. Smith asked if it would be more appropriate to amend the code and comp plan rather than grant variance. Assistant City Attorney Brekken stated that that was definitely an option, but that which path to follow is the Council's discretion.

Mr. Nelson asked about another 1 acre lot that apparently did not need a variance. Mr. Klatt said that two things could happen. Reconstruction or meet 60% rule. Another neighbor obtaining a variance was brought up. Ms. Smith asked how it was relevant.

Public comment:

Dean Dworak 12325 Upper Heather, Hugo: Variance applicant. Mr. Dworak takes issue with finding #2 regarding the aquifer impact. He does not believe that the addition of two more residents on his property would have any impact on the aquifer. He provided some water use statistics. He also alleged a conflict in the land use plan with the ordinances regarding the number of units per acre. Ms. Smith noted that this was for sewer. He respectfully requests that City approve the variance or change the ordinance.

Paul Hansen 8024 Hill Trail North: Lived in Lake Elmo almost 50 years. When they purchased the property, they could not get a straight answer from City whether the lot was buildable. He asserted that multiple variances have been granted to nearby properties to build houses in last 8-10 years. He claimed that this lot is one of the last vacant lakeshore lots. Council Member Smith asked about how recent the variances were granted. Her recollection is that Mayor Johnston was the last home built back in 1983. The length of time since the last variance was debated. Mr. Hansen recommended approval of variance.

Steve Iverson 8108 Hill Trail: He has concerns that the efforts to keep the character of Lake Elmo will be lost if the variance is granted. Mr. Iverson proceeded to read his letter that he had previously submitted and is included in the packet. He is concerned about Council setting bad precedent and running out of space for septics.

Mayor Pearson believes that there is not a compelling reason to grant the variance. He also believes that the current owner was on notice that the lot may not have been buildable. Septic systems are a problem and will continue to be a problem especially for this area.

Mr. Nelson believes that the rules have been changed and that he agrees with the original staff recommendation to grant the variance. Ms. Smith asked if there were already houses on the lots with the more recently built houses. Ms. Smith said that the letter is not the ordinance, but it is just a letter. The City should change the ordinance if the City decides to allow building on these lots. Ms. Smith noted that the planning staff and the planning commission simply provide guidance to the Council. Thinks that the Planning Commission did a good job fleshing out the issues and reasons to deny. Noted that three meetings took place and a lot of consideration went into the issue.

Council Member Bloyer – aquifer two houses are not going to draw down the aquifer. Septic meets Washington County. New technology allows for smaller septics with less impact.

Messrs. Nelson and Bloyer noted that the applicant is only asking for what others have been granted. Mayor Pearson said he is empathetic to the intricacies of the variance requests, but the rules are in place for a reason. Ms. Smith concurred with

MOTION: Council Member Bloyer moved **TO TABLE THE ITEM UNITL NEXT MEETING.** Council Member Nelson seconded the motion. **MOTION FAILED 2-2 (SMITH AND PEARSON – NAY).**

Mr. Nelson said he just visited the area and the applicants request seems reasonable given the recent building activity and circumstances.

MOTION: Mayor Pearson moved TO APPROVE RESOLUTION NO. 2013-082, DENYING THE VARIANCE REQUESTED AT 09.029.21.22.0025 (HILL TRAIL NORTH) TO ALLOW FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF A SINGLE FAMILY HOME ON A LOT THAT IS NOT CONSIDERED A BUILDABLE

LOT OF RECORD, BASED UPON FAILURE TO MEET ALL REQUIRED FINDINGS NECESSARY TO GRANT THE VARIANCE. Council Member Nelson seconded the motion.

There was discussion of voting requirements and effect of the motion failure. The variance is not granted by the motion to deny failing. The variance request will remain before the Council until it is formally approved or denied.

MOTION FAILED 2-2 (BLOYER AND NELSON - NAY).

MOTION: Mayor Pearson moved **TO POSTPONE ITEM.** Council Member Bloyer seconded the motion. **MOTION PASSED 4-0.**

<u>ITEM 10: 2012 STREET AND WATER QUALITY IMPROVEMENTS - FINAL ASSESSMENT HEARING; RES. 2013-83</u>

City Engineer Griffin gave overview of the project. The project came in under bid for quantities of materials. Expected to cost about \$861,000. The actual const cost about \$800,000. The project came in under budget for total cost at \$995,792.98. Initial assessment costs were \$3,200. Final proposed assessment came in at \$3,000. Mr. Griffin explained the assessment payment options.

MOTION: Council Member Bloyer moved **TO OPEN THE PUBLIC HEARING.** Council Member Nelson seconded the motion. **MOTION PASSED 4-0. Public Hearing opened at 8:32PM**

Jeff Nichols 8170 59th Street North: believes the City did a great job getting done under cost. However the quality of workmanship left something to be desired. Curbs and landscaping are not great. Mr. Griffin said that the city has been working on addressing issues that have been noticed. Mr. Nichols said he has not called the city to complain specifically, but expected that the city would monitor is on its own without having to be called. The mayor requested that any specific issues be brought to engineers' attention. Mr. Griffin said that there is still work being done on various rain garden issues.

MOTION: Council Member Smith moved **TO CLOSE THE PUBLIC HEARING.** Council Member Bloyer seconded the motion. **MOTION PASSED 4-0. Public Hearing closed at 8:35PM**

Mr. Bloyer asked about the rain gardens, and if they are federally mandated. Mr. Griffin said no they are not. The street projects have included voluntary rain gardens. Mayor Pearson asked if there is a quid pro quo with the installation. Mr. Griffin said that certain water quality levels must be met to maintain compliance with watershed rules. Valley Branch Watershed has been used for the funding and the Washington County Conservation District for design.

MOTION: Council Member Smith moved **TO APPROVE RESOLUTION NO. 2013-83, ADOPTING THE FINAL ASSESSMENT ROLL FOR THE 2012 STREET & WATER QUALITY IMPROVEMENTS.** Council Member Nelson seconded the motion. **MOTION PASSED 4-0.**

ITEM 11: WELL NO. 4 CONNECTING WATERMAIN IMPROVEMENTS - PUBLIC IMPROVEMENT HEARING; RES. 2013-84

City Engineer Griffin gave overview of the project. Resident meeting was held on 9/18/2013. Only one property represented at meeting. Mr. Griffin explained which properties will receive a benefit. Current lateral benefit fee is \$5,800. Total estimated project cost is \$617,000.

Options: #1) \$5,800 each property – city picks up balance. \$252,000 would come out of \$1Mil. DEED grant. #2) assess \$2,900 and the balance would be carried by city. Other half would be charged at time of connection. Mr. Griffin explained the total charges and the breakdown of the cost estimates per property. There are additional \$2,000 costs after soft costs to install stub. However, if stubs are done at later date, because of tearing up road, costs can skyrocket. Mr. Griffin explained the benefits of water service, the payment schedule, and the final assessment roll. Mr. Griffin provided overview of the construction schedule. He noted that because it was initiated by council, there is a 4/5 passage requirement.

MOTION: Council Member Smith moved **TO OPEN THE PUBLIC HEARING.** Council Member Nelson seconded the motion. **MOTION PASSED 4-0. Public Hearing opened at 8:49PM**

Don Slinger 4620 Lake Elmo Ave: asked if the reductions in growth by the Met Council make the water expansion not necessary. Mayor Pearson stated that contrary to what has been published and what he may have heard, the City is still subject to the MOU. Mr. Griffin explained that the improvement is still needed for the entire system both in growth and redundancy. Well #1 will eventually be taken offline.

Ms. Smith noted that there is a comprehensive water system. She reiterated several of Mr. Griffin's points. At some point nearby development will need the water. Mr. Slinger said that he does not understand how the land can be developed. Ms. Smith explained how they can be combined for Open Space Preservation developments.

Mr. Slinger also took issue with 11180 50th St. not being assessed. Mr. Griffin said that it does not meet the criteria. Mr. Slinger took issue with that determination. Mr. Slinger said if no current house, means not being assessed, that is not fair. Mayor Pearson stated that in the future that owner would pay entire cost. Mr. Slinger stated he wants to pay the same as the undeveloped lot owners. Mr. Slinger also stated that according to his information, there is no benefit to insurance.

Ms. Smith noted that the current users are paying a heavier share because of the low number of users, so it is not just the proposed assessed properties. The water fund and whether it will be flush was discussed. Mayor Pearson disagrees with some of Mr. Slinger's assertions, and asked Mr. Griffin to respond. Mr. Griffin explained that the initial buy-in is much cheaper up front. Vacant lot assessments are a policy decision, and that some cities do it differently. Some assess the total cost divided by the number of properties. Lake Elmo is not trying to encourage growth, and that assessments can force development.

The cost of the later connection charge was discussed and clarified. Mr. Griffin noted that another benefit to the early hook-up.

Margaret Schmidt 4525 Lake Elmo Ave: thanked Council for not charging for vacant lots. She was out of town for the neighborhood meeting. She has three lots. She wants to know if at any point she is going to be forced to connect. She also wants to know if she will be forced to stop using her well and what about future owners of her other lots. Will they be forced to connect as well? Discussion of what future OP lots could be. Mayor Pearson said his belief was that there would not be a forced connection. An OP development probably would. Vacant lots getting stubs at early point was discussed.

Doug Williams 3946 Lake Elmo Ave: does not want to have to hook up or be assessed. Does not believe that he will want to connect and does not believe he is receiving a benefit. He asserted that he already has the same water. If was going to spend that money, it would not be to connect to water.

Kathy Flicek 4890 Lake Elmo Ave: asked when water would begin being used. Mr. Griffin said 2014. The entire system will be using it immediately once pump station is built. Mr. Griffin explained again that the assessment is a very small portion of the entire project cost.

MOTION: Council Member Smith moved **TO CLOSE THE PUBLIC HEARING.** Council Member Bloyer seconded the motion. **MOTION PASSED 4-0.** Public Hearing closed at 9:23PM.

Mr. Bloyer said his perspective has changed as his role has changed. He sees multiple benefits in the water service. He is in favor of taking the same action as done with Keats Ave.

MOTION: Council Member Smith moved **TO APPROVE RESOLUTION NO. 2013-84, ORDERING THE WELL NO. 4 CONNECTING WATERMAIN IMPROVEMENTS WITH ASSESSMENT OPTION #2.** Council Member Bloyer seconded the motion.

Ms. Smith explained that the one property Mr. Slinger asked about will never be able to connect, so it does not make sense to assess that property.

MOTION PASSED 4-0.

ITEM 12: 2014 STREET IMPROVEMENTS - AUTHORIZE FEASIBILITY REPORT; RES. 2013-85

City Engineer Griffin presented the 2014 streets improvements plan. He also touched on some of the anticipated 2015 projects. Mr. Griffin identified what streets were included: Packard park neighborhood, Deer Pond Trail/Court, 20th Street North, and Manning Trail. The prioritization considerations were also explained: Condition of the street (salvage reclaim option); potential for future watermain; potential for significant storm sewer / drainage improvements; other potential issues / project readiness. Mr. Griffin then explained the anticipated costs and the proposed schedule.

The fact that the City has put off various projects over the years and the resulting poor condition of many of the roads was discussed. It was noted that the Council is taking a more aggressive approach now to catch up and also putting in higher quality streets, which should prolong the durability.

MOTION: Council Member Bloyer moved **TO APPROVE RESOLUTION NO. 2013-85, ORDERING PREPARATION OF A FEASIBILITY REPORT FOR THE 2014 STREET IMPROVEMENTS IN THE NOT TO EXCEED AMOUNT OF \$13,000.** Council Member Nelson seconded the motion.

Council Member Smith asked about the micro-surfacing street. She hoped that it is not wasting the money and will require the City to have to fix it soon after. Mr. Griffin reiterated that MNDOT was brought in for consultation. This will provide a good test of the process. Hopefully the process will be successful and be able to save the City money in the future.

MOTION PASSED 4-0.

Mayor Pearson made point of personal privilege and recessed the meeting at 9:44PM Mayor Pearson reconvened the meeting at 9:53PM

ITEM 13: COMPREHENSIVE PLAN AMENDMENT - LANDUCCI PROPERTY; RES. 2013-86

Planning Director Klatt provided overview of the Comp Plan amendment request by Ryland Homes for the Landucci property. It is located in the I94 corridor. Planning Commission recommends approval.

Mayor asked about the reduction in RECS and not needing to be transferred. Mr. Klatt confirmed that because of the size, there are is no resulting transfer.

MOTION: Council Member Bloyer moved **TO APPROVE RESOLUTION NO. 2013-086, APPROVING REQUEST BY RYLAND HOMES TO AMEND THE LAKE ELMO COMPREHENSIVE PLAN.** Council Member Nelson seconded the motion. **MOTION PASSED 4-0.**

ITEM 14: SKETCH PLAN REVIEW - LANDUCCI PROPERTY

Planning Director Klatt provided explained the item and introduced the representative from Ryland Homes. Mark Sonstegard and Tracey Rust from Ryland Homes were present. Mr. Sonstegard provided a summary of the proposed development. Mayor Pearson asked if the plan had changed from the Planning Commission submission. Mr. Sonstegard said it had not. Mr. Sonstegard pointed out the proposed trail plan that was not on original plan.

Council Member Smith asked about the need for a park. Sonstegard said that Ryland is looking for direction on where the park dedication funds go and whether cash or pocket park is desired. Council discussed park options.

Council Member Nelson asked about the number of façades. Mr. Sonstegard said about 5 floorplans and then multiple options for each. The proposed pricing was explained: base \$325K-400K; 370K-430K with options. Mayor Pearson asked about taking it to Parks Commission. City Administrator Zuleger said staff would like to meet to discuss parks before submitting it to Parks Commission. Mayor Pearson asked if turning a section into a common area that the neighborhood maintains, similar to what was done in his neighborhood. Council Member Bloyer noted that Public Works has commented that maintenance is difficult with number of parks as it is.

Mr. Sonstegard explained some options for secondary access to development and said Ryland is looking forward to discussing secondary access with staff. Mayor Pearson asked about the collector road buffer. Mr. Zuleger said that the road is not desired to be any farther south.

Ms. Smith asked if there was another community that she could look that is similar to proposal. Mr. Sonstegard explained a community in Mahtomedi and Prior Lake. Council can also visit Ryland.com to see all current sites.

NO FORMAL ACTION REQUESTED

ITEM 15: OFFICIAL LIST OF STORM WATER APPEALS / ASSESSMENTS

Finance Director Bendel gave overview and background of appeals. City Administrator Zuleger explained the policy in place. Council Member Nelson asked if the charge was based on square footage. Mr. Zuleger explained that it depends on what the zoning is. Base fee starts with equivalent run-off units of \$50 per standard residential lot.

There was an inquiry about the religious organizations proving hardship. Mr. Zuleger explained the process under the current policy that was used for the various properties.

Mayor Pearson commended staff's work on the issue. He then inquired about the situation where all the water is retained. Mr. Griffin explained that water quality is also a factor in addition to conveyance, so there would still be issues to consider. Over half the fees are to cover the permitting aspects. Mr. Griffin noted that the two options are to either have the fee collected through the tax levy or create the utility. The utility actually allows the agricultural properties to pay less than they would be based on tax value. Ms. Smith noted there are properties that do more than their fair share. Changing the policy going forward was discussed.

Mr. Nelson asked about who would be responsible in future if there is a required remediation. Mr. Griffin explained that it would be the City, but the City can assign that responsibility to property owners.

Gaylen Springborn asked about other cities' practices. Mr. Zuleger said some cities have credits and some do not.

George Dimmick 8465 Demontreville Trail: said he has asked for minutes from when the ordinance was passed. He has not received anything yet. The scope and of the request and the nature of his appeal were discussed.

MOTION: Mayor Pearson moved **TO CONTINUE TO RESPOND TO ALL STORM WATER APPEAL APPLICATIONS AS OUTLINED IN ORDINANCE 2012-057.** Council Member Smith seconded the motion.

Council Member Bloyer said on principal he cannot vote for this item because it is unfair. Council Member Nelson asked that the policy be revised. Mr. Griffin cautioned that the more the Council seeks a perfect policy more time and money will be expended. Suggested that the City needs to be careful about too much detailed critique. Ms. Bendel explained statistics and that policy is working pretty well. Mr. Nelson stated he wants to know the hardship standard.

MOTION PASSED 3-1 (BLOYER -NAY).

ITEM 4: AUTHORIZE CERTIFICATION TO WASHINGTON COUNTY AUDITOR FOR THE UNPAID STORM WATER UTILITY BILLS: RES. 2013-79 – (CONTINUED)

No discussion.

MOTION: Council Member Smith moved **TO APPROVE CERTIFICATION TO WASHINGTON COUNTY AUDITOR FOR THE UNPAID SURFACE WATER UTILITY BILLS.** Council Member Nelson seconded the motion.

Ms. Bendel asked if Mr. Springborn was going to be included. Ms. Smith said no, and that council members will be looking at process. Mayor Pearson said that this year is done, but that the Council will review the policy.

MOTION PASSED 3-1 (BLOYER -NAY).

ITEM 16: APPROVE SUNFISH LAKE PARK NAME CHANGE – SUNFISH LAKE NATURE PRESERVE; RES. 2013-87

Parks Commissioner Pam Hartley urged council to change the name. The park is subject to the terms of conservation easement with the MN Land Trust. Not like any other park. The Parks Commission thinks that changing the name would better reflect the intended use.

Council Member Bloyer asked how the park came about. Council Member Smith explained her opposition to the name change: the easement was supposed to include a 5 acres in Area 2 with greater use. Ms. Hartley said the Parks Commission is creating a task force to discuss the use within the easement. Mayor Pearson wants to know more about how it was purchased. He would like to postpone taking action to see what is proposed by the Parks Commission. Ms. Hartley asserted that mountain biking is specifically not allowed under the easement.

Mr. Bloyer asked about scope of the item before the Council. City Administrator Zuleger said it is limited to the proposed name change. He noted that the Parks Commission is serious at looking at the park and its use.

MOTION: Council Member Bloyer moved **TO DIRECT THE STAFF TO LOOK INTO HOW TO REMOVE THE LAND TRUST CONSERVATION EASEMENT.** Council Member Nelson seconded the motion.

Ms. Smith has spent 9 years working on park. She was part of keeping the water tower out. She also kept the ball fields out. Carol Kriegler understood her desire to have Area 2 and its additional uses. Ms. Smith wants to know where it went and what happened. Parks Commissioner Sarah Hietpas said the commission is willing to look at suggestions, but that is not relevant to the name change. Ms. Smith said the name does matter as the use will be further limited by changing the park to a nature preserve.

Council discussed the conservation easement vis-à-vis the park. Opinions differ on whether the public land should even be in the Land Trust and whether removing the easement is required. City Clerk Bell confirmed that his research thus far has found that the easements are written to be permanent and difficult to remove.

Mr. Zuleger explained that Ms. Smith is correct in her beliefs of what was agreed to, but somehow those items did not get into the easement. The issue of using eminent domain was discussed. Because the City already owns the land, that option is not Ms. Smith wants to work with the Parks Commission and the Land Trust to find a solution to use Area 2.

Mayor Pearson prefers to not change the name. He wants to work with the Land Trust to see what can be done to expand use. Council Member Nelson is troubled that a public park was put in the easement. He thinks that it is reasonable to ask and negotiate. Mr. Zuleger's opinion is that working within the easement is probably more likely to be successful than removing the easement. It was noted that legal costs alone would not be cheap.

MOTION FAILS 1-3 (PEARSON, NELSON, AND SMITH - NAY).

MOTION: Mayor Pearson moved TO POSTPONE UNTIL THE PARKS COMMISSION BRINGS BACK THEIR USE SUGGESTION. MOTION FAILED FOR LACK OF SECOND.

The Council – Parks Commission relationship was discussed. Ms. Hietpas noted that the name change has been in the works for a long time. Mayor Pearson asked if all the impact concerns were met, would mountain biking even be considered? Ms. Hietpas said probably no, but that possibly other areas could be considered.

NO FORMAL ACTION TAKEN.

ITEM 8: APPROVAL OF GATES FOR SUNFISH LAKE PARK

City Administrator Zuleger explained that the Washington County Sheriff's Office has requested that gates be installed at the park to limit access afterhours. Due to the location and nature of park, it is difficult to patrol. Mr. Zuleger described the recommended gates.

Mayor Pearson voiced his support for the gates. Council Member Smith asked about the entrance and whether it was part of an easement. City Clerk Bell confirmed that it was City land.

Council Member Nelson believes that this is premature until the task force proposes its use plan. Ms. Smith concurred. Mayor Pearson stated the security concerns will be prevalent regardless of the proposed uses; therefore, the gates are appropriate.

MOTION: Mayor Pearson moved **TO AUTHORIZE THE PURCHASE AND INSTALLATION OF A 24' AUTOMATIC BARRIER GATE AT SUNFISH LAKE PARK FROM, SECURITY ACCESS SYSTEMS, FOR THE NOT TO EXCEED PRICE OF \$11,075.00.** Council Member Smith seconded the motion.

The scenario of trying to get out of park after the gate closes was discussed. There is a safety feature that would allow exit only for an additional 30 minutes, but after that period, the sheriff would need to be contacted to provide egress.

MOTION PASSED 4-0.

Council Member Nelson asked about also taking steps to make Reid Park safer. The Council consensus was that this can and should be done.

SUMMARY REPORTS AND ANNOUNCEMENTS

Council Member Nelson: attended a sensible land use coalition meeting. The bottom line that he took away from it is that developers want to know the rules and their fees; resident meeting discussed Speak Your Peace. Resident is bringing it back to her board; received two resident phone calls on sewer for peninsula. Wants to bring it up for discussion and get it on agenda.

Council Member Smith: spent some time perusing the lakes. Glad there have not been any problems; call on culvert at end of 28th. She hopes that the completion includes some possible clean up. Project has been a long time coming.

Mayor Pearson: trails meeting; meeting with fire chief; developer meetings; resident meetings; attended Planning Commission meeting; participated in Met Council discussions. Stated the goal is lower RECs and eliminate MOU; commended staff on healthcare costs maintenance due to lower utilization.

Council Member Bloyer: wants discussion on amending the OP rules; he has 4TB of data on Lake Jane use and would like it reviewed when the lake use review occurs.

City Administrator Zuleger: had outstanding parks retreat. Commended Parks commission and Council Member Mike Reeves and Alyssa MacLeod; bonding strategy meeting; working with Lowell

Johnson letter for Lake Elmo Ave/Village sewer and non-compliant septics; focus newsletter is out; invited council to sit down and discuss the approach of storm water appeals.

Associate City Attorney Brekken: no report

Planning Director Klatt: Village workgroup will be looking at the mixed use in village; airport zoning making some progress. Continuing to work with MNDOT aeronautics and MAC.

City Engineer Griffin: no additional report. Mayor Pearson asked about 30th street construction. Mr. Griffin said the impact should be limited due to directional drilling.

City Clerk Bell: no report.

Finance Director Bendel: working on storm water assessments and appeals; street assessments; upcoming budget workshop; working on CIP; wrapping up bonding documents; working on escrow updates.

Mayor Pearson adjourned the meeting at 11:37PM.

SUMMARY AND ACTION REQUESTED: As part of its Consent Agenda, The City Council is asked to accept the September 2013 Financial Reporting Packet. No specific motion is needed, as this is recommended to be part of the overall approval of the *Consent Agenda*.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION: The City of Lake Elmo has fiduciary authority and responsibility to conduct normal business operations and report the financial (unaudited) statement to the City Council. City guidelines suggest the Council be updated on a regular basis.

STAFF REPORT: Attached please find a report for September reflecting the monthly detail supporting the year to date actual results and comparing those results to the 2013 Budget.

On a year to date basis through September 30, 2013, the actual results are \$112k better than budget.

The most significant variances are highlighted below:

Revenues:

- Building Permit revenue for the month was 25% better budget. On a year to date basis actual activity continues to be above plan by 17%.
- Plan review fees for the month were 89% above budget bringing the year to date revenue to 52% above budget.

Expenses:

Most departments are below budget for the month as all Departments continue to be very cost conscious. A few key items to note:

- The City Council recently approved the Administration Department to hire a lobbying firm to assist with the state grant application process. This was not a budgeted expense and the monthly retainer of \$1k is reported as contract services.
- The Planning Department has incurred expenses above the amounts budgeted for many expense items due to the City expansion initiative. The majority of the expenses were related to Engineering support and Contractor expenses.
- Fire prevention costs for the month were over budget but on a year to date basis the costs are right on budget. It was planned that the supplies would be ordered earlier in the year. Supplies were ordered in September to be sure to be available for Lake Elmo Days.
- The Cost for the Permit Works software and licenses of \$16.3k is reflected in the year to date Info technology costs for the Building Inspection department. This expense was not budgeted.
- The Contractor expense in the Public Works department in September represents the OSHA mandated training which was budgeted later in the year.
- The part-time salaries under the Parks and Recreation department are higher than budgeted due to having to cover the Park Maintainer functions with part time resources until the full-time position is filled. Overall the salary costs are right in line with budget for the month and 25% less than budgeted year to date.
- Please note that the salary and benefit expenses are based on more accurate departmental allocations than we had in August 2012 when the 2013 budget was initially compiled. As a result, some departments are above budget, while others are under but overall, personnel expenses are below budget.

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that the City Council receive the August monthly Financial Reporting Packet as part of tonight's Consent Agenda.

Alternately, the City Council does have the authority to remove this item from the Consent Agenda and further discuss and review.

STAFF REPORT:

This change order provides compensation to the contractor for additional work completed at the direction of the Project Engineer. Three hydrants were raised using hydrant extensions to provide better access to the hydrant by public works and the fire department. Additional ditch grading and installation of erosion prevention measures was completed to improve stormwater drainage in several locations along the project corridor. The improved grading was ordered to better protect the new infrastructure.

Once the ditch grading and restoration was complete, the City identified three (3) hydrants that were at a low elevation relative to the road. The Contractor extended the hydrants under direction from the City to provide better access. Additional ditch grading was requested by the Project Engineer to ensure positive drainage throughout the corridor and to install additional erosion control efforts not originally in the plan. The Contractor is being paid for time and materials with the time, equipment, and labor tracked by the City inspector.

With approval of this Change Order, the revised Contract amount will be increased by \$4,028.37 for a revised Contract Amount of \$1,622,226.84. With this change, the project remains within the scope of the current project budget and contingencies.



SUMMARY AND ACTION REQUESTED:

The City Council is asked to consider a Variance submitted by Dean and Gayle Dworak at 09.029.21.22.0025 (Hill Trail North) to allow for the construction of a single family home on a lot that is not considered a buildable lot of record under the Lake Elmo Zoning Ordinance. In addition, the variance request includes an allowance to install a subsurface sewage treatment system on a lot that does not meet the area requirements for septic systems per the Zoning Ordinance. The Planning Commission held a Public Hearing on August 26, 2013, which was continued at meetings on 9/9/13 and 9/23/13. The Planning Commission recommended denial of the variance request based upon failure to meet three findings necessary to grant a variance. The City Council considered the variance request at its meeting on 10/1/2013 and postponed the item for further consideration at its next meeting.

The Planning Commission recommends the City Council deny the Variance by taking the following action:

"Move to approve Resolution 2013-082, denying the variance requested at 09.029.21.22.0025 (Hill Trail North) to allow for the construction of a single family home on a lot that is not considered a buildable lot of record, based upon failure to meet all required findings necessary to grant the variance."

BACKGROUND AND STAFF REPORT:

The City of Lake Elmo received an application for a variance from Dean and Gayle Dworak to build a single family home on a lot that is not considered a buildable lot of record under the Zoning Ordinance. The City Council reviewed the request at the meeting on 10/1/13 and postponed the item for further

consideration at a future meeting. To access all of the application materials, staff reports, and other documents included in the variance review, please reference the City Council agenda packet from the 10/1/13 meeting.

In order to approve a variance under the City Code, the applicant must demonstrate compliance with 4 required findings. The findings and their definitions per City Code (§154.109) are the following:

- 1. Practical Difficulties. A variance to the provision of this chapter may be granted by the Board of Adjustment upon the application by the owner of the affected property where the strict enforcement of this chapter would cause practical difficulties because of circumstances unique to the individual property under consideration and then only when it is demonstrated that such actions will be in keeping with the spirit and intent of this chapter.
 - a. Definition of Practical Difficulties. "Practical difficulties," as used in connection with the granting of a variance, means that the property owner proposes to use the property in a reasonable manner not permitted by an official control.
- 2. Unique Circumstances. The problem for the landowner/applicant which the proposed variance is intended to correct must be due to circumstances that are unique to the property in question and that were not created by the land owner/applicant.
- 3. Character of Locality. The proposed variance will not alter the essential character of the locality in which the property in question is located.
 - a. *Definition of Locality*. For purposes of this subsection, "locality" shall be defined as all that property within 350 feet of the property proposed for the variance; however, in all events, it shall include all parcels abutting the affected parcel, including those immediately across a public street, alley of other public property.
- 4. Adjacent Properties and Traffic. The proposed variance will not impair an adequate supply of light and air to property adjacent to the property in question or substantially increase the congestion of the public streets or substantially diminish or impair property values within the neighborhood.

Based upon these application submitted and the required findings, staff recommended the variance application for approval. Staff determined that the variance application met the four findings as required by the City Code. Further detail about the content of the staff recommendation can be found in the Staff Report dated 8/26/13, also found in the 10/1/13 City Council agenda packet.

During the review of the application at the Public Hearing, the Planning Commission spent a significant amount of time over the course of several meetings reviewing the applicant's request and considering testimony from the applicants and neighboring property owners. All of the reports, submitted comments, and record of the public hearing can be found in the City Council agenda packet for the 10/1/2013 meeting.

Following up from the last City Council meeting (10/1/13), the applicants, Dean and Gayle Dworak, have submitted a letter to the City Council. In the letter, they submit that four other properties have received lot size variances to construct single family homes after the 1979 zoning regulations were adopted. Based upon staff research, three of these properties received variances to build on substandard lots, while the fourth property was a tear down and rebuild. However, it must be noted that each variance application must be reviewed independently based on its own merit, unique characteristics and in light of prevailing City Code requirements at the time.

PLANNING COMMISSION REPORT:

The Planning Commission recommended denial of the variance request based upon the failure of the applicants to meet three required findings for granting a variance. The Planning Commission's findings included the following: 1) that the variance was inconsistent with the Comprehensive Plan, 2) that there are no unique circumstances associated with the request, and 3) that the variance would lead to a degradation of water quality of the Tri-Lakes area and would alter the essential character of the locality. For further detail related to the Planning Commission's discussion and findings, please reference the content found in the City Council agenda packet dated 10/1/2013.

RECOMMENDATION:

The Planning Commission recommends the City Council deny the Variance by taking the following action:

"Move to approve Resolution 2013-082, denying the variance requested at 09.029.21.22.0025 (Hill Trail North) to allow for the construction of a single family home on a lot that is not considered a buildable lot of record, based upon failure to meet all required findings necessary to grant the variance,"

WHEREAS, the City of Lake Elmo is a municipal corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Minnesota; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Dean Dworak and Mrs. Gayle Dworak, 12325 Upper Heather Avenue North, Hugo, Minnesota, (the "Applicant") has submitted an application to the City of Lake Elmo (the "City") for a variance to allow for the construction of a single family home on a lot that is not considered a buildable lot of record; and to allow for a subsurface sewage treatment system on a lot that does not have the required amount of

WHEREAS, notice has been published, mailed and posted pursuant to the Lake Elmo Zoning Ordinance, Section 154.109; and

WHEREAS, the Lake Elmo Planning Commission held a Public Hearing on said matter on August 26, 2013, September 9, 2013, and September 23, 2013; and

WHEREAS, the Lake Elmo Planning Commission has submitted its report and recommendation to the City Council as part of a Staff Memorandum dated October 1, 2013; and

WHEREAS, the City Council considered said matter at its October 1, 2013 meeting and postponed consideration until the next available meeting; and

WHEREAS, the City Council considered said matter at its October 15, 2013 meeting.

NOW, THEREFORE, based on the testimony elicited and information received, the City Council makes the following:

FINDINGS

- 1) That the procedures for obtaining said Variance are found in the Lake Elmo Zoning Ordinance, Section 154.109.
- 2) That all the submission requirements of said Section 154.109 have been met by the Applicant.

- 3) That the proposed variance is to allow for:
 - a) The construction of a single family home on a lot not considered a buildable lot of record per the Lake Elmo Zoning Ordinance; and
 - b) The installation of a subsurface sewage treatment system on a lot that does not contain the necessary area suitable for a septic system as required by the Lake Elmo Zoning Ordinance.
- 4) That the Variance will be located on property legally described as follows: Lots 505 Thru 510 and Lots 629 Thru 634, Part of Vacated Beach, Lane's DeMontreville Country Club, Section 9, Township 29 North, Range 21 West, City of Lake Elmo, Washington County, Minnesota.
- 5) That the plight of the landowner is <u>not</u> due to circumstances unique to the property not created by the landowner. Specific findings: That the applicant's property was purchased with the knowledge that the lot was not a buildable lot of record, thereby negating the existence of unique circumstances related to the lot being platted and acquired before the current zoning regulations were established.
- 6) That the proposed variance <u>will</u> alter the essential character of the locality in which the property in question is located. Specific findings: The degradation of the water quality caused by additional drainage and erosion on the site and additional strain on the aquifer caused by an additional private water supply well will alter the essential character of the locality.
- 7) That the proposed variance is <u>not</u> consistent with the Comprehensive Plan. The proposed variance is not consistent with the Comprehensive Plan, as the area is guided for rural development, and allowing for smaller lots that do not meet the minimum size requirements of the Rural Single Family zoning district would be in conflict with the Comprehensive Plan.

CONCLUSIONS AND DECISION

Based on the foregoing, the Applicants' application for a Variance is denied.

SUMMARY AND ACTION REQUESTED:

The City Council is respectfully requested to consider an amendment to the current Animals chapter of the City Code. The amendment reorders, adds clarifying language, and makes the Animal code much easier to read and enforce.

Staff recommends the City Council approve Ordinance 08-088 through the following motion:

"Move to approve Ordinance 08-088, which amends the Animals chapter of the current City Code."

In addition, Staff recommends that the City Council approve Resolution No. 2013-88, authorizing summary publication of Ordinance 08-088, through the following motion (a 4/5 vote is required):

"Move to approve Resolution No. 2013-88, authorizing summary publication of Ordinance 08-088."

In addition, Staff further recommends that the City Council adopt Ordinance 08-089, an ordinance amending the Municipal Fee Schedule, by taking the following action:

"Move to approve Ordinance 08-089, an ordinance amending municipal fees."

BACKGROUND AND STAFF REPORT:

The current Animal Code in the City of Lake Elmo is difficult to understand and requires updating. Staff has researched Animal Codes from surrounding and similar cities over the past year and recommends the following clarifications and changes.

The first five sections of the amended Animal Code are new and act as introductory language. They lay out a very basic summary of the Code, adopt state law that prevents cruelty to animals, advise that this chapter does not regulate trapping or hunting, lay out basic definitions that are used throughout the chapter, and state some basic care requirements for domestic animals.

In order to make the code more understandable for residents, staff has added clarifying language regarding limiting the numbers of dogs and cats allowed in the City of Lake Elmo. This language is essentially the same as is allowed under the current City Code, with a couple of additions. Under current code, no more than three dogs, cats, or combination thereof is allowed in the City unless a kennel license is obtained. This section clearly states such language, and places that language in the appropriate chapter. Current language is only located in definitions. After considerable research by staff of regional, surrounding, and similar communities, the maximum of three animals allowed is the standard and staff is recommending that Lake Elmo stay with that number. It also adds a Grandfather Clause so that anyone who currently owns more than three domestic pets is allowed to keep their animals as long as they are properly licensed and documented with the City.

While keeping most of the substantive law and policy, staff added some clarifying language to the section on Dog Licensing. All dogs are required to be licensed in the City of Lake Elmo. Owners must also provide proof of current rabies vaccination at the time of licensing. Language was added to clarify that licenses are valid for one year beginning on Jan 1 of each calendar year. It also adds language that states that this section does not apply to domestic animals temporarily brought into the city.

There is a change in the amended code regarding the fees for dog licenses. The City will be charging \$20 for a dog license for altered dogs and \$25 for unaltered dogs. An additional cost of \$2.50 per month will also be added if a license is renewed late (after Jan 31) each year. There is also a provision for residents who properly apply for a new dog license after June 30 of a given year. They will pay one-half of the total fee.

Language was also added to the section on Unreasonable Disturbances. This added clarity and will allow the city to better and reasonably enforce this provision.

To protect the city from future legal claims, a Liability and a Severability section were also added.

The Dangerous and Potentially Dangerous Dogs Article of the Code was left unchanged. This was prescribed by the Washington County Sheriff's Department. This article lays out reporting and notification, registration and containment requirements for dangerous or potentially dangerous dogs. There is also language that states confiscation procedures as well as an exception to the section.

There was also language added to the Horses article that requires owners to clean up after their animals when on a public street, alley, sidewalk or other public right-of-way. This section was added to expressly clarify that these animals need to be attired and to prevent animal waste from being deposited on public property. Language was left unchanged that states that horses are not allowed on any street in the city which is hard surfaced or will be made hard surfaced. Horses, ponies, and horse-drawn vehicles are only allowed on paved shoulders of the street or public roads.

The Article on Dangerous Animals was also left largely unchanged. The only change was adding a section for Exceptions. It states that this part of the code does not apply to animals which are temporarily brought into the city, does not apply to any public zoos or persons keeping an animal for a public zoo, nor

does it apply to any bona fide research institution or veterinary hospital provided that protective devices adequate to prevent such animals from escaping or injuring the public are provided.

In addition to researching surrounding and similar communities, staff also consulted with the current Animal Control Officer and her recommendations were taken into consideration and incorporated into the new ordinance.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends the City Council approve Ordinance 08-088 through the following motion:

"Move to approve Ordinance 08-088, which amends the Animals chapter of the current City Code."

In addition, Staff recommends that the City Council approve Resolution No. 2013-88, authorizing summary publication of Ordinance 08-088, through the following motion (a 4/5 vote is required):

§ 95.01 HARD SURFACED ROADS.

No horses or ponies shall be allowed directly on and in contact with any street or public road in the city which is hard surfaced or which has been made ready for hard surfacing to the extent that the base for the hard surface has been applied. Horses, ponies, and horse-drawn vehicles shall only be allowed on paved shoulders of the street or public roads.

§ 95.02 RIDING.

No person shall ride, drive, lead, or otherwise allow any horse or pony to directly travel over and in contact with any street or public road in the city which is hard surfaced or which has been ready for hard surfacing to the extent that the base for the hard surface has been applied, except the horses, ponies, and horse drawn vehicles shall be allowed unpaved shoulders of the street or public road.

DOGS; GENERALLY

§ 95.15 DOG LICENSING REQUIRED.

No person shall own, keep, or harbor any dog over the age of 4 months, within the city, unless a dog license has first been secured. Dog licenses shall be issued by the Administrator for a fee as set by resolution of the Council. It shall be the duty of each person owning, keeping, or harboring a dog to pay the license fee imposed by §§ 95.15 *et seq.* to the Administrator on or before the first day of January of each year, or upon establishing residence in the city to immediately pay the license fee. The Administrator may cause a notice of the necessity of the license fee to be printed in the official newspaper in December prior to each license year.

§ 95.16 RABIES SHOTS REQUIRED.

At the time of application for registration, the applicant shall present to the Administrator a written statement from a licensed veterinarian or other satisfactory evidence that a rabies shot has been administered, within the previous 24 months, to the dog or dogs being registered.

§ 95.17 RECEIPT FOR REGISTRATION FEES.

Upon payment of the registration fee, the Administrator shall execute a receipt in duplicate, the original of which shall be delivered to the person who pays the fee and the duplicate retained in the records of the city. The receipt shall describe the dog as to breed, age, color, and sex, and whether or not the dog has been neutered.

§ 95.18 TAGS.

The Administrator shall also procure a sufficient number of suitable metallic tags, the shape of which shall be different for each registration year. The Administrator shall deliver 1 appropriate tag to the owner when the fee is paid. The owner shall cause the tag to be affixed by a permanent metal fastener to the collar of the dog so registered in a manner that the tag may be easily seen. The owner shall ensure that the tag is constantly worn by the dog. In case any dog tag is lost, a duplicate may be issued by the Administrator upon presentation of a receipt showing the payment of the registration fee for the current year. A charge of \$1 shall be made for the duplicate tag.

§ 95.19 OFFENSES INVOLVING TAGS.

It shall be unlawful to counterfeit or attempt to counterfeit the tag provided for in § 95.18 or take from any dog a tag legally placed upon it by its owner with the intent to place it upon another dog, or to place the tag upon another dog.

§ 95.20 TAGS NOT TRANSFERABLE; REFUNDS.

Dog tags shall not be transferable. No refunds shall be made on any dog registration fee because of leaving the city or death of the dog before the expiration of the registration period.

§ 95.21 PROHIBITION OF DOGS RUNNING AT LARGE.

It shall be unlawful for any person who owns, harbors, or keeps a dog to allow the dog to run at large in the city.

No person owning, operating, having charge of, or occupying, any building or premise shall keep or allow to be kept, any animal which shall, by any noise, unreasonably disturb the peace and quiet of any person in the vicinity. The phrase "unreasonably disturb the peace and quiet" shall include, but is not limited to, the creation of any noise by any animal which can be heard by any person, including a law enforcement officer or animal control officer, from a location outside of the building or premises where the animal is being kept and which animal noise occurs repeatedly over at least a 5-minute period of time with 1 minute or less lapse of time between each animal noise during the 5-minute period.

§ 95.23 PROHIBITION OF UNSECURED FEMALE DOGS IN HEAT.

- (A) It shall be unlawful for any person to own, harbor, keep, or have in their possession or on their premises any unsecured female dog in heat.
- (B) An unsecured female dog in heat shall be deemed to be any female dog in heat which is not confined in a building or secured enclosure in a manner that the dog cannot come into contact with another animal except for planned breeding.

§ 95.24 DOGS WHICH ARE PUBLIC NUISANCES.

Every unregistered dog, unsecured female dog in heat, and every dog that runs at large or causes disturbance, or noise, in violation of the provisions of §§ 95.15 et seq. is declared a public nuisance.

§ 95.25 INTERFERENCE WITH ENFORCEMENT.

It shall be unlawful for any unauthorized person to take or attempt to take from any officer any dog taken up by the officer in compliance with §§ 95.15 et seq. or in any manner to interfere with or hinder the officer in the discharge of official duties under §§ 95.15 et seq.

§ 95.26 INVESTIGATION.

Any agent of the Council may enter the premises where any animal is kept in a reportedly cruel or inhumane manner, after obtaining required warrant, and demand to examine the animal and to take possession of the animal when in the agent's opinion it requires humane treatment.

§ 95.27 QUARANTINE.

- (A) Whenever any person owning, possessing, or harboring any dog within the corporate limits of the city shall learn that the dog has bitten any human being, the person shall immediately impound the dog in a place of confinement where it cannot escape or have access to any human being or other animal. The person shall also immediately notify the Administrator. Whenever the Administrator learns that any human being has been bitten by any dog within the city, the Administrator shall ascertain the identity of the dog and the person owning, possessing, or harboring it. The Administrator shall immediately direct the person to impound the dog as required. Any dog so impounded shall be kept continuously confined for a period of 10 days from the day the dog bit a human being.
- (B) Upon learning that a dog has bitten a human being, the Administrator shall immediately notify the Animal Control Officer and inform Animal Control Officer of the place where the dog is impounded. It shall be the duty of the Animal Control Officer to inspect the dog as necessary during its period of 10-days' confinement and to determine whether the dog is infected with rabies. For this purpose, the Animal Control Officer shall have access to the premises where the dog is kept at all reasonable hours and may take possession of the dog and confine it in a suitable place at the expense of the owner. The owner or person in possession or harboring the dog shall immediately notify the Animal Control Officer of any evidence of sickness or disease in the dog during its period of confinement and shall promptly deliver its carcass to the Animal Control Officer in case of its death during the period.

§ 95.28 MUZZLING PROCLAMATION.

Whenever the prevalence of hydrophobia renders action necessary to protect the public health and safety, the Mayor shall issue a proclamation ordering every person owning or keeping a dog to confine it securely on the owner's or keeper's premises unless it is muzzled so that it cannot bite. Any unmuzzled dog running at large during the time fixed in the proclamation shall be killed by the police without notice to the owner.

§ 95.29 PROHIBITION OF KENNELS.

No kennels may be established in the city unless a special use permit has been issued for the kennel as provided by the city ordinances regulating land use.

§ 95.31 POUNDKEEPER.

The Council shall appoint a person, persons, or firm as the Council may deem necessary and advisable as poundkeeper for the city. The poundkeeper shall be compensated in the manner as the Council may deem reasonable. The poundkeeper shall file a monthly report with the Council relating to the operation of the pound as it applies to the city.

§ 95.32 IMPOUNDING OF DOGS.

The Animal Control Officer shall take up and impound any dogs found in the city without the tags provided in § 95.18 or any dogs which are in violation of any of the other provisions of §§ 95.15 et seq. To enforce §§ 95.15 et seq., the Animal Control Officer is empowered and instructed to enter upon any private premises where the officer has reasonable cause to believe there is an unlicensed dog, a dog which has been at large during the same day, or an unsecured female dog in heat.

- (A) Redemption. Any dog may be redeemed from the pound by the owner within 5 days after impounding by payment of a fee as set forth from time to time by resolution of the Council for each day the dog is confined in the pound, as the cost of boarding, feeding.
- (B) Additional impoundment charge. An additional fee, set from time to time by resolution of the Council, shall be charged for any dog that has been impounded more than once each year.

- (C) Double impoundment charge. In the case of unregistered or untagged dogs, the poundkeeper shall not return the dog to the owner until a dog license and/or tag has been purchased at the city office or from the poundkeeper. In the case of unregistered or untagged dogs, a double impounding fee shall be paid due to the special handling required on an unregistered or untagged dog.
- (D) Registration certificate. The poundkeeper shall remit to the city the sum paid to him/her for the dog license and/or tag. The poundkeeper shall furnish to the city all necessary information pertaining to the purchase, including a copy of any dog license issued in connection with the registration.

§ 95.34 DISPOSITION OF UNCLAIMED DOGS.

Any dog which is not claimed as provided for in § 95.33 or by a licensed educational or scientific institution or sold, shall be painlessly put to death and the body properly disposed of by the poundkeeper.

§ 95.35 PROCEEDINGS FOR DESTRUCTION OF CERTAIN DOGS.

- (A) Upon sworn complaint to district court that any 1 of the following facts exist:
- (1) That any dog at any time has destroyed property or habitually trespassed in a damaging manner on property of persons other than the owner;
- (2) That any dog at any time has attached or bitten a person outside the owner's or custodian's premises;
- (3) That any dog is vicious or shows vicious habits, or molests pedestrians or interferes with the driving of automobiles on the public highways;
- (4) That any dog is a public nuisance as defined in M.S. § 561.01, as it may be amended from time to time; and/or
- (5) That any dog is running at large or violates its quarantine contrary to the provisions of the chapter.
- (B) The district court shall issue a summons directed to the owner or person having possession of the dog commanding the owner or person in possession to appear before the court and show cause why the dog should not be disposed of as authorized in this code. The summons shall be returnable not less than 2 nor more than 6 days from the date of delivery and shall be served at least 2 days before the time of appearance mentioned in the summons. If, at the hearing, the district court finds that the facts stated in the complaint are true, the judge may either order: the owner or custodian to keep the dog confined to a designated place; the owner or custodian to remove the dog from the city; or the dog killed. If the owner or custodian disobeys the order, the owner or custodian shall, upon the filing of a complaint and after a hearing and conviction before a district court, be liable to the punishment provided for violation of this chapter. Any Animal Control Officer may, upon

disobedience of the order, impound and kill any dog described in the order of the district court. The provisions of this section are in addition to and supplemental to other provisions of this code. Costs of the proceeding specified by this section shall be assessed against the owner or custodian of the dog.

DANGEROUS AND POTENTIALLY DANGEROUS DOGS

§ 95.50 DANGEROUS DOGS; REPORTING AND NOTIFICATION.

- (A) *Incident report*. The Animal Control Officer shall complete an "Incident Report" on any incident listed in the definition for "dangerous dog" in § 11.01.
- (B) Notice declaring a dangerous dog. The Animal Control Officer shall provide the animal owner with a "Notice to Declare Dog Dangerous" for any incident listed in the definition for "dangerous dog" in § 11.01. The Animal Control Officer shall provide written notice to the City Clerk/Administrator that a "Notice to Declare Dog Dangerous" has been issued to an animal owner.
- (1) Every reasonable attempt should be made by the Animal Control Officer to deliver the "Notice Declaring a Dangerous Dog" to the animal owner in person.
- (2) If the "Notice to Declare Dog Dangerous" cannot be delivered to the animal owner, the Animal Control Officer shall provide the "Notice" to the City Clerk/Administrator for mailing. The "Notice Declaring Dog Dangerous" shall be mailed to the animal owner by certified mail.
- (3) Dogs may not be declared dangerous if the threat, injury, or damage was sustained by a person:
- (a) Who was committing, at the time, a willful trespass or other tort upon the premises occupied by the owner of the dog;
- (b) Who was provoking, tormenting, abusing, or assaulting the dog or who can be shown to have repeatedly, in the past, provoked, tormented, abused, or assaulted the dog; or
- (c) Who was committing or attempting to commit a crime. (1997 Code, § 1320.24)

§ 95.51 DANGEROUS DOGS; REGISTRATION REQUIREMENT.

- (A) The owner of a dangerous dog shall obtain a certificate of registration from Washington County.
 - (B) Washington County regulations indicate that a certificate of registration will be issued if:
- (1) Registration. The county shall issue a certificate of registration to the owner of a dangerous dog if the owner presents sufficient evidence that:
 - (a) A proper enclosure exists for the dangerous dog and a posting on the premises with a

clearly visible warning sign, including a warning symbol to inform children, that there is a dangerous dog on the property; and

- (b) A surety bond issued by a surety company authorized to conduct business in this state in a form acceptable to the county in the sum of at least \$50,000, payable to any person injured by the dangerous dog, or a policy of liability insurance issued by an insurance company authorized to conduct business in this state in the amount of at least \$50,000, insuring the owner for any personal injuries inflicted by the dangerous dog.
- (2) Fee. The county may charge the owner an annual fee, in addition to any regular dog licensing fees, to obtain a certificate of registration for a dangerous dog under this section.
- (3) Law enforcement exemption. The provisions of this section do not apply to dangerous dogs used by law enforcement officials for police work.
- (4) Tag. A dangerous dog registered under this section must have a standardized, easily identifiable tag identifying the dog as dangerous affixed to the dog's collar at all times.

§ 95.52 DANGEROUS DOGS; CONTAINMENT REQUIREMENTS.

An owner of a dangerous dog shall keep the dangerous dog, while on the owner's property, in a proper enclosure. If the dog is outside the proper enclosure, the dog must be muzzled and restrained by a substantial chain or leash and under the physical restraint of a responsible person. The muzzle must be made in a manner that will prevent the dog from biting any person or animal but that will not cause injury to the dog or interfere with its vision or respiration.

§ 95.53 POTENTIALLY DANGEROUS DOGS; REPORTING AND NOTIFICATION.

- (A) *Incident report*. The Animal Control Officer shall complete an "Incident Report" on any incident listed in the definition for "potentially dangerous dog" in § 11.01.
- (B) Notice declaring a potentially dangerous dog. The Animal Control Officer shall provide the animal owner with a "Notice to Declare Dog Potentially Dangerous" for any incident listed in the definition for "potentially dangerous dog" in § 11.01. The Animal Control Officer shall provide written notice to the City Clerk/Administrator that a"Notice to Declare Dog Potentially Dangerous" has been issued to an animal owner.
- (1) Every reasonable attempt should be made by the Animal Control Officer to deliver the "Notice To Declare a Potentially Dangerous Dog" to the animal owner in person.
- (2) If the "Notice" cannot be delivered to the animal owner, the Animal Control Officer shall provide the "Notice" to the City Clerk/Administrator for mailing. The "Notice To Declare a Potentially Dangerous Dog" shall be mailed to the animal owner by certified mail.

§ 95.54 POTENTIALLY DANGEROUS DOGS; CONTAINMENT REQUIREMENTS.

- (A) An owner of a potentially dangerous dog shall keep the dangerous dog, while on the owner's property, in a proper enclosure.
- (B) If the dog is outside the proper enclosure, the dog must be muzzled and restrained by a substantial chain or leash and under the physical restraint of a responsible person.
- (C) The muzzle must be made in a manner that will prevent the dog from biting any person or animal but that will not cause injury to the dog or interfere with its vision or respiration.

(1997 Code, § 1320.28) Penalty, see § 10.99

§ 95.55 CONFISCATION.

- (A) Seizure.
 - (1) The Animal Control Officer shall immediately seize any dangerous dog if:
- (a) After 14 days after the owner has notice that the dog is dangerous, the dog is not validly registered under § 95.51;
 - (b) The dog is not maintained in the proper enclosure; or
- (c) The dog is outside the proper enclosure and not under physical restraint of a responsible person as required under § 95.52.
- (2) If an owner of a dog is convicted of a crime for which the dog was originally seized, the court may order that the dog be confiscated and destroyed in a proper and humane manner, and that the owner pay the costs incurred in confiscating, confining, and destroying the dog.
- (B) Reclaimed. A dangerous dog seized under division (A) above may be reclaimed by the owner of the dog upon payment of impounding and boarding fees, and presenting proof to the Animal Control Officer, and the city that the requirements of §§ 95.51 and 95.52, as they may be amended from time to time, will be met. A dog not reclaimed under this subdivision within 7 days may be disposed of as provided in § 95.35, and the owner is liable to the city for costs incurred in confining and disposing of the dog.
 - (C) Subsequent offenses; seizure.
- (1) If a person has been convicted of a misdemeanor for violating a provision of §§ 95.51 and 95.52, and the person is charged with a subsequent violation relating to the same dog, the dog must be seized by the city's Animal Control Officer.
- (2) If the owner is convicted of a crime for which the dog was seized, the court shall order that the dog be destroyed in a proper and humane manner and the owner pay the cost of confining and destroying the animal.
- (3) If the person is not convicted of the crime for which the dog was seized, the owner may reclaim the dog upon payment to the city of a fee for the care and boarding of the dog.
- (4) If the dog is not reclaimed by the owner within 7 days after the owner has been notified that the dog may be reclaimed, the dog may be disposed of as provided under § 95.35, and the

owner is liable to the city for the costs incurred in confining, impounding, and disposing of the dog. (1997 Code, § 1320.29)

DANGEROUS ANIMALS

§ 95.70 KEEPING OF ANIMALS.

The keeping of animals except for domesticated pets inside of the dwelling unit shall be prohibited.

§ 95.71 OTHER ANIMALS.

No person who owns or who has custody of any horse, mule, sheep, goat, swine, fowl, poultry, cattle, monkey, domesticated snake, cat, or any other animal shall permit the same to run at large in the city. Any animal or fowl found running at large shall be impounded by the Animal Control Officer who will then proceed, pursuant to §§ 95.33 through 95.36.

§ 95.72 DANGEROUS ANIMALS PROHIBITED.

- (A) No person shall harbor, maintain, or control any dangerous animal within the city.
- (B) A dangerous animal is 1 which is capable of inflicting severe bodily harm to humans, and shall include but not be limited to the following species:
 - (1) Class Mammalia.
 - (a) African buffalo (Syncerus caffer);
 - (b) Hippopotamus (Hippopotamus amphibious);
 - (c) Wolves, dingoes, jackals, all species except foxes (Family Canidae);
 - (d) Hyenas, all species except aardwolves (Proteles cristatus)(Family Hyaenidae):
 - (e) Wolverine (Gulo gulo);
 - (f) Honey badger or ratel (Mellivora campensis);
 - (g) Old World badger (Meles metes);
 - (h) Bears (Family Ursidae);
 - (i) Lions, jaguars, leopards, tigers (Genus Panthera);
 - (j) Clouded leopard (Neofelis nebulosa);

- (k) Cheetah (Acinonyx jubatus);
- (l) Cougar or mountain lion (Felis concolor);
- (m) Elephants (Family Elephantidae);
- (n) Rhinoceroses (Family Rhinocerotidae);
- (o) Gibbons, siamangs (Family Hylobatidae);
- (p) Orangutans, chimpanzees, gorillas (Family Pongidae);
- (q) Baboons, drills, mandrills (Genus Papio);
- (r) Macaques (Genus Macaca); and
- (s) Gelada baboon (Theropithecus gelada).
- (2) Class Repitilia.
 - (a) Gavials (Family Gavialidae);
 - (b) Crocodiles (Family Crocodylidae);
 - (c) Alligators, caimans (Family Alligatoridae);
 - (d) Cobras, coral snakes (Family Elapidae);
 - (e) Sea Snakes (Family Hydrophidae);
 - (f) Adders, vipers (Family Viperidae);
 - (g) Pit Vipers (Family Crotalidae); and
 - (h) All venomous rear-fanged species (Family Colubridae).
- (3) The following species of constricting snakes over 8 feet in length.
 - (a) Boa constrictor (Boa constrictor), all subspecies;
 - (b) Anaconda (Eunectes murinus);
 - (c) Indian python (Python molurus);
 - (d) Reticulate python (Python reticulatus); and
 - (e) Rock python (Python sebae).
- (4) Other.
 - (a) Gila monsters and beaded lizards (Family Helodermatidae); and
 - (b) Komodo dragon (Varanus komodoensis).

§ 95.00 Purpose and intent

The purpose of this ordinance is to promote health, safety and general welfare of animals and the people around them by requiring animals be cared for in such a manner that they will not become a public nuisance, requiring animals be properly fed, sheltered and cared for, requiring the removal of animal defectaion from public property and to ensure licensing of dogs and rabies vaccination of all dogs and cats within the City of Lake Elmo.

§ 95.01 State code adopted

All of the relevant provisions of Minnesota Statutes Chapter 343, as amended, are hereby incorporated by reference into this chapter with the same force and effect as if fully set forth in this chapter.

§ 95.02 Construction and application

This chapter shall not be interpreted as covering any law regulating the trapping of animals, the use of live animals in dog trials or in training of hunting dogs, or the slaughter of animals by persons acting under state and federal law, or taking of animals through hunting or fishing as permitted by law.

§ 95.03 Definitions

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this article, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

Adult dog means a dog over four (4) months of age.

Animal means any live vertebrate or invertebrate creature either domestic or wild, except a human being.

Animal, dangerous means any animal that is declared to be dangerous by the animal control officer after a temperament test has been conducted on the animal or as defined by Section 11.01 of this Code.

Animal control officer means any person designated by the city to enforce State Statutes, adopted by reference, and local ordinances as they pertain to animal control.

Animal shelter, public means a facility operated by a humane society, or a governmental agency or its authorized agents for the purpose of impounding or caring for animals.

Animal, wild or exotic means apes, coyotes, foxes, wolves, bears, cougars, lynx, bobcats, wild boars, cheetahs, jaguars, lions, tigers, leopards, panthers, ocelots, monkeys, elephants or other similar animals as determined by the humane officer.

At large means to be off the premises of the owner and not under the control of some person, either by leash or otherwise, but a dog or cat within an automobile of its

owner or in an automobile of any other person with the consent of the dog's or cat's owner, shall be deemed to be upon the owner's premises.

Cat means a domesticated animal of the feline type (Felis domesticus), except for a feral cat.

Cat, altered means a cat which has been certified in writing by a veterinarian as being nonreproductive.

Cat, feral means a cat without owner identification of any kind whose usual and consistent temperament is extreme fear and resistance to contact with people. A feral cat is unsocialized to people.

Circus means a commercial variety show featuring animal acts for public entertainment.

Cruel means causing unnecessary and excessive pain or suffering or unjustifiable pain, injury or death to an animal.

Commercial Animal Establishment shall mean any pet shop, grooming shop or boarding kennel and shall exclude any city pound, humane society, animal shelter or veterinary facility.

Dog means a domesticated animal of the canine type (Canis familiaris); young animals (puppies) of this type are considered dogs. It shall not include any animal which is in whole or in part of the canis lupus or wolf species.

Dog, altered means a dog which has been certified in writing by a veterinarian as being nonreproductive.

Dog, service means any dog individually trained to do work or perform tasks for the benefit of an individual with a disability, including, but not limited to, minimal protection work, rescue work, pulling a wheelchair or fetching dropped items.

Dog, unlicensed means a dog for which a required license fee has not been paid, or to which the license tag required by this chapter is not attached.

Foster parent, animal means a person who provides temporary care for kittens, puppies, cats and dogs in their homes for 6 months or less at a time. Animals which are in temporary foster care are not required to be licensed.

Grooming shop means a commercial establishment where animals are bathed, clipped or otherwise groomed.

Kennel means a facility where dogs, cats or other animals are kept for 24 hours or more for boarding, training or similar purposes for compensation. This does not include animal shelters or a facility owned or operated by a veterinarian where animals are boarded only in conjunction with the provision of veterinary care.

Owner means any individual, partnership or corporation that has the right of

property in an animal or who keeps, harbors, cares for or acts as its custodian or who knowingly permits an animal to remain on or about or return to his/her property/premises for five or more consecutive days is presumed to be harboring or keeping the animal within the meaning of this article.

Permanent animal exhibition means any spectacle, display, act or event other than circuses, in which animals perform or are displayed, with the exception of education programs presented by persons or organizations with proper state and federal education permits, as required, and which are perpetual in nature and in a stationary location.

Person means and includes all natural persons and any firm, sole proprietorship, limited liability corporation (LLC), partnership, corporation, trust and any association of persons, government agency or political subdivision.

Pet means an animal kept for pleasure rather than utility, which may/may not be susceptible to rabies.

Pet shop means any person, sole proprietorship, limited liability corporation (LLC), partnership or corporation, whether operated separately or in connection with another business enterprise, except for a kennel, that buys, gives away, sells or takes on consignment any species of animal.

Temperament testing means evaluating an individual dog's temperament through a series of tests that measure traits including stability, confidence, shyness, friendliness, aggressiveness, protectiveness, prey instincts, play drive, and self-defense instincts, and the ability to distinguish between threatening and nonthreatening situations.

Transient animal exhibition means any spectacle, display, act or event other than circuses, in which animals perform or are displayed, with the exception of education programs presented by persons or organizations with proper state and federal education permits, as required, and which are traveling shows of a temporary duration.

Veterinarian has the meaning as defined in Minnesota Administrative Rules, Chapter 9100.0100.

Veterinary hospital or clinic means any establishment maintained and operated by a licensed veterinarian for surgery, diagnosis and treatment of disease and injuries in animals.

Cross References—Definitions generally, Section 11.01.

§ 95.04 Care of Domesticated Animals

All domesticated animals shall be cared for, maintained and handled in a humane and sanitary manner and in such a way as to prevent noises such as barking, fighting or howling or other disturbance of the peace and quiet of the neighborhood. No domestic animal shall be abandoned or turned loose by its owner. No animal shall be inhumanely confined in a manner which causes or is likely to cause pain, suffering, injury or death. No person who owns, harbors, or keeps any animal shall fail to provide proper medical attention to such animal when and if such animal becomes sick or injured.

§ 95.05 Number of Dogs and Cats Limited

- A. The keeping of a large number of dogs or cats poses health, safety and public welfare risks and is deemed a public nuisance.
- B. Cats. Unless the property owner holds a valid kennel license, no individual or family unit living together, firm or corporation shall keep more than three (3) cats over the age of four (4) months on any parcel.
- C. *Dogs*. Unless the property owner holds a valid kennel license, no individual or family unit living together, firm or corporation shall keep more than three (3) dogs over the age of four (4) months on any parcel.
- D. Cats and Dogs. Unless the property owner holds a valid kennel license, no individual or family unit living together, firm or corporation shall keep more than a combination of three (3) cats and dogs over the age of four (4) months on any parcel.

E. Grandfather clause.

- 1. Any person who owned, possessed, kept or harbored dogs and/or cats on or before October 15, 2013, in excess of the above allowed number of dogs and/or cats shall be permitted to continue ownership or possession as long as they meet all the requirements set forth under State and Federal Law in addition to those set forth in this Ordinance.
- 2. Anyone whose animals fall under the grandfather clause shall have obtained license for the dogs within sixty days of the effective date of the original ordinance (October 15, 2013).
 - i. Any person who successfully obtains license within sixty days of the adoption of this Ordinance shall be permitted to hold, keep, harbor or maintain the number of animals that person had as of the date of the adoption of this Ordinance but shall not be permitted to increase the number of animals. Following death of the licensed animal, the property owner shall not acquire more animals until they have brought the number of animals down to legal limits through attrition.
 - ii. Any person who has not successfully obtained license for their animal within sixty days of the adoption of this Ordinance shall forfeit the right to keep the animal under the grandfather clause and be deemed to unlawfully possess the animal.

§ 95.06 Rabies Shots Required

At the time of application for registration, the applicant shall present to the City a written statement from a licensed veterinarian or other satisfactory evidence that a rabies shot has been administered, within the previous 24 months, to the dog or dogs being registered.

§ 95.07 Dog Licensing Required.

- A. No person shall own, keep, or harbor any dog over the age of 4 months, within the city, unless a dog license has first been secured. Dog licenses shall be issued by the City for a fee as set by resolution of the Council. It shall be the duty of each person owning, keeping, or harboring a dog to pay the license fee imposed by §95.07 et seq. to the City on or before the first day of January of each year, or upon establishing residence in the city to immediately pay the license fee. The City may cause a notice of the necessity of the license fee to be printed in the official newspaper in December prior to each license year.
 - 1. The license fees are provided for in the city fee schedule for the following:
 - a. Altered dogs
 - b. Unaltered dogs
 - c. Service dogs
- B. All licenses shall be valid for one year from each January 1 to the following December. License applications may be made from January 1 through January 31 each year without penalty. When application is made after January 31 for any animal subject to licensing prior to that date, an additional fee shall be charged for the license. The additional fee herein prescribed is assessed to cover the additional costs of the administration and not as a penalty, and the payment of such a fee shall not exempt any owner from any penalties imposed for any violation of this subchapter.
- C. A license will be one-half of the amount set out in the fee schedule if properly obtained after June 30 of the license year.
- D. The City shall deliver one (1) appropriate tag to the owner when the fee is paid. The owner shall cause the tag to be affixed by a permanent metal fastener to the collar of the dog registered in a manner that the tag may be easily seen. The owner shall ensure that the tag is constantly worn by the dog. In case any dog tag is lost, a duplicate may be issued upon verification of the licensure for the current year. A charge of \$1 shall be made for the duplicate tag.
- E. The provisions of this section shall not be intended to apply to domestic animals brought into the city for the purpose of participating in any domestic animal show or for less than 30 days.

§ 95.08 Offenses Involving Tags

It shall be unlawful to counterfeit or attempt to counterfeit the tag provided for in §95.07 or take from any dog a tag legally placed upon by its owner with the intent to place it upon another dog.

§ 95.09 Tags Not Transferable; Refunds

Dog tags shall not be transferable. Norefunds shall be made on any dog registration

fee because of leaving the city or death of the dog before the expiration of the registration period.

§ 95.10 Prohibition of Kennels

No kennels may be established in the city unless a special use permit has been issued for the kennel as provided by the city ordinances regulating land use.

§ 95.11 Prohibition of Dogs and Cats Running at Large

It shall be unlawful for any person who owns, harbors or keeps a dog or cat to allow the dog or cat to run at large in the city.

§ 95.12 Unreasonable Disturbance Prohibited

The following are prohibited:

- A. The keeping or harboring of any animal or fowl, whether licensed or not, which by frequent or habitual howling, yelping, barking, crowing or making of other noises shall greatly annoy or disturb a neighborhood or any considerable number of persons within the city which tends to cause or create a disturbance is prohibited and is a public nuisance. An animal is considered to be in violation of this section when written complaints from two or more adults living in separate residences within audible distance of the noisy animal are filed with the law enforcement or the city within a four-week period. No prosecution shall be commenced, except upon the request of the law enforcement or city, following a written petition signed by two or more adult persons residing at different residences. Failure to correct the disturbance within 24 hours of written notification from law enforcement or other designee of the city shall constitute a violation of this section and will subject the owner or occupant of the premises to the penalties set forth in Sec. 10.99, Penalty. Each day that such nuisance exists constitutes a separate offense.
- B. The phrase "unreasonable disturbance" shall include, but is not limited to, the creation of any noise by any animal which can be heard by any person, including a law enforcement officer or animal control officer, from a location outside of the building or premises where the animal is being kept and which animal noise occurs repeatedly over at least a 30 minute period of time with a 5 minute or less lapse of time between each animal noise during the 30 minute period.
- C. *Exemptions*. The provisions of this section shall not apply to animal veterinary hospitals or clinics operated for the treatment of animals or to permitted kennels.

§ 95.13 Dogs or Cats which are Public Nuisances

Every unlicensed dog, unsecured female dog or cat in heat, and every dog or cat that runs at large or causes disturbance, or noise, in violation of the provisions of §95.07 *et seq.* is declared a public nuisance.

§ 95.14 Interference with Enforcement

It shall be unlawful for any unauthorized person to take or attempt to take from any

officer any animal taken up by the officer in compliance with §95.07 et seq. or in any manner to interfere with or hinder the officer in the discharge of official duties under §95.07 et seq.

§ 95.15 Investigation

Any agent of the Council may enter the premises where any animal is kept in a reportedly cruel or inhumane manner, after obtaining required warrant, and demand to examine the animal and to take possession of the animal when in the agent's opinion it requires humane treatment.

§ 95.16 Quarantine

- A. Whenever any person owning, possessing, or harboring any dog within the corporate limits of the city shall learn that the dog has bitten any human being, the person shall immediately impound the dog in a place of confinement where it cannot escape or have access to any human being or other animal. The person shall also immediately notify the Administrator. Whenever the Administrator learns that any human being has been bitten by any dog within the city, the Administrator shall ascertain the identity of the dog and the person owning, possessing, or harboring it. The Administrator shall immediately direct the person to impound the dog as required. Any dog so impounded shall be kept continuously confined for a period of 10 days from the day the dog bit a human being.
- B. Upon learning that a dog has bitten a human being, the Administrator shall immediately notify the Animal Control Officer and inform Animal Control Officer of the place where the dog is impounded. If the animal is current on its rabies vaccination with proof provided by a rabies certificate, then the animal is safe to be quarantined in the owner's home. If no proof of a current rabies vaccine is able to be provided the animal must be impounded at the current impound facility. When an animal is impounded at home, the animal should be required to be inspected by a licensed veterinarian at the beginning of the rabies quarantine and at the end of the rabies quarantine. The Animal Control Officer will inspect the animal as needed during the 10 day quarantine only when the animal is kept in the home of the owner. For this purpose, the Animal Control Officer shall have access to the premises where the dog is kept at all reasonable hours and may take possession of the dog and confine it in a suitable place at the expense of the owner. In the circumstance that the animal is impounded at the impound facility it is the duty of the licensed veterinarian on staff to inspect the animal during the rabies quarantine.
- C. The owner or person in possession or harboring the dog shall immediately notify the Animal Control Officer of any evidence of sickness or disease in the dog during its period of confinement. In the case that an animal dies during this period when the animal is kept in the owner's home, the animal is to be brought to the impound facility where it will then be transported to the U of MN for diagnostic testing. If the animal dies while being impounded at the impound facility, then the impound facility will be responsible for diagnostic rabies testing.
- D. In the case that the owner of the animal that has bitten does not have a current rabies vaccine and it is impounded at the impound facility, and if the owner decides not to reclaim the animal from the impound facility, the impound facility can then humanely euthanize the animal and send it for diagnostic testing without holding the

animal for a 10 day quarantine.

§ 95.17 Muzzling Proclamation

Whenever the prevalence of hydrophobia renders action necessary to protect the public health and safety, the Mayor shall issue a proclamation ordering every person owning or keeping a dog to confine it securely on the owner's or keeper's premises unless it is muzzled so that it cannot bite. Any unmuzzled dog running at large during the time fixed in the proclamation shall be killed by law enforcement without notice to the owner.

§ 95.18 Required Removal of Animal Excreta

The owner or person having immediate care, custody or control of any animal shall promptly remove and dispose of, in a sanitary manner, any excreta left or deposited by the animal upon any public or private property. Failure to do so shall be a violation of this section and will subject the owner or occupant of the premises to the penalties set forth in section 10.99 Penalty. Each day that such act exists shall constitute a separate offense.

§ 95.19 Animals on Owners Property

The accumulation of dog feces or wastes upon private property in the city is declared to be a public nuisance. The owner or occupant of property upon which there exists any accumulation of dog feces or waste shall remove all such waste from his premises and dispose of the wastes in a safe and sanitary manner within 24 hours of written notification from law enforcement or the city to remove the wastes. Failure to do so shall be a violation of this section and will subject the owner or occupant of the premises to the penalties set forth in section 10.99 Penalty. Each day that such act exists shall constitute a separate offense.

§ 95.20 Animal Control Officer

The Council may appoint a person, persons, or firm as the Council may deem necessary and advisable as Animal Control Officer for the city. The Animal Control Officer shall be charged with the duty of enforcement of §95.07 et seq. and shall be vested with all the authority conferred by §95.07 et seq., including the power to issue a summons requesting a violator to appear in court. The Council may provide for compensation for the Animal Control Officer as it may deem reasonable. The Animal Control Officer shall file a monthly report with the Council relating to the operation of the Animal Control Officer as it applies to the city.

§ 95.21 Animal Control Agency

The city may contract with or enter into an agreement with such person, persons, organization or corporation to provide for the operation of an animal shelter, impoundment of stray animals, confinement of certain animals, disposition of impounded animals, and for assisting in the administration of rabies vaccinations programs.

§ 95.22 Impounding of Dogs or Cats

The Animal Control Officer may take up and impound any dog found in the city without the tags provided in §95.07 or any dogs which are in violation of any other provisions of §95.07 et seq. To enforce §95.07 et seq., the Animal Control Officer is empowered and instructed to enter upon any private premises where the officer has reasonable cause to believe there is an unlicensed dog, a dog or cat which has been at large during the same day, or an unsecured female dog or cat in heat. Animals will not be impounded with any facility that sells, trades, or deals animals for licensed educational or scientific institution purposes.

§ 95.23 Impoundment Charges

- A. Redemption. Any dog or cat may be redeemed from the impound facility by the owner within 5 days after impoundment by payment of a fee as set forth from time to time by resolution of the Council for each day the dog or cat is confined in the pound, as well as the cost of boarding, feeding, and required vet charges. The city may recover, from the owner, impoundment fees charged to it by the impound facility.
- B. Additional Impoundment Charge. An additional fee, set forth from time to time by resolution of the Council, shall be charged for any dog or cat that has been impounded more than once each year.
- C. Unlicensed Additional Charge. In the case of unlicensed or untagged dog, an additional fee, set forth from time to time by resolution of the Council, shall be charged due to the special handling required on an unlicensed or untagged dog.
- D. If the owner does not pay fees, expenses, license and reclaim the animal within five (5) days of being notified of the impoundment, the animal will be put up for adoption without further notification, at the owner's expense. If the animal is adopted, the expenses and fees may be paid by the new owner through adoption fees.

§ 95.24 Disposition of Unclaimed Dogs or Cats

Any dog or cat which is not claimed as provided for in §95.23 or sold through a standard adoption process, shall be painlessly put to death and the body properly disposed of by the poundkeeper.

§ 95.25 Proceedings for Destruction of Certain Dogs

- A. Upon sworn complaint to district court that any one (1) of the following facts exist:
 - 1. That any dog at any time has attacked or bitten a person outside the owner's or custodian's premises;
 - 2. That any dog is vicious or shows vicious habits, or molests pedestrians;
 - 3. That any dog is a public nuisance as defined in M.S. §561.01, as it may be amended from time to time; and/or
 - 4. That any dog violates its quarantine contrary to the provisions of the chapter.

B. The district court shall issue a summons directed to the owner or person having possession of the dog commanding the owner or person in possession to appear before the court and show cause why the dog should not be disposed of as authorized in this code. The summons shall be returnable not less than 2 nor more than 6 days from the date of delivery and shall be served at least 2 days before the time to appear mentioned in the summons. If, at the hearing, the district court finds that the facts stated in the complaint are true, the judge may either order: the owner or custodian to keep the dog confined to a designated place; the owner or custodian to remove the dog from the city; or humanely euthanized by certified veterinary staff. If the owner or custodian disobeys the order, the owner or custodian shall, upon the filing of a complaint and after a hearing and conviction before a district court, be liable to the punishment provided for violation of this chapter. Any Animal Control Officer may, upon disobedience of the order, impound and order the humane euthanasia of any dog describe in the order of the district court. The provisions of this section are in addition to and supplemental to other provisions of this code. Costs of the proceeding specified by this section shall be assessed against the owner or custodian of the dog.

§ 95.26 Prohibition of Unsecured Female Dogs or Cats in Heat

- A. It shall be unlawful for any person to own, harbor, keep, or have in their possession or on their premises any unsecured female dog or cat in heat.
- B. Any unsecured female dog or cat in heat shall be deemed to be any female dog or cat which is not confined in a building or secured enclosure in a manner that the dog or cat cannot come into contact with another animal except for planned breeding.

§ 95.27 Liability

The city and/or its animal control agents shall not be liable to any person for the death, destruction, damage, injury or disease caused to any animal that has been impounded pursuant to this chapter.

§ 95.28 Severability

The provisions of any part of this chapter are severable. If any provision or subsection hereof or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the other provisions, subsections and application of this chapter to other persons or circumstances shall not be affected thereby. It is the intent of this chapter that the same would have been adopted had such invalid provisions, if any, not been included herein.

§ 95.30 Dangerous Dogs; Reporting And Notification

- (A) *Incident report*. The Animal Control Officer shall complete an "Incident Report" on any incident listed in the definition for "dangerous dog" in § 11.01.
- (B) Notice declaring a dangerous dog. The Animal Control Officer shall provide the animal owner with a "Notice to Declare Dog Dangerous" for any incident listed in the definition for "dangerous dog" in § 11.01. The Animal Control Officer shall provide written notice to the City Clerk/Administrator that a "Notice to Declare Dog Dangerous" has been issued to an animal owner.
- (1) Every reasonable attempt should be made by the Animal Control Officer to deliver the "Notice Declaring a Dangerous Dog" to the animal owner in person.
- (2) If the "Notice to Declare Dog Dangerous" cannot be delivered to the animal owner, the Animal Control Officer shall provide the "Notice" to the City Clerk/Administrator for mailing. The "Notice Declaring Dog Dangerous" shall be mailed to the animal owner by certified mail.
- (3) Dogs may not be declared dangerous if the threat, injury, or damage was sustained by a person:
- (a) Who was committing, at the time, a willful trespass or other tort upon the premises occupied by the owner of the dog;
- (b) Who was provoking, tormenting, abusing, or assaulting the dog or who can be shown to have repeatedly, in the past, provoked, tormented, abused, or assaulted the dog; or
 - (c) Who was committing or attempting to commit a crime.

§ 95.31 Dangerous Dogs; Registration Requirement

- (A) The owner of a dangerous dog shall obtain a certificate of registration from Washington County.
- (B) Washington County regulations indicate that a certificate of registration will be issued if:
- (1) Registration. The county shall issue a certificate of registration to the owner of a dangerous dog if the owner presents sufficient evidence that:
- (a) A proper enclosure exists for the dangerous dog and a posting on the premises with a clearly visible warning sign, including a warning symbol to inform children, that there is a dangerous dog on the property; and

- (b) A surety bond issued by a surety company authorized to conduct business in this state in a form acceptable to the county in the sum of at least \$50,000, payable to any person injured by the dangerous dog, or a policy of liability insurance issued by an insurance company authorized to conduct business in this state in the amount of at least \$50,000, insuring the owner for any personal injuries inflicted by the dangerous dog.
- (2) Fee. The county may charge the owner an annual fee, in addition to any regular dog licensing fees, to obtain a certificate of registration for a dangerous dog under this section.
- (3) Law enforcement exemption. The provisions of this section do not apply to dangerous dogs used by law enforcement officials for police work.
- (4) Tag. A dangerous dog registered under this section must have a standardized, easily identifiable tag identifying the dog as dangerous affixed to the dog's collar at all times.

§ 95.32 Dangerous Dogs; Containment Requirements

An owner of a dangerous dog shall keep the dangerous dog, while on the owner's property, in a proper enclosure. If the dog is outside the proper enclosure, the dog must be muzzled and restrained by a substantial chain or leash and under the physical restraint of a responsible person. The muzzle must be made in a manner that will prevent the dog from biting any person or animal but that will not cause injury to the dog or interfere with its vision or respiration.

§ 95.33 Potentially Dangerous Dogs; Reporting And Notification

- (A) *Incident report.* The Animal Control Officer shall complete an "Incident Report" on any incident listed in the definition for "potentially dangerous dog" in § 11.01.
- (B) Notice declaring a potentially dangerous dog. The Animal Control Officer shall provide the animal owner with a "Notice to Declare Dog Potentially Dangerous" for any incident listed in the definition for "potentially dangerous dog" in § 11.01. The Animal Control Officer shall provide written notice to the City Clerk/Administrator that a"Notice to Declare Dog Potentially Dangerous" has been issued to an animal owner.
- (1) Every reasonable attempt should be made by the Animal Control Officer to deliver the "Notice To Declare a Potentially Dangerous Dog" to the animal owner in person.
- (2) If the "Notice" cannot be delivered to the animal owner, the Animal Control Officer shall provide the "Notice" to the City Clerk/Administrator for mailing. The "Notice To Declare a Potentially Dangerous Dog" shall be mailed to the animal owner by certified mail.

§ 95.34 Potentially Dangerous Dogs; Containment Requirements

- (A) An owner of a potentially dangerous dog shall keep the dangerous dog, while on the owner's property, in a proper enclosure.
- (B) If the dog is outside the proper enclosure, the dog must be muzzled and restrained by a substantial chain or leash and under the physical restraint of a responsible person.
- (C) The muzzle must be made in a manner that will prevent the dog from biting any person or animal but that will not cause injury to the dog or interfere with its vision or respiration.

§ 95.35 Confiscation

(A) Seizure.

- (1) The Animal Control Officer shall immediately seize any dangerous dog if:
- (a) After 14 days after the owner has notice that the dog is dangerous, the dog is not validly registered under § 95.31;
 - (b) The dog is not maintained in the proper enclosure; or
- (c) The dog is outside the proper enclosure and not under physical restraint of a responsible person as required under § 95.32.
- (2) If an owner of a dog is convicted of a crime for which the dog was originally seized, the court may order that the dog be confiscated and destroyed in a proper and humane manner, and that the owner pay the costs incurred in confiscating, confining, and destroying the dog.
- (B) Reclaimed. A dangerous dog seized under division (A) above may be reclaimed by the owner of the dog upon payment of impounding and boarding fees, and presenting proof to the Animal Control Officer, and the city that the requirements of §§ 95.31 and 95.32, as they may be amended from time to time, will be met. A dog not reclaimed under this subdivision within 7 days may be disposed of as provided in § 95.25, and the owner is liable to the city for costs incurred in confining and disposing of the dog.

(C) Subsequent offenses; seizure.

- (1) If a person has been convicted of a misdemeanor for violating a provision of §§ 95.31 and 95.32, and the person is charged with a subsequent violation relating to the same dog, the dog must be seized by the city's Animal Control Officer.
- (2) If the owner is convicted of a crime for which the dog was seized, the court shall order that the dog be destroyed in a proper and humane manner and the owner pay the cost of confining and destroying the animal.
- (3) If the person is not convicted of the crime for which the dog was seized, the owner may reclaim the dog upon payment to the city of a fee for the care and boarding of the dog.

(4) If the dog is not reclaimed by the owner within 5 days after the owner has been notified that the dog may be reclaimed, the dog may be disposed of as provided under § 95.35, and the owner is liable to the city for the costs incurred in confining, impounding, and disposing of the dog.

§ 95.36 Exceptions

- (1) This section does not apply to animals which are temporarily brought into the city for the purpose of participating in any circus or show; nor does it apply to any public zoo, or persons keeping animals for a public zoo as volunteers, docents or otherwise; nor to any bona fide research institution, or veterinary hospital, provided protective devices adequate to prevent such animal from escaping or injuring the public are provided.
- (2) In the case of regulated animals, those exemptions listed in Minn. Stat. § 346.155, subd. 7 shall apply.

ARTICLE 3. HORSES

§ 95.40 Horses; Requirements

§ 95.40 Horses; Requirements

- A. No person shall ride, drive, lead, or otherwise allow any horse or pony to directly travel over and in contact with any street or public road in the city which is hard surfaced or which has been ready for hard surfacing to the extent that the base for the hard surface has been applied, except the horses, ponies, and horse drawn vehicles shall be allowed on unpaved shoulders of the street or public road.
- B. No horse, pony, mule or other beast of burden shall be allowed on any public street, alley, sidewalk or other public right-of-way or upon public property unless the animal is properly attired to prevent animal waste from being deposited upon such public property or the owner of the animal shall be otherwise responsible for cleanup of all animal waste deposited upon public property by the animal.
- C. The restrictions of this section do not apply to animals that are part of a parade or other legally sanctioned event held in the city; however, all animals participating in such events are still subject to waste and cleanup requirements.

§ 95.90 Keeping Of Animals

The keeping of animals except for domesticated pets inside of the dwelling unit shall be prohibited.

§ 95.91 Other Animals

No person who owns or who has custody of any horse, mule, sheep, goat, swine, fowl, poultry, cattle, monkey, domesticated snake, cat, or any other animal shall permit the same to run at large in the city. Any animal or fowl found running at large shall be impounded by the Animal Control Officer who will then proceed, pursuant to §§ 95.33 through 95.36.

§ 95.92 Dangerous Animals Prohibited

- A. No person shall harbor, maintain, or control any dangerous animal within the city.
- B. A dangerous animal is 1 which is capable of inflicting severe bodily harm to humans, and shall include but not be limited to the following species:
 - 1. Class Mammalia.
 - a. African buffalo (Syncerus caffer);
 - b. Hippopotamus (Hippopotamus amphibious);
 - c. Wolves, dingoes, jackals, all species except foxes (Family Canidae);
- d. Hyenas, all species except aardwolves (Proteles cristatus)(Family Hyaenidae);
 - e. Wolverine (Gulo gulo);
 - f. Honey badger or ratel (Mellivora campensis);
 - g. Old World badger (Meles metes);
 - h. Bears (Family Ursidae);
 - i. Lions, jaguars, leopards, tigers (Genus Panthera);
 - j. Clouded leopard (Neofelis nebulosa);
 - k. Cheetah (Acinonyx jubatus);
 - 1. Cougar or mountain lion (Felis concolor);

- m. Elephants (Family Elephantidae);
- n. Rhinoceroses (Family Rhinocerotidae);
- o. Gibbons, siamangs (Family Hylobatidae);
- p. Orangutans, chimpanzees, gorillas (Family Pongidae);
- q. Baboons, drills, mandrills (Genus Papio);
- r. Macaques (Genus Macaca); and
- s. Gelada baboon (Theropithecus gelada).
- 2. Class Repitilia.
 - a. Gavials (Family Gavialidae);
 - b. Crocodiles (Family Crocodylidae);
 - c. Alligators, caimans (Family Alligatoridae);

Public Notice

The City Council of the City of Lake Elmo has adopted Ordinance No. 08-088, which replaces the current sections of the City Code pertaining to Animals. The ordinance includes the following provisions.

- The ordinance regulates dog and cat ownership and care in the City of Lake Elmo
- The ordinance regulates licensing of dogs in the City of Lake Elmo
- The ordinance prohibits unreasonable disturbances by animals in the City of Lake Elmo
- The ordinance adds a section on Requirements for Horse-Drawn Vehicles to the Horses Article.
- The ordinance adds an Exceptions section to the Dangerous Animals Article

ORDINANCE NO. 08-089

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING MUNICIPAL FEES

The Lake Elmo City Council hereby adopts the following fee schedule amendment and directs that it be added to the Lake Elmo Municipal Code as Appendix A.

- Change of \$20 Dog License Fee to \$20 Dog License altered Fee

SUMMARY AND ACTION REQUESTED:

The City Council is respectfully requested to consider approving Ordinance 08-090, thereby approving revisions to Section 150.277 of the City Code governing storm water and erosion and sediment control in the City of Lake Elmo; and approving Resolution No. 2013-89 authorizing summary publication of Ordinance 08-090. The recommended motions for these actions are as follows:

"Move to approve Ordinance 08-090, approving revisions to Section 150.277 of the City Code governing storm water and erosion and sediment control in the City of Lake Elmo."

and

"Move to approve Resolution No. 2013-89, authorizing summary publication of Ordinance 08-090."

STAFF REPORT:

The Storm Water and Erosion and Sediment Control Ordinance was adopted and incorporated into the City Code by the City Council on June 16, 2009, and received minor revisions in May 2011. Additional revisions are now being proposed through Ordinance 08-090 to better align the

regulation of stormwater management in the city with the new State and Watershed rules and to simplify permitting and compliance requirements with the rules.

In compliance with the Federal Clean Water Act, the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) maintains permitting authority to manage stormwater and improve water quality throughout the state. The MPCA Stormwater Program includes two general stormwater permits that have been reissued on August 1, 2013 to comply with changing federal rules and incorporate changes needed to enhance compliance with the permit. The MPCA issues the Minnesota NPDES/SDS Construction Stormwater General Permit (R1000001) to protect water resources from contaminants in runoff from construction sites. The MPCA also issues the General NPDES/SDS Permit MNR040000 for Municipal Separate Storm Sewer Systems (MS4s) to regulate stormwater discharge from counties, cities, townships and other government entities in urbanized areas.

Through the reissuance of these two permits the MPCA has included new requirements for construction projects and by MS4's for controlling stormwater discharge volume, Total Suspended Solids (TSS) and Phosphorus; which will require increased infiltration of stormwater runoff for new development and redevelopment projects.

In addition, the Valley Branch Watershed District (VBWD) is updating their Rules and Regulations to comply with the changes in federal and state rules. Among these changes the VBWD is increasing the volume control design standard to capture and retain on site 1.1 inches of stormwater runoff from the new and/or fully reconstructed impervious surface. This design standard was previously 0.5 inches.

Ordinance 08-090 revises Section 150.277 Performance and Design Standards to;

- Eliminate the requirement by applicants to prepare and submit for approval by the City a Storm Water Management Plan using stormwater modeling design criteria that is different from the State and/or local Watershed District(s). Instead the Stormwater Management Plan must be submitted to the City, but will be the same Stormwater Management Plan already prepared for watershed district and/or State approvals.
- Align the stormwater rate control requirements by the city with the rate control requirements of the State and local Watershed(s).
- Align the water quality control (volume) requirements by the city with the water quality control (volume) requirements of the State and local Watershed(s).

The proposed revisions to Section 150.277 of the City Code are shown in Ordinance 08-090 (see Attachment No. 1). Since these revisions are not within the City's Zoning Code, a public hearing is not required.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff is recommending that the City Council approve Ordinance 08-090, thereby approving revisions to Section 150.277 of the City Code governing storm water and erosion and sediment control in the City of Lake Elmo; and approve Resolution No. 2013-89 authorizing summary publication of Ordinance 08-090. ORDINANCE NO. 08-090

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 150.277 OF THE LAKE ELMO CITY CODE OF ORDINANCES GOVERNING STORM WATER AND EROSION AND SEDIMENT CONTROL

Section 1. The City Council of the City of Lake Elmo hereby ordains that Section 150.277 subdivision (A) (1) is hereby amended to read as follows:

(1) All storm water management plans shall meet the minimum requirements of the NPDES Construction Stormwater Permit (Permit No. MNR100001), the minimum requirements of the watershed(s) having jurisdiction over the site(s), the City Engineering Design Standards, and other regulatory agencies. A storm water management plan must be submitted to the city for review and approval concurrently with the submittal to the watershed(s) having jurisdiction over the site(s).

Section 2. The City Council of the City of Lake Elmo hereby ordains that Section 150.277 subdivision (A) (2) (a) and (b) are hereby amended to read as follows:

- (2) Storm Water Criteria. Storm water management plans will be assessed for stormwater rate control and storm water quality management to reduce the impacts of the land activity.
 - (a) Rate control requirements. The stormwater management plan shall demonstrate that all rate control requirements of the NPDES Construction Stormwater Permit (Permit No. MNR100001) and the watershed(s) having jurisdiction over the site(s) are met. Storm water best management practices to meet this requirement shall be designed and constructed in accordance with the most current version of the City Engineering Design Standards. The City Engineer retains the authority to require the above conditions to apply to the rate of storm water runoff discharging at any point leaving the site.
 - (b) Water Quality Control Requirements. The stormwater management plan shall demonstrate that all water quality control requirements of the NPDES Construction Stormwater Permit (Permit No. MNR100001) and the watershed(s) having jurisdiction over the site(s) are met. Storm water best management practices to meet this requirement shall be designed and constructed in accordance with the most current version of the City Engineering Design Standards. The City Engineer retains the authority to require the above conditions to apply to the rate of storm water runoff discharging at any point leaving the site.

Public Notice

The City Council of the City of Lake Elmo has adopted Ordinance No. 08-090, which replaces the current sections of the City Code pertaining to Storm Water and Erosion and Sediment Control. The revisions to the Lake Elmo stormwater management ordinance are being proposed to better align the regulation of stormwater management in the city with the new State and Watershed rules and to simplify permitting and compliance requirements with the rules.

In compliance with the Federal Clean Water Act, the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) maintains permitting authority to manage stormwater and improve water quality throughout the state. The MPCA Stormwater Program includes two general stormwater permits that have been reissued on August 1, 2013 to comply with changing federal rules and incorporate changes needed to enhance compliance with the permit. The MPCA issues the Minnesota NPDES/SDS Construction Stormwater General Permit (R1000001) to protect water resources from contaminants in runoff from construction sites. - Align the stormwater rate control requirements by the city with the rate control requirements of the State and local Watershed(s).
- Align the water quality control (volume) requirements by the city with the water quality control (volume) requirements of the State and local Watershed(s).

150.270 STATUTORY AUTHORIZATION.

This subchapter is adopted pursuant to the authorization and policies contained in M.S. Chs. 103B, 103F.401, 103F.441, and 462 and Minnesota Rules Chs. 7050, 7090, and 8410. This subchapter is intended to meet the current construction site erosion and sediment control and post-construction storm water management regulatory requirements for construction activity and small construction activity (NPDES Permit) as defined in 40 CFR pt. 122.26(b)(14)(x) and (b)(15), respectively.

150.271 FINDINGS.

The City of Lake Elmo finds that uncontrolled storm water runoff and construction site erosion from land development and land disturbing activity can have significant adverse impacts upon local and regional water resources diminishing the quality of public health, safety, public and private property, and natural resources of the City. Specifically, uncontrolled construction site erosion and storm water runoff can:

(A) Threaten public health, safety, property, and general welfare by increasing runoff volume peak flood flows, and overburdening storm sewers, drainage ways, and other storm drainage systems;

- (B) Diminish the capacity of lakes and streams to support fish, aquatic life, recreational, and water supply uses by increasing pollutant loadings of total sediment, suspended solids, nutrients, heavy metals, bacteria, pathogens, and other urban pollutants;
- (C) Degrade physical stream habitat by increasing stream bank erosion, increasing stream bed scour, diminishing groundwater recharge, diminishing stream base flows, and increasing stream temperatures;
- (D)Undermine floodplain management efforts by increasing the incidence and levels of flooding;
- (E) Alter wetland communities by changing wetland hydrology and increasing pollutant loading; and
- (F) Generate airborne particulate concentrations that are health threatening or may cause other damage to property or the environment.

150.272 PURPOSE.

- (A) The general purpose of this subchapter is to set forth regulatory requirements for land development and land disturbing activities aimed at minimizing threats to public health, safety, public and private property and natural resources within the city from construction site erosion and post-construction storm water runoff.
- (B) Specific purposes are to establish performance standards that will:
 - (1) Protect life and property from dangers associated with flooding;
 - (2) Protect public and private property and the natural resources from damage resulting from runoff and construction site erosion;
 - (3) Protect functional values of all types of natural water bodies (e.g., rivers, streams, wetlands, lakes, seasonal ponds);
 - (4) Sustain or enhance biodiversity (native plant and animal habitat) and support riparian ecosystems;
 - (5) Protect water quality from nutrients, heavy metals, bacteria, pathogens, debris, thermal stress, and other urban pollutants;
 - (6) Promote infiltration and groundwater recharge;
 - (7) Regulate storm water runoff volumes and peak rates for land development and land disturbing activities;
 - (8) Promote regional storm water management by watershed; and
 - (9) Provide a single, consistent set of performance standards that apply to all land development and land disturbing activities.

150.273 APPLICABILITY.

- (A) Storm Water Management.
 - (1) A storm water management (SWM) plan shall be required for all proposed land development activity, unless otherwise exempted in this subchapter, which meets any or all of the following:
 - (a) Any land development activity that increases and/or replaces impervious surface with a surface area exceeding 1 acre, including smaller individual sites that are part of a common plan of development that may be constructed at different times; and/or
 - (b) A subdivision consisting of 3 or more lots; and/or
 - (c) Any land development activity, regardless of size, that the city determines would otherwise cause an adverse impact to an environmentally sensitive area.
 - (2) Exemptions. The following land development activities will be exempt from the storm water management requirements of this subchapter:
 - (a) Mining activities regulated by Chapter 90 of the City Code; and
 - (b) Reconstruction of existing public trails and construction of new public trails that are not a part of a proposed land development activity as defined in division (A) (1) above; and
 - (c) Reclamation and maintenance of existing public streets.
- (B) Erosion and Sediment Control.
 - (1) An erosion and sediment control (ESC) plan shall be required for all proposed land disturbing activity, unless otherwise exempted in this subchapter, which meets any or all of the following:
 - (a) Meets the permit requirements of an excavation and grading permit per Section 151.017 of the City Code;
 - (b) New dwelling permits;
 - (c) A subdivision of any size;
 - (d) Involves the laying, repairing, replacing, or enlarging of an underground utility, pipe or other facility, or the disturbance of road ditch, grass swale or other open channel for a distance of 500 feet or more;

- (e) Is a land disturbing activity, regardless of size, that the city determines would otherwise cause an adverse impact to an environmentally sensitive area, or may violate any erosion and sediment control standard set forth in this subchapter.
- (2) Exemptions. The following land disturbing activities will be exempt from the erosion and sediment control plan requirements of this subchapter:
 - (a) Cemetery graves;
 - (b) Mining activities regulated by Chapter 90 of the City Code;
 - (c) Tilling, planting, or harvesting of agricultural, horticultural or silvicultural (forestry) crops;
 - (d) Emergency work necessary to protect life, limb, or property; and
 - (e) City, county, state, or federal agency project whose plans and specifications meet the requirements of this subchapter and are reviewed and approved by the city under a separate process.

150.274 DEFINITIONS.

For the purposes of this subchapter, all terms, phrases, words, and their derivatives shall have the meanings as stated in Chapter 11 of the City Code.

150.275 INCORPORATION BY REFERENCE.

- (A) The following are incorporated into this subchapter by reference:
 - (1) The Local Surface Water Management Plan; and
 - (2) The City Engineering Design Standards.
- (B) All storm water mitigation and management technologies shall be consistent with the most current versions of the City Engineering Design Standards.

150.276 PLAN REVIEW PROCEDURE.

- (A) Plan approval required The applicant shall not commence any construction activity subject to this subchapter until plan approval has been authorized by the city and all fees, escrows and securities have been paid and filed with the city.
- (B) *Plan Submittal* The applicant must submit the required plans and documentation to fully address all provisions of this subchapter and demonstrating conformance to the current versions of the City Engineering Design Standards.
- (C) Plan review and authorization The city shall review the plan submittal for completeness and compliance with standards. If the city determines that the plan does not meet the requirements of this subchapter, the city shall notify the applicant that the submittal is incomplete and request changes or additional information. The plan(s) must be revised to correct the deficiencies and resubmitted for approval before the land disturbance activity

begins. If the city determines that the storm water management plan and/or erosion and sediment control plan meet the requirements of this subchapter, the city shall issue a plan approval valid for a specified period of time that authorizes the land activity contingent on the implementation and completion of this plan. The city may approve the plans subject to compliance to conditions reasonable and necessary to insure that the requirements in this subchapter are met.

- (D) Construction initiation and first compliance inspection No work shall begin on a site until a preconstruction meeting has been conducted (if required by the city as part of the plan approval). Once work is authorized to begin, the applicant or agent shall install all erosion and sediment control devices as required by the approved plan and shall inform the city that they are in place. The city will complete an initial site inspection to determine compliance with the plan and to authorize the land disturbance activity to begin.
- (E) Adherence to the approved plans and plan modifications Once approved by the city, the storm water management plan and/or erosion and sediment control plan must be followed throughout the duration of the land disturbance or land development activity. The approved plans shall not be modified or altered without receiving written authorization from the city. Plan amendments will be required by the city whenever:
 - A change in design, construction, operation, maintenance, weather, or seasonal
 conditions that has a significant effect on the discharge or pollutants to surface waters
 or underground waters;
 - (2) Inspections or investigations indicate the plans are not effective in eliminating or significantly minimizing the discharge or pollutants to surface waters or underground waters or that the discharges are causing water quality degradation:
 - (3) The plan is not achieving the general objectives of minimizing pollutants in storm water discharges associated with construction activity; or
 - (4) The plan is found to not be consistent with the terms and conditions of this subchapter.
- (F) Variance Requests. The city may grant a variance on a case-by-case basis. The content of a variance is specified in the zoning code.

150.277 PERFORMANCE AND DESIGN STANDARDS.

(A) Storm Water Management Plan.

(1) All storm water management plans shall meet or exceed the most stringent of the performance and design standards of this subchapter and shall be consistent with minimum requirements of the National Construction Stormwater Permit (Permit No. MNR100001). Pollution Discharge Elimination Permit (NPDES) requirements, the minimum requirements of the watershed(s) having jurisdiction over the site(s), the City Engineering Design Standards, and the filing or approval requirements of relevant watershed districts (Brown's Creek, South Washington, and/or Valley Branch), Washington County, Minnesota Department of Natural Resources.

Minnesota Pollution Control Agency, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, and other regulatory agencies. A storm water management plan must be submitted to the city for review and approval concurrently with the submittal to the watershed(s) having jurisdiction over the site(s).

- (2)-Storm Water Criteria.
- (a) Storm water management plans will be assessed for stormwater rate control, stormwater volume control and storm water quality management to reduce the impacts of the land activity, by maintaining pre-development hydrological conditions in the following ways:
 - 1. Decrease runoff volume.
 - 2. Decrease crosion and sedimentation.
 - 3. Decrease flow frequency, duration, and peak runoff rates.
 - 4. Increase infiltration (groundwater recharge).
 - 5. Maintain-existing flow patterns.
 - Reduce time to peak flows by increasing the time of concentration to and through drainage ways and storm sewers.
 - 7. Storage of storm water runoff on site.

Aveid-channel-crosion.

- (b)(a) Rate control requirements. The stormwater management plan shall demonstrate that all rate control requirements of the NPDES Construction Stormwater Permit (Permit No. MNR 100001) and the watershed(s) having jurisdiction over the site(s) are met. Storm water best management practices to meet this requirement shall be designed and constructed in accordance with the most current version of the City Engineering Design Standards. The City Engineer retains the authority to require the above conditions to apply to the rate of storm water runoff discharging at any point leaving the site.
 - I. The rate of storm water runoff discharging from a proposed site shall not be greater than the rate of storm water runoff discharging prior to the proposed site alteration for the 2., 10., and 100 year storm events. Storm water best management practices to meet this requirement shall be designed and constructed in accordance with the most current version of the City Engineering Design Standards. The City Engineer retains the authority to require the above conditions to apply to the rate of storm water runoff discharging at any point leaving the site.
 - 2. The analyses for the rate of storm water runoff shall be calculated using the Soil Conservation Service Type II time distribution for the 2 , 10, and 100-year 24 hour storm events. The rate of storm water runoff prior to the proposed development shall be calculated at the pre-settlement condition as defined in the State of Minnesota Stormwater Manual for a "meadow" condition based on the applicable hydrologic soil group(s) for the development (see Table 1).

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- (b) Volume Water Quality Control Requirements. The stormwater management plan shall demonstrate that all water quality control requirements of the NPDES Construction Stormwater Permit (Permit No. MNR 100001) and the watershed(s) having jurisdiction over the site(s) are met. Storm water best management practices to meet this requirement shall be designed and constructed in accordance with the most current version of the City Engineering Design Standards. The City Engineer retains the authority to require the above conditions to apply to the rate of storm water runoff discharging at any point leaving the site.
 - 1. The volume of storm water runoff discharging from a proposed site shall not be greater than the volume of storm water runoff discharging prior to the proposed site alteration for the 2 . 10 . and 100 year storm events. Storm water best management practices to meet this requirement shall be designed and constructed in accordance with the most current version of the City Engineering Design Standards. The City Engineer retains the authority to require the above conditions to apply to the volume of storm water runoff discharging at any point leaving the site.
 - 2. The analyses for the volume of storm water runoff shall be calculated using the Soil Conservation Service Type II time distribution for the 2 , 10, and 100 year 24 hour storm events. The volume of storm water runoff prior to the proposed development shall be calculated at the pre-settlement condition as defined in the State of Minnesota Stormwater Manual for a "meadow" condition based on the applicable hydrologic soil group(s) for the development (see Table 1).

- (a) Drainage-Related Easements. Drainage easements must be acquired on behalf of the city and legally recorded at the county for all permanent storm water facilities to allow for proper access and maintenance activities. At a minimum, drainage easements shall meet the following criteria.
 - Easements are required for all ponding areas to the basin's 100-year storm high water level elevation.
 - 2. Easements are required for all outlet swales and ditches, and for overland overflow routes located downstream of basins located on site.
 - 3. Easements are required for all storm sewer pipes, throughout its entire length. For storm sewer pipes installed less than 10 feet in depth within private property, the easement shall be a minimum of 20 feet wide. For storm sewer pipes installed greater than 10 feet in depth within private property, the

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- easement shall be a minimum of 30 feet wide, or as determined by the city engineer.
- 4. Easements are required for maintenance vehicle access to all storm water facilities where not directly available on a public road.
- 5. If a storm water management plan involves direction of some or all runoff off of the site, it shall be the responsibility of the applicant to obtain from adjacent property owners any necessary easements or other property interests concerning flowage of water.

(B) Erosion and Sediment Control Plan.

(1) All erosion and sediment control plans shall meet or exceed the most stringent of the performance and design standards of this subchapter and shall be consistent with National Pollution Discharge Elimination Permit (NPDES) requirements, the City Engineering Design Standards, and the filing or approval requirements of relevant watershed districts (Brown's Creek, South Washington, and/or Valley Branch), Washington County, Minnesota Department of Natural Resources, Minnesota Pollution Control Agency, and other regulatory agencies.

(2) Erosion and Sediment Control Criteria.

- (a) Erosion and sediment control plans will be assessed in the following ways:
 - Pollution prevention by minimizing disturbance of natural soil cover and vegetation, and minimizing, in area and duration, exposed soil and unstable soil conditions;
 - Using sediment barriers to protect soil stockpiles, receiving water bodies, wetlands, storm sewer inlets, and adjacent properties from sediment deposition:
 - 3. Minimize off-site sediment transport on trucks and equipment;
 - 4. Minimize work in and adjacent to water bodies and wetlands:
 - 5. Maintain stable slopes;
 - 6. Avoid steep slopes and the need for high cuts and fills;
 - 7. Minimize disturbance to the surrounding soils, root systems and trunks of trees adjacent to site activity that are intended to be left standing;
 - 8. Minimize the compaction of site soils:
 - 9. Using and maintaining temporary and permanent soil stabilization;
 - Controlling site waste through the use of a designated concrete washout area;
 and
 - 11. Managing site waste of all unused building materials by properly disposed of wastes offsite and not allowing site wastes to be carried by runoff into a receiving channel or storm sewer system.
- (b) All sites must be maintained to prevent unreasonable erosion and sedimentation.
- (c) Erosion control measures must be in place before any land disturbance activity begins, and measures must remain in place and functional until the site is

- permanently stabilized. Adequate and timely temporary and permanent stabilization measures must be taken.
- (d) Streets shall be cleaned and swept within 24 hours whenever tracking of sediment occurs and before sites are left idle for weekends and holidays.
- (e) All temporary erosion and sediment control measures, such as silt fence and inlet protection devices, shall be removed within 30 days after permanent stabilization is attained. All storm sewer systems and drainage ways must be flushed and cleaned of sediment accumulation and all accumulated sediments must be removed and properly disposed.

150.278 STORM WATER FACILITY MAINTENANCE.

- (A) Maintenance of publically owned facilities.
 - (1) The city shall perform maintenance of publicly owned storm water facilities within the city as provided for in the local surface water management plan and the City Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan.
 - (2) A final inspection shall be required before the city accepts ownership of the stormwater facilities. Before work under the plan is deemed complete, the applicant must submit as-built record drawings and a maintenance plan demonstrating at the time of final stabilization that the storm water facilities conform to design specifications.
- (B) Maintenance of privately owned facilities. A maintenance agreement in a form acceptable to the city must be executed and recorded with the county for all permanent storm water facilities to be located on private property. The agreement shall provide a maintenance plan defining the party responsible to conduct maintenance, the type of maintenance and the maintenance intervals.

150.279 MONITORING AND INSPECTIONS.

(A) Monitoring and inspection requirements for site construction. The applicant is responsible for inspections and record keeping in accordance with the approved plan requirements and NPDES permit requirements. The applicant must maintain a copy of the approved storm water management and erosion and sediment control plans at the site at all times including all daily records required by the plan(s). The applicant must monitor site conditions and make any and all necessary repairs and corrections to the erosion control measures to maintain site compliance. The applicant has a duty to report to the city any illegal offsite discharges. Failure to make a report within 24 hours of the discovery of the offsite discharge shall constitute a violation of this subchapter.

(B) City Inspections.

(1) The city shall conduct inspections on a regular basis to ensure that both storm water and erosion and sediment control measures are properly installed and maintained prior to construction, during construction, and at the completion of the project. The city shall not be responsible for the direct or indirect consequences to the applicant or to third-parties for non-compliant conditions undetected by inspection.

- (2) Right of entry. The issuance of an approved plan under this subchapter constitutes a right of entry for the city or its contractor to enter upon the construction site for the purpose of obtaining information, examination of records, conducting investigations, inspections or surveys, including the right to bring such equipment to perform such surveys and investigations. The City Inspector may copy any books, papers, records, or memoranda pertaining to activities or records required to be kept under the terms and conditions of this site, and may inspect the storm water pollution control and erosion control measures including any sampling and monitoring pertaining to the compliance requirements for the site.
- (3) Construction shall not occur on the site at any time when the city has identified conditions of non-compliance or a stop work order has been issued.
- (4) Construction activities undertaken by an applicant prior to resolution of all discrepancies specified by the city shall constitute a violation of this subchapter.
- (5) Whenever there is insufficient evidence of compliance with any of the provisions of this subchapter or evidence that any material or construction does not conform to the requirements of the approved plans, the city may require tests as proof of compliance to be made at no expense to the city. Test methods shall be as specified by recognized test standards, or in the absence thereof, by the city.

150.280 ENFORCEMENT.

- (A) Enforcement. The city shall be responsible for enforcing this subchapter.
- (B) Penalties. Any person, firm or corporation failing to comply with or violating any of the provisions of this subchapter, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and each day during which any violation of any of the provisions of this subchapter is committed, continued or permitted, shall constitute a separate offense. All land use and building permits shall be suspended until the applicant has corrected any and all violations.
- (C) Enforcement by Stop Work Order.
 - (1) Whenever a city inspector finds any violation of this subchapter, the inspector will fill out an inspection form noting the observed violations and a stop work order will be issued.
 - (2) The stop work order shall be in writing and shall be given to the applicant or the applicant's agent.
 - (3) Upon issuance of the stop work order, the cited work shall immediately cease. The stop work order shall state the reason for the order.
 - (4) The applicant must immediately begin corrective actions to remedy the violations. Once the violations have been corrected the applicant must contact the city to schedule a re-inspection.

- (5) The applicant may commence further activity at the site after a re-inspection is provided by the city and the city determines that the site is in compliance, and all fees associated with the violation are paid in full.
- (6) If the applicant fails to correct the violations in a timely manner, the City may correct the cited violations and draw down the escrow to cover the costs.
- (D) Enforcement Actions to Ensure Compliance.
 - (1) The city can take the additional following actions in the event of a failure by applicant to meet the terms of this subchapter.
 - (a) Withhold inspections or issuance of certificates or approvals.
 - (b) Revoke any permit issued by the city to the applicant.
 - (c) Conduct remedial or corrective action on the development site or adjacent site affected by the failure.
 - (d) Recover from applicant all costs associated with correcting the failure or remediating damage from the failure, by drawing down any escrow funds. If the costs exceed the escrow funds the city may invoice the applicant with payment due immediately. All payments by applicant must be made prior to resuming work on the site.
 - (e) Bring other actions against the applicant to recover costs of remediation or meeting the terms of this subchapter.

150.281 FINANCIAL SECURITIES.

- (A) Financial securities. The applicant shall provide security for the performance of the work in the amount established in the city's fee schedule, and in a form acceptable to the City.
- (B) Action against the financial security. The city may access the financial security to conduct work necessary to correct any violations in a timely manner and in accordance with the provisions of this subchapter. The city shall use the security to finance remedial work undertaken by the city, or a private contractor under contract to the City including a fee to the city for processing equal to 10% of the any contractor(s) invoice for materials and services, to reimburse the City for all costs incurred in the process of remedial work including, but not limited to, staff time, engineering fees and attorney's fees.
- (C) Maintenance of financial security. If at any time the financial security is drawn upon, the applicant will be required to submit additional security to restore the security to the full amount as originally established. Restoring the full security is a requirement prior to resuming work on the site.

150.282 STORM WATER UTILITY.

Please refer to Chapter 53 in the City Code.

150.283 LAWN FERTILIZER REGULATIONS.

No person shall apply fertilizer to or deposit grass clippings, leaves, or other vegetative materials on impervious surfaces, or within storm water drainage systems, natural drainage ways, or within wetland buffer areas.

150.284 OTHER CONTROLS.

- (A) In the event of any conflict between the provisions of this subchapter and the provisions of any other city ordinance adopted by the city council, the more restrictive standard prevails.
- (B) The city retains the right to impose supplemental or additional conditions or requirements to prevent erosion or undesired runoff.

PUBLIC POLICY STATEMENT

In preparation for next spring's adoption of Thrive MSP 2040 and the beginning of decennial Comprehensive Plan updates, the Metropolitan Council has developed preliminary local forecasts of population and employment to 2040. This is the beginning of the process to determine the population and household projections that will be used for the City's next Comprehensive Plan Update. With the release of these forecast numbers, the City intends to continue working with the Met Council towards an overall reduction of the population, household, and employment projections specified in the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the City and the Met Council, with the ultimate goal of eventually eliminating the MOU as regulatory document.

FISCAL IMPACT: None at present – the Wastewater Inefficiency Fees that are included as part of the MOU would require the City to make payments to the Met Council if the development targets specified in the agreement are not met.

SUMMARY AND ACTION REQUESTED:

The City Council is being asked to review proposed population, household, and employment projections for Lake Elmo that have been prepared in response to recent conversations with the Met Council concerning the Thrive MSP 2040 process. With the release of preliminary 2040 forecast numbers for Lake Elmo, the timing is appropriate for the City to propose a new set of growth targets for the community that are much more consistent with the expected level of development in the community and the help the City Council achieve its stated goal of easing the Met Council REC unit mandates and to extend the deadlines for development out until 2040. Planning Staff has recently met with Mayor Pearson and Council Member Smith to begin the process of creating a credible 2040 forecast for the City of Lake Elmo, with the intent of:

- Understanding the real growth potential of the community in the next 27 years using primarily a single family residential philosophy.
- Determining how this growth relates to sewer REC units.
- Allowing enough growth to provide enough cash flow to support ancillary efforts like downtown development.
- Ensuring that the population forecast will be viewed as credible by the Met Council and provide a sufficient level of development to permit the eventual elimination of the MOU.

The projections that have been proposed as a result of this meeting are included below as part of this memorandum.

At this time, Staff is seeking conformation from the City Council that the proposed forecast numbers may be presented to the Met Council for consideration as a first step towards revising or eliminating the MOU. With the City Council's support, Staff will be submitting a letter to the Met Council with the proposed updated numbers for Lake Elmo. The suggested motion for this action is as follows:

"Motion to authorize Staff to present the proposed 2040 forecast numbers to the Met Council"

PROPOSED FORECAST:

Using the goals noted above, the following numbers are being proposed to replace the projections included in the Comprehensive Plan and Memorandum of Understanding (both of which were updated earlier this year). These numbers would be presented as a minimum commitment on the part of the City.

Please note that it is very difficult (if not impossible) to predict the number future housing units and commercial REC units within the Village due to the mixed-use zoning that will be used for the central portions of the Village Planning Area. Rather than attempting to guess at the commercial/housing nature of future development and the amount of existing units will be lost due to redeveloped in the future, Staff is proposing to establish a baseline REC count of 2.5 units per acre for all land outside of the greenbelt in the Village. This allows the City to use a general number for planning purposes while allowing flexibility to plan for various forms of development. The number used in the existing MOU does not take into account any future housing development within the mixed use development area within the Village, nor

does it take into account any future commercial development in the Village (this is why the existing MOU number is smaller than the proposed unit count).

In moving ahead with a proposal to revise or eliminate the MOU, the City's ultimate goal is the elimination of any numbers that are otherwise not required to be included in the Comprehensive Plan. This would allow the City to focus on attracting appropriate development that is consistent with the overall objectives of the Comprehensive Plan rather than having to worry about whether or not an arbitrary housing or commercial REC number is being met. The projected REC counts are important for planning purposes, but typically are only reported as part the wastewater plan and generally do not serve as targets for growth and development.

The assumptions and rationale that led to these numbers include in the above table are as follows:

- That the City should be planning for residential densities of 2.5 units per acre throughout all of the areas that guided for public sanitary sewer service. This is seen as the minimum level of housing development that is needed to help support the needed public infrastructure on City-wide basis. This also correlates with the housing demand that is anticipated in Lake Elmo.
- That the household and population growth in the rural development areas should be set at a level that anticipates a low to moderate level of growth consistent with the City's 2010 rural development review and analysis.
- That the overall projections should reflect a reduced amount of housing in all three of the City's future development areas (Village Area, I-94 Corridor, and rural development areas) rather than reducing the household numbers in only one or two of these areas. Although it does not appear to the case, the proposed Village unit count does represent a decrease from the current plan following the methodology described above.
- That previous projections for commercial development areas were overly aggressive and could only be achieved through the creation of large employment centers. The City prefers to focus on developing appropriate land uses within the commercial areas rather than concentrating on employment numbers and REC unit counts.

The numbers as proposed have also been drafted in order to account for the following variables, which will be very difficult to project with any degree of certainty in the future:

- How much of the Village Planning Area will develop for commercial or mixed use development compared to housing alone.
- What the average household size will be in 2040 given current population trends and the City's desire to accommodate senior housing options.
- Other factors that may shift more of the City's planned REC units into commercial or mixed-use development.
- How much development is likely to occur in the City's rural development areas. Under the City's current comprehensive plan, many of the City's 10-20 acre parcels would need to be redeveloped as OP or OP-2 development in order to achieve the housing unit projections. The proposed rural development number of 720 would greatly reduce this pressure

STAFF RECCOMENDATION:

Based upon the above background information and Staff report, it is recommended that the City Council authorize the drafting and submission of a letter to the Met Council with the proposed updated projections for Lake Elmo by undertaking the following action:

"Motion to authorize Staff to present the proposed 2040 forecast numbers to the Met Council"

SUMMARY AND ACTION REQUESTED:

The City Council is respectfully requested to approve a City Policy to provide a bridge for homeowners in the Old Village with older septic systems to use temporary measures / continue to use their systems until City sewer services can be provided in 2015-2016. The recommended motion for this action is as follows:

"Move to adopt the general property notice regarding private septic systems residing in the old village of Lake Elmo dated October 15, 2013."

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

Many homeowners in the Old Village area of Lake Elmo have private septic systems that exceed 20 years in age and were built under state law that did not require as much soil separation as current law. Subsequently, when these systems need to be replaced these same homeowners find

themselves with little or no room for the replacement, especially lake shore homeowners. This problem becomes compounded when the house is placed for sale with many homeowners finding that they must either discount the sales price or escrow funds for a system replacement. With City sewer services imminent, the City, in cooperation with Washington County, thought it prudent to develop an interim policy that allows taxpayers / homeowners to bridge the gap between having to install a new system and hooking up to City sewer (2015).

STAFF REPORT:

The City Administrator (after being made aware of the issue by several home owners and Council Member Smith), in concert with Washington County and the City Attorney, has constructed a two-fold policy that allows for temporary use of holding tanks for systems that are deemed to be an imminent health threat and a continued use of non-compliant systems until sewer is installed in the Old Village beginning in 2015. The policy places operational control of system review in Washington County's hands for the determination of system viability. The material change in policy for the Council to consider is that current City Code allows for a two year grace period for hook-up to City sewer when it is made available at the curb. Systems found to be either a health threat or non-complaint would not be allowed the grace period.

RECOMMENDATION:

Based on considerable review, the City of Lake Elmo staff recommends the adoption of the attached policy for interim measures to transition homeowners from private septic systems to city sewer in the Old Village or other potentially sewered areas:

"Move to adopt the general property notice regarding private septic systems residing in the old village of Lake Elmo dated October 15, 2013."

GENERAL PROPERTY NOTICE REGARDING PRIVATE SEPTIC SYSTEMS RESIDING IN THE OLD VILLAGE OF LAKE ELMO October 15th, 2013

Dear Property Purchaser / Property Owner:

The City of Lake Elmo is currently installing a force main sewer line to connect residents of the Old Village portion of the community to a Metropolitan Council sewer interceptor line located in the I-94 corridor. The force main sewer line is the first step to providing sanitary sewer service to downtown area of Lake Elmo — which is scheduled to commence in 2015 when Washington County rebuilds CTH Highway (Lake Elmo Avenue). It has been suggested that installing lateral sewer pipes to service the 200+ homes could take up to two years (2016) and most likely will include street and water main repairs. In the interim, the City understands that many residents in the Old Village may be faced with a situation where their current septic system is failing due to age or has been deemed non-compliant due to change in state regulations. This becomes particularly troublesome when it becomes necessary to sell your home.

The City of Lake Elmo, in conjunction with Washington County, is issuing this notice to inform prospective property purchasers, property owners, realtors, private home inspectors and private septic system consultants and vendors that the City of Lake Elmo presently intends, subject to fiscal ability and construction logistics, to install sewer to Old Village homes commencing in 2015.

In the event that your system is deemed an imminent health threat, it will be important for you to talk with representatives of Washington County to determine your best course of action. In an effort to save you money, the City of Lake Elmo would allow the construction of a temporary holding tank to bridge the gap between your old system and city sewer. Since the City of Lake Elmo contracts with Washington County for private septic system inspections, it is necessary for you to receive your interim solution from the Washington County Public Health & Environment Department. They may be reached by calling 651-430-6655.

In the event that your system is functioning, but is determined to be failing to protect groundwater due to a lack of soil separation, this notice will serve as your regulatory bridge to hook-up with the city's sewer system. Simply put, you will be able to use your current system until city sewer service is provided, BUT you will be required to hook-up immediately when the sewer pipe reaches your property. (NOTE: Current City Ordinances allows a grace period of two years to hook up to city services when provided). Our current estimation, in 2013 dollars, is that sewer costs (including Sewer Access & Availability Charges) could run between \$18,000 - \$30,000 based on your home's proximity to the sewer line, the retrofitting of your plumbing, and other site specific concerns.

Please present this notice to your financial institution, realtor, home inspector or others that may need a clear understanding of how your home will be served by city sewer in the near future.
